The latter explained that the keepsake and the pictures had been forwarded from the Imperial Graves commission to Ottawa, to be sent on to their owner. They had been found on the battlefield, it said. Clearly discernible on the back of the snapshots, themselves blurred almost beyond recognition, are the words "Baby Bevan," and Mr. Bevan's name and regimental number. He was with the 1st C.M.R's.



This risk should only have been taken whilst bringing the ship to a port of safety for necessary examination and repairs. The repairs made by the Chief Engineer were as good as could be performed under the circumstances, but were not sufficient to warrant the captain in keeping the ship at sea. In my opinion the officers in charge performed their duties as efficiently as could possibly be expected under 'existing circumstances.

There are six wooden ships prose cuting the scalfishery each year whose average age would be in the neighbourhood of forty years, the aggregate number of men employed being approximately one thousand, and ho serious accident has heretofore occured to the ships boilers or engines causing loss of life, with one exception, that of the S. S. Tigress, whose boiler exploded while prosecuting the scalfishery. The boilers and engines. of these ships are probably in a safe and fit condition to prosecute the scalfishery, but nevertheless all necessary precautions should be taken to prevent deterioration which might at any time prove dangerous to life and property.

In view of the conditions revealed during this Inquiry, I would suggest that a thorough survey of the boilers and engines of these ships be made each year before proceeding to the sealfishery, and a report in each case submitted to the Marine and Fisheries Department on a printed form, and that such form be used in all future inspections. The mere isssuing of a certificate, such as that given the S. S. Ranger, is not a sufficient record either of the examination then made, or the actual condition of the boiler at the time. The rules laid down for the inspection of boilers leave everything to the discretion of the Inspector. I would suggest that definite rules be drawn up for the guidance of Inspectors and Owners, cur in the report sent to the Department of Marine and Fisheries. FINDING.

I find from the evidence-That the state and condition of the boiler of the S. S. Ranger, at the commencement and during the sealfishery of 1925, was unsafe, and that the boiler was unfit for use.

2. That on the 8th day of October 1924, the day upon which the certificate of John A. Forbes, Inspector of Boilers, was given, the boiler of the steamship Ranger was unfit for use.

What qualifications does the person possess (the Acting Assistant Boiler Inspector) who it is rumored is about to be appointed head and shoulders over the rest. Has he any experience at Boiler Construction and Boiler repair work? Is he competent to dictate to a boiler maker as to how work should be done, especially repair work, or is he simply going to rely upon questioning a boiler maker, who is likely in most cases to be present when an examination of a boiler is taking place. The applicants (boiler makers) for this osition have been told that a Chief Engineer's Ticket is required, and that a boiler maker couldn't fill the position. If this is true, why a Second Class Engineer? It is ridiculous to think that a boiler maker can't inspect a boiler and superintend repairs. What does an Engineer know about boilers beyond the care and running of same? Certainly he knows othing about the practical side of the trade. For instance two boilers, identical in dimensions could be built, in the same shop. Upon inspection both would look alike, as far as appearances go, yet there could be quite a difference in the factor of safety to be used, and here is where the man that knows his business comes in. In other countries the position coiler Inspector is filled by a man

who thoroughly knows the Boller Maker's trade. I can 'refer to the Fidelity & Casualty Company of New York, who give preference to boiler makers in taking on Inspectors, as experience shows them to be the only nes competent for the work.







Without warning a man-eating tiger

jumped on Mr. George's back, seized him by the neck, and dragged him into the jungle. Veladi Sammai behaved with extraordinary gallantry; he rushed at the tiger, placed the muzzle of the gun against it, and pulled the trigger, but was unable to discharge the weapon owing to the safety catch, with which he was not familiar. He then shouted and waved his arms, thus driving the tiger off for a short distance. Mr. George was badly bitten in the neck and covered with blood. but with the Gond's assistance he managed to stagger to his camp two miles away. The tiger followed them for some distance, but was kept off by the shouts and demonstrations of the Gond. It was known that a maneating tiger was in the neighourhood and had killed villagers. The Problem of

Improving the Race

TORONTO, May 22.-Can we proluce in Canada a better, more efficient and a happier race? This is the question that the recently formed Division of Education of the Canadian Social lygiene Council under Professor eter Sandiford and A. D. Hardie, M. ., have set out to answer.

For months these experts in conjunction with an advisory committee composed of biologists, hygienists, psychologists, educationalists, and noted figures in the church and women's organizations have been searching for an answer which is not merely theoretically acceptable, but is definitely practical throughout the Dominion.

Findings are to be later embodied in official publications of the Division of Education of the Social Council, but a forecast of them is now available from recent pronouncements made by the directors of this department.

The answer to all three questions is yes, but the end in view of attain ing better health, greater happiness and usefulness, as well as a pro
