



Fighting on the borders of the flooded area was particularly furious. They rallied to the charge and three times they were repulsed. PARIS, Dec. 18. #### Baden-Powell on German Invasion.

London, Dec. 13.—General Baden-Powell shares the opinion of many other English experts who believe that Germany fully expects to invade England, if possible, and will direct its activities toward the commercial cities in the North of England, rather than toward London and the resort cities of the south. In the opinion of General Baden-Powell the German Emperor will endeavor to land at

east 90,000 troops in England. "I know that the general idea," said General Baden-Powell, in a recent interview, "is that the attempt to invade England will be made on the coast of Norfolk or Suffolk. Personally I think that the Yorkshire coast is more likely, for the Germans will first desire to invade the industrial centres of the north. They apreciate what effect that would have if they succeeded. Once let them get hold of some of the big manufacturing towns, factories would be smashed up and ruined, and I figure that they could throw 14,000 persons out of employment, rendering them destitute and starving. It is certain that even by a short, sharp raid they should do a tremendous amount of damage."

#### NOT OVER OPTIMISTIC.

General Baden-Powell is far less pptimistic about the war than many of England's public men. The hero of Mafeking, in discussing the present crisis, said:

"There are still many persons in country districts, and even in some of our large towns, who do not realize ed in our offensive. In this region what this great war means-that Britain's fight is for her very existprisoners and several guns and quick ence. We receive encouraging reports that we are doing well, but we nust remember that one side or the other must go under, and go under forever. At present, it looks as if the wind is blowing in our favor, but there is always the unexpected to consider. You can never tell. The right thing to do is to try to smash the Germans now, which means that every man must put his shoulder to

the wheel." The Germans, it is pointed out by the General, have nine places from which they could embark with troops in an effort to make a landing in England. He estimates that a greater force that 10,000 would probably not be sent from each of these points, making a total of less than 100,000.

COAST TOWNS ARE PREPARED. Lowestoft and other towns along he east coast of England, which are egarded as likely landing places for an invading army, have made preparations to receive the Germans. The Mayor of Lowestoft has issued a statement to the citizens of that town advising them how to act in case the Germans land. A special force of one hundred and fifty constables have been named, and civilians have been advised to follow the directions of hese officers explicitly, should the

dermans enter the town. Walter Long, a member of Parliaent, has advised that all foodstuffs stored in large quantities in east coast towns, should be moved inland where they can be guarded against eizure.

General Baden-Powell says that the 15,000 older Boy Scouts of England are doing everything in their power to assist in the present struggle. These scouts are sixteen years of age, or more, and would be available as a second guard, in case the military authorities lower the age standard. All these boys are fairly well drilled, and would be effective in amost any ort of military duty.

Frankly, we are, and must be, barbarians, if by this word we understand those who wage war relentlessly to the uttermost degree. There is nothing for us o justify and nothing for us to explain away. Every act, of whatever nature, committed by our troops for the purpose of discouraging, defeating, and destroying our enemies is a brave act, a good deed, and is fully justified. There is no reason whatever why we should trouble ourselves about the notions concerning us in other countries. Certainly we should not worry about the opinions and feelings held in neutral countries. Germany stands supreme the arbiter of her own methods, which must in time of war be dictated to the




