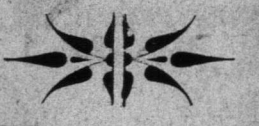

It is certain that, if I am to write at all, it must be of Whittlesford folk—for the best of reasons—I know very little of any others. I was born in Whittlesford, and have lived there ever since; consequently my range of experience is more or less limited. and stately, that the park and grounds surrounding it are simply splendid, and that there have been Chavasses of Chavasse for the last four hundred years. I do not and never did care much about birth; still I would rather be Edward Chavasse of Mount Chavasse than have any other title that was ever bought or given.

Handsome, proud and stately is this Madame of the Mount, handsomer at fifty than she was at twenty—proud of every drop of her Chavasse blood, and stately as the grand old house that calls her mistress—a woman rather cold, but true as steel, and loving but two things in the world, I used to think, at the time about which I am going to write—the old name, which is hers by birth as well as marriage, and myself.

What Nobody Wants to Do.

"Thinking is just what nobody wants to do," said Arnold Bennett once on a time. And to my mind, he certainly struck twelve with that sentiment if he ever did. How few people really do think about the little matters of everyday life!

Last summer I frequently had occasion to make a short trip during which I changed from one train to another. The second train always stood on a siding waiting for the passengers. There was usually a large crowd so that all could not get seats. On leaving the first train this crowd divided itself into two groups—the hot lot of those who were not in the habit of thinking about little things, and those who were. The first group rushed over to the train, jumped on the nearest car and scrambled for seats. The second class walked rapidly along the outside of the train, to the front cars where there was no crowd, then leisurely selected comfortable seats. By the time the overfrow of the first group had managed to make a difficult way down the crowded aisles of the rear cars, they found the front cars fully tenanted by the people who were in the habit of taking thought about the little matters of everyday life. Occasionally I used to look about at the faces of the people in the front part, and almost without exception they were intelligent faces, thoughtful

faces, the faces of men and women who were undoubtedly making their way in the world because they had learned to do something besides follow the leader in the game of life. There is the best way to do every little thing, whether it be washing dishes, or trying to get a seat in the train, or writing a letter. There is also a routine way of doing every little thing. Occasionally these two ways are one, more often they are not. And the successful men and women are those who use their thinking machines in deciding whether the routine way is the best way, and do not accept it unless it is. It is easy to do things in the routine way. It requires effort to think. That is why "thinking is just what nobody wants to do,"—at first, at least. After you have made the effort a little while, like all good habits, it ceases to be an effort. The men and women who get the habit of thinking about little things are men and women who can think to some purpose about bigger things. In business they are the people whose salaries rise as inevitably as the rivers in spring, in the home they are the folks who astonish their neighbours because they accomplish so much so easily. Do you think? Not just when you are up against it, and have to put your rusty machinery into effectual motion, but every day, every minute, about everything? It pays.

Household Notes.

Butter is best kept in stone jars with stone lids.

We have perused with much interest the Journal of Proceedings of the Fourth Annual Convention of the Supreme Council of the Fishermen's Protective Union held at Bonavista, December 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th, 1912. The Journal is published in the Fishermen's Advocate, the official organ of the Union.

Our readers have had an opportunity of familiarizing themselves with some of the doings of the F.P.U. and the people of Bonavista and neighborhood. Since the publication of the message descriptive of the public demonstrations and public meetings, we have been assured by eye-witnesses that the message sent to us and published by us in no way exaggerated what took place. The enthusiasm was wonderful and the feelings of the people were so pronounced that they almost baffled description. It was the biggest outburst of public feeling ever witnessed in Bonavista and vicinity.

The readers of the Evening Telegram have had also the opportunity of learning something of what was done at the Supreme Council meetings. They have been enabled to peruse in full the suites of resolutions denouncing the Government for its action in refusing to grant the prayer of the Council's petition which asked for an election in the fall of 1912, and the suite of resolutions which condemned the action of the Governor, the Premier and the Minister of Justice in connection with the Morrison Memorials.

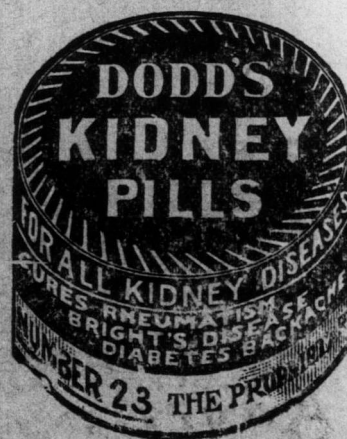

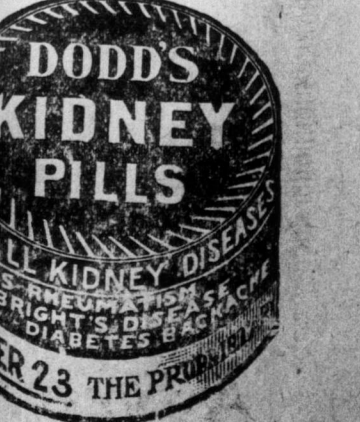

Cable News.

Berlin, Dec. 27.
Elgar is preparing to resume war according to a despatch from Bulgaria. The correspondent says that the Bulgarian War Minister has called up recruits due to be enrolled only in 1914, and has summoned all able-bodied men up to the age of 50 to the colors. Large supplies of war munitions and provisions have reached Rustchuk on a Russian steamer, which came up the Danube. Other steamers brought a large number of cavalry horses and hospital supplies.

London, Dec. 27.
A Durazzo despatch to the Times, dated Dec. 23rd, says that after four days' fighting between Baba and Deitche, ten miles north of Alessio, the Turks were driven out of the neutral zone on Friday. They lost several hundred killed and wounded, while the Servian casualties numbered 200. A Greek steamer brought to Durazzo great quantities of war stores, including twelve guns from Saloniki for the Servians at Alessio.

Berlin, Dec. 27.
The Kaiser's fifth grandchild, a boy, was born to Prince August Wilhelm, His Majesty's fourth son, and Princess Alexandra Victoria, yesterday. The other four grandchildren are all boys. The Kaiserin attended the accouchement. The Kaiser called and left a bouquet for the mother. He also ordered salutes of 12 guns fired at Potsdam and Berlin. Mother and child are doing well.

London, Dec. 27.
Following up the hitherto comparatively harmless campaign against letter boxes, fire alarms, and telephone wires, suffragettes are apparently adopting a new form of militancy, which, if persisted in, will seriously threaten the public safety. They have been interfering with signal wires at Potter's Bar on the Great Northern Railway. The wires were found tied together with a rope, to which was attached a letter pleading for votes for women. The discovery was made before any damage was done.

Pittsburg, Dec. 27.
Edward L. Dawes, millionaire, head of the Bath Tub Trust, and a leading citizen of New Brighton, 25 miles from here, has followed the example set by Corey, former president of the Steel Trust. Dawes divorced the wife of his youth and was married to Mrs. Forger, his former stenographer, also divorced. With the announcement of his wedding comes word that Dawes has quit New Brighton and Pittsburg forever, and will make his home in Toronto.

Hr. Grace Notes.

A little drunkenness was noticed on the streets on Tuesday night. It is only fair to say that this state of affairs was caused more by the "clock" rescued by train than by the breach of the Temperance Act in Harbor Grace.

Little Dorothy Darby, the 11-year-old daughter of Rev. T. B. Darby, passed away early on Tuesday morning, the 24th inst. The little girl, who was a favorite with all, has been ailing for some time and her death was anticipated. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the sorrow-stricken parents. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon.

The members of the Loyal Orange Society, held their annual parade yesterday forenoon, and ended service at the Methodist Church. The service was conducted by the Rev. J. Pincock. The day was very suitable for the parade. The British Society's band furnished the music on the occasion.

The ladies of the Cathedral Parish are holding their annual Christmas Tree. The affair was opened yesterday and was largely attended and very enjoyable. It is to be continued to-night.

Rev. F. S. Coffin, of St. Andrew's conducted service in the Methodist Church, on Sunday forenoon.

The new band instruments for the K.E.B., arrived last week, and is on exhibition at the shop of Mr. James Cron. It is a fine drum band and the lads will commence practice right away.

Miss Madge Oke, C. of E. teacher at Placentia, arrived by last night's train to spend her vacation with her parents and other friends here.

Cable News.

LONDON, Ont., To-day. Bishop Fallon, Roman Catholic, of the Diocese of London, confirmed by official announcement the intention of the Redemptorist Fathers to establish a Monastery in this city without delay. A new parish will be formed in London, and will be in sole charge of the Redemptorist Fathers who will build Church and Monastery. It is said that Rev. John McPhail, Parish Priest at Stannes, Montreal, will be director of the new institution.

CHICAGO, To-day. Fewer cattle by 231,288 have been received at the Chicago Stock yards this year than in 1911. Despite the fact, more money was paid for beef during 1912 than 1911 by \$33,382,750. The beef exports fell off this year owing to the big home demand. In 1911 there were 47,000 cattle exported from Chicago yards as compared to 23,000 this year.

CALGARY, Ala., To-day. Arrangements are completed for a 15-round bout between Bombardier Wells, English heavyweight champion and Tommy Burns, who claims the championship of the world. The bout will be held in Calgary, March 14th, for a purse of \$37,000.

INDIANAPOLIS, To-day. Fifteen hours spent by the jury in the dynamite conspiracy cases up to last night had failed in the result to return a verdict. Judge Anderson, further convening the Court to receive any reports from jury, ordered adjournment until 9.30, with the understanding that the verdicts should be found not to be returned till the time the sessions should be ended. The bailiffs entered while the defendants were awaiting and removed almost ten revolvers, guns, alarm clocks, pieces of exploded bombs of nitroglycerine which the Government introduced as exhibits. Part of the exhibits were weapons taken from McNamara brothers and McManigal at the time of their arrest.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Castro, Ex-President of Venezuela, said to be on board the steamer La Touraine due at New York from Havre on Sunday will be detained at Ellis Island, the Immigration Station, until Secy. Nagal personally passes up on his admissibility to the States. A special effort is being made to learn whether he was ever convicted of any crime, involving moral turpitude, that would supply grounds for deportation.

Fierce Storm.

WIND BLOWS WITH HURRICANE FORCE.

At 11.30 last night, it became stormy with the wind from the S.E. The gale gradually increased until at 3 a.m. today it blew a regular hurricane. At first it snowed a little then sleet was added and a flowing rain. The storm was undoubtedly the worst experienced here for many years and houses erected in exposed places rocked dangerously and many feared that they would be demolished. Along the country roads fences and trees are blown down on all sides. One of the principal supports of the Cape Sable Bridge gave way and the structure is very shaky. In the Narrows and in the offing, a mountainous sea is on and Mr. Cantwell, Cape says it was the worst storm he experienced since he has been at that station. Nautical men fear accidents at sea and that vessels in the vicinity of the coast must have had a hard drubbing.

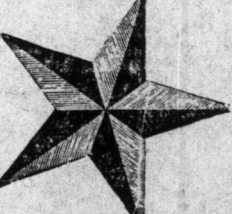

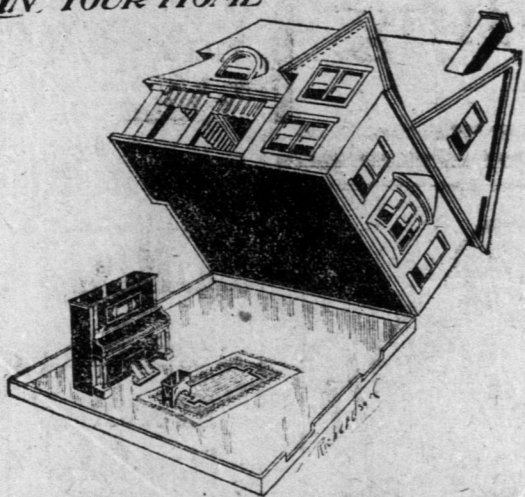

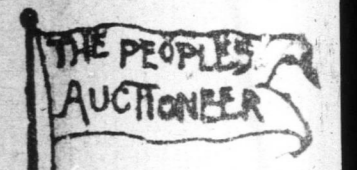
