

THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
CANADA SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION.

PRESENTED TO THE SUBSCRIBERS AT THEIR ANNUAL MEETING,
JANUARY 23RD, 1872.

The Canada Sunday School Union is characterized by peculiarities in its aims, and agencies which arise out of the necessities of a new country, and which are daily being justified by the ever recurring fact that in towns where Christian organizations are developed there is felt an increasing need of a bond of co-operation, and that in remote scattered settlements there does not exist apart from external aid, and counsel the ability to establish Schools for the religious instruction of the young. To meet the demand put forth, in consequence of this state of things, upon the zeal and enterprise of churches in the more highly honoured centres of intelligence and activity the Institution was formed in the advocacy of whose interests we are now assembled. And the Committee in meeting their constituents, to render an account of the stewardship of the past year, do so with increasing confidence in the extreme importance of the cause they represent, and with the assurance that when the facts of the case are again fairly presented, a generous Christian public will with a hearty cheerfulness respond to the appeal which those facts embody.

When it is said that the design of this Union is to bring to a focus the varied intelligence of experienced teachers, so that more light may be secured for the solution of the difficult problem of a complete Religious Education ; also, to support agencies by which the efficiency of existing Sabbath Schools may be promoted and new Schools formed in districts far away from the advantages of centralized town life, this of itself is enough to commend the aims of the Union to the thoughtful attention of all who profess to value religious training, and to associate the future happy destinies of this Dominion with a piety wide spreading in extent, healthy and strong in its development, and fed by the pure waters of life which unceasingly flow from the Fountain of Divine Truth. We must deny the value of the richest and deepest experience which the Christian world has ever known ; we must do violence to our own noblest instincts and set aside the clearest teaching of the Word of God, in case, we think lightly of the early consecration of our children to Christ. It is bad theology, equally bad sentiment if we sluggishly compare ourselves with the notion that our offspring must be expected to grow up in sinfulness till they are old enough to be converted, and that, after sin has manifested itself in strong and perhaps repulsive forms, we must strive to save the soul by preaching and praying. There is an economy of Christian forces in our seeking the salvation of souls very early in life ; and if the Christian Church is alive to its responsibilities and privileges it will spare no self denial to obviate the fearful pressure, and acknowledged difficulty of labouring for the conversion of adults hardened in iniquity, by wisely and tenderly drawing the young into the peaceful paths of early piety.

The religious care of the young primarily rests, of course, on parents ; and it would be a serious calamity to domestic life if the prevalence and advocacy of public religious instruction, under the direction of the Church


should be perverted into an excuse for neglecting the important and inobviable duty of parental care. No Church action, no *semi*-public teaching in Sabbath Schools, no contrivance for elevating the general mass of the community, however wise, can for a moment release us who are parents from the high and imperious duty of seeking by all the means that loving ingenuity can invent the salvation of our own children. Natural obligations are as enduring as nature herself; and society ceases to be wisely and soundly constituted when it ignores or swamps the duties and privileges of the individual. But while these general principles are fully recognized and enforced, it is impossible to overlook certain facts that should be allowed to exercise some influence in the direction of our conduct in relation to our youth. The Church of God has its duties in reference to every creature on the face of the earth. The Saviour claims the young for whom He shed His blood, as His "lambs" to be nourished by those who love Him most. There is, also, a well considered supplement to the teaching and influence of pious parents, which instead of weakening will tend to strengthen their exertions. Nor should the healthful influence of mingling with other children, and associating with them in youthful acts of public prayer and praise, be lost sight of; whilst beyond all this there is the lamentable fact that in consequence of the irreligion or profound indifference of many parents, thousands of children must grow up in religious ignorance unless the Christian Churches come to the rescue. It is true, such representations as these seem to bear exclusively upon the formation of Sabbath Schools as distinguished from Home instruction; yet they are the strongest reasons that can be found for the support of a Sabbath School Union, in as much as the Union seeks by collecting the results of a large and varied experience, by providing the best materials in the shape of books, lessons and maps, by promoting opportunities for conference and

discussion on the best methods of teaching, and by fostering a public interest in Sabbath School work, to make the religious instruction of the young as perfect as possible. And the Committee have to report that they have afforded to them constant evidence of the great benefits which both Teachers and Scholars receive through the means now specified.

But there is one feature of the work which presents a peculiar claim on the sympathy of the churches in consequence of its missionary character. The country in which we live is itself young. The fertile fields are not all cultivated,—its forests not all cleared. Its towns and villages are often very small and far removed from one another. Moreover there are wide districts occupied by a scattered population which can only be described by the term "settlements." It is obvious that in such a country there are hundreds of villages and settlements which cannot be in the full enjoyment of Church life; and the experience of all the Protestant denominations goes to show that, in these districts, it is with extreme difficulty that even the preaching of the Gospel to adults by itinerant Evangelists can be maintained. The formation and support of Sabbath Schools is much more a work of difficulty. Such being so, the Canada Sunday School Union, can present valid claims to the sympathy and support of denominations, seeing that it seeks to bring the Sabbath Schools of our settled churches into co-operation with a view not only to strengthen and perfect what is, but also to send out agents to the remote settlements whose business is to gather together the people and aid them in forming Sabbath Schools in central localities. It is a significant fact that there are many Sabbath Schools in active operation in remote settlements which had it not been for the actions of this Union would have no existence.

In illustration of the principles and aims now indicated, we subjoin the following:—





AGENTS WORK.

The Committee have to report concerning the Missionary Work which it, the Canada Sunday School Union undertakes that in consequence of inadequency of funds they have not been able to avail themselves of the services of more than one Agent. This is a matter of deep regret inasmuch as it is impossible for one person to visit all the settlements and villages of this great country so often as is required for the maintenance of Sabbath School organizations in efficiency. But at the same time there is reason for gratitude that God has blessed the Union with the continued services of Rev. J. McKillican whose earnest and successful exertions of the past year affords a fresh justification for the confidence which the Committee have ever reposed in him. None but those who reflect in detail on the wide range of our action in Sunday School work and on the extremely remote and scattered homes of many of the youths who are the objects of our solicitude can form a correct conception of the zeal, tact, courage and perseverance involved in a successful prosecution of the Missionary part of our enterprise.

The leading features of the Agent's work, which extends from Kingston to Gaspe, and from Ottawa to the Vermont border line, consist in revisiting schools already organized the organization of new schools in destitute districts, the infusion into the minds of teachers and others of newer and nobler views of duty and privilege, and the securing of some aid towards the support of the Union. Mr McKillican's words are the best illustration of what is now stated. He says in his report: "I append the following synopsis of the work of the year; Schools organized 41, with 196 teachers and 1506 scholars. Visited 86 schools with 527 teachers and 4206 scholars, delivered 199 sermons and addresses.

In sums acknowledged elsewhere, Mr. McKillican collected in the country about \$400. He also aided in taking up subscriptions in different parts of the City.

He further says. To several of these *representative* cases I may be allowed to make a very brief allusion. To reach H—1 travelled 25 miles through a French Country. I organized the Sunday School years ago as a Union School. It has continued ever since and has sown much good seed. It has been the only public testimony for Christ, on many Sabbaths, there being no preaching nearer than eight miles. At P—the Sunday School has become a power or good. Before it commenced the settlement was notoriously quarrelsome and every improvement sought to be introduced, of a religious nature, was treated with disrespect. A few Christian men of various denominations were induced to conduct a Sunday School and the result has been a blessed change for the better in the entire settlement, between 60 and 70 being often present engaged in the study of God's Word. Peace, good order, temperance, and the Sabbaths are now respected in that settlement.

In reference to the general Missionary work of the year, he says: Thirty-five Townships were visited, some of these only partially, owing to the nature of the country and limited Protestant population. Twelve different points were visited on the sea coast, on the eastern limit of our field and five schools were there organized and five others placed in more effective working order. To show the destitution of some parts he adds, "In one Township I found only 3 schools in operation and organized 6. In another I found the same number and organized 6. In a third I found 4 schools and organized 5. In another I visited 2 and found openings for 4 and in yet another I found 2 and organized 8."

The difficulties and hardships connected with organizing some of the schools and also in attending them in scattered settlements are often very formidable. The people have generally shown Mr. McKillican kindness and respect, but with all this he has had to face inconveniences and discomforts enough to deter many a brave man. The reports says.

"At one place great inconvenience is felt for want of room for all the children. All in the settlement from the age of five up to twenty are regular attendants." In one case where meetings for prayer had been disturbed by unruly youths the efforts of our agent issued in a great change so that; "the moral training of the youths in that neighborhood has received an impetus which gladdens the heart of many a parent who before shed tears over the misconduct of their youths who had broken loose from all restraint. Again, I have seen during the coldest seasons of the year school houses, and where there was no school house, the largest dwelling in the settlement crowded to hear an address and Sabbath School training exercises with the children..... Some of the children coming three or four miles in bad roads."

In a rear settlement I found over 50 persons crowded into a little unpleasant school house, the mercury 20 below Zero and yet at 9 a. m. all the children were gathered and all in earnest to have the school organized. Many of the children were very poorly clad, the only protection from the cold over head was the shingles, while the openings between the logs were only partially stuffed with moss. There those children gathered with a

cheerful-interest and earnest wish for the Sabbath School, which was more than remarkable, it was touching in the extreme, an ample compensation for a long journey in bitter cold, in an open sleigh, without fur coat or robe to protect me. Indeed every meeting held for 10 days among those new settlers impressed me with the wants of the people and their hearty appreciation of the means adopted to meet their acquirements. These children were 10 miles from the nearest place of worship and the former school 14 miles."

Mr. McKillican appears in the character of an explorer as well as organizer of Schools. He says ;

"I recently found two interesting settlements in the vicinity of a dense Roman Catholic population. On inquiry I was told by a merchant that it was useless to go any further in that direction. An old woman wished me to go. The result was the organization of two Union Schools, in one of which are 40 scholars ; in the other, at my second meeting, 36 young persons gave in their names as wishing to be received into a "Testament Class." The young people raised and paid over \$13 in a little more than 24 hours to furnish their School."

These extracts might be extended and yet be full of fresh and instructive facts. But the foregoing may suffice to show what has been done, and how imperative are the claims of the poor, outlying districts on the sympathies and aid of this Union. The bearing of these facts on the development of the higher and nobler features of national life is evidently recognized by His Excellency Lord Lisgar, the Governor General, who on becoming acquainted with the nature of the work, conveyed to Mr. McKillican the sum of \$30, for which donation the Committee take this opportunity of expressing their thanks, both for its own notice, and also, because of the sympathy which it indicates.

During the past year, the Committee have been active in endeavouring to make the Union more effective in developing the intelligence and zeal of the well established Sabbath Schools of this city. The following list of meetings of Teachers and supporters of Sabbath Schools will show what was been done in this direction.

Feb'y. In St. Andrews Church ; *Subject*,—"Earnestness in Teaching," introduced by the Rev. G. Wells.

Mar. In Zion Church ; *Subject*,—"How may Sabbath Schools become efficient," introduced by the Rev. G. Lang.

- April, In Zion Church ; *Subject*,—" S. S. Teachers, Where shall they be sought, and how fitted for their work," introduced by the Rev. J. Potts.
- May, In Zion Church ; *Subject*,—"Teachers Training," introduced by Messrs. Scott and L. Cushing.
- Sept. American Church ; *Subject*,—"Hindrance to success," Rev. C. Chapman.
- Oct. St. George's Church ; *Subject*,—" Delegates Report of London Convention," introduced by Dr. Dawson.
- Dec. St. Andrew's Church ; *Subject*,—" What is the Sabbath School for ? introduced by the Rev. Mr. Cheetham.

The attendance at some of these meetings has been excellent, and the discussions evidently elicited a good deal of earnest thought, which it is hoped, will bear fruits in days to come. At the meeting held in Zion Church in May, on the question of "Teachers Training," a resolution was passed to the effect that it would be desirable to secure a Public Union Normal School, or Training Class for Teachers. An undertaking of this importance and magnitude could not however be entertained by your Committee, unless a request be made for it by all the Churches comprised in the Union within the City.

Several important Sunday School Conventions have been held during the year, namely, at Sherbrooke, Ottawa, Granby, & Melbourne, under the auspices of the Union ; and the provincial, at London ; also one of the N. Y. State at Plattsburg. The Committee are indebted to Revs. Dr. Burns, G. Wells, J. McKillican and Gales, and Messrs. Scott, L. Cushing, T. Lyman, S. J. Lyman, T. Muir, A. Savage, for their kindness in attending some of these conventions on behalf of the Union. It is an interesting fact, as showing the brotherly kindness fostered by means of these Conventions, that at the request of the committee, through their delegation to Plattsburg, the Rev. S. Scovill, J. B. Tyler and Ralph Wells visited Montreal in

June, where three very successful meetings were held, and a magnificent gathering of Sabbath School Children took place on the following Sunday in the American Church to hear an address from Ralph Wells.

The Delegation to the Provincial Convention held in London were authorized to invite the Convention to meet in Montreal, during the present year, and as that invitation has been accepted, we may look on with interest to the coming Fall, and the Committee venture to express the hope that Montreal will prove as hospitable as of yore and that our Churches will endeavour to make the Convention one of permanent blessing.

In order to develop the resources of our Sabbath School in this Province the Committee have secured the kind gratuitous services of the Rev. Mr. Gales of the Temperance League, who is well acquainted with the towns, to aid Mr. McKillican in organizing County Conventions.

But one of the most important undertakings of the past year remains to be noticed. The Committee have felt that something ought to be done to furnish useful religious instruction to the French speaking population, so far as they are accessible—especially to the rising generation who are likely to be more eager for interesting reading than their ancestors were. And after considerable deliberation and correspondence, arrangements were made for the publication of a little monthly illustrated paper which was issued in August last, and is entitled *Le Messager des Familles*. When it is known that this paper is furnished with a first class illustration executed in England, is under the management of an able and devout Editorial Committee, may be purchased for 12 cents *per annum*, and is in every way adapted to nourish the faith of French Protestant children, and to sow the seeds. Eternal Truth in the hearts of casual Romanish readers the Committee venture to hope that every effort will be exerted by the members of our Schools and Churches to

maintain the circulation at such a rate as shall enable this messenger of peace and love to live and flourish.

DEPOSITORY.

One of the most widely useful agencies of this Union is that of its Depository, from whence issue, week by week, publications specially designated to promote efficiency in Sabbath School work. It will be seen from the following figures that there has been a marked advance in this department during the past year,

It will be seen by the Treasurer's statement now presented that there is a balance to the credit of the Union of \$232: it may be inferred from that the finances are in a flourishing condition. But it should be borne in mind that this is not the balance in hand after all expenses have been met; it is simply the sum with which the Committee have to meet the current expenses of the present year; that is to say, we are living in advance of our income. This unsatisfactory condition of things involves the Treasurer in constant difficulties, with a view to remove it the Committee recently addressed to their friends a circular seeking special aid so as to provide during the year for the cost of the year. Apart from clearing off of old liabilities, it is important to raise the income of the Union from subscribers to \$5000 *per annum*, and it is earnestly hoped that the Christian public will respond without delay, unless, forsooth, it is thought well to withdraw our efforts from some of the remote and destitute parts of the field.


The foregoing statement of facts is presented by the Committee with gratitude to God for all His kindness in blessing the work of our hands, and in full confidence that all who love the Lord Jesus Christ will answer to our call for a more entire consecration to this holy enterprise. There never was a time when the enemies of Truth were more active and the dangers which beset our youth more subtle and numerous.

It depends on the care we take of our young people as to what the next generation becomes. The world, and the Church too, has often tried, and is trying still, various remedial measures for the rectifying of what is wrong, and the elevation of what has fallen. Now, can we, with the sins and woes of men around us, withhold a helping hand from those who are old in misery. But surely, it is time for the Christian Church to pay increased attention to measures of prevention, and especially to the saving of

our youth from the ignorance and the sin into which, otherwise they will assuredly fall. It is far better for us and for them that we spend vast sums of money, and put ourselves, if need be, to great inconvenience in winning them to Christ, while in their earliest days, than at some future day to have to pour out our treasures and pass through spiritual travail in the effort to rescue them from the misery, and the ignorance into which they will certainly fall if we restrain our heart and hands from this Sabbath School work. And knowing as we all do, from painful experience, the need of wisdom and co-operation in the work of saving our youth, remembering that the young men and women and children of the distant, scattered settlements, far from sanctuary, and from their former friends, are "bone of our bone, flesh of our flesh," and not forgetting how the Great Lord delights in the loving union of His people, be it ours to do our part to make the Canada Sunday School Union an increasing power for good throughout the length and breadth of the land.

October 31, 1871.

Your Committee has met twice since the date of the close of the last Annual Report, and an attempt was made to hold a third meeting, but owing to adverse circumstances, the attempt proved a failure. Two public meetings only since the Annual Meeting have been held, viz.: at the Roe District Union School on April 11th, which was well attended by parents and scholars. The subject down for discussion was "The desireableness or otherwise of the scholars committing a portion of their lessons to memory." But the speakers dwelt chiefly on the general work of the Sabbath School, and how the Association might aid and assist in such work. The other was held in the School House in the Grandboro District, on the last day of August. But owing to very unfavorable weather on the previous Sabbath, the notice given was very limited, and the weather on the day appointed not being good, the attendance was very small. Addresses were delivered on the general work of the Sabbath School and the objects of the Association by the Chairman, Deacon Minor, and the Secretary, which were well received.

The Schools in the Association appear to be progressing silently, but it is hoped effectually in their work.

Returns from Schools in the Association have been received, and from one other reporting to the same, which will be presently laid before you. (See Tabular Report.)

The little interest which appears to be manifested in the work of the Association, is a great grief to your Committee, for they conceive that with a very little rightly directed effort it might be made a very efficient organization for the improvement and encouragement of Sabbath School work in our neighborhood. Should we fail during the coming year to secure an improvement in this respect, it may be the duty of the Executive to move the dissolution of the Association. But for the present they will hold on, and strive once more, to make its meetings more regular and efficient, with the aid and blessing of the Most High.
