Camping Out—Continued.

CAMP GROUNDS (Near the Western Commons), July 15th, 1869.

MR. EDITOR, Sir: You don't know me. Well, I have my doubts whether it is worth while cultivating your acquaintance, but I write to inform you that my cousin Jim who sent you a letter a few days ago is not so bad as he might have been. You don't know Jim, don't you? He is my cousin, as I observed before, and is a descendant of the O'Grady's and them people. (Don't you mind me now?) His grandfather was said to be next of kin to Giralpin Pictou, and the Fighting Fifth, and the Connaught Rangers and all them grand people. New Books.

CORD AND CREESE.—This novel was we believe first published as a serial in Harper's Monthly, and was very extensively read and very generally admired. The plot is well framed, and the denouement is more than usually interesting.

THE ADVENTURES OF PHILIP.—This is the last production of the great novelist Thackeray. It is, like "Vanity Fair," and in fact all his other works of fiction, illustrated by himself, but in a better style than any of them we have yet seen. Such a work by such a master requires no commendation from us.

HAVEN'S RHETORIC.—This is a well got up volume, intended for use as a text book in schools and colleges. The author is Dr. Haven, President of the University of Michigan. We have not had time to examine it, but it is said to be an excellent work, well suited to answer its design.

FAMOUS LONDON MERCHANTS.—This is a neat little volume designed to furnish young readers with some account of the growth and influence of trade, and the work and character of its heroes. It is in fact a series of well written biographical sketches of men who have risen by industry from poverty to affluence, and our old friend: Whittington and his cat receive a notice along with others.

GRAND LODGE OF CANADA.—The annual

meeting of the Grand Lodge of Masons of Canada opened at Montreal, on Wednesday. The address, a very comprehensive one, was delivered by Grand-Master A. A. Stevenson, who congratulated the fraternity on the flourishing condition of the Order. Twelve new Lodges were created during the year, and the union of the Nova Scotia Masons was accomplished. The Grand-Master urged the establishment of a Masonic school, and the consolidation with the Canada Lodge of certain Lodges in this country, which still held aloof from them.

We much regret to learn that Adam Burg, late cabinet maker, Brantford, and who, it will be remembered, was severely injured during the late fire at Brantford, expired on the 4th inst.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES.

The French Cable Finished and in working order—

The Irish Church—

Reception of the "Dauntless."

New York, July 15th.—The following dispatch is published in the morning papers:

St. Pierre, Miquelon, July 14th.—The Ocean Cable was spliced to the shore end to-day. The cause of the failure to splice yesterday was on account of the shore end being lost. The buoy was early found, but when taken up it was discovered the cable was detached, and it was necessary to grapple for it. Directly the splice was made, the instruments and the full staff of operators were sent on shore, and communication was soon opened with Brest.

Sir James Anderson, the Commander of the Great Eastern, had brought with him a sealed message which had been prepared by the Emperor Napoleon, the purport of which was to remain unknown until it was opened on this side of the Atlantic upon the completion of the cable, when the message was to be sent to the Emperor over the wires, in order that he might thus judge of the accuracy of the transmission. This message was sent to France to-day.

LONDON, July 14th.—There is reliable authority for stating that the offer of Glebes to the Catholic priesthood will be declined by the Church on these grounds: 1st, That it is opposed to the discipline of the Church. 2nd, That the proposition is unfair and insufficient as a just equalization between the religious communities of Ireland, considering the disproportion of numbers.

The Royal Cork Yacht Club of Ireland tendered their hospitality to the owner of the Dauntless and his friends during their stay at Queenstown. The Dauntless left last evening for Havre. Before sailing she fired a royal salute of 21 guns, which was returned by the Royal Cork Yacht Club, and the Guardship Mersey. The reception which the American visitors have met with has been enthusiastic.

LONDON, July 14.—Following the example of the Tories, the Liberal party are now organizing. A number of meetings in favour of the dis-establishment of the Irish Church, have been extensively advertised to be held in various parts of the kingdom. Prominent speakers will be in attendance.

The Prince of Wales will unveil Foley's statue of George Peabody, near the exchange, during the present month.

At the Volunteer Rifle Match on Wimbledon Common, yesterday, Mr. Cameron for the second time won the Queen's Prize.

BELFAST, July 14.—Serious riots occurred here between the Catholics and Orangemen on the 13th. Several windows were smashed, and a number of rioters and one policeman were wounded.

THE OVEREND-GURNEY CASE.

It seems that the prosecution of the defendants in the Overend Gurney case is likely to fall through. The prosecutor, Dr. Thom, being already a heavy loser, was unwilling or unable to expend more money, and applied to the Treasury to carry on the case. The Treasury refused. Dr. Thom then requested the Court of Queen's Bench to let him prosecute in person; but the Court declined, dreading, no doubt, the muddle into which lay prosecutors are apt to bring their cases. Dr. Thom, therefore, who in fact represents the public in the matter, will be compelled either to drop the prosecution, or continue it languidly or unwillingly.

TROUBLES IN THE CHURCH.

Troubles seem to be multiplying in the Protestant Episcopal Church. The Church at Put-in-Bay, Ohio, has discarded the authority of the Bishop, revised the Prayer Book, and made divers other liturgical changes—in short, set up for itself an independent plan. It is really none of our business, but we cannot help saying, that if the shepherds could manage to agree a little better, the sheep would not show this disposition to jump over the fence. There is a great party in the Church which doesn't like what is called "Bitualism."—There is another party which likes nothing so well. Here are "Bishops and other clergy" who are nothing if not ceremonious; there are Right Reverends and Reverends who don't relish candles. We wish that they could compromise; if they cannot, the division must, sooner or later, come.

THE FRENCH CABLE.

The Government authorities at Washington seem determined not to permit the working of the French cable until some provision for reciprocity is conceded by the French Government. Secretary Fish says that the American end of the cable must either be buoyed until the assembling of Congress, or must be landed on the Island of St. Pierre, unless the Company would agree to favor reciprocity, and abide by such legislation as Congress may deem proper to enact. If the Cable Company should agree to these conditions, some arrangements will probably be effected whereby the United States Government would permit them to begin business.

THE IRISH CHURCH BILL.

This Bill having passed its third reading in the Lords, goes back to the Commons, to see if they will concur in the amendments. At a late meeting of the Cabinet it was resolved to oppose every thing in these amendments which touches upon the great fundamental principle of endowment. If this is so, then a collision between the two Houses appears all but inevitable, as the Lords have committed themselves very much to the idea of concurrent endowment or "levelling up."

THE London Times

observes that "the American people ought to be in a friendly spirit after the Monster Peace Festival at Boston. Such a prodigious condemnation of strife, ought to have a softening effect on the most strenuous asserter of the Alabama claims."

It is announced, in a late cable despatch, that Messrs. Bright and Foster have withdrawn their resignations, sent in some time before, as members of the Reform Club.

NEWS ITEMS.

BOW BELLS.—The July number of Bow Bells is to hand at Day's bookstore. It has an admirable coloured steel fashion plate, good stories, and everything that goes to make up a first-class fashion magazine.

PETER'S MUSICAL MONTHLY.—The July number of this periodical has been received from the publishers. It has some well written articles, one on Music in Ireland being particularly attractive, a nice little story, something about the Peace Jubilee, and a great deal of good music. The number is for sale at the bookstores in town.

SUICIDE IN WATERLOO.—We regret to learn, by special telegram from Waterloo, that Mrs. Cain, wife of Captain Cain, formerly of Guelph, committed suicide by shooting herself this (Thursday) morning. The funeral will take place to-morrow (Friday), at three p. m. The simple announcement was made no particulars of the state of mind which led to the melancholy occurrence.

She makes considerable of a noise.

At the close the Superintendent, Mr. Barrie, and the Trustees spoke in the highest terms of praise of the school, of the excellent classification, and the great proficiency of the pupils, and highly complimented Mr. Weir on the talent, assiduity and perseverance which he had brought so largely into exercise in order to secure such satisfactory results. The ladies deserve great credit for bringing such a bountiful supply of refreshments for both old and young, and likewise abundance of good things, in the shape of confectionery, for the special benefit of the scholars.

RED RIVER NEWS.

The growing crops present a very luxuriant appearance all over the Colony. Barley is coming to ear, and some few fields of wheat are very near the same stage of growth. A much larger breadth of grain has been sown than ever before in Red River, and with God's blessing we may look forward to a very bountiful harvest.


