Special to The Evening Telegram. The assassination of Mortiaro Abe, Director of the political bureau of the Japanese Foreign Office inflamed the masses to-day and a dramatic chapter in the history of the new Japan, written. Fifteen thousand persons gathered at a mass meetir in Hibiyapark, calling for military action against China. The Majority of these marched to the Foreign Office and clamored for admission. They demanded the despatch of troops to China to take such measures as were necessary to get satisfaction for the killing of the Japanese at Nanking or failing this, the resignation of the Minister of Foreign Affaires, Baron Nobauki Makino. The speakers de nounced the emptiness of Japanese diplomacy in connection with Call fornia and China, and insisted that the -insult to the Japanese flag of Nanking should be wiped out. The Mar ifestation is clearly an explosion of popular resentment against the Ministry in its treatment of California and Chinese questions. Profiting by the lesson of the riots which followed the conclusion of peace between the Russian and Jananese Government it reduced the risk of violence by refus ing to allow a single soldier or police man at the scene of manifestatins many of whom were students and were orderly. During the early par of the proceedings, a score of agitators, including a girl, decried Japan ese diplomacy, and decleared it had never contributed to the upholding of the Empire, and had ended in failure The incidents in China were unbear able. Suddenly a cry to march or the Foreign Office was raised. There was a general stampede, and many persons barely escaped being crushed. The crowds surged through the

War on Ragwort Senecio Jacobaea.

The Halifax Agricultural Society has been engaged during the past ew weeks in a laudable effort to rid the section of country from Bedford to Richmond of that most undesirable exotic popularly known as "Stinking Willie," which has cost the farmers of portions of Pictou and Antigonish Counties the loss of many nundreds of cattle, sheep and horses. Farm after farm has been abandon ed because the presence of ragwort has made it impossible to keep stock. On some farms all that was left was a solitary pig. Animals once attacked by hepatic cirrhosisthe disease induced by the ingestion of ragwort-infected hay-never re-

Men have been employed during the past fortnight to cut, pull and destroy the ragwort while in bloom throughout the district above nam ed. From a small patch at Bedford a few years ago ragwort has spread until it has become general along the western side of the Basin to Dutch Village: and unless systematic and continuous efforts are made to destroy the blooms the country will soon be overspread with this noxious plant from Hubbard's to Ecum

Ragwort is a biennial, coming up one year and flowering the next, and in consequence, it will take about three years to thoroughly subdue it in any infested district.

The plant was introduced into Halifax County chiefly through the importation of infested hay. The seed may be carried in the wool of sheep and is borne down the streams in time of flood. The Stewiacke River on the confines of Pictou County Senecio luxuriates in undisturbed vigor and thus the seed is carried down stream and passes by stages over the divide to the Valley of the

The Halifax County Municipa Council recently placed posters and olored plates of Senecio in many public places throughout the County, so that everyone may be able to recognize the plant.-Halifax Record.


