MR. MACKENZIE'S FIVE HUNDRED. The Ex-Premier Returns His Extra Sec

OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—I understand, through private advices from Toronto, that the house of commons department has received from Hon. Mr. Mackensie, M.P., a letter enclosing the check for \$500 extra sessional allowance which had been forwarded to him. The enclosure was accompanied by an intimation that illness alone had prevented his returning the money at an earlier date. This illness, it is learned from other sources, is serious that few of his political friends ever expect to see him the parliament again. Paralysis is slowly but surely obtaining the mastery of one side of his body; and his friends have watched with alarm for more reached.

A score of physicians have all quietly been asked their opinion, and all pronounced the verdict given above. 
