Tea Stains.

Dear Miss Grey—Please tell me how to remove iced-tea stains from table-linen.

A.—If linen has not been washed, boiling water will take out stains. Otherwise use a chloride of lime solution. Boil a pound of soda in a gallon of water 10 minutes, then add a pound of chloride of lime. When the fluid is settled the clear part should be bottled and corked tightly, and kept for use for all stains which are hard to remove. Use fudiciously, as if used too often or too strong, it will rot the clothes.

Crabapple Jelly.

Dear Miss Grey—1. Give recipe for crabapple jelly and preserves, 2. What will take furniture polish out of an Axminster rug? SUBSCRIBER.

A.—1. For jelly, wash the crabapples and quarter them. Put them on to cook in barely enough water to cover. When cooked enough to mash to a pulp, strain, cook the julce a few moments, then add the sugar—as much as you have julce. Cook rapidly in a broad, flat kettle, try a little in a saucer occasionally, and when stiff pour into glasses to cool. Some of these apples are more dry than others, and it is necessary to use a little more water on these than on the julcy ones when putting them on to cook. To make preserves the apples must be pared, quartered and cored. Take an equal quantity of granulated sugar, and cook until chear. 2, it will probably evaporate. If not, clean with gasoline, but do it in the open air and be car-ful about fire.



Returns just to hand show a wide variation both in yield and quality reported, ranging from poor to good; but the average yield per acre will be decidedly less than usual. The excessive heat and drouth that prevailed at times in May and June caused the crop to be shorter in stand than usual, and some of the grain is described as having been shrunken by premature ripening. On the other hand some correspondents speak of the kernel as being plump and a good sample, and claim that fall wheat is the best grain crop of the year. The straw, while short, is generally dean and bright Smut was reported by only a few correspondents, but occasional mention was made of the presence of Hessian fly in every county west of York and Simcoe (inclusive), except Grey, Bruce, Huron and Essex. Harvesting was earlier than usual, ranging from the 3rd to the 22nd of July, and weather conditions then were on the whole very favorable.


