Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a panalty of Twanty-Rvs per centum of the amount of the tar payable.

Any person, whether tazable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide informaston duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction the Act, shall be liable as summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false astension in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty net exceeding \$15,600, or to dis months imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.
