LONDON MAN SUFFOCATED BY A STOVE IN HIS SHACK

Dispatch From Saskatchewan Tells of the Death of Mr. W. M. Duncan, Who Is Supposed To Be a Brother of Well-Known South Londoner-Was Coming East for Christmas.

They found the man, W. M. Duncan, leaning over the stove, dead. He had heated the stove apparently almost to white heat; had taken the lid off the stove, and retired. The stove had set fire to the bed clothing and ed and the gas had partly asphyxiatted his own clothing. He was fully attired and gas had partly asphyxlated and had tried to replace the lid. Failing in this, his smoldering clothes had caused unconsciousness, and he fell over the stove, where he expired.

Duncan's home was in London, Ontario, where he had planned to go for the Christmas holidays. His people have been notified and the body will be sent east.

GRAND TRUNK DEVICE PREVENTS TELESCOPING

Life-Saving Invention by Head of Car Department at Montreal.

Montreal, Dec. 11 .- The score of lives that have been lost in passenger train wrecks in Canada chiefly through the telescoping of cars might have been saved had those cars been equipped with a device produced by Superintendent J. Coleman, of the Grand Trunk Railway's car department at Point St. Charles, and which the officials of the Grand Trunk claim will either absolutely prevent the telescoping of passenger cars or reduce to a minimum the destruction following a collision.

Mr. Coleman who has been working on his anti-telescoping device for two years describes his product as a centrifugal lock in the centre plate of the car The principal adhered to is that if the of the car and the trucks on which it rides can be made as far as practicable a solid unit telescoping is virtually impossible. The officials of the Grand Trunk point out that telescoping is due to the fact that the body of the car merely rests upon trucks and is unconnected except for a two-inch centre pin "of negligible importance." Again, when the emergency brakes are applied by the engineer realizing imminent disaster the connection between the car body and the trucks is so slight that the car readily leaves the tracks and rushes forward into the car ahead and, unless the cars are of steel construction, tele-



SIR WILFRID STANDS FIRM.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has not given up the ship. If he is again returned to power, the grand old mariner promises that the dereliction of the Borden Government shall yet be made good. and Canada shall have Canadian fleets, Canadian shipbuilding plants, and a

Canadian naval service to be proud of.

The Liberal leader stands precisely where he always has stood. His policy is the same as he propounded from the first, as Messrs, Borden and Foster themselves once supported. It is based on a sound British and Canadian principle. There is scarcely a line of Sir Wilfrid's speech but can be found in essence in what Messrs. Borden and Foster said three years ago. It may be asked whether, the principle of national and imperial defence being the same as ever, Sir Wilfrid's actual plan has not been considerably expanded by the addition of Dreadnoughts. It has. The Laurier navy would have developed appreciably in five years towards the dimensions now proposed, but Sir Wilfrid has enlarged his plans make up for the do-nothing interval of Bordenism. By 1916, at the present rate of growth, Canada should be at least half as populous and rich again as in 1909, easily adequate to the larger effort which the Liberal party now forecasts. As Australia has enterprisingly advanced since 1909 to Dreadnought construction, so Sir Wilfrid's program grows with Canada, and to cruisers are to be added battleships of the first rate.

If Sir Wilfrid had stayed in power, there would have been before now a ship-building plant in Canada ready to begin operations. The first Canadian cruisers would have been on the stocks. Tenders had been received from British builders for ships to be built in this country, for this country, and by Canadian labor.

Since 1910 the case for the establishment of a Canadian navy for imperial defence has grown even stronger The burden of armament on Great Britain has increased, although or rather because, relatively to Germany, she is in a better position than she was supposed in 1909 to be. The head of the British admiralty at that time, Mr. McKenna, made the mistake of overestimating the rapidity of Germany's building and started the scare of 1909-1910. Since then there have been, to quote Mr. Churchill's speech of May last, "no grounds for panie or alarm." But the increasing cost of Britain's ermament nevertheless supplies a reayon for the greater development on our

It is precisely a Canadian development that will most help the mother country and ourselves. As Mr. Churchill said in May:

"The important thing is that the gaps should be filled up so that while we in the old country guard the decisive centres, our comrades and brothers across the seas shall keep the flag flying on the oceans of the world.

The Laurier navy, then, is the true Imperia! policy. It is also the only national policy for a self-respecting Canada. Even the Borden Government asserts that a British squadron must be sent to the Pacific waters to co-operate with the Australian fleet, In that squadron there will be no Dreadnought, only second-class ships But the Laurier policy will put 'a Canadian squadron with one Dreadnought on the British Columbia coast to co-operate with Australia. On such a policy the Liberal party can safely challenge the Government to test Canadian opinion. It is not afraid.

Sir Wilfrid's program has the element of permanency; it is "something grafted on the soil of Canada's nationhood which takes root and grows and develops," to quote Mr. Foster's eloquent language in a moment of patriotism three years ago. Sir Wilfrid bases his policy, as ever, on the principle of local autonomy. It is not a school-boy challenge to Europe, but provides a sound, national service for Canada, Great Britain and the Empire.



Dowieites Announce Return of Heavenly One, With Revelation Imminent.

SAYS VOLIVA TO GO

Utopia. [Special to The Advertiser.]

Chicago, Dec. 12 .- It was announced yesterday by Dowieites that the Messiah has returned-that he is on the ground in Zion City, and only delays his public appearance until the moment when divine revelation gives him the list of his eight attending priests-his cabinet.

The "reappearance" of the Messiah is in accord with a prophecy made three and a half years ago by H. L. Burnette and John Taylor, co-workers with John Alexander Dowle. They predicted at that time that Christ would come back to earth during the autumn of 1912.

Burnette said yesterday that the Messiah is in Zion City with two men —the Brothers Bushaw, of New York. He was to have appeared on Nov, 11. but "because the devil stepped in and combated the Lord" in his selection of the eight high priests, the revelation has been delayed until about Christmas time. All this is according to the word passed out in secret to his followers.

At Outs With Voliva.

Burnette, though an old-time Dowie lieutenant, is at outs with Wilbur Glenn Voliva, and is now giving out his statements from the third floor of a building at 741 La Salle avenue. Ho told his followers there that the Bro-thers Bushaw arrived from New York on Wednesday and went at once to Zion City. Burnette is said to have visited them there Thursday, and the men showed him costly garments of every description that were to be used to clothe the Messiah when he makes his public appearance on earth.

The prospectus of the work of the reappearing Messiah, as outlined Burnette, is to unite the twelve tribes of Israel in a sort of worldwide Utopia, where everything will be bliss and content. The first step in this plan was worked out by Dowie, according to Burnette, when he declared himself the Elijah, and then proceeded to Zion City-a place free from vice of all

HOME RULE BILL PASSES COMMITTEE; HOUSE ADJOURNS

Demonstrations in British Commons Marks Completion of an Important Stage.

GREAT OVATION FOR MR. ASQUITH

Mr. John Redmond Declares Union lack Will Always Be the Flag of Ireland.

London, Dec. 12 .- The committee stage of the home rule bill was completed in the House of Commons late tonight amid exciting demonstrations and counter demonstrations. The House then adourned. Premier Asquith and his ministers were given an ovation as they left the chamber.

Mr. Hammersley (Unionist) moved a new clause providing that the Union Jack shall continue to be the official flag of Ireland after the measure passed. He also urged that the flag should be hoisted in a conspicuous place and kept flying over the building of the Irish Parliament each day while the Irish Parliament was in session. He urged that this clause would be a test of the sincerity of the Nationalists present professions of leyalty to the Empire, and he considered such a test also necessary, having regard to their past declarations. There ought to be one flag for the whole Empire. The clause was defeated by 130 of a majority. In the debate on the proposal to make compulsory that the Union Jack should fly over the Irish Parliament building, Mr. Jeremiah MacVeagh, of South Down, behalf of the Nationalists, spoke dis-

aragingly of the Union Jack.



Let us give the empire not only money and ships, but our men, and if need be, our lives."



VOTING IS A SCIENCE

Ohio Ballot Filled With Names Was Over Four Feet

Long.

An Ohio ballot of the recent elections in the United States was presented to The Advertiser today, and is a most interesting document. It is one on which the electors of Cleveland voted, and is not a fac-simile used for campaign purposes.

It clearly disposes of the question so requently asked of late, as to whether or not the voters of the United States voted directly for the President. They certainly do not, but rather vote indirectly, that is, for the delegates to the Electoral College, 24 in number, from -the Democrats, the Republicans, the Progressives, the Prohibitionists, the tion to being a member since the Socialists, and the Socialist Labor organization of the society in Portage party—have tickets for the Electoral party-have tickets for the Electoral College, the names of each delegate from each party being attached. Following the delegates to the Electoral College, the various candidates for a myriad of offices, from governor of the state to the county coroner, are placed. Each of the parties has a ticket for these offices, although the Socialist Laborites had not many candi-

The governments of some of th states are making an effort to keep the judiciary free from political influence This is particularly true of Ohio, which has a separate ballot for the judges to be chosen.

The names are all put on one ballot, separate places being left for the various kinds of judges, supreme court judges and the like. No mention of the political character of the various candidates is made, and the elector has the opportunity of showing some signs of independence in the selection of the indiciary.

The presidential ballot is over four feet long and two feet wide, with about 400 names on it. At the top of each ticket is a round

space, where a voter may put a cross, signifying that he votes the ticket straight. This ballot is counted for every candidate on that slate, and gives the average man a chance to vote his party without knowing for whom he is

This is the method adopted by the majority, although in the recent elec-tion a growing number mixed up the tickets, and kept away from the strict party lines.

The ballot was presented to The "There is a growing tendency," he stated, "for electors to get away from the straight party ticket. It was not so noticeable some years ago, when the large majority of ballots were marked for the ticket, very few picking out candidates other than those with the party stamp upon them. That was not so much the case this year, and is a make for independence among the judges."
