Munsey's Magazine For September.
In addition to eleven clever short stories, there are six special articles in Munsey's Magazine for September of exceptional interest and importance. The most notable of the latter is perhaps an article by Dr. William Lee Howard on 'How to Make Yourself Germ Proof'. Dr. Howard tells of the danger of too much exercise and urges nasal breathing as a supplementary fight against consumption. Isaac F. Marcossom contributes the dramatic life story of two poor boys who conceived and built the most important railroad in Canada, and who ultimately became sole owners. His story, 'Mackenzie and Mann,' is solid truth in fiction form and an intimate picture of two men of international fame.
'Moses Breze, Doctor of Sick Children,' is another article that is timely as well as informative. Breze says that the churches of this country must be conducted along more business like lines if they are to live. He says they must adopt fair means of raising money if they are to hold the people's confidence.
Two other articles of unusual interest are 'Crucial Moments Caught by the Camera,' by William Allen Johnston, and 'Lost in America,' by F. Canliffe Owen. Accompanying the former are many striking photographs of uncommon happenings. The latter story tells of a number of titled foreigners who have come to America and never again been heard of.
Matthew White, Jr., in his stage comment, tells of the work of the Drama League. In addition, there is the usual financial department, that answers a score of questions asked by investors, as well as offering a number of timely suggestions on the proper kind of stocks, bonds, and securities to buy at this time.

A Garden in the Air.
The highest garden in the world is said to be the Alpine garden of botany, which was laid out by the late Canon Chanoux, formerly rector of the Hospice of Little St. Bernard. It is situated at an elevation of 2,200 meters, or 7,150 feet. Here are to be found almost all species of mountain flowers, not only those common in the Alps, but also many that are peculiar to the area in 1858, but it was not until 1902 that his project became effective. In the latter year the commune of Thulle gave him the land.—London Globe.

Election.

One of the greatest victories in the present campaign was the defeat of Sir Frederick Borden by Arthur de Witt Foster. In 1908 Borden's majority was 491, while in this election Foster received a majority of 250. This is a difference of 741 votes, which is a wonderful change to bring about in a short time.

Although the unpopularity of the reciprocity pact was the chief cause of this change, still there are other reasons. Kings has had enough of old men and old ideas. She saw in Foster an untiring and enthusiastic worker, who would build up the County as no one else has done.

Kings county has done nobly. She has elected a young man of which any Province or County would be proud. Nova Scotia which has already given two Conservative Premiers at Ottawa and another just ready to form a government, will find in young men of ability like A. de Witt Foster the material for future leaders.

With the defeat of the Laurier Government on the 21st of this month an event has taken place that will go down to posterity as one of the greatest in the annals of Canadian history. The outcome plainly showed that the people of Canada did not want Reciprocity with the United States.

However they voted, most Canadians openly or privately rejoice at the final issue. They are delighted that the country's fiscal autonomy has not been sacrificed, that the Dominion is not to be bled for the benefit of the Republic, that its natural resources are to be conserved for its own inhabitants, that American trusts are not to dominate our commerce and our politics, that Canadian business interests are not to be jeopardized, that Canadian workmen are not to be exposed to American hard times, that single cropping and land impoverishment are not to be encouraged, that inter-Provincial trade is not to be slaughtered, that the well-proved National Policy of moderate protection is to be maintained, that Imperial trade is to be fostered, that the nation's political independence is not to be risked, and that once and for all the electorate has declared emphatically against continentalism and for the Empire.

Representation will be as follows:— Each Sunday School is entitled to send one delegate for every one hundred scholars or fraction thereof. Two accredited delegates from each county association. Besides above all Evangelical clergymen, Sunday School superintendents, county and provincial Sunday School officers can attend as delegates. Free entertainment will be provided for all delegates. The names of those requiring such entertainment should be sent to Mr. F. E. Cox, Middleton, on or before October 10th.

Reduced fares on the standard certificate plan will be granted by all railways and the Canada and Bras d'Or Steamship Companies.

Rev. Franklin MacEilfresh, Ph. D., of Chicago will represent the International Sunday School Association. Besides addresses by Dr. MacEilfresh, the programme contains the names of many strong men of our province.

General News.

Lord Strathcona, High Commissioner of Canada, sailed from London for home on Saturday, by way of New York. It is expected that his successor will be appointed as soon as his arrival in Montreal.

An informal announcement was made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier Saturday evening at Ottawa to the effect that he would lead the opposition at the coming session of parliament and until a successor could be agreed upon.

At Campbellton N. B., Friday, Mr. D. J. Bruce died of injuries inflicted by Dr. Doherty on election day. They had some words about political matters, and Doherty stuck his umbrella into Bruce's eye causing his death in a few hours.

The annual meeting of the Dominion Atlantic railway, which takes place October 13th, will be held at Windsor street station, Montreal. In the past the annual meetings of the company have been held at London, England. The fact that the meeting is being held at the new head office of the company is proof that the C. P. R. has in almost every respect taken over the road.—Herald.

DIGBY, N. S., Sept. 26.—Harry Wilson, whose trial took place in Little Brook today at the regular session of the Supreme Court, Judge Meagher presiding, was found guilty of the murder of his brother, George Wilson, Jr., and was sentenced to be hanged in Digby on Wednesday morning, November 15th, between the hours of four and eleven o'clock. The crime was committed last Wednesday.

Not for years has the Canadian Pacific Railway had so many miles of new track under construction as they have this year. New lines are being built practically all over Western Canada, and hundreds of gangs of track builders are at work in the various provinces. The C. P. R.'s network of new lines is rapidly extending into new districts. For the incoming settlers of next year it is stated that the C. P. R. will rush to completion nearly four hundred new lines in Alberta and Saskatchewan.



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THE POWER OF SYMPATHY.

THE HOUSE FLY.
This Most Filthy Insect Known.
This fly, called "phobid fly," on account of its being known as a carrier of typhoid germs, is one of the filthiest insects with which we have to contend. It also carries germs of tuberculosis and other diseases, and is a menace to the health of the family.
It breeds in fresh horse-manure and other filth, hence, when the stable is near the house, flies are apt to be more numerous. Use screens on the windows; resort to the use of sticky fly paper; keep garbage pails and privy vaults securely closed; if possible, keep stable manure covered. Some farmers wrap hank sticky fly paper, sticky side out, on the outside of their screen doors, at the top; which, in warm weather, catches flies which gather there.

A VENEOUS INDUSTRY.
How the Paper Makers Are Destroying the Forests of the United States.
The forests of the United States now cover 550,000,000 acres, or about one-fourth of the area of the country. Forests publicly owned contain one-fifth of the timber standing. The timber privately owned is not only four times that publicly owned but it is of a much more valuable quality. Forestry is not practiced on 70 per cent. of the forests publicly owned and on less than 1 per cent. of the forests privately owned, or on only 18 per cent. of the total area of the forests.
