Financial Provisions of the Home Rule Bill

speaking on the question of finance in the Home Rule bill, Mr. Asquith said that the Government was unable to adopt the scheme suggested by the special committee appointed to investigate financial relations, but had derived great benefit from that report. He emphasized the fact that under the existing system it was nobody's interest in Ireland to economize. Next year there would be a deficit of a million and a half pounds on frish administration, and if the present system were continued the deficit would be added to year by year. The bill anticipated a future when Irish income and expenditure would balance, and provision was made for that state of affairs; and meanwhile the collection of all taxes would remain in the Imperial service and would be paid to the Imperial exchequer. It was provided that there should be transferred from the Imperial to the Irish exchequer a sum to be called the "transferred sum," representing the cost, as determined by a board to be called the "Joint Exchequer Board," to the Imperial exchequer of the Irish services at the time of the passing of the act. There would further be paid over to Ireland half a million pounds the first year, diminishing by £50,000 a year to £200,000. The postal service would be made an Irish service. Ireland would get the benefit of all the incomes made under her administration.

The Irish Parliament would have full power to devise new taxes, to increase, to reduce or to discontinue Imperial taxes subject to the following restrictions:

Firstly-As regards income tax and estate duties and customs duties other than customs duties on beers and spirits, it will be unable to add more than will produce ten per cent. increase in yield. As regards excise its hands are entirely free. Secondly-It cannot impose a customs duty except upon articles which are dutiable in the United Kingdom.
Thirdly—There are certain stamp duties which ought to be

uniform throughout the United Kingdom. Fourthly-Any reduction or increase in Imperial taxes will

be subject to a reduction or increase in the transferred sum, corresponding to diminished or increased yield thus caused.

THE HOME RULE BILL.

The home rule bill gives the proposed Irish Parliament powers somewhat wider than those of a Canadian Provincial Legislature, and much narrower than those of the Canadian Federal

It will have no control of military or naval forces, or of external affairs Its powers of taxation will be restricted. It will not collect the Irish The members of its Upper House or Senate are to be appointed in the first instance by the Imperial Government. In these particulars Ireland will fall short of the measure of Canadian autonomy. The parliament at Dublin will exceed the authority of a Canadian Provincial Legislature by controlling the postoffice and a larger area of taxation. For the limitations of her self-governing powers Ireland will be compensated in some degree by representation in the Imperial Parliament, a privilege Canada does not enjoy and which she is not certain she

The piecemeal disclosures of the contents of the bill by cabinet minishausted curiosity, except in one important respect—the financial relations. Would Ireland have full fiscal autonomy, even to the extent of controlling the tariff on Irish imports: This claim was pressed by some Nationalists, though not by the leaders of the Nationalist party so far as known. It has not been allowed, and the opponents of home rule are deprived of what would have been a potent argument. An Ireland imposing customs duties on foreign imports which entered Great Britain duty-free-a protective Ireland alongside a free trade Great Britain-would not have been consistent with the federal principle upon which the bill has been

All faxes. English. Scotch. Irish. Welsh, including customs duties, are to be paid into the Imperial exchequer, which will pay Ireland an amount equivalent to the expenditure on Irish services at the time of the passing of the act, plus a grant of \$2,500,000 the first year, diminishing by \$250,000 yearly till reduced to a million an-The Irish Parliament cannot customs duties except upon articles which are dutiable in Great Britain, though it may increase, reduce, or discontinue these duties, any increase not to exceed ten per cent, It may also alter the income tax and estate duties, subject to the same restriction, and it has a free hand in respect to excise. /

Several clauses of the act aim at providing safeguards for the miniority, especially in the matter of religion. No religion can be established or endowed, or given preference or priv ilege; and no religious ceremony is to be made a condition of the civil validity of marriage. Of course these safeguards, or any others, would not reassure Irish Unionists, or abate their hostility, but they will satisfy the British Nonconformists, who are the backbone of the Liberal party in Great Britain, and will be accepted by the Nationalists without demur.

It must be gratifying to British Liberals to hear John Redmond's ac ceptance on behalf of his party of a scheme which falls far short of the demands of Irish extremists. With the latter he will have to reckon in his own country, but the reasonable temper of the Nationalist party in the House of Commons is a happy omen for a self-governing Ireland. Mr Redmond accepts the supremacy of the Imperial Parliament, and a limited autonomy, in the interest of a federal union of the United Kingdom, and of the solidarity of the British Empire. This is a libel on the West which Westerners ought to resent. Mr. Roblin's idea of a yellow journalist is a journalist opposed to the Roblin Government. He parades himself as a defender of British institutions, but no cabinet minister in Great Britain could survive for one day such charges as have been brought against Mr. Roblin himself, and proved to the hilt. He directs the most unscrupulous political machine in Canada, and his Government has become a stench in the land. This is the man who tries to put the stigma of disloyalty upon those who voice indignation at his administration, or express the egitimate grievances of the western





Meat Brine. Dear Miss Grey: Could you please

give me a recipe for making brine for keeping pork and beef? Thanking you in advance. COUNTRY COUSIN. Wipe every piece of the meat with a clean cloth until free from moisture. If the pieces are very large cut them vith a knife here and there to allow the brine to penetrate. To 50 pounds of meat allow 11/2 ounces saltpetre, 11/2 gallons of water, and sufficient Liverpool salt to make a brine. Mix the sugar, saltpetre and water together; add the salt until the brine will float an egg. Have ready the meat in a tub or barrel, pour the brine upon it, skimming off whatever may float; cover well with a thick cloth and watch it carefully for one week, skimming every day. The brine must cover the meat. In about two months drain this brine off and throw it away, and up they remain obedient to her. Mr. Hayman's Opinion.

Mr. William Hayman spoke along the same lines. He did not see why the city hall should be built in that part of the city. There was not a thing about the Ridout street site to com-mend it as a suitable site for a city hall. It would not be any advantage to West London, nor any other part of

"West London may talk of getting factories over there," he continued, "but I do not see how they are going to do it. Some mornings the employees will have to use a boat to get over. had some property there once, but I sold it, and was glad I did."

Mr. Christian again addressed the meeting. He stated that it was not for the sake of going in with the county council that the city council were agitating joint buildings, but for the sake of "a somebody," who was using his influence to get the city hall located there because it was going to benefit that one person.

London's Boundaries.

"It seems to me," he said, "that if ou asked any of the councilmen what were the boundaries of the city of London they would tell you that London is bounded on the north by Fullarton street and St. Paul's Cathedral; on the west by Ridout street; on the south by the Grand Trunk station, and on the east by Wellington street. Their view apparently does not extend beyond these limits."

"I really thought we had a good ounch of businessmen in the city council," said Mr. Hayman, "but if they ran their own business on an eighty and twenty per cent basis they would not have much of a business.

"Many ar alderman has entered that ouncil with the intention of doing the good and square thing," said Mr. A. H. Doyle, "but the million influences brought to bear upon him change him before he is there very long, and he has to follow the rest of them. The local papers are in a large measure responsible for this." "Let the people say what is to be

done," was the opinion of Mr. E. Hargreaves. "It was all right to build the city hall on the jail site if the city employees wanted a good view of the ball games in Tecumseh Park, but no other purpose could be served."





Redmond Satisfied With Home Rule Bill

In the British Commons yesterday, Sir. E. Carson was followed by the Nationalist leader, Mr. John E. Redmond, who made a compromise speech, indorsing the home rule bill.

"We Nationalists of today are not separatists like the ol lowers of Parnell," he said. "We are ready and willing to accept an Irish Parliament, subordinate to the British law-making body, which may prescribe proper safeguards for Irish legislation. The bill presented today by Premier Asquith is ex-

Mr. Redmond thought the bill would be adequate to carry out the objects of its promoters. He unhesitatingly advised the forthcoming Nationalist convention to accept the bill.

John Redmond declared today that the financial provisions of the bill were satisfactory, and that there was no objection to the reduction of representation at Westminster proposed in the bill. He declared he would recommend that the Nationalist convention accept the measure.

"I thank God that I have lived to see this day." he exclaimed. "I believe the bill will pass, and that the work of Ireland under its provisions will remove the widespread misconception of the Irish attitude toward England and the suspicion of the loyalty of Ireland."

New York, April 12.-General Frederick Dent Grant, commander of the department of the east, and son of the famou Civil War general, died suddenly at midnight at the Hotel Buckingham, where he had been secretly taken on Wednesday evening by his physicians. His presence in this city was not known until the news that he had been suddenly stricken was flashed to newspapers by the police. A policeman stationed near the hotel had called an ambulance at the request of an employee, who told hin that General Grant was choking to death Although there had been rumors of General Grant's illness and reports that he would never again take up his duties on Governor's Island, today's news came as a distinct sheck to the public. According to Dr. Robert Abbe and Dr. Edward B. Dench, his physicians, the death of the general was caused by heart failure. He had been suffering for some time, they asserted in an official statement from "diabetes and attendant digestive isturbances.'

Recent reports that General Grant had been in a private pavilion in St. Luke's Hospital in this city suffering from a cancerous growth under the tongue, the same affection which caused the death f his distinguished father, were denied today by the hospital authorities. Dr. Abbe, who has been the general's family physician for many years, refused to disuss the subject.

NO JOINT BUILDINGS SAYS THE WARDEN

Mr. Buttrey Declares County Council Has Made Its Best Offer to the City.

WILL HAVE OWN ROW

Repairs Will Be Gone on With, and Old Buildings Will Be Made To Do Duty in the Future.

Joint buildings are now practically impossible, in the opinion of Mr. Jos. T. Buttrey, Strathroy, warden of the county of Middlesex. In an interview with The Advertiser today, over the long-distance 'phone, he stated that the recommendation of the city hall ommittee that no action be taken or the proposition of the county counci to pay 20 per cent, of the cost of the buildings, finally settles the whole

question. "I see that the city hall committee has recommended that no action be taken on our offer," the warden stated to The Advertiser. "As they control the council, it is safe to presume that this recommendation will be accept-able to the council. That being the case, the question of joint buildings is finally disposed of. The county made the best offer they could, consistent with good business, from our standpoint. They felt that they could not pay more than 20 per cent, of the cost in view of all the circumstances. I am satisfied that the county will make no more offers, and that the question is now finally disposed of. We will have to go ahead with the repairs to the court house, and leave (the presen buildings as they are."






