





There are rare instances of girls marrying men charged with some con-temptible crime, the evidence of the man's guilt being overwhelming and no explanation whatever being offered. Several such cases have come to light when it has been suspected that the accused was made a scapegoat to screen some royal personage. The night before I was called for they had received a telephone message that they would find Slippery Jim in canonicals at the Ackley hotel.
