Fatal Accident in Pusitneh.

We regret to record a sad and fatal accident which occurred in Pullinch on Tuesday night, by which Mr. Jas. H. Henning, an old and respected resident of that Township lost his life. We learn that Mr. Henning had gone to Aberloyle in the early part of the day with the weggon. Loss of the Magnelia

A letter comes from Chedmatt, dated March 19th, which says, the Magnolia was built at this city in October, 1859; and was two hundred feet in length; thrivitires feet beam, with dix feet depth of hold. She had three bollers each sweaty feet in length, forty, six inches in diameter, and five flues each; also, two engines twenty liches in diameter and six feet strokes. She was owned by David Gibson, J. H. Prather, her commander; R. O. Shaw, first clerk, and Mr. B. Gustdner, who were on board at the time of the disaster. When ahe left the city she had over one hundred cabin passengers, a large number being indies, and all the freight she could carry. The scene at the time of the explosion was terrible. Some were blown high into the air, others were thrown into the river, where they struggled to keep from drowning, and many lay scattered here and there on the wreck, horribly mangled, scalded and burning to death. After she had floated about a mile and, a half down the river, a large lot of loose hay caught fire, which communicated to the magazine, blowing up three kegs of powder and causing a second explosion to take place. The boat immediately "caught fire, and sunk in three "initutes after the last explosion. The "Magnolia's yaw! was accustantly making trips between the wreck and the shore, and picking up all she could carry. There were also skiffs, from California sent out, which assisted in rescuing many from a watery grave. Several, after being taken into the, skiffs, being so badly burned and scalded could not endure the pain, and jumped into the river and were the explosion cook place, and found them to be full of water. San Francisco, March 25—The Legislature of British Uclimbia opened at New Westminster on the 21st inst. The Story of a Wreek.

The Victoria (Australasis) newspapers publish the following: Intelligence has just been received that the sime deneral Grant, which left Melbourne for Loadon on the 3rd of May, 1860, was wrecked at the Auckland Islands on the 14th of the same month. The current drew the vessel toward the rocks, and then into a vast cave, where the masts struck against the roofs and drove them through the vessels bottom causing her to sink. Fifteen persons only were saved in boats, who succeeded in reaching a hut on the side of the islands, and here they lived on muscles, seals and pigs. One seaman died; and about a year ago the chief officer and three seamen left in a boat with the hope of reaching New Zealand. No tidings, however, have been heard of them. On the 21st of November last, the ten survivors, after 18 months hardships and privations on the islands, were picked up by the whaling brig Amherst, Capt Gilroy, and taken to Bluff Harbor, New Zealand. The cave into which the Gen. Grant was drawn is twenty-five fathoms deep, and 250 yards long. The captain (W. H. Loughlin) and sixty-light other persons perished. The Gen. Grant was a new ship, 1,095 ton., and was owned by Page, Richardson & Co., of Boston.

THE DUTY ON SUGAR—A deputation from the Toronto Board of Trade waited on Hon. Messrs. Rose, Howland and Tilly, at Ottawa on Wednesday, when they brought up the subject of the duties on sugar, and other matters in which the grocery trade is interested. It was urged by the deputation that under the existing tariff, the refiners have an undue monopoly of the sugar trade. The duty on the low grades which the refiners import for refining purposes is so very low as compared with the duty on the highest control. low grades which the refiners import for refining purposes is so very low as compared with the duty on the higher grades which the consumers require, that the general wholesale dealer is unable to compete with the refiner, and the result is that the consumers pay more for the refined article at present than they would for raw sugar of superior quality if a more equitable tariff were in operation. The deputation do not ask for a reduction of revenue, or for protection, but only for such an alteration as will plage the importer and refiner on a strictly equal footing, and thereby promote a healthy competition. They suggest a mixed duty of one dollar and twenty-five cents specific and fifteen per cent. ad valorem on all raw sugars.



General News.

AN ARISTOCRATIC PREACHER .-The Paris correspondent of the London Baily News gives an account of a sermon preached by Lord Radstock, an English nobleman who has lately dommenced preaching in Paris. Lord Radstock is a grandson of Admiral Waldegraye, and is described as a handsone man, in the prime of life; thirty-five, with a head (prematurely bald) of somewhat singular form, but by no means deficient in intellectual development. He has light hair and extremely well built and active, and looks in perfect health. The correspondent says that his lordship has a real vocation for the work to which he has lately addicted himself, and it he had been plain Mr Smith instead of a British peer, he would have made his way in England as a popular preacher.

PROGRESS. The Montreal Herald says It is a good sign of a country when its rulers are not above taking lessons from other countries in their mode of conducting business. Mr. Chauveau, as we are aware, went to Europe to study the systems of education in force, there. The mode of manufacturing public opinion in France appears to have struck him more than anything else he saw in the cours of his investigations; and the simple plan by which newspapers are governed, and their license in remarking upon the acts of a paternal Government restricted, so pleased him that we understand he has conceived the happy idea of adopting the same plan in this country. It is whispered that journals receiving Government aid have been warned that if they persist in criticising unfavorably any acts of the Government of Quebec, all assistance will be withdrawn, and they will have cause to rue their ingratitude in snapping at the hand that feeds them. The blessings of Confederation are multiplying, openly gagging the press being the latest.

SIR MORTON PETO.—The Conservatives of Bristol, England, are considerably excited in regard to Sir Morton Peto's seat in Parliament. As is well known in this country, Sir Morton failed some time since in business, and his political opponents think that he ought to resign his seat in consequence. Legal opinions have been taken upon the question, but these opinions are at variance, some of them maintaining that he should resign, and others that he should resign, and others that he should not. The Conservatives have a man picked out to take the place, and are in a harry to have it declared vacated. A petition to the House of Commons has been prepared, praying that Sir Morton may be reduced to private life; and it is understood that this petition will be followed up by a direct motion that shall open the way for a new election.
