

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
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HE high rank of "Asparagus officinalis" awarded to this child of the early spring-time justifies us in making it the subject of a paper entirely given up to its nature, works and It was in high favor in imperial Rome. The epicurean patrician—when the modern master would say, "Be quick about it!" and the city conductor would growl, "Step lively!"—enjoined his slave to "do it in less time than is needed to cook asparagus!"

Most of us are familiar with the tale of the two French gourmands who quarreled over the rival merits of oil and butter in cooking asparagus, finally compromising by sending word to the cook to prepare half of the vegetable with butter and half with oil. The friends chatoil! The butter-man is dead!"

An American lover of the table avers that Asparagus officinalis "is an aristocrat from tip to stalk." All of which goes to prove that the owner of the high-sounding title differs utterly from human upstarts. He is an upstart, nevertheless, and the further he gets away from his native soil the less worthy

- ASPARAGUS RECIPES Boiled Asparagus (English Style).
Cut off an inch from the lower part of the stalks and scrape them from end to end with a sharp knife, taking off the thin outer skin alone, without bruising the rest. All the stalks must be of equal length. Bind them into a bunch and set upright in a saucepan of boiling water slightly salted, just deep enough to leave over an inch of the tips out of water. Lay clean stopes about the base of the stalks to prevent them from tipping over. Fit a close cover on the saucepan to keep in the steam, and after you feel that the boil has begun, cook twenty minutes: boiling water. Drain and cover the bottom of a buttered bakedish with a layer, arranging in alternate rows of tips to the ends of the spalks. Have ready this sauce: Drawn butter, based upon a cup of hot milk thickened with a roux of a tablespoonful of flour cooked smooth with a scant tablespoonful of butter; the yolks of two eggs beaten light and two heaping tablespoonfuls of Parmesan cheese. Cover the layer of asparagus with this, dust lightly with cayenne, put in the rest of the asparagus, arranged as before; pour the remainder of the sauce on this, and sift fine crumbs that have been dried in the oven on the top of all. Bake, cov-

Pare, wash and core carefully tart apples. Sweet apples will not do. Arrange in a deep dish. Fill the interstices with a half-cupful of sugar; stick a bit of butter in each apple; squeeze half a lemon over the apples, then pour in gradually a cupful of cold water. Cover the dish and bake until the apples are soft.

Have ready a cupful of tapioca that has been soaked for four heurs in enough water to cover it well. Drain the syrup from the apples upon the soaked tapioca and set over the fire in a double boiler until it is boiling hot. Pour, then, upon the apples in the dish; cover again and bake slowly for twenty minutes.

You may serve hot in the dish, eating it with hard sauce, or transfer to a glass dish while warm, and eat ice-cold with sugar and cream.

King are taking a great deal of trouble to deny in a purely technical way that the police squads with large shipments of rifles which left here last week for McLeod and Lethbridge had anything to do with the labor troubles at the mines.

The West was the first newspaper to announce that the police and rifles. were sent out so as to be available in case of trouble and that the force was in readiness at headquarters if needed.

The police went west to McLeod and Lethbridge and they were well equipped for trouble, and if, under the circumstances and with the warning indications pertaining to the difficulties that would ensue in case of a complete strike, the government had not taken this precaution to mend in power to enforce the law, they would have been guilty of criminal negligence.

It is well known that the people would never stand for the mines being tied up over a labor quarrel, esecially after the fuel famine of the past winter. The people and the rail oads must have coal and the Govrnment would have to arrange for operation of the mines in the event of a strike until such times as the operators and miners arrived at a solution of the dispute. The needs of the country demand this and there is no doubt that the police would be needed at the mines to keep order.

The labor organisations at Fernie must know that the history of coal strikes would warrant the government preparing for the worst under such conditions as the present and the sending of the police was not an expression of want of confidence in the negotiations taking place for a peaceful settlement.

It will be observed that the largest item of increase was on Dominion lands proper, the total revenue under this head for the last decade being \$13,139,941.78 as compared with \$2,343,835.95 for the preceding ten years. 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



While the wheat average for the whole province for the past season was 21.40 bushels per acre, the Regina district, consisting of Pense, Balgonie, the city, and Lumsden vielded 22.86 bushels per acre. The total area of land under crop in 1905, was 188,019 acres; in 1906, 231,293 acres, or an increase of 23 per cent.



Water Supply

The greatest asset any community can possess is an abundant supply of good water, and Regina holds a very

exceptional position in this respect. The water that is being distributed in Regina is obtained from underground springs, and is as pure as it is possible to get it. The water supplied until last September was obtained solely from springs intercepted by the 15-in. supply line leading from the reservoir to the compensating basin, which basin is situated about four miles from the city. There is an immense storage of Boggy Creek water at the reservoir which, though not as desirable as the spring water, could be used, after being treated with copper sulphate in proper quantity for domestic use. Fortunately there are a number of valuable springs near the reservoir which are being tapped and conducted to the main pipe line, and in this way the supply of last summer has been trebled. 





1882 when the post office was portable and consisted of a packing box which was allowed to remain a week at a time inside each of the business tents, and it was quite a nuisance, people having to keep it themselves, there being no one authorised to look after the mail.

E. B. Reed is credited with taking the initiative in drawing the attention of the government to this matter and a change soon took place. The first postmaster was Joseph C. Irvine, was was appointed in December 1882 and occupied J. J. Campbell's tent for a couple of weeks after which he moved to South Railway street and the following April to Stobart's on Victoria avenue. In January 1886 the new post office on Scarth street was completed and occupied. Mr. Irvine was succeeded by J. A. Whitmore who held office till his death and was succeeded by Frank Callendar who resigned last year, J. Nicoll, the present incumbent, taking his place.







Regina's Sponsor

Twenty-five years ago Regina consisted of a dozen tents and a couple of shanties. A party of old country tourists arrived in this canvas town on a bright summer morning in a special car and dined in a tent hotel. Among those visitors was Nicholas Flocd Davin, who had given up his law practice in Toronto to make a home somewhere in the west. He became enamoured of Regina and decided to cast his lot with the handful of picneers who were gathered at this point. Mr. Davin hung up his sign as a barrister and at once proceeded to establish a newspaper. He was anxious to tell the world about the queenly spot on these broad plains and he had more to do with the promoting of the early growth and development of the place than any other agency. Within one year there was in the town a population of 1,500 people. Through his eloquent tongue and prolific pen Mr. Davin tecame sponsor for Regina in her infancy, and now as the Queen city of Saskatchewan she has fulfilled the hopes and prophesy vouchsafed for her.

Fred Cook, writing to the Toronto Mail, twenty-five years ago spoke of Regina as the "Much abused Regina... Of all the places in the North-West not one has come in for less praise or more abuse." Rev. Mr. Wellwood writing on Regina in the Winnipeg Sun refers to this place as "Muchabused Regina." We have lived down the reputation of the past.

* * * * The first murder trial held in Regina was that of John and George Stevenson for killing John McCarthy The both men charged were found guilty and sentenced to be hanged on Nov. 28th, 1883. John McCarthy was a settler who lived on Sec. 32,-18-14. The murderers were halfbreeds. J. H. (afterwards Sheriff) Benson prosecuted and D. L. (now Judge) Scott defended the accused. Judge Richardson was on the bench. Peter Hourie, now on the Crooked Lake Reserve, was interpreter.

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

He had in the exercise of this responsible duty acted only after a great deal of investigation and deliberation, but he concluded that Regina was the most favorable situation, and he located the seat of government here, his choice to be confirmed twentyfour years afterwards by an almost unanimous vote of the first provincial legislature.

Hon. Mr. Dewdney regretted very much that owing to death having visited his home, and taken away his helpmeet, he was unable to be present at the - inauguration, for he would have met some of those who criticised his judgment when he first made Regina the capital.

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
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
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
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
