THAT ONE THOUSAND FOR LIQUIDS.

We have never made any attempt to defend the Government for spending \$1,000 in the purchase of intoxicants for the Vice Regal reception. We have no doubt but the Marquis is a moderate drinker, but it is our opinion that one thousand dollars worth of liquor would keep himself and his man servants and his maid servants, and all properly partaking of Vice Regal bounty, "on the spree" for a month. The Government members themselves did not try to defend the item, because they were well aware, that even though Robert Ritchie, Ex-President of the Temperance Union negotiated the purchase on behalf of his friend who does not live far from the Dufferin, theirs was the responsibility.

 It is said Mr. Pickard this spring is "raising" 23 calves, 14 of which are heifers, the balance of the male kind. If this is so, one is at a loss to know how he can waste his time in literary pursuits of such a nature as the above. Mr. Adams is as innocent of the Ritchie Rum transaction as is that big speckled calf that the Editor of the Transcript says he wouldn't "let any man have for \$50."

AN ANNOYING WHISTLE.

Three mornings out of each week, fully one half the town is roused by the unearthly scream of the up river boat's whistle. It is first blown about a quarter past five, and those who sleep at all know that at this hour most people "turn over" for the morning's nap. It is quite impossible for any one from Temple's corner, on both sides of Queen street, up to Post Office corner, indeed up as far as York street to sleep the mornings the Florenceville goes up river. The people of Regent street have also complained about it, and one should listen particularly to the little less than imprecations of the disturbed travellers in the two principal hotels, the Queen and Barker. In the Barker notably, no one can sleep on the luckless morning this boat sails.

WE DO NOT WISH TO GRAPPLE WITH THE PROPRIETORS OF THE FLORENCEVILLE AT ALL, BUT WE DO THINK AFTER CONSIDERING THE MATTER, THEY WILL SEE THEIR WAY CLEAR TO USING A BELL IN THE CITY, AS ALL THE OTHER STEAMERS DO.

The whistle is needed up river to notify the natives who may be buried a mile deep in the woods when the boat comes along, but there is no more need for the Florenceville to have a trumpet whistle, which gives us some faint idea of the instrument which it is said a certain angel will use on a certain day, than for any of the other boats to have one. The company publish their starting hours and that ought to be sufficient, but if the whistle be to wake up the few who go by the boat, it hardly fair to rouse the whole city at that unseasonable hour on their account. It is like a servant getting up in the morning, and hobnobbing through the domicile at such a rate as to waken the household. We believe the people disturbed by this boat, would willingly present the Company with a bell, if it would abate the nuisance.

COUNCIL MEETING.

APPOINTMENT OF OFFICERS.

"Now some vague method And now chaos reigns." The Council met on Thursday evening last. All the members were present, Ald. Wheeler not excepted! His Worship Mayor Gregory in the chair.

The Church Sextons Appointed Special Constables—Rosanna in Excelsis!

Ald. Clinton Declares that Carnal Expedients are Unnecessary in St. Dunstan's.

ALD. WHEELER WAS PRESENT! AND OTHER THINGS NIGH AS STRANGE WERE SEEN.

ALD. BURCHILL RECEIVES HIS LICENCE—THE TOLLS ABOLISHED IN PHENIX SQUARE—ALDS. WHEELER AND GUNTER DID NOT MAKE QUITE A HUNDRED SPEECHES!!

The City Council came together to a special call by the Clerk, on Thursday evening last. All the members were present, Ald. Wheeler not excepted! His Worship Mayor Gregory in the chair.

The Council room was well nigh full, at least all the sitting accommodation was taken up, and some squatted themselves on the doorsteps. In this connection how would it do to suggest the purchase of a few more forms or chairs?

One of the list of special subjects was the appointment of "officers." The first officer, according to the motion of a certain Alderman, appointed, was Ann Fleming as Alms House Keeper.

Alms House Commissioner, Mr. E. Clark, reappointed. (The "E." stands for Elijah; translated by the friars, Elias.—Ed.)

City Treasurer, John Edwards, reappointed.

City Auditor, P. McPeake, reappointed.

City Clerk, Charles Beckwith, reappointed.

Chief Fireman, Andrew Lipsitt, reappointed.

Road Surveyor, William Grieves.

Engineer of the "Alexandria," James White. It is this the White who is engineer of the city clock?

Engineer of "Silby," (of which Mr. Frank McPeake is Captain) Gordon Kelly—a good man.

Capitain Sampson was deposed as Captain of the Hook & Ladder Truck, and Alfred Edgecombe put in his place. This man is now "Captain Edgecombe!"

Sergeant John Woodward was appointed Collector of miscellaneous licenses, rather a comprehensive office. (We do not know if marriage licences and dog licences are also included.)

J. E. Smith was appointed Janitor and City Marshall, receiving \$100 for the latter office. This salary was obtained after a "fight," Ritchie, Wheeler, Clinton and Gunter opposing it.

Israel Smith a reliable officer always, was appointed surveyor of notices, and collector of taxes. He was endowed with 5 cents for serving each notice, and his profits came in out of the 40 cents on each execution. (Of course the ordinary reader will notice that the terms in our report come in every order, head first and tail first, but they must thank the Council for this. Our reporter, who is quite reliable, and did neither pen falsehoods, or distort statements, took them just as they came.—Ed.)

John J. Virtue was then appointed civic teamster. Mr. Gunter made a tremendous speech in favour of Mr. James Robert's appointment, but after the storm had subsided, Ald. Gunter stood up and very quietly informed the Council that Robert was indignant that his name should have been brought forward; and that he would not accept the position. Alderman Gunter looked quite heart-broken at this announcement, and it was fully a minute and a half before he made a speech after it. R. Dumphy was balloted out.

Ald. Gunter then made a fierce speech against Virtue. He solemnly assured the Council that Virtue was a deep, plotting, hidden enemy of the city's interests, and that his appointment would be "stir" in the city's fair escutcheon.

A lull here ensued, and John B. Hawthorne was appointed Captain of the Alexandria.

Geo. H. J. Jr., was appointed Assistant Engineer, and Jas. White was appointed clock winder.

Ald. Gunter who chafed while the above appointments were being made, presented a document which he called a report from the wharf committee. His Worship looked at it, but falling to fathom its depth refused to accept it without explanation.

Ald. Gunter then explained it in a speech.

After the conclusion of Ald. Gunter's speech, they appointed W. Long Pound Keeper, laying down no rules for the guidance of that officer, but simply leaving the matter of pound-keeping to his own discretion.

After Mr. Long, who, we believe, was sitting outside, had realized that he was again pound-keeper, notwithstanding the unmistakable demonstrations Ald. Gunter gave of his readiness to make another speech, Joseph Murray was added to the mile-long list of special constables.

Ald. Gunter then arose and urged that all city sextons be appointed special constables, because it often occurred that it was necessary to remove a man from the churches. Clinton said that no such carnal expedient was necessary at St. Dunstan's, and his Worship who is, some people hold, a Presbyterian, naively remarked, "You employ moral suasion down there, I suppose." Clinton said he "supposed so," and then the sextons were duly appointed. [Now it would have been a bright idea had they appointed all the clergymen and the male members of the choir and the deacons and elders, all special constables.]

The Surveyor General of lumber, wood and coal was next appointed.

Then the Council, after mature deliberation and sundry speeches by Ald. Wheeler—who, as we said before, sees present—and Ald. Gunter, appointed as Cow Drivers Joseph Murray, Esq., and D. Z. Keith, Esq. Of course the appointment of Cow Drivers is regarded by the Council as a mere formal ceremony, and the position is a mere honorary one and is so regarded by gentlemen acting in the driving capacity. Witness the cheerful moo-o-o-o-o-o-o of Drimmen every bright summer morning when the short, sweet herbage along Queen street is sweeter than any other. We shall attempt by-and-by, however,

to show to the Council and the gentleman appointed as Cow Drivers that W. Long, Esq., is Her Most Gracious Majesty's Pound Keeper to some purpose.

Ald. Ritchie, who is a credit to the Board, rose, getting the start on Mr. Gunter who was again ready to pounce upon the resolution, and moved the following resolution:

Resolved—That Debentures to the amount of \$5000 be forthwith issued under the hand of His Worship the Mayor and City Clerk, and City Seal—in accordance with the Act passed at late session of the Legislature, (43rd Victoria, Chapter V) entitled an Act to authorize the City of Fredericton to borrow money to take up outstanding indebtedness caused by burning of old City Hall, said Debentures to be in sums of \$100 and \$200 each, \$3,000 payable in 4 and 8 years, and the balance of \$2,000 after present City Hall Debentures fall due.

Before the last words of the resolution were concluded, Ald. Wheeler—who was present!—made an attempt to rise, but Ald. Ritchie had a remark to offer. He said he thought the time had arrived when some action of this nature was required in the interests of the city.

Ald. Wheeler, who, as we have said, was present at that meeting! then jumped up and said he would "go for" having the matter stand over. He offered nothing instead, but simply objected to the resolution.

Ald. Gunter moved an amendment that the Mayor be authorized "how-ever he can" to borrow \$3000. On being put this amendment was lost; but Ald. Wheeler during the disposal of the matter, rose just ten times. He reminded one of a cork on a trout line, now going down, and again bobbing up. We believe Gunter's amendment was supported by Clinton and Wheeler. Yes, Gunter himself also voted for it.

Ald. Wilson then moved a resolution to the effect that Phoenix Square be exempted from paying tolls. This resolution had the effect of bringing Ald. Wheeler square, and he explained that the Council did not understand the legal question involved, but listened with considerable concession to the legal explanation of the Clerk, and the "judgment" of his Worship. When these two were done, the Ald. quietly gave them a vague hint that they were both mistaken, and then subsided for a second or two. It was in this question that the Mayor was asked to rise, and the horns on the other. The contest was between Up and Down. Such a question is quite worthy the majority of the present Council. Ald. Wheeler, however, had a motion in his head, and with it he wished to amend Wilson's business like resolution. But he could not get it out, and after stammering for some time, His Worship put the "idea" in shape, and got it before the meeting. It stood in this way: That the Mayor, that we do not think it is his business to frame motions or amendments for stammering Aldermen. Ed.]

The whole matter was put in some shape or another before the Chair, and Free Markets all round was decided upon by His Worship's casting vote. His Worship always gives "reasons" for his vote, and in this case said he did not think it fair to merchants that there should be one toll market and another free market. This was good; and it was fluently expressed. By the way the Mayor is improving as a talker—getting ready for Ottawa we suppose—and he is becoming much of a wit, if not a wag.

The application of Mr. Pennyfather to have leave to open a drain on "Smythe Street, was referred to the Road Committee.

Ald. Burchill then made application for a wholesale liquor licence which was granted him by 5 to 4. The division was on the license rate, \$50 being adopted by 5, and \$25 by the other 4. Ald. Burchill cast the vote.

McPheron moved the police be paid monthly. Wilson moved an amendment that the monthly pay be confined to the night police.

The salary of the Police Magistrate was then fixed at \$400 per annum, which term a portion of the Council at least, understood to be per year. Salary of day police fixed at \$22 a month. No other police were appointed: so the corner roadies ought to kindle a bonfire to do honor to the City Council!

Then His Worship read a communication from Mayor Mackenzie of Ottawa, asking relief for the Irish sufferers. Our great-hearted Council, ordered the report to be laid on the table.

A delegation was appointed [then to wait on the ferry boats relative to the matter. The Council then disbanded till Tuesday next.

The reporters table was outside, but no one sat at it. The STAR representative sat back among the "unwashed" and took his notes. A reporter with vim in him would scorn to sit among men who could descend to such a little transaction as that of the Council towards the members of the press.—FNRS.

OTTAWA NOTES.

The Influx to Manitoba.

THE PETROLEUM MOTION.

THE DISCUSSION OVER THE ENGLISH AMBASSADOR—BLAKE AND MACKENZIE AFRAID OF A STANDING ARMY—SIR JOHN TELLING THEM TO QUIET THEIR FEARS.

Sir John A. McDonald stated in the Commons on Wednesday last that up to the day before over seven thousand emigrants had settled in Manitoba. And yet those who predict greatness for the North-West in the near future are deemed visionary.

Mr. Baby has a notice of a motion on the books relating to petroleum. The present law virtually excludes American oil, only admitting at a high duty oil of a fire test of 190° Fahrenheit. Mr. Baby proposes to lower the American standard to a 120° test, and to raise the home standard from 105° to 115°. The idea is a good one.

On the second reading of the Bill appointing Sir A. T. Galt a permanent Resident Minister in England, a warm dispute arose. Sir Leonard explained that the Government had no doubt but that the expense of Sir Alexander would be far more than made up by a saving in the making of loans. This looks reasonable. Canada has a great deal of business to do with England from time to time, and in such cases without a Resident Minister to do that business, she would be obliged to send over some of her Cabinet Ministers.

It is a resident minister in England in the past years, loans might have been negotiated without sending our Finance Minister, or our Railroad Minister over to carry on the negotiations. But the hoops were never over anything good in what is right. This is why Mr. Anglin thought the appointment was to put Canada on a different footing from hitherto, and to make her responsible for the burdens of war.

Mr. Mackenzie who is so far from material things just now, is heartbroken and disappointed because a younger man with less experience is set above him, regretted that the Bill had not passed in earlier session. He regretted above all that Sir Alexander was imprudent in his utterances, and hoped the Government would charge him not to talk his mind too freely.

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SCHOOL EXAMINATION.

MODEL SCHOOL.

The model schools, which are supposed to reflect the perfection of the system, were examined yesterday. The model schools consist of four departments, with two grades to each. Mr. Nicholson is head master and teaches grades 7 and 8. His department was examined by himself. There were 46 names on his register, 39 of which were represented at the examination. The examination in Canadian History showed a creditable knowledge by the school of the early settlement of the country, the maneuvering of the Indians, and the different changes that culminated in a consolidation of the Provinces in a political manner. Local history was taken up, and this exercise was highly creditable to the originality of Mr. Nicholson. The simultaneous reading showed a great deal of pains taking and was nearly faultless. The examination on chemistry went to the bottom of things, and the subject was well understood by the school. There was an interesting dispute on electricity; and the different abodes of this subtle element, from the black cats to the "camel creak" cloud were told to the evident amusement of many present, who from looks of determination then-formed upon their faces had resolved to test their respective black cats immediately on going home.

The school seemed quite familiar with Arithmetic. The singing was good, the grammar and analysis was better, and the geography, best of all perhaps. The map drawing was excellent, that of Bessie Mitchell, Minnie Evans and Lucy Ladd being particularly noticeable for neatness of execution and accuracy in outline and detail.

MISS BARTLETT'S GRADES 5 & 6. Miss Bartlett has 52 names on her register, of which 28 were represented. The exercises performed in this department consisted of reading, simultaneous and single, arithmetic mental and figurative, geography, religion, physics, from the text primers, and a very excellent exercise on proverbs from the reader. Miss Bartlett has a pleasing manner, and complete control over her school, and while master (mistress rather) of the method, she has plenty of energy to give action to her principles. Every good point "brought out" in the lesson produced approving smiles between Dr. Rand and Mr. Crooket, who are always ready to be delighted with the success of the "system."

MISS BATEMAN'S ROOM, GRADES 3 AND 4. The particular feature of this lady's room was the discipline; and her little flock was completely "under her thumb" so to speak. The reading was excellent, and in the simultaneous performance each word was said together, and there was not the slightest difference in the pitch of any child's voice.

The singing was charming, but our reporter said he was listening for—"Lord Bateman was a rich, noble lord, A rich, noble lord he was of high degree." This was not sung, however.

MISS MINARD'S GRADES 1 AND 2. This is said to be the most important department in the system, for here the foundation of the man and woman is laid; here the bent is given to the budding twig, and here the mental forces are shaped to certain courses. The work is chiefly blackboard exercises, oral and object lessons, and operations upon numbers: classification of colors, &c., &c. In all these exercises Miss Minard class did high credit to that lady; and the class moved with the precision of wheels in a clock. There were 40 names on the register, 35 present. In the several rooms on looking over the cards for "General Standing" we find in Mr. Nicholson's room the following names:

Miss Jennie Fowler 1st. Oswald Crockett, 2d. Mary Alexander, 3d. And special mention made of Bessie Stanger, Minnie Evans, Bobb Jarvis, Maggie Johnston and Bessie Mitchell.

In Miss Bartlett's room we find Miss Nellie Allen, 1st. Maggie Nicholson, 2d. Mary Smith, 3d. And special mention made of Paul Sherman, George Babbitt, Bessie Everett and Susie Gregory.

In Miss Bateman's room Nettie Libby, 1st. Lily Nicholson, 2d. Annie Stanger, 3d. Martha Tuffs, 4th. Emma Todd, 5th. And special mention of Ruth McAlpine.

In Miss Minard's room Miss Gunter, 1st. Mary Purdie, 2d. Mary Phillips, 3d. Nettie Estey, 4th. And special mention: Mary Perkins, George Stanger, Stella Smith and Fret Allen.

Owing to the bad state of the weather the examination at Doak Settlement did not take place until this afternoon.
