With an attendance of 920,000 at the Canadian National Exhibition, and some 175,000 at Quebec, and judging from the interest which a large percentage of these visitors evinced in the Government Railways attractive exhibits, they may reasonably expect to enlarge their ever increasing clientele.

At Toronto an immense map of Canada from Winnipeg East to the Atlantic Coast, some sixty feet long by fifteen feet high, was erected. The route of the Government Railways was outlined in electrically lighted red globes, and in order to demonstrate the run of the principal trains a moving shadow by an ingenious electrical contrivance was arranged. For instance, starting from Quebec an illuminated sign flashed the "National Atlantic," and immediately the shadow commenced its run to Quebec, connecting at Cochrane with the line to Toronto, the names of the principal stations flashing as approached. Nearing Quebec another sign announced the Ocean Limited had left Montreal. The two lines connected at Quebec, and the Ocean Limited continued its journey by the shores of the St. Lawrence and thence to Moncton, Halifax and the Sydneys. On the return journey a similar operation was performed.

An announcement on the map stated that over 500,000 of our soldier lads had travelled this route without mishap, a feature in railway operation any transportation corporation might point to with prideas indeed did a huge statue of Jack Canuck, emblematic of the fact that it was his own railway that had made such a record.

An architectural illuminated model of the new Union Station which is to be erected in connection with the vast terminals now under construction at Halifax was also displayed together with oil paintings showing the terminals as they will appear when completed.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-

THE sole head or a ramily, or any male over 18 years old may home stead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskat-chewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern-GREETING:

A Proclamation calling out the men comprised in Class 1 as described by the Military Service Act, 1917.

And Whereas that part of our militia of Canada known as the Canadian Expeditionary Force is now engaged in active service overseas for the defence and security of Canada, the preservation of our Empire and of human liberty; and it is necessary owing to the emergencies of the war to provide reenforcements for our said Expeditionary Force in addition to those whose inclination or circumstances have permitted them to lyolunders:

And Whereas by reason of the large number of men who have already left agricultural and industrial pursuits in our Dominion of Canada in order to join our Expeditionary Force as volunteers, and by reason of the necessity of maintaining under these conditions the productiveness or output of agriculture and industry in our said Dominion, we have determined by and with the advice and consent of our Senate and House of Commons of Canada that it is expedient to secure the men so required, not by ballot as provided by our said Militia Act, but by selective draft; such re-enforcement, under the provisions of the Military Service Act, 1917, hereinafter referred to, not to exceed one hundred thousand men;

And Whereas it is accordingly enacted in and by the provisions of an Act of our Parliament of Canada, holden in the 7th and 8th years of our reign, and known as the Military Service Act, 1917, that every one of our male subjects who comes within one of the classes described and intended by the said Act shall be liable to be called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada, either within or beyond Canada; and [that his service shall be for the duration of the present war and demobilisation after the conclusion of the war;

And Whereas the men who are, under the provisions of the said last mentioned Act, liable to be called out, are comprised in six classes of which Class 1 is, by the provisions of the said Act, defined to consist of all our male subjects, ordinarily, or at any time since the 4th day of August, 1914, resident in Canada, who have attained the age of twenty years, who were born not earlier than the year 1883, and were on the 6th day of July, 1917, unmarried, or are widowers but have no child, and who are not within any of the following enumerated

- Members of our regular, or reserve, or auxiliary forces, as defined by our Army Act.
- Men serving in our Royal Navy, or in our Royal Marines, or in our Naval Service of Canada, and members of our Canadian Expeditionary Force.
- Clergy, including members of any recognized order of an exclusively religious character, and ministers of all religious denominations existing in Canada at the date of the passing of our said Military Service Act.
- Those persons exempted from military service by Order in Council of August 13th, 1873, and by Order in Council of Decem-ber 6th, 1898;

And Whereas it is moreover provided by our said Military Service Act that our Governor-General of Canada in Council may from time to time by proclamation call out on active service as aforesaid any class of men in the said Act described, and that all men within the class so called out shall, from the date of such proclamation, be deemed to be soldiers enlisted in the military service of Canada and subject to military law, save as in the said Act otherwise provided that the themse actiled out shall report. Act otherwise provided; and that the men so called out shall report and shall be placed on active service in the Canadian Expeditionary Force as may be set out in such proclamation or in regulations; but that they shall, until so placed on active service, be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay;

And Whereas it is also provided by the said Act that at any time before a date to be fixed by proclamation an application may be made, by or in respect of any man in the class to be called out, to one of our local tribunals, established in the manner provided by the said Act in the province in which such man ordinarily resides, for a certificate of exemption from service upon any of the following

#### GROUNDS OF EXEMPTION :

- (a) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged;
  (b) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged in other work in which he wishes to be engaged and for which he has special qualifications;
- (e) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in military service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being educated or trained;
- (d) That serious hardship would ensue, if the man were place active service, owing to his exceptional financial or bus obligations or domestic position;

  (e) Ill health or infirmity;
- (f) That he conscientiously objects to the undertaking of combatant service, and is prohibited from so doing by the tenets and articles of faith in effect on the sixth day of July, 1917, of any organized religious denomination existing and well recognized in Canada at such date, and to which he in good faith belongs;
- And that if any of the grounds of such application be establis certificate of exemption shall be granted to such man.

And Whereas moreover it is enacted in and by the visions of an Act of our Parliam Canada holden in the 7th and 8th years of our reign and last the War Time Elections Act that certain persons thereby disgreem voting with such of their sons as on polling day are not cage, shall be exempt from combatant military and naval service.

And Whereas it is further provided by our said Millie from service shall be determined by our said local tribunals, sub to appeal as in the said Act provided, and that any man, by o respect of whom an application for exemption from service is me shall, so long as such application or any appeal in connection th with is pending, and during the currency of any exemption grantim, be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay;

And Whereas our Governor-General of Canada in Council has determined to call out upon active service as aforesaid the men included in Class 1; as in the said Act and hereinbefore defined or described;

Now Therefore Know Ye that we do hereby call comprising the men in our said Military Service Act, 1917; and hereinbefore defined or described as to the said class belonging, on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada, either within or beyond Canada, as we may, in the command or direction of our Military Forces, hereafter order or direct.

And we do hereby strictly command, require and enjoin that each man who is a member of the said class shall, on or before the 10th day of November, 1917, in the prescribed form and manner, report himself for military service, unless application for his exemption shall then have been made by him or by another person entitled to apply on his behalf; wherein our loving subjects, members of the said class, are especially charged not to fail since not only do their loyalty and allegiance require and impose the obligation of careful and implicit obedience to these our strict commands and injunctions, but moreover, lest our loving subjects should be ignorant of the consequences which will ensue if they fail to report within the time limited as afore-said, we do hereby forewarn and admonish them that any one who is hereby called out, and who without reasonable excuse fails to report as aforesaid, shall thereby commit an offence, for which he shall be liable on summary conviction to imprisonment for any term and exceeding five years with hard labour, and he shall nevertheless, if we so require, be compelled to serve immediately in our said Expeditionary Force.

And we do hereby proclaim and announce that for the groconvenience of our subjects, we have directed that prescribed for for reporting for service, and for application for exemption from sice, may, at any time on or before the said 10th day of Novem 1917, be obtained at any post office in our Dominion of Canada; that reports for service and applications for exemption from ser if obtained at any of our said post offices and properly enseuted, be forwarded by our postmaster at the post office from which the sare obtained to their proper destinations as by our regulations scribed, free of postage or any other charge.

And we do further inform and notify our loving subjects that: tribunals have been established in convenient localities throug our Dominion of Canada for the hearing of applications for exemption service upon any of the statutory grounds, as hereinhedrout; that these our local tribunals so established will begis to a the discharge of their duties on the 8th day of November, 1917, that they will continue to sit from day to day thereafter, as ma necessary or convenient, at such times and places as shall be notified, until all applications for exemption from service shall been heard and disposed of; also that men belonging to the hereby called out who have not previously to the said 8th ds November, 1917, reported for service, or forwarded application exemption through any of our post offices as aforesaid, may applications in person for exemption from service to any of our post offices are within the class hereby called out, that if, on or before that day, application for exemption 10th day of November, 1917, which by our registrar for the province in which they reported or applications for exemption from service for mis service, or if, on or before that day, application for exemption from services for mis service, or if, on or before that day, application for exe inform, forewarn and admonish the men belonging to the class he called out that if any of them shall, without just and sufficient of fall to report for duty at the time and place required by notiviting so posted, or shall fail to report for duty as other by law required, he shall be subject to the procedure, pains penalties by law prescribed as against military describers.

Of all of which our loving subjects, and all others whom the presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice, rend strict obedience to and compliance with all these our comme directions and requirements, and governing themselves according
