EXTENSION NORTH.—A bill to grant a lease of \$10,000 to the Stratford and Huron Railway Co. will be voted upon in the Township of Arran on the 6th November next. The Township of Arran has also authorized a bill to lay out a road in a similar suit, voting to take place on the 8th Nov.

COUNCIL.—An irregular meeting of the Town Council took place on Wednesday evening, at which permission was granted for the erection of a temporary frame annex to the Grand Central Hotel. A committee was appointed to "locate" a new sidewalk on Elma street, a duty which was performed on the following morning by selecting the north side of the street.

BASEBALL.—Listowel Red Stockings and Harrison Browns played a game on Tuesday. Darkness prevented the game being carried beyond the seventh inning, the score standing 10 to 14 in favor of Listowel. GRAND TRUNK TO LISTOWEL.—The prospect of securing the extension of the Grand Trunk Railway to Listowel has again been revived. General manager Hickson recently had a conference with a number of influential gentlemen of Berlin, at which the project of a railway north-westward was discussed. Mr. Hickson agreed to send one of the Co's engineers over the proposed line to report on the same. If a feasible route were found, and sufficient bonuses could be secured from the municipalities, he thought the G. T. R. might agree to build and run the road. Whether immediate action will be taken towards putting the scheme into operation is somewhat doubtful, still the municipalities that would be served by placing this link in the rail way chain of the Province should give it their careful consideration, and if thought sufficiently advantageous, the required aid will not be forthcoming.

SOCIAL AND PRESENTATION.—On Monday evening last an entertainment of the nature of a social ball, took place in the Methodist church. There was a goodly number present, and a couple of hours were very pleasantly spent together. Short addresses by Rev. Scott and Mr. Gregor, readings by Mrs. Freeman, Miss Powell and Mr. W. Hamilton, and musical selections by the choir, formed a part of the entertainment. Another interesting feature was the presentation to the church of a silver communion service. It was the free-will offering of Mr. Winans, an elderly lady of Listowel who is endowed with the true spirit of a Christian. The donation was made in her behalf by A. D. Freeman, Esq., Rev. Mr. Scott making suitable acknowledgment for the Trustees of the church. The service is of considerable value. It will be a worthy ornament to the communion table, and no doubt will long remain a cherished memento of the donor.

HIGH SCHOOL.—Mr. Buchan, Inspector of High Schools, visited Listowel on Tuesday last. We understand he was very favorably impressed with the marked progress being made in this institution. Since the summer vacation there has been a considerable increase in the attendance, so large in fact that it has been determined upon to employ an additional teacher. The resignation of Mr. Metzler, as assistant master since January, will create a vacancy at the end of the term which shall not be necessary to fill, and in order to meet these requirements the Trustees are advertising for two new teachers. The urgent need of better school accommodations is daily being more apparent. Indeed it would not be a matter of surprise were the Inspector to condemn the presentrickety building as unfit for school purposes. To delay the erection of new buildings is to jeopardize the promising future of our High School, and the board of management should feel it incumbent upon them to take action in this matter at an early day.

NEW ENGLISH CHURCH.—For some time past the members of the Church of England in Listowel have had under consideration the erection of a new church, the present edifice being quite inadequate for the accommodation of the steadily increasing congregation. The enlargement of the old church was at first proposed, but the idea was wisely abandoned after due investigation. A new building was then decided upon, but the committee not deeming it advisable to proceed until the subscription lists had reached a fair proportion of the estimated cost of a suitable structure. In the meantime Mr. Gall, architect, was invited to draw plans for a new church, and on Monday evening of the 19th inst. a meeting of the building committee and other interested was held, when the architect's plans were submitted. They were already well advanced, and it was resolved to invite tenders for the construction of a building in accordance. The church will be of modern gothic style of architecture, the structure being of white brick with free stone dressings, and will consist of an audience room and basement, the latter to be used for Sunday school purposes. The size of the building will be 36x72 feet, with transepts on each side extending 7 ft. from main body and 20 ft. wide; the tower will be 12 ft square and 52 ft high, surmounted by a spire 55 ft in height. There will be seating capacity in the body of the church for four hundred people. The building is to be heated with hot air, and will have all the modern improvements in ventilation, etc. It is to be erected on the site recently purchased on the corner of Victoria and Elma streets. When completed the members of Christ church will have a house whereof to worship that will be a worthy token of their desire to exalt the Prince Master, and at the same time be an ornament to the town. Hearty co-operation will be required, and it is hoped that the building committee will be liberally sustained in their laudable undertaking.

FORESTERS' PRESENTATION.—Mr. F. Chaplin, the gentleman who has recently taken up his residence and opened out a pork packing house in Listowel, was honored with a complimentary supper and presented with a handsome medal by the Foresters of Dundas, on the occasion of his removal from that town. The interesting event was alluded to by the Dundas Standard of the 17th inst.
