A Genius in Paper Mosaic.

In the Students Book room of the British Museum is to be seen a wonderful collection of Plant Mosaics, the work of Mrs. Dr. Delaney.

"The Delaney Plant Mosaics were made by painting fine paper one piece upon another and are the work of Mary Granville, who was born in 1700, and who married Dr. Delaney, one-time Dean of Down. She died in 1758. During her life she gained some reputation as a portrait painter. But it is for her Plant Mosaics, made for amusement during her leisure hours, that she is famous.

"Mrs. Delaney attempted to paint flowers, but was dissatisfied with her efforts and set about to copy Nature more accurately by pasting coloured tissue paper on rough black sheets. To obtain the best results she often made use of paper of very delicate shades, covering the one with the other, until the desired shade was obtained. In the petals of some of the flowers in the British Museum collection hundreds of pieces of paper are used. The work is a wonderful imitation of Nature—every petal, every leaf is formed with an accuracy, a skill, which goes to show that Mrs. Delaney was a botanist as well as an artist.

"The Plant Mosaics include not only specimens of well-known British plants and flowers; rare blooms from overseas are also represented. It is said that Mrs. Delaney got the models for these latter from plants collected by friends of her husband, who brought back specimens of rare plants from distant lands for her to copy. To obtain paper for her work the artist collected every bit of coloured paper she could lay hands on, and employed her friends to do the same.

"The British Museum Collection consists of ten books, all carefully indexed in Mrs. Delaney's own handwriting. In one volume several specimens are missing, and in the blank spaces the artist explains that the missing mosaics were presented to Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III, who was a great admirer of the Mosaic work. Mrs. Delaney was a favourite at the Court of King George III, and was counted among Queen Charlotte's best friends."

One-Fourth of Scotland Sold.

The decrease in business has been general, and the output of business in the market for Scottish estates, published in the Times, proves it in one very important section of the market.

American Irish Republicans Warned

EVACUATION OF BRITISH TROOPS SUSPENDED. DUBLIN, Feb. 13. The evacuation of British troops and the military forces from Dublin has been indefinitely suspended to-day.

CHURCH VALUABLES TO FEED STARVING. MOSCOW, Feb. 13. The All-Russian Central Committee has decided to take over immediately the valuables in all churches of all parts of Russia and sell them for the benefit of famine sufferers. The value of the property is estimated at millions of rubles.

WOMAN OF WALES HAS NARROW ESCAPE. LONDON, Feb. 13. The Prince of Wales narrowly escaped injury at Gwalior, Central India, last Saturday, when his polo pony reared and fell backward, says a despatch to the Times.

O'DUFFY SAYS FEELING INTENSE. BELFAST, Feb. 13. Owen O'Duffy, chief of the staff of the Irish Republican Army, who went to Clones yesterday to investigate the shooting of a British soldier, said to the Times: "The feeling is intense."



U. S. TRADE FIGURES.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13. United States exports in January aggregated \$279,000,000, the lowest in seven months, and a decrease of \$15,000,000 from December. The imports totalled \$216,000,000, against \$237,000,000 in December and \$209,000,000 in January.

INDIAN NATIONALISTS TAKING HEED.

BARDOLI, India, Feb. 13. A resolution exploring the recent outbreak at Cabani and calling for suspension of civil disobedience until the wave of violent feeling has passed, was adopted to-day by the Working Committee of the National Congress. Another resolution urges that Congress organizations should be advised to cease activities designed to court arrest and imprisonment, except such normal activities as voluntary marches wherever a peaceful atmosphere can be assured. That resolution advises against the holding of public processions and mass meetings in defiance of the law.

PROTEST AGAINST WAGE CUTS.

BOSTON, Feb. 13. Cotton mills in New Hampshire and at Lowell, Mass., employing about 25,000 operatives, were affected by strikers, which became effective to-day in protest against wage cuts averaging twenty per cent.

CURFEW REIMPOSED IN BELFAST.

BELFAST, Feb. 13. Beginning to-night the curfew extending from 9 o'clock in the evening until 5 o'clock in the morning will be reimposed. Up to three o'clock this afternoon a total of eight persons had been killed since Saturday.

STATE INSURANCE AGAINST CROP FAILURE.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 13. State insurance against crop failure caused by uncontrollable conditions as a means of eliminating uncertainty in the Agricultural industry and providing the necessary impetus to rapid development, will be proposed in a resolution to be submitted to the Manitoba Legislature by A. E. August, member for Dufferin.

WELD, CREW AT PROVIDENCE.

PROVIDENCE R.I., Feb. 13. Seven members of the crew of the three masted schooner Rose M. from Fogo, Newfoundland, washed ashore at Faya, Azores, January 15, were brought here to-day from Ponta Deagada, Azores, by the Fabre liner Asla. The schooner, according to the crew, was a complete wreck. For twenty days before she went aground all hands worked night and day at pumps to keep her afloat.

PROTESTED AGAINST MARRIAGE.

VIGO, Spain, Feb. 13. Eight persons were wounded to-day when villagers of Bora protested against the marriage of a seventy-year-old man with a 15-year-old girl. The groom and brother of the bride were seriously injured.

TENSION PREVENTS MEETING.

LONDON, Feb. 13. Winston Spencer Churchill, Colonial Secretary in a statement in the House of Commons to-day on the Irish situation said the Provisional Government had expressed a desire for a meeting between the heads of the Provisional

and Northern Governments, but that thus far in the present state of tension it had not been found possible to arrange such a meeting.

DEMAND FOR TICKETS.

ROME, Feb. 10. Forty thousand tickets have already been distributed for the Papal coronation ceremonies and the flood of demands continues.

DON'T THINK IT WISE.

LONDON, Feb. 13. Lloyd George told the Commons to-day the Government did not think it wise to introduce a Bill giving women the franchise on the same terms as men at present. All men of 21 years are over and who have lived in the same constituency six months now have the right to vote and all women of 30 years of age and over, subject to certain limitations.

AUSTRIAN FARMERS HAVE BECOME WEALTHY.

VIENNA, Feb. 10. The farmers alone of all classes in Austria have profited by the economic breakdown of the country and are estimated to hold fifty billion Kronens of Austria's circulating medium. Having supplied themselves with all necessities and many luxuries they are now investing their surplus capital in securities and have become an important factor on the Vienna Stock Exchange.

THE DUKES OF YORK TURNS THE FIRST SOU-ENCOURAGEMENT OF TRADE AND SPORT.

The most practical step towards the development of the British Empire was taken yesterday when His Royal Highness the Duke of York performed the ceremonial of turning the first sod on the site of the Exhibition at Wembley. His Royal Highness saw a sign in the fact that while the Duke had only been assured on other work had been commenced the following Tuesday.

The Duke of York, who was loudly cheered on rising to reply, after expressing his pleasure at being present to inaugurate this great enterprise, said: "My father, as Patron of the Exhibition, is deeply interested in its success, and is very anxious that it should accomplish something of practical value to the trade of the Empire. My brother, too, as President of your General Committee, has from the outset identified himself with your work in every way he could. It is therefore a real source of pleasure to me that I also am enabled in a small way to be associated with this great undertaking."

How Animals Bring Up Their Babies.

Birds don't fly or sing, nor do fish swim, entirely from instinct. They have to be taught by their parents in the same way that we teach our children to walk and to speak. Chickens, for instance, have to be trained even to drink. If you have chicks, and their mother isn't with them, you will have to press their beaks into the water before they will drink. When with older birds, however, they learn by imitation.

A falcon flies round a bough in wide circles to show her family how flying is done. Then she pushes a tiny bird off with her wing. The next day, when the little falcon has learnt to keep aloft in the air, the mother follows them as they fly, driving them up against the wind, then round in graceful curves.

Young ducks enter the water without being urged, but geese have to be shown the way. The old birds urge them on from behind, gabbling continuously.

At first the goslings are allowed a very short swim, but the lesson is lengthened from day to day until the little ones learn to go into the water alone. Breeders of canaries, bullfinches and other song birds invariably place their young cock birds in a room with the best singers. The young birds soon learn to warble delightfully. 

WEIRD NIGHT PAGEANT OF HILL TRIBESMEN — REMARKABLE WELCOME FOR H.R.H. AT RANGON.

Mandalay's reception of the Prince of Wales will rank among the most remarkable of his experiences in India. No "hurtle" marred the harmony of the welcome, which was white-hearted in its enthusiasm. The entertainment for the Prince by the chiefs of the northern and southern Shan States at their camp on the outskirts of Mandalay was a striking demonstration of the loyalty of those remote communities to the Empire of which they are a fringe. It was an unusual and very picturesque show, which entailed the bringing, over many hundreds of miles, of more than 4,000 men and women of various tribes. Round and round an ornamental space, constructed to resemble the buildings of these wild, unknown frontier States, where China and Burma meet an intricate, but awe-inspiring, gigantic procession wound its way for an hour. It was headed by grotesque beasts and monsters of every colour, breed, and shade of tabulosity—a dozen huge, white-fleeced, dragon-like yaks, rainbow-coloured tigers 12 feet long, bear cubs and panthers, peacocks with white human masks, and two-legged griffin, monstrous farmyard fowls, headed by a cock of crimson tinsel. Then followed a procession of Shan State men and women, each, after his blood and custom, playing

STRANGE MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS and crashing out the time on drop-booming gongs and drums. Throughout the performance there were many incidents which might have made either the crowning solemnity of a religious rite or the crowning burlesque of a pantomime. It was easy to see that the men from the Shan States saw no inconsistency in mingling the grotesque with piety—if, indeed, piety be the right word for the superstitious reverence which, among these wild hillmen, generally takes the place of religion. Women with artificially elongated necks stalked by like Alice in Wonderland, monsters writhed past mopping and moving by way of salute to the Prince, occasionally betraying by their contortions the iron fight going on between the component parts. Of all that happened the sound of a pair of drums will be longest remembered. Their contribution to the pageant was a dry grinding vibration, which reduced to impotence every other note or chord. Indeed, all present were hypnotized by this old noise. The curious part is that the drums giving this terrible sound were only about 12 inches across. They were, however, about 2 ft. in, deep, and tapered sharply to a base, which a hand could span. Mastery of this instrument was discussed far into the night by one of the most delighted audiences that have ever hailed the Prince's coming. The Prince's arrival at Rangon was to have been private, but was changed to a public ceremony for the benefit of the spectators; in fact, Rangon took up the Governor's challenge to OUTDO THE MAGNIFICENT WELCOME

of Mandalay. The great display at Rangon was held on the Royal Lakes. Arriving at a gaily decorated temporary building on a densely-wooded promontory, the Prince embarked in a decorated barge. A distinguished British and Burmese party accompanied the Prince. The barge was tormented by six vivid-coloured galleys, one of which contained a weird Burmese band, and moved slowly about the beautiful tropical lake, while the regatta proceeded. The acting was of a characteristically fantastic kind, crews of women taking part in the rowing, which was often more reminiscent of a shovelling competition than oarsmanship. There was great good humour, and much splashing and ducking, but also strenuous rivalry amongst the yelling contestants, and the Prince frequently laughed heartily. All Rangon was making hollay and immense crowds lined the palm-fringed banks. The whole picture was one of indescribable golden and turquoise beauty, splashed with the exquisite harmony of brilliant colours of which the Burmese are such perfect masters. The European boat races evoked great enthusiasm, the performances being of a highly meretricious order. Ashura, a native boxing exhibition afforded much entertainment. The art of self-defence in Burma appears to consist mainly in springing, whirling, crouching, and shouting, the victory lying with the noisiest and most acrobatic combatant. During the long blazing afternoon the wonderful water symphonies continued with amazing vigor and much fantastic novelty. At sunset the Prince returned through

to Government House, setting forth again after dinner to drive round to view the illuminations. Along several miles of the lake shores 120,000 lamps and paper lanterns twinkled in all the colours of the rainbow. Passing the entrance to D'Almeida Park, the Prince was greeted with 31 aerial maroons. A great blaze of coloured fire amongst the bushes on Crow Is-
