Pobledonostseff, of the Holy Synod, Foe of All Reforms.

STRONG ENEMY OF DUMA

Close Friend of the Imperial Family and Has Tremendous

St. Petersburg, Aug. 11.-The man

behind the throne is Peter Pobledonostseff, procurator and attorney-general (as we would call him), for the holy synod, the central ruling body of the Doree made an unsuccessful effort to Orthodox Greek Church, of which the Czar of Russia is the head. He has been a member of all the ministries for the last 26 years, and, although he is probably the most unpopular man in Russia, no incident or influence has been able to shake the confidence of three Czars in his ability, integrity and wisdom. He was the tutor of Alexander III. He instructed Nicholas II. in theology and prepared the present Czarina, as well as the Dowager Empress, for admission to the Russian faith. Both were Protestants before their marriages. 





Every journal in the country giving any attention to the sport of light harness has had more or less to say in regard to the selection of judges for the stand, and it is true that the "hail fellow well met" is not always a competent judge, nor is the prominent citizen either, no matter how honest and honorable he may be in all other matters. One well-known turf writer expresses himself on the subject as follows:

"Even casual observers of trotting, as it is conducted on the half-mile tracks, cannot have failed to be impressed by the fact that the paramount need of the sport is a better discrimination in the selection of the judges. This is a hackneyed and threadbare subject, but it is still apparent that it has not been sufficiently discussed to entail any material improvement.

"The judges continue to be chosen, at a good many of the half-mile track meetings from available material on the ground, when it is time to call out the horses, and it frequently happens that the available material is of a very doubtful character of serviceability.

"So that, when the drivers are permitted to resort to various practices not sanctioned by the rules, as I regret to say some of the drivers are in the habit of doing, it is a common and natural impulse to animadvert against the judges, when the fact may be that they have not seen the transgression in question, or, if they have, are unable to comprehend just what course they ought to pursue. There should be at least one man in the stand who knows the rules, knows when they are broken, and has the backbone to enforce them."-Spirit of the West.



HARD ON BIG-EARED

Professor Says That the Greater the Helix the Lower the Mind.

Berlin, Aug. 13.-Before the congress of German anthropologists, now meet- pit. ing at Goerlitz Professor Blau, a wellear, read a paper on the formation of the Fourth Avenue Methodist Church, the ears of criminals and lunatics. Professor Blau had taken accurate

measurements of 1,061 ears, of which 255 belonged to lunatics and 343 to male criminals, all Germans. The professor concludes that in a vast majority of cases the various parts of the external car are larger in the case of criminals and lunatics than in normal persons. This is especially noticeable in the belix or incurve, outer border of the car, and in the lobe. According to Professor Blau, the larger the helix is the lower is the state of mental develpoment. The hearing faculty, on the other hand, is keener.
