League Meetings Are Moveable.

Rome Will be Next Itinerary---Jugo Slave Given a Chance ---English Exchange Shows Upward Movement --- International Court of Justice Proposed ---Greek Government Dealing With War Traitors.

Forward Movement Campaign

TO RAISE \$100,000.

At a meeting of St. Andrew's Congregation, held in the Presbyterian Hall last night, what is known as the Forward Movement Campaign was inaugurated. After devotional exercises by Rev. Gordon Dickie, M.A., Mr. D. Baird was moved to the chair to conduct the meeting and delivered an address outlining the objectives of the Forward Movement Campaign. Similar addresses were given by Messra. Jno. Clouston, Edwin Murray, Alex. Robertson, R. A. Templeton, J. J. McKay, Rev. Gordon Dickie and J. Boyd Baird. The object of the campaign is to raise \$25,000 for Church extension purposes, of which \$15,000 will be spent locally and \$10,000 be given to the mother Church in Canada as contribution to the \$4,000,000 fund which is to be raised there for foreign and home missions and other church work distinct from local congregations. The \$25,000 will be raised immediately as a Peace Offering and is expected to be realized by July next. Notice to Flour Importers.

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
All Importers of Flour into Newfoundland are required to obtain permits for same from the Newfoundland Food Control Board at their office in the Justice Department.

Written applications for permits must cover the following information:-

- 1. Quantity of Flour.
- 2. Quality of Flour, whether pre-war (white) or Canadian Government Standard.
- 3. Where purchased, and from whom.
- 4. Date of Shipment.

In cases where the tax of two dollars (\$2.00) imposed on January sixth by the Canadian Wheat Board has actually been paid, the Board is prepared to present any claims to the Canadian Wheat Board if any difficulty is met with in the refund of same.

Flour can now be purchased by Importers on terms of shipment within sixty days.


