American Soldier Not As Well Paid As Many Others

Washington. July 16.—Popular belief in the United States that the American soldier is higher paid than that of any other country is erroneous, according to an official table issued today by the general staff. This shows that the three British dominions.— Canada, Australia and New Zealand—allow materially higher prices for each grade than does the United States. For instance, in the Australian army a corporal earns \$72.90 per month, as compared to \$36 in the American army.

Jack Mooney Dies As Result of **Gunshot Wounds.**

INQUEST BEING HELD

Amos Sherrick Is Detained by Police Pending Outcome.

Collingwood, July 16 .- Early this morning Jack Mooney, a man about 30 years of age, was shot by a farmer named Amos Sherrick, and died about fifteen minutes later. The tragedy occurred on Sherrick's farm, about two

Weimar, Tuesday, July 15.—It is reported that the government's new tax bill will include a surplus assessment on capital amounting to 30 per cent, and also a drast's imperial income tax, the receipts from which will be apportioned among the federated states, according to their needs.

Mathias Erzberger, minister of finance, is understood to be planning to centralize the nation's tax assessments, obviating the necessity for an individual tax in financing part of the federated states. An increase in the general trading tax, especially on articles of luxury, is also planned. It includes a 10 per cent levy on advertising.

Erzberger declared in favor of a constitution declaring equality of all men and women, and refusing to recognize special rights or privileges based on birth or social station. The new constitution prohibits a German citizen from accepting a title or decoration from a foreign government. fine.







Mayor Church, Controller Maguire and Controller Robbins voted to sign the agreement and Controllers McBride emerged from the meeting before the others, indignant at the proceedings. He declared that the whole thing had been done without first obtaining the opinion of the city's legal department.

"The whole business," he asserted, "was railroaded through by the mayor, who was supported by Controller Robbins and Controller Maguire. I was strongly opposed to it, but it was rushed through by them." Mayor Church, at the conclusion of the session, stated that the signing of the agreement had been decided upon so that the hydro-electric commission could go ahead with the work.

FORD CONCERN INCREASES CAPITAL FROM \$100,000 TO A HUNDRED MILLIONS

WILMINGTON, Del., July 15. — By certificate filed at Dover today, the Eastern Holding Company changed its name to Ford Motor Company, and increased the capital from \$100,000 to \$100,000,000.

The Eastern Holding Company was chartered July 9, 1919, with a capital of \$100,000 to deal in investments. The amending certificate filed today did not disclose any reason for using "Ford Motor" in the name of the company, merely stating that the change was authorized at a meeting of the board of directors, held in New York yesterday. No reason for the change was known at the office of the secretary of state.
