# IRON HEEL GRINDS **GERMAN CITIZENS**

Throughout Domains of the Kaiser Militarism Reigns Supreme.

Berlin, July 21 - That barbarous practices among army and navy of-ficers are not confined to Russia is expected to be shown at a trial to begin in Berlin shortly. The trial will also go far to show how absolutely under the heel of imperial officialdom is the average respectable German

The case concerns a young son of a prominent Berlin physician. The boy, Ulrich Cruewell, enlisted a year ago in the imperial navy. After about six weeks of service it was discovered that he had heart disease. A naval surgeon was ordered to make a

thorough medical examination. Among the young recruit's papers the surgeon found a certificate which showed that the boy had been discharged by a corporation because he refused to be vaccinated. In the eyes of the zealous imperial surgeon this was a grave offence, and he determined to teach the recruit a lesson before he reported him unfit for ser-

Ordering the recruit to bare his arm, the surgeon made four savage slashes in the flesh, several times as deep and long as customary in vac-cination. He then recommended the young man's discharge on the ground ysical disability. Thinking that Cruewell would be discharged at once, the surgeon paid no more attention to the vaccination. As it happened there was a delay of nine days before the boy was released from service, and when he appeared

swollen terribly and infected with Dr. Cruewell was still more amazed

Dr. Cruewell, however, forestalled such designs by having the boy's arm photographed in its various stages of convalescence from the poisonous wound he had received.

It is expected that the naval officers will pack the jury, as is usual in such cases, and produce official medical experts to testify against Dr. Cruewell, and the trial probably will result in further humiliation for the physician, if not actual punishment-




