

TELEGRAPH LINES INTERRUPTED  
The disastrous fires raging in the neighborhood of Jumper's Brook and Lewisport for the last two days have devastated a considerable area of the forests, while much destruction has been wrought to the property of the lumbering mills operating at both these places. It is gratifying, however, to note that the prayer for rain has been listened to and that the conflagrations are being gradually subdued. Few messages were received in the city to-day about the fire owing to interruptions in the line caused by numbers of telegraph poles being burned down. The Reid Co. were in communication with Notre Dame Junction this forenoon and learned that there were copious rain showers prevailing at Lewisport and that the fire was practically out. The company also had meagre information concerning the fire at Jumper's Brook. Several telegraph poles and railway ties have been destroyed belonging to the R. N. Co., but the damage is only considered slight. A number of horses belonging to the mill there also succumbed to the ravages of the flames.

Inspector General Sullivan had the following message to-day from Const. Forsey at Gumbo: "Forest fires raged here yesterday. Walter Pritchett's mill burned. Fire not improving. It is hoped that the worst is over and the fires are being got under control. The fires are greatly hampering telegraph operations and as a result the Invermore's passenger list could not be received."

**What a Difference?**

The cable despatch conveys the intelligence that the resignation of Mr. A. B. Morine, as Chairman of the Public Service Commission has been accepted, and that it will take effect on Saturday next. The circumstances under which Mr. Morine resigned this office are interesting in view of the protests of the President of the F. P. U. against Mr. Morison continuing a member of the Government.

It will be remembered that objection was taken by a member of the Dominion House of Commons against the incumbency of Mr. Morine of the office of Chairman of the Public Service Commission on the ground of objectionable feature of Mr. Morine's career in Newfoundland. Premier Borden stated immediately that he would look into the protest. Mr. Morine almost as promptly placed his resignation in the hands of the authorities to take effect should they so wished when he had finished matters then pending.

It may be observed that the resignation has been accepted and it is to take effect at once.

What strikes one at once is that the objections raised against Mr. Morine

were not about anything he had done or left undone in connection with his duty as Chairman of the Public Service Commission, nor had the objections any reference to any acts of commission or omission during his residence in Canada for the past six years. The gravamen of the case against him was that which caused Governor Sir Herbert Murray to call for his resignation some thirteen years ago and related to his relations with the late Robert Reid before, about and after March 1898.

In short, certain matters which were held by Governor Murray to affect the honour of one of his Ministers, are now held by Premier Borden to be incompatible with the continued tenure of the office of Chairman of the Public Service Commission by Mr. Morine, although they took place in another country and took place some fourteen years ago.

Now mark the contrast between the action of Premier Borden and that of Premier Morris and also that of Mr. Morine and Mr. Morison.

The first protest was made against Mr. Morison about the time the protest was made in Canada against Mr. Morine.

Mr. Morine immediately placed his resignation in the hands of the authorities. So far as we know, Mr. Morison did not do so, and subsequent events seem to confirm this surmise.

Mr. Morine acted most considerately towards the Prime Minister who had placed him in office. Can the same be said of Mr. Morison?

Premier Borden answered publicly a public challenge in the premises. Premier Morris has remained silent

in spite of a public challenge in the matter of the Memorials about Mr. Morison.

Nay, more, he has done worse. He has flouted Public Opinion, by leaving Mr. Morison as Acting Premier, and practically his locum tenens during his absence. What a contrast between the conduct of these two Premiers!

Lisbon, May 23.—The Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 50 against 45, decided to-day to abolish the Portuguese Legation at the Vatican. This is a sequel to the law for the separation of church and state decreed by the government in April last year. The carrying out of the separation law has given rise to disturbances in many districts and in some cases has led to severe fighting.

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, May 29. A conference which will probably decide Britain's future policy in the Mediterranean opened here to-day. Among those present were Premier Asquith, Winston Churchill, Viscount Kitchener, who came from Egypt on a warship, and General Sir Ian Hamilton, Commander-in-Chief in the Mediterranean and Inspector General of the Overseas Forces. The Conference is the direct result of the recent action of the Admiralty in reducing the Mediterranean fleet and concentrating the vessels taken from it in the North Sea, which caused the keenest disapproval in England and France. This has led to the suggestion that the existing entente cordiale which has existed between the two countries should be replaced by an alliance. The question of strengthening the garrisons in Egypt and other places on the route to India, and the activity of the Italian fleet in the Islands of Aegean Sea and its effect upon British possessions, will also be discussed.

NEW YORK, May 29. Insurance men here have been advised that in consequence of the heavy losses sustained by the marine insurance companies this year, amounting to nearly \$25,000,000, culminating with the foundering of the Titanic, representatives of Lloyds and other marine companies are conferring in London with a view of an all-round increase in premiums.

OTTAWA, May 29. The resignation of A. B. Morine, as Chairman of the Public Service Commission, has been accepted, and takes effect June 1st.

MONTREAL, May 29. Ten thousand tailors, cutters and pressers are prepared to strike Monday next if their demands are not acceded to.

LONDON, May 29. Australia defeated South Africa in the first game of a triangular contest by an innings and 88 runs.

### Queer Charge AGAINST A TORONTO CLERGYMAN.

Published Notes of Burlesque Show, and is Charged With Issuing Immoral Literature.  
Toronto, May 23.—The Rev. R. B. St. Clair, Secretary of the Toronto Vigilance Association, recently attended the first performance of a show put on at a local burlesque house, and took extensive notes of the dialogue and the action of the play. These were printed, and the use of the mails being denied them, they were privately distributed to Ministers and others interested in the suppression of vice and immorality. The outcome was the issuance of a warrant against Mr. St. Clair, charging him with publishing immoral literature. This fact coming to his knowledge yesterday, Mr. St. Clair at once went to the City Hall and gave himself up.

He was taken to the detective office, where a police photograph was taken, after which he was moved in the patrol wagon to Court Street Station, where he was placed in a cell, being released three hours later in a \$1,000 bail to appear in the Police Court to-day.

## Forest Fires.

The forest fires which are raging north have already caused considerable damage. Telegraph communication is interrupted and business between the city and places beyond the range of the fire is being conducted through Cuckhold's Cove, Canso, and Port-aux-Basques by the Postal Telegraphs and the Commercial Cable Co.

This morning we received the following communication from Supt. Scott, which states that the settlement of Jumper's Brook is destroyed and that the inhabitants only got clear with their lives. The information yesterday afternoon, when the lines were interrupted, was that Botwood was doomed, but a more reassuring message came to-day stating that the fire was under control.

Newfoundland Postal Telegraphs, Superintendent's Office, May 30th, 1912.

Following From Grand Falls via Canso.

Settlement of Jumper's Brook destroyed; engine went out to rescue people, could only get within quarter mile of station, found no one, track impassable there; Cruiser Brook and repair out with me to make temporary repairs. Fires are still raging.

From Botwood.  
Impossible owing to smoke and fire to do anything to repairing line for few days, fire under control, not likely to damage line North unless it sets worse.

From Gambo.  
Lines east cut off by fire, have men fixing temporarily, lines west between Jumper's Brook and Bishops Falls 2 miles poles burnt down, Jumper's Brook swept, not a thing saved, doing best possible to get lines up.

AT BEAVERTON.  
Yesterday, Beaverton Secretary Watson received this message from Magistrate Scott at Beaverton:—

"Forest fires raged all round Beaverton and adjacent places yesterday and a most anxious time was realized, as the whole whaling plant and settlement was in danger. At my request Capt. Kneebone came direct here from Change Islands, to stand by the people and remain here all night. The this a.m. in immediate vicinity now over, and danger to settlement much less, but a large fire rages about two miles inland. Not much wind, and it is hoped the worst is over. Two motor-boats came from Change Islands, and a number of men belonging here hastened home from Change Islands. Mr. Hennebury is expected home to-day from Pilley's Island, where he has been engaged on telegraph repairs."

The Minister of Agriculture had the following messages yesterday and instructed the fire-rangers to employ all the men they could get to fight the fires:—

The Fire Ranger of Alexander Bay wired: "Forest fire raging, Salvage Bay in danger. Sending motor boat to see what can be done, and make enquiries as to origin of fire."

Another message said, "Fire at Glenwood still raging. Glenwood is out of danger. Have not heard from Norris' Arm, Badger, nor Crabb's today. A hot day; storm of wind."

A message from Lewisporte was as follows:—"Forest fire raging since last night half a mile from settlement. Scissors Cove was swept, only three houses left there. In Brown's Arm, Salt Arm, Salt Pond, Mason's Cove and Little Burnt Pond, Mason's Cove and Little Burnt Bay, if they are not already destroyed, great damage has been done."

## Died Suddenly.

There passed away suddenly at 5 o'clock this morning a well known and highly respected resident of Holloway street in the person of Mr. Lawrence Tobin. Deceased was in his 72nd year, and up to yesterday he had been working and shortly after last midnight was stricken suddenly. He leaves to mourn, a wife, four sons and five daughters to whom with other relatives much sympathy is expressed.

## Report on Vital Statistics

We are in receipt of the Annual Report of the Registrar General of Vital Statistics for 1911. The death-rate from Tuberculosis of the Lung for the Colony was the same as that for 1910, which was less than any of the four years' immediately preceding 1910. The rate for the city was 2.7 as against 2.58 for 1910. Infants Mortality generally was also higher both in the Colony and the City. The general mortality of the city was higher than it has been since 1908. The general birth-rate for the Colony was 28.44 and the death-rate 16.02. The population of Newfoundland is given as 242,596.

## A Plea for the Art of Profanity.

The Atlantic Monthly contains a humorous apologia for what the writer calls the lost art of profanity. He says:—

Whatever may be its history as a practice, the true psychological function of profanity is just this: to offer to the perturbed spirit an outlet for the energy which his provocation, whatever it may be, has aroused. The natural outlet for the energy thus provoked would, of course, be some act of retaliatory violence.

Understood, then, as a substitute for actions which would be unbecomingly unbecomingly profanity assumes at once a certain dignity of its own, as being possessed of a psychological importance. One would seem to be justified in speaking of it as an art.

### DEFINITION OF THE ART.

The question at once arises, "Wherein consists the Art of Profanity?" and the answer is obvious: the Art of Profanity consists in that choice of expletives and oburgations which, to a small extent by their meaning, but principally by their phonetic resonance and impact, shall offer the perturbed spirit the most satisfactory substitute possible for the natural action in whose place they stand. If one seeks merely to "ease his mind" a meaningful oath is quite unnecessary. All one needs is a good bit of mouthful of crackling consonants. For it is in its phonetic character that your true oath discharges its proper function.

### HOW THE NATIONS SWEAR.

The writer distinguishes the national characters in the various national oaths:—

The straightforward outspoken, brute anger of the Anglo-Saxon finds its truest satisfaction in the delectable linguistic and the booming mutts of our poor old overworked "damns." The more crafty hatred, and the more disreputable passion of the Latin races finds its apter expression in the purring aspirants and malignant sibilants of their hackneyed "sacres" and "carrambas." While the deliberate, unburied, deep-seated vindictiveness of the Orient is unmistakably betrayed in such polysyllabic maledictions as that one which so delighted the poetic soul of Thomas Huxley, "May the jackals howl on his grandmother's grave."

A glass works discovered that its profits were disappearing through mysterious channels. Expert accountants and auditors failed to detect the source of the deficit. The books showed no errors and yet the balance represented on the ledgers was constantly in excess of the balance in the bank. One day a quiet-voiced man entered the plant.

"Oh," replied the manager, "that's standard. Everybody in the glass business knows that the breakage is fourteen per cent."

"Nothing is standard that can't be verified," was the answer.  
Within a few hours, the astounding truth was brought home that breakage in this particular business amounted to more than double the calculated waste, and the problem of the deficit was solved.

The world is at last discovering that figures do lie. A new science has sprung into being—a science of common sense. Its motto is "show me"—it takes nothing for granted. It recognizes no precedents. It believes that no business procedure is sound which can't be proved, and declares that all things can be improved.

Harrington Emerson is accomplishing miracles in the conservation of human energy and the saving of millions. His work is one of the most important contributions to the Twentieth Century. He is the distinguished head of a small group of wonder-workers, among whom are such brilliant personalities as Gantt, Taylor of Philadelphia and Brandeis of Boston.

To make one drop of sweat fall where three poured before—to increase output and decrease the effort attendant thereon—to check reckless expenditures and eliminate extravagance and graft—to better the conditions of the worker, raise his pay, cut down his hours, and, at the same time, increase the income of the employer—these are daily accomplishments of the efficiency engineers.—Herbert Kaufman in Woman's World for June.

## Employers Refuse to Meet the Dockmen.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

Hopes for an early settlement of the dock strike were dissipated to-night by the refusal of shipowners to accept the Government invitation to meet the representatives of the men at a joint conference to-morrow. This decision was reached by the London Shipowners' Dock Committee this afternoon and was announced in a letter to the President of the Board of Trade, in which they state they fail to see where any good can arise from attending such a conference. Apparently the shipowners are prepared to fight to a finish, relying upon the Government to afford protection to whatever workers are employed. This course was indicated by a resolution adopted at a special meeting of the London Chamber of Commerce to-day, in which the right of employers to engage either non-union or union labor is affirmed, and the Government urged to afford protection to those willing to work.

She is a pupil of the Mercy Convent.

The Board of Trade is in receipt of a letter from Vancouver in which the following paragraph occurs:—

"Can you persuade some packer to put up boneless codfish in 2 lb. bricks? The boxes are all right, but it comes much dearer, owing to the cost of the box and the additional freight that is charged for packages. If the Halifax and St. John, N.B., people can put this fish in here at 10½c. to 11c. per lb., there is no reason why Newfoundland cannot do the same. This style comes here in carloads."



It is the law of life to want to see one's own flesh and blood about one, to hope to accomplish in the younger generation the things in which one has failed oneself. So that the average woman counts her children the strongest tie that binds her husband to her. But if children may bind, they also may separate. The husband should never be sacrificed to the children—for the sake of himself, the wife and the children.

#### Husband Neglected for Children.

There is really no need to choose between husband and children, but too many young women do not know that they are choosing. A young wife has had a relatively serene courtship, and has safely weathered the initial hazardous month of marriage. After the first baby comes, her husband seems to love her more than ever. As time goes on, and other children are born, it seems to her that their interests are merely growing broader and closer than they were. Too often she is so absorbed in her motherhood that she scarcely is aware of her husband's deeper needs—Maude Radford Warren in *Woman's World* for June.

### The Church and the Masses

Rev. F. Lewis Donaldson, of St. Mark's, Leicester, made some strong observations regarding the attitude of the Church to social problems in his sermon at Bow Church, Cheapside.

'We are in the presence,' said Mr. Donaldson, 'of forces that are shaking society to its foundations. I can almost hear the rocking of it as I speak. I see in these movements the working of the Holy Spirit. The people have seen a vision. The alienation of the masses from the Church will never cease until the Church breaks free from her class bonds and responds to these passionate appeals for life in the name of Him who came to bring it abundantly.'"

## The Cabmen's Tariff Again.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Any reasonable person would imagine that when injustice and wrong are pointed out to the Mayor and Councillors that some attempt would be made to apply a remedy, or that an investigation be held for the purpose of ascertaining whether the grievances complained of really exist, but apparently there is no intelligent head directing affairs municipally in this city to-day, and as a consequence a certain class of tax-payers must suffer. How long this will continue, and how long people are going to put up with this treatment are questions which must be answered by the taxpayer if he has any regard for his rights and the duties of those whom he placed in position. There is, however, a certain class of citizen who if he seeks not justice, but favors, we will find the Mayor, Councillor Mulvey and Councillor Myrick falling over one another so to speak in their haste to grant the favor. If the Honorable John Harvey were to ask some favor, or Dr. Grenfell make application that the building be erected on Water St. be exempt from Municipal taxation, we find the Mayor even going to the extent of giving his casting vote in order that it be done. The Cabmen are not asking for any favor, they are not asking to be exempted from the payment of taxation, they are asking for justice and fair play, then why are they withheld? Equality in the eyes of the law citizens are supposed to have, but apparently that equality does not exist in municipal government here. Neither the Mayor nor any member of the Council has attempted to defend their actions with regard to Cabmen's tariff rates fixed by them, and it goes to prove that they cannot justify the position which they took, nor justify the tariff which they published. Cabmen are paid less in many respects in this city than in any on this side of the water, notwithstanding.

Cabmen have the same right to live by the fruits of their toil in this community as the Mayor or any Councillor at the Board, they are going to insist upon this right, notwithstanding any action that the Council may take, and the matter is not going to rest or be waived aside by an autocratic act of the Mayor until full and ample justice be done us. There is a Court which is regarded as the final Court of appeal, namely, the public, and if we cannot get justice by bringing the matter under the notice of the Council, then we will appeal to the public for protection against wrong.

## Board of Trade on Steamer Service.

At a special meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade, with the President, Mr. G. C. Feary, in the chair, it was resolved to send a protest to Mr. Hugh Allan, of the Allan Steamship Co., against the continuance of the s.s. Pomeranian in the Newfoundland service. The message will also ask that this steamer be replaced by a boat more modernly equipped, of the type of the s.s. Sardinian. The Board of Trade objects to the s.s. Pomeranian. The Board objects to the s.s. Pomeranian as one of the oldest boats of the line and holds that she is utterly unfit for the conveyance of passengers and freight on the Newfoundland route. It is a well known fact that the placing of the Pomeranian on this service has caused considerable adverse comment along Water Street and among the public who cross the Atlantic from this port.

The matter of asking for a modification of the Common Carriers Liability was discussed and reference was made to the English Act. A committee was appointed to look into the matter.

The subject of a fire boat for use along the harbor frontages was also mooted, but it was decided to do nothing further until a reply was received from the Municipal Council to the proposal made to them by the Board.

The Council also took up the complaints of certain members of the Board, who are fruit importers, against the carriage of fruit on the Red Cross steamers for pursers who pay no Municipal taxes, which the complainants are forced to do. The Council decided to make a representation to the shipowners with the object of seeking a remedy.

Several applications for the office of Secretary to the Board were received, but no appointment was made. At 10.30 p.m. the meeting adjourned.


