FREIGHT TO COME BY CANADA.

As the Result of a Labor Strike Contractor

Will Close Down Ruffalo Shipping. A despatch from Buffalo, N. Y. - President Corrigan, the Lake Carrier's Association, arrived in Buffalo to-night. In an interview he stated that the associadirection was taken to-day, when all grain shipments to Buffato had been ordered stopped.

It was the intention, Mr. Corrigan

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

What the Legislators of the Country are Doing at Ottawa.

THE BUDGET.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, in his budget peech, showed the big increase is the receipts from customs, excise and post-office. The increases in ex-penditure had taken place mainly in sinking fund, immigration, the mounted police and militia. There had been a betterment of \$538.937, in the Postoffice Department, which led to the penny postage and two-cent domestic

Mr. Fielding estimates the revenue for the year ending June 30, 1899, at \$46,632,398, and the expenditure \$42,-026,028, leaving a surplus in round numbers of \$4,000,000. He estimated the expenditure on capital account at \$8,-662,795, making an increase in the national debt of \$1,700,000.

Mr. Fielding commented on the fact that the proposal to reduce the rate of interest on savings bank deposits from 3 to 2 1-2 per cent. had not been carried out. Contrary to expectations the money market stiffened and it was thought advisable to keep the rate at 8 per cent. The Government, however, may reduce the rate at any time such action is deemed warranted, though the 3 per cent. rate will be maintained in the case of small deposits, as the Minister said, in order to encourage thrift.

The elector al districts of the counties of Kent Lambton, Huron, Bruce, Grey, Wellington, Perth, Middlesex, Elgin, Oxford Norfolk, Brant, Haldimand, Welland, Lincoln, Wentworth, Peel, Dufferin Simcoe York, and Ontario the districts of Muskoka and Parry Sound shall consist of the several townships, villages towns and cities, as declared by Chap ter 3 of the Revised Statutes of Out ario to belong to each of said counties and districts for municipal and judicia purposes, except that the County o Middlesex shall not include any portion of the city of London, the County of Wentworth shall not include any por tion of the city of Hamilton, and the County of York shall not include any portion of the city of Toronto. The city of London shall have one member Hamilton two members and Toronte shall have four members. The counties of Dufferin, Haldimand, Lincoln, Peel Welland, and Wentworth and the dis tricts of Muskoka and Parry Sound shall each return one member. The counties of Brant, Elgin, Lambton, Norfolk, Ontario, Oxford and Pertl shall each return two members. The counties of Kent, Huron, Bruce, Grey Middlesex, Simcoe, Wellington and York shall each return three members The cities and counties aforesaid return ing more than one member shall be divided into electoral districts by a Board of Commissioners consisting of three Judges of the Supreme Court of Ontario. Prince Edward Island shall have three electoral districts, Prince's Queen's and Kings. Prince and Queen's shall each return two members and Kirg's one member. No change shall be made in Quebec, except in Bagots, which shall be restored to its bound aries previous to the change made in

Hollow out drills, so they will be about two or three inches deep in stiff clay, or four or five soil in the trench with the foot; this is important; on this sow your seed twice as thick as you want them to stand in row to be sure of a full stand; cover seed about two inches deep and firm soil. Thin plants to two inches apart before they commence to vine. Hoe only shallow between plants. For support use poultry wire or brush. HINTS FOR THE FARMER.

PROFIT IN BEES.

Bees may be profitably kept as a side issue on the farm, and will pay as good a profit according to the capital invested as anything else, writes Mr. A. H. Duff. There is scarcely any time lost in caring for a few colonies of bees, for the most of the work can be done at leisure hours. It is true that at times they demand our attention at once as in case of swarming but this is only a rare occurrence and no one but enjoys the sport and excitement in hiving a swarm of bees a consider themselves well paid for time it takes.

To make the bees most profitable w do not want many swarms and we can, to a great extent, keep them from swarming by furnishing them plenty of room, to store honey. Farmers frequently make mistakes in this most particular of all things in not giving the bees enough surplus capacity. A good working colony of bees should have fully as large surplus storage capacity as they have in the brood chamber, and they are liable to fill this two or three times if the season is a good one.

Every one having bees should supply themselves with the necessary fixings for taking care of them. They need a few hives of the standard pattern, and also supers supplied with honey boxes and foundation starters to fit out all the honey boxes and the frames of the different hives, and thus have them all in readiness for the bees just at the moment they are ready for them. No one should be without a good bee smoker, and if they are fearful of getting stings, they may add a bee veiling stings. and a pair of rubber gloves. It is no truble to handle bees if we once learn

how to do it.

Greatly to our benefit we can have a honey extractor, and increase our crop of interesting, and I shall say the most profitable of all things connected with bee-keeping.
