



On Pyorrhea.

(By DR. A. B. LEHR.)

kingdom which, in less strenuous

times, was wont so often, and that

with the utmost picturesqueness, to

but Montenegro has had to do what it had to do very much without its accustomed audience. It seems, however, to have done it pretty well. The

Montenegro had proclaimed the union

of that country with Serbia and,

consequently, with the new kingdom

of Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes, would

appear to have represented the facts

of the case, in spite of repeated de-

nials by the representatives of the

There appears, moreover, according

to a statement recently issued by Mr.

Y. Spassoyevitch, a member of the Montenegrin National Assembly, to be no truth whatever in the sedu-

lously circulated report that the union was forced upon Montenegro by the Serbian Army. Mr. Spassoyevitch, indeed, throws a welcome light

on the whole situation, and from his

statement it would appear that one of the first acts of the Montenegrins,

last November, when, for the first

time for almost three years, they re-

gained liberty of action, was to de-

pose King Nicholas, and proclaim the

union with Serbia. The Great Na-

tional Assembly, he declares, met on

November 11, and on November 13

unanimously proclaimed the fall of

the King and his dynasty and the

union of Montenegro with Serbia,

under the Karageorgevitch dynasty.

There was not, he insists, a voice

raised for the former King, although

The Skupshtina thus voted for com-

plete freedom, nor was it swayed,
