**EDITORIAL NOTES.**

The Redistribution Bill was introduced on Friday last by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the chief points in it are as follows: The Electoral districts of Bothwell, Cardwell and Western Ontario are hereby abolished. The electoral districts of the counties of Kent, Lambton, Huron, Bruce, Grey, Wellington, Perth, Middlesex, Elgin, Oxford, Norfolk, Brant, Haldimand, Welland, Lincoln, Wentworth, Peel, Dufferin, Simcoe, York, and Ontario the districts of Muskoka and Parry Sound shall consist of the several townships, villages, towns and cities, as declared by Chapter 3 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario to belong to each of said counties and districts for municipal and judicial purposes, except that the County of Middlesex shall not include any portion of the city of London, the County of Wentworth shall not include any portion of the city of Hamilton, and the County of York shall not include any portion of the city of Toronto. The city of London shall have one member, Hamilton two members and Toronto shall have four members. The counties of Dufferin, Haldimand, Lincoln, Peel, Welland, and Wentworth and the districts of Muskoka and Parry Sound shall each return one member. The counties of Brant, Elgin, Lambton, Norfolk, Ontario, Oxford and Perth shall each return two members. The counties of Kent, Huron, Bruce, Grey, Middlesex, Simcoe, Wellington and York shall each return three members. The cities and counties aforesaid returning more than one member shall be divided into electoral districts by a Board of Commissioners consisting of three Judges of the Supreme Court of Ontario. Prince Edward Island shall have three electoral districts, Prince's Queen's and Kings, Prince and Queen's shall each return two members and King's one member. No change shall be made in Quebec, except in Bagots, which shall be restored to its boundaries previous to the change made in 1891.

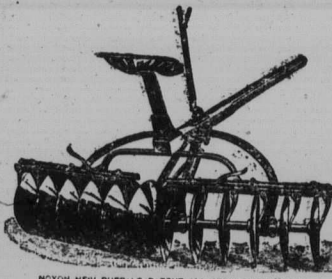

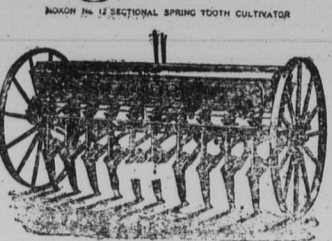
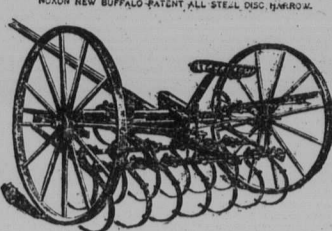

## LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO

The run of live stock at the cattle market was not large for a Friday, 58 loads, composed of 875 cattle, 1400 hogs, 25 calves and 200 sheep and lambs.

Quality of fat cattle was good, the bulk of which were exporters, there being barely enough butchers' stuff to supply the demands.

Trade was fairly active for choice heavy well finished exporters, but light or medium exporters were easy and inclined to be slow of sale. Prices remained about the same in all the different classes of fat cattle as they have been for the past three market days, with the exception of choice picked lots of exporters, which sold from \$5 to \$5.15 per cwt. Few, however, reached these prices. Considering the state of the market abroad, prices on this market for all kinds of fat cattle are good. But, notwithstanding this fact, many of the drovers are losing from \$15 to \$50 for every carload of cattle they bring to the market, having bought them too dear in the country.

Export cattle—Choice, heavy, well-finished loads of exporters sold at \$4.80 to \$4.90 per cwt., light exporters going at \$4.40 to \$4.60.

Export Bulls—Heavy export bulls sold at \$3.75 to \$4.25, light export bulls at \$3.40 to \$3.65 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers' and exporters, mixed, sold at \$4.45 to \$4.65 per cwt.

The bulk of exporters sold at \$4.70 to \$4.85 per cwt.

Butchers' cattle were not plentiful, and prices remained firm.

Butcher's Cattle—Choice picked lots of butchers' cattle, equal in quality to the best exporters, weighing 1000 to 1150 lbs, sold at \$4.50 to \$4.60 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers' cattle sold at \$4.35 to \$4.40, and medium at \$4.20 to \$4.30 per cwt.

Common butchers' cattle sold at \$3.75 to \$3.85, and inferior which are scarce, at \$3.50 to \$3.60 per cwt.

Very inferior rough cows and bulls, sold at \$3.25 to \$3.30 per cwt.

Stockers—Buffalo stockers sold all

the way from \$3.75 for common to \$4 for medium, and \$4.75 for extra choice bred steers, with the market active at these prices.

Feeders—Heavy feeders in good demand, with prices firm at \$4.40 to \$4.60 for well bred steers, half fat, weighing not less than 1000 to 1150 lbs each.

Stock Heifers—A few heifers were offered and sold at \$3 to \$3.12½ per cwt.

Stock Bulls—Inferior stock bulls sold at \$2.75 per cwt.

Feeding Bulls—Bulls suitable for buyers are worth about \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt.

Milch Cows—About 18 springers and cows, the bulk of which were of inferior quality, sold at \$25 to \$48 each. Good choice cows are wanted, and are worth good prices.

Sheep—Deliveries 200; prices unchanged at \$4 to \$4.25 for unclipped ewes, and \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt. for bucks.

Yearling Lambs—Prices a shade easier at \$5 to \$5.50 per cwt.

Spring Lambs—Prices easy at \$2 to \$4.50 each.

Calves—About 25 calves sold at \$2 to \$3 each. Good calves wanted.

Hogs—About 1400 were delivered at \$4.75 for choice selections, while light sold at \$4.37½ and thick fat at \$4.25.

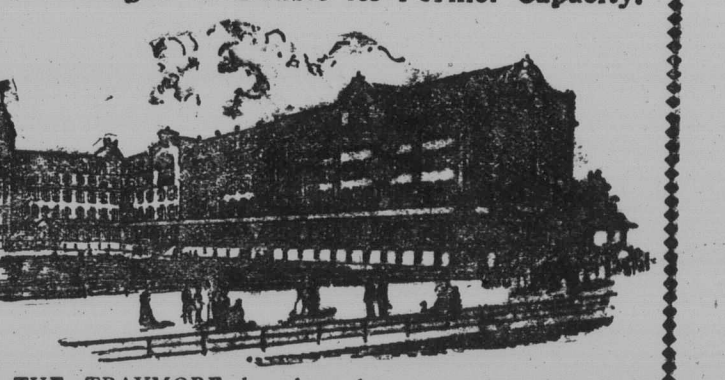

—Quite a number of Carrick farmers have plowed up their fall wheat, as it was not considered worth leaving to grow. J. D. Kinzie plowed up about twenty acres and put in spring grain instead. Fall wheat in this part will average about ten bushels to the acre.

—John LaFrance is at Walkerton this week clerking in Lembke Bros' shoe store. Mr. Lembke was married on Monday to Miss Seegmiller of Otter Creek, and the happy couple are spending their honeymoon in different parts of Ontario.

—Yesterday was the 80th birthday of Our Most Gracious Sovereign, Queen Victoria, and as such was celebrated by millions of her loyal subjects in Canada and throughout the domains of the British Empire. In fact, loyal Britons in foreign lands met and toast the health of their Royal Queen-Mother, the First Lady of the world, who has for more than three-score years so guided her own conduct and the affairs of the nation that she is now loved by millions of the world's people, British and foreign, and worthy of the emulation of mothers and queens the world over. Fortunate, indeed, are we that are privileged to live under so mild, yet just, a sovereign.

—Empire Day was celebrated on Tuesday afternoon at the public school in good style. There was a fairly good attendance of the parents and the afternoon passed away very pleasantly. The scholars sang some patriotic songs and gave a few recitations in the same line. Speeches were delivered on the following subjects:—What the Germans had done for our Empire—Mr. A. Moyer; What the Irish had done for the Empire—Mr. R. S. Scott; What the Scotch had done for the Empire—Mr. James Johnston; What the English had done for the Empire—Rev. R. Keefer. Mr. Moyer gave an outline of German history, specially emphasizing the excellent and efficient army and some of its successes in recent years. He showed that nowhere in Canada could be found more evidence of industry and thrift than in the German settlements of our country. Mr. Scott's wit and humor showed that he was just the man to speak for the Irish. He proved from British history that much of Britain's success was due to the skill and bravery of Irish generals, notably, the Duke of Wellington, Lord Wolsley, General Roberts and Lord Kitchener. Mr. Johnston proved to a demonstration that Scotland had supplied the cream of Canada's statesmen, notably Sir John A. McDonald, George Brown, Alexander McKenzie, Wm. McDougall, Sir Alexander Galt, Sir John Rose, Hon. Alexander Morris, John S. McDonald, Sir Oliver Mowat, J. M. Gibson G. W. Ross and many others. Responsible government in Canada was largely due to the persistent agitation of Scotch statesmen. The greatest public works in Canada had been undertaken and successfully completed by Scots, such as the Canadian Pacific Railway, surveyed by a Scotch engineer, Sir Sandford Fleming, who also finished the Intercolonial Railway. The Canadian Pacific Railway syndicate was composed of four Scots, George Stephens, Donald A. Smith, Duncan McIntyre and Robt. B. Angus. Rev. R. Keefer was particularly well pleased that his name was Keefer, which is a German name. His grandmother on one side was Irish and on the other side Scotch, so he had a like share in the glory of the achievements of German, Irish and Scotch and what had not been accomplished by these three peoples, the English had done, so he was in the most enviable position of any of the speakers. Mr. Ward, the principal, brought the proceedings to a close by a few well chosen remarks on the benefits of such gatherings. The national anthem was then sung and the audience dispersed.
