On motion of P. G. W. P. Longley, seconded by P. G. W. A. Noble, it was agreed that the Bands of Hope be received on Thursday evening at 7 o'clock.
A communication from Mr. Z. Pope Vose, of Rockland, Mainc, in reference to the "Youtl's Temperance Tisitor," a monthly paper published by him, was read, and on motion referred to Committce on Communications.

Communications were read as follows, and referred to Committce on Communications :
From Columbia Division, No. 24, Royal, No. 37, General Williams, No. 146, and Home, No. 169, asking that July scssion of G. D., for 1863, be held at Weymouth, Digby County; from Now Era Division, No. 179, asking that one of the quarterly sessions for 1863 be held at Liverpool; from Wallace Division, No. 75, Parrsborough, No. 110, and Eurcka, No. 144, in which similar requests were made for sessions at Wallace, Parrsborough and River Philip.
Bro. George V. Rand, representative of Wolfville Division, No. 112, presented an application for one of
the quarterly sessions for 1863 to be held at Wolfville. Application referred to Committee on Communications.

Rev. Bro. Gunnison, G. W. A. (acting G. W. P.) presented the foilowing report:

## To the Officers and Members of the Grand Division of Nova Scotia:

Once more have we been permitted, under a kind Providence to meet in Aunual Session to interchange the greetings of an exalted friendship,-to review the past and legislate for the future.

In the absence of our Grand Worthy Patriarch it devolves upon me to present the customary annual report. Brother Fraser notified me by last steamer from England of his inability to return home in season to be present at the opening of the Division by reason of a surgical operation to which he found himself obliged to submit; and requested me to prepare and present the Annual Report.

Considering the faithfulness of our G. W. P. in the discharge of all his official duties; and his untiring devotion to the interests of our Order, to the cause of Temperance in general, I know you will all regret his absence on this oceasion, and sympathise with him in the cause of it, and pray for his speedy return to his family and friends, in health and strength renewed.

The materials for a systematic and useful report have but just reached me-hardly in season for that carefint consideration which their importance to the interests of the Order demand.

It affords me pleasure to be able to inform the Grand Division, that its Quarterly Sessions at Hantsport, Great Village, and Baddeck, were well attended by Representatives, and the public meetings connected with them interesting and profitable; and the results such as to evince the expediency of making the Quarterly Sessions rather missionary than legislative.

The reports from the Deputies during the year past have been geuerally encouraging, and crince a healthy, if not a
rapidly growing, state of the Order. I am happy to inform "ou, that not only some of the Deputies, but many of the m: mbers of the Divisions, have shewn a praiseworthy luve and zeal for our common cause, so that peace and harmony lave generally prevailed throughout our jurisdiction.
From the reports of Deputies for the last quarter, I gather the following facts:-

"No grog shops in Hantsport"-_" consequently no drunkards." "Division healthy, and in good working order." Windsor-"Intemperamee rules predominant." "Temperance advocates mourn the consequences" of "moderate tippling." Division inactive, if not dead. Welsford Division at Shubenacadic "holding on well."

## hing's countr.

Wolfville-"New interest awakened," "promising young men united with the Division," prospects good. Aylesford"have had a hard time to keep the Division up;" "prospects better now." "King's county has retrograded exceedingly." "We want a series of stirring meetings, and the services of a popular, thorough working agent."

## ansarolis county.

Nictanx-"Have had a gloomy time at Victoria Mines," "prospects are beginning to brighten," "no rum selling, and hence some of the old friends are dull and lifeless." Of course, where there is no carcass there will be no eagles; consequently no watch set. Wilmot-The Deputy reports discouragingly of the Divisions, but not of the cause of temperance; thinks a lecturer much needed, and satisfactorily explains the cause of the inactivity of the Divisions, without calling in question the integrity of the members.

## digby cocaty.

Reports encouraging; Divisions generally doing good serrice. Columbia Division asks the G. D. to hold its July session with it.

## TARMOUTII COUNTY.

" Not much progress during the past year, yet something has been donc." The "sickly and dying" Divisions "are located where there is little or no drinking." Central Division has "deadly opposition," yet "works well and effectually," and has the "good wishes of the influential men." "A lecturer much needed." Deputy Christie will take the field for a short time. May we bid him God speed. Recommends an cffort to G. D. to "get a legislative enactment, enabling us to select a license officer, to whom may be intrusted the furnishing of spirituous liquors for mechanical and medicinal purposes."

## SIIELIURRNE COUNTY.

Ragged Island Division "in a good healthy state," prosperity anticipated.
queen's county.
Divisions young, but healthy and prosperous. New Era, 179, numbers 74 members and 23 lady visitors. Prince Albert, 185, " is prosijerous, pleasing and profitable." Ray of Hope, 186, "is working in great harmony."

## hUNENBURG COUNTY.

Reports rather discouraging. Divisions inactive. A visit from the G.W.P. greatly desired, to stir up the members and revive the Order.

CUMDEMLAND COUNTY.
Divisions not so active as desirable, yet holding on and making slow progress. Public meetings held occasionallywell attended. Amherst Division works well, and is rising in influence and favour.

## COLCIESTER COUNTY.

All the Divisions in this county seem to be doing well, except Truro, which has not been working for two yearsand may be considered twice dead, and ready to be plucked up by the roots.

Nearly all the Divisions in this county are working well and doing great good. The Deputy has visited most of them, and thinks "the Session of the G. D. on the Island has been attended with much good.

## VICTORIA COUNTY.

Divisions "active and healthy," though not "increasing in numbers very rapidly." "Good men and true engaged in the Order." "Drinking prevalent." Great good resulted from the mecting of the G. D., "stimulated the weak" and "encouraged the strong."

INYERNESS COUATY.
Divisions "prosperous," but rum selling and drinking predominant.

## malifax county.

City Divisions-holding their own "in the way of improvement." Sackville "in good working order." Gay's River "doing well."

From these Reports of the County Deputies, I feel encouraged to believe, that upon the whole, our Order is in as flourishing a condition as it has been at any former period, and that the cause of Temperance generally, is on the increase. The reports are not so full and definite as we could wish, owing to the neglect of Divisional Deputies:I call the attention of the G. D. especially to this subject, that it may remedy the evil if possible.

Eight new divisions have been opened since our lasf annual Session, and a charter has been issued for a new division at Bermuda, while some few of the old divisions have ceased from their labours and perhaps are dead beyond the hope of a resurrection.

Many of the divisions are asking for a lecturer; yet propose no plan by which to raise the funds required for his support.

I invite your attention to this long felt necessity in our Order. There seems to be unanimity of sentiment thiroughout the $O \mathrm{rder}$; and I can but think your wisdom and zeal sufficient to provide for the want, and put an active agent in the ficld at an carly day.

In connection with this subject of a lecturer, I will suggest to you, for your consideration, the importance of the circulation of temperance tracts, and espcially the Abstainer. This paper is wholly under the control of this G. D., and is the only medium of communication within our reach. Its circulation is not so general as it should be. Its merits, and its importance to the success of our cause, shonld give it a greatly increased patronage. I trust it will receive the attention of this G. D.

I have the pleasure of informing you that this G. D. was represented in the N. D. by two representatives; and that the next session of the N. D. is appointed to be held in this city. I need not remind you of the necessity for some action of this G. D. in referenee to the reception and entertainment of the members of the N. D. in June next, for I know you will be ready to give them a Nova Scotia welcome. The City Divisions will do their part; still they cannot do all.

I suggest that an extra session of G. D. be held in th.is City, at the time $0^{.}$the meeting of N. D.

This G. D. was also represented by two or more representatives in the World's Temperance Convention, recently held in Iondon.

And now, in conclusion, brothers, let me assure you that it gives me, as I feel it does you, great satisfaction to know that we are engaged in a great work. The mission of our Order is " to raise the fallen, to strengthen the weak, to shield the innocent, and to give the light of a pure life as a beacon star of salvation."

Let us then pledge ourselves anew, and gird ourselves up. for the grand fight of Temperance, until we shall "destroy the destroyer of millions," and emancipate our land from this worst of all slaverics!

On my induction into offire in May, 1S.5G, I found that the (rand Division was in debt to the amome of abont £170), or upwards; (independent of liabilitics for which the Publication Committee were responsible, in comnection with the Alhencum newspaper, conduated by Mr. Willoughby:) The largest portion of this amount was duc the National Division on account of "old debt."

To have the G.D. relieved of this heavy responsibility has always been my desire; and by excrecising strict economy in comection with the expenses of this ofiece, and other matters, that desire has been realized. It affords me much pleasure to report that the indebtedness of the Grand Division to
the National Division has been entirely liquidated, with the exception of $\$ 6$ due for a supply of journals just received.

By the foregoing estimate of income and expenditure for the ensuing year, it will be seen that the Grand Division will be entirely free of debt immediately after this session.

## National myision journals-bighteentif sess.

Since last quarterly mecting a supply of Journals of Proecedings of National Division, at eighteenth session, held at. Hamilton, C. W., in June last, was received from the M. W. Scribe. As the $\grave{\mathrm{i}}$. D. decided to furnish but one journal for every fifty members in each Grand Jurisdiction, forty additional copies were wanting to supply the Subordinate Divisions in this Jurisliction. I thought it necessary, therefore, to order that number of copies from the M. W. Seribe. They have just come to hand, and, as they have to be paid for, at a cost of $\$ 6$.

## INSTALIATION CERHMONIES FOR CIMPIANE AND LADY OPFICELS.

The National Division having, at its last session, adopted ceremonies for the Installation of the Chaphain and Lady Officers of Subordinate Divisions, and the same having been printed by order of that body, I ordered a supply of 200 copies which have just come to hand, at a cost of $\$ 2$. I would suggest that copies be furnished each Division and D. G. W. P. in the jurisdiction, free of charge.

## ACTION OF N: D. on mesolutions of g. D. of N. S.

After action had on the resolutions passed by this G. D. at its April Quarterly Session, in reference to vouching in Subordinate Divisions for members without the P. W., and in favor of admitting all Lady Visitors and Members of the Order to visit Gramd Divisions, the National Division decided on the first question "that the matter is now practically in the hands of the W. Patriareh." On the second and third questions, Rule XX. of Grand Divisions has been so amended that those bodies may admit Lady Visitors and Members of the Order, duly vouched for, to visit their sessions.
ambndilents to constitution of grand divistons.
At the last session of the National Dirision the following amendments to the Constitution for Grand Divisions were adopted:-

Rule XV.-Rerenue-Strike out the words "Each Subordiuate Division shall pay not more than twenty cents per quarter for each of its members whose name may appear on the F. S. books to," and insert in their place, "The per capita tax from Subordinate Divisions shall be regulated by the Grand Division, and shall."

Rule XVI.-Add the following, which is now a note at bottom of page: "All decisions of the acting body are to be and remain in force, until reversed by the superior body in the case."
Rume XVIT.-Strike out, in 3 dine, the word "allowed," and insert " entitled."

Rure XX.-Strike out the whole rule, and insert, as Rule XX., "Members of the Order, and Lady Visitors, duly rouched for, may be admitted to visit Grand Divisions."

most clearly elicit the results of the traffic in their respective jurisdictions, these blank circulars to be sent by the Grand Seribes to the subordinates of this widely extended Order, to be filled by a committee with the facts asked for, and returned to a tract committee of the Grand Division, to use as much of, as will throw light upou the unholy business allowed in our communitics, then to be sent to a similar committee of this body, whose duty it shall be to publish so much of the matter, as will serve a general interest. In this way, it is believed, such an accumulation of facts will be gathered, from which the most potent arguments may be drawn in an argressive warfare agrinst the most unatural: inhuman, suicidal policy ever sanctioned by a Christian people."

It would be well if the Grand Division would take actiou on this'subject at the present session.

## TEMPERANCE TRICTS.

The supply of Temperance tracts received carly in the present year is now nearly exhansted, there being but a few handreds on hand, eopies of which are now on the table for examination. The demand for the tracts has not been so great as anticipated. The largest portion of those received were circulated gratuitously, in accordance with instructions of $G$. D. at the April quarterly session.

## dNCREASE Of mer capita tax.

At the Jamary quarterly session instructions were given for the issuing of a circular, addressed to the Subordinate Divisions on the Agency question, and mode of raising fiuds in support of that olject; and also to ascertain the fecling of the Divisions on the propriety of raising the per capita tax from six to seven-and-a-half cents per quarter, in order that a portion of it might be appropriated to the Agency Fund. In reply to the circular sent out, I find, that. although many Divisions readily gave their consent to have the tax incereased in amount, the scheme has not been received farombly, generally speaking, hy a majority, and if adopted much conftusion and dissatisfaction would be the consequence. Some of the Divisions that have refused their sanction to the plan
proposed, state that they will be willing to contribute their liair proportion towards the expenses of a lecturer, whenever a suitable man shall be employed.

## d. G. w. r.'s Queny cheulars.

I would suggest that the query circulars now sent out to Divisional Deputies every half year, be, for the future, issued amually, the answers to be made returnable on the last day of December in each year. This suggestion is made from the belief, on the experience of the two past years, that the rendering of the answers yearly would be more useful than a more frequent issuing of the same.
next meeting of the antional division.
As the National Division of North America will meet in this city in June next, commencing its nincteenth Ammal Session on Thursiday, eleventh day of that month, $I$ would surgest that a committee of this Grand Division be appointed, at the present session, to make suitable arrangements for the reception of the Natioual body-said committee to co-operate with any committees that may be appointed by the city Divisions.

## concludng remaris.

In concluding this somewhat lengthy and imporfect report, I would earnestly urge the representatives present to devote themselves assiduously to the business that may be brought before them; and I trust, that cre our labors are concluded, means may be devised for the extension of our Order: the permanent establishment of the Agency department: the rirculation of Temperance literature: the enlisting of the respectable portion of our fellow eitizens under the bamuer of Temperance: the spread of our principles among the routh of our Province, and the general adrancement of the Cause so dear to our hearts,-all of which subjects I commend to your serious consideration.

Report of Committec on State of the Order was taken from the table, when the third and following clauses were considered and adopted.

The report was adopted, as a whole, as follows :
The Committee on the State of the Order beg to report that they have had much pleasure in the examination of the documents placed in their hands.

The committec can but regret the absence of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, and especially that it is caused by indisposition. They trust, however, that he will be speedily restored to health, to his fanily and to the sphere of usefulness he occupies in the community. Whilst, however, your committee feel this absence of their chief officer, they congratulate the Grand Division on having so efficient and worthy an Associate in their second officer. The committee commend his able report to the attention of their brethren, and in doing so, would notice the recommendation to make the Quarterly Sessions of this body as much as possible of a missionary character. Your committee are glad to hear that those who are best able to form a correct opinion believe the Order to be "in as flourishing a condition as at any former period." In the absence of any public lecturer or agent this is a state of things which should encuurage us to fresh efforts and devotion to the cause.

The desire expressed for a Lecturer and General Agent of the Order to visit subordinate divisions and offer advice, afford instruction, and seek generally a revival of the work of reformation, is one which your committee think may well command the serious attention of this body. It would be well, hower -i, for divisions to inform the officers of the Grand Division not only that they wish for such aid in their own localities, and for the province generally, but, how much, in a certain specified sum, they wish him to be engaged.

Your committee recommend that a Special Session of the Grand Division should be held in this city in June next, for the purpose of meeting and welcoming to this Province the august body at the head of our organization.

Your committee rejoice to learn that a hranch of this jurisdiction has been exteuded to Bermuda, and would advise that the division there established be numbered consecutively with the divisions in this Province.

We are glad to learn from the very able report of the Grand Scribe that there is a nett increase of six divisions under our jurisdiction during the year. The statistical information obtained from the returns reveals to us the remarkable fact that only nine deaths have taken place in our membership during the quarter. This, in so large a body, is a fact not to be lightly esteemed, Whilst your committee regret to find that so many have violated their pledge,-the number who have done so amounting to $2 \frac{1}{3}$ per cent. of the whole number,-yet, when they reflect on the power of the labits of intemperance, and the numerous and insidious temptations of the great enemy to those engaged with us in reserving his victims from his grasp, it is not surprising that some should be entrapped, or even drawn back again into the fearful vortex. We are, however, glad to find that but a very small proportion are found violating their pledge the second time,-only 25 out of the whole, less than one per cent. of our membership.
The circulars proposed by the National Division for obtaining information respecting the results of the liquor traffic, referred to by the Grand Scribe in his report, we deem of the utmost importance, and would advise immediate action upou that subject, so as to be able to show the people and ourselves what are the benefits which arise to a country or locality from this branch of business so carefully protected by our legislators.
Your committee recommend a renewal of efforts at the coming meeting of the Legislature, to obtain the amendments to the license law, repeatedly before that body, and which have failed to receive sufficient sanction to place them on our statute book. We would also advise our brethren to use all legitimate means with their representatives in Parliament to secure a prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating drinks. Your committee further advise that the acting Past Grand Worthy Patriarch, Longley, be requested to uss his best judgment in the introduction of the said amendments to the Legislature.
Your committee would recommend that a special committee be appointed of your body for the purpose of making all necessary arrangements for receiving with proper respect the National Division of North America, which is expected to hold its Annual Session in Halifax in June next.

The committee much regret to learn that the circulation of the Organ of this Grand Division-the Albstainer, has diminished during the past yeir. The importance of sustaining the 'Temperance Press for the furtherance of our cause is too well understood to need to be enlarged upon by pour Committec. To allow so valuable an instrumentality in the work to become more limited, year by year, in its sphere of usefulness, cannot fail to be felt disastrously in regard to the general spread of our principles in the Province. The committee would recommend that this subject be now pressed upon the attention of the divisions, and that the deputies be respectfuity requested to use their best endeavours to increase the circulation of the Abstainer in the divisions under their charge, and in their several districts generally.

The Agency Committee regret that the materials which the past ycar has furnished for a report of their proceedings are very small. They have made two attempts to procure a lecturer from the United States, neither of which has been successful. In the latter case the application first came from the individual himself in a letter to our worthy brother, the Rev. Mr. Gunnison, and the committee wrote immediately to lim, mentioning the terms on which they would engage lim. To this letter, however, no answer has been received.
The committec regret that the scheme for raising money for the maintenance of a permanent lecturer, devised last jear, has hitherto proved so umproductive. If a respectable sum hadd been collected, they would probably have been able to induce some man of ability and energy to undertake the tack, so necesssuy to the further progress of our cause, of bringing before the whole of our population the best and most effectual means of arresting the evils of intemperance.

An examination of these Returns gives us the following results:-

To the first question 10 of the Returns represent their Divisions as not meeting regularly, of which number, 2 meet semi-monthly, and 2 monthly, the remainder are reported as meeting every week.

The answers in many instances contain the old complaint, that the majority leave a few to do the work and sustain the Divisions. There are, however, some honorable exceptions.

The answers to the third and fourth questions (with a few exceptions) are of a more favourable character than usual.

Thie fifth question, the Committee are pleased to find auswered very geuerally in the affirmative.

The answers to the sixth question, are not very different from those of former Returns, and appear to be goverued pretty much by the regularity of attendauce.

To the seventh question, only seveu report having any organization of youths. Your Committee regret that so litile effort appears to be made in behalf of the young.
In answer to the cighth, Returns report $4 S$ Divisious admitting Visitors-2 of these declare them to have been of no benefit, and seven speak doubtfully, the others think their admission to be beneficial, and in many instances the good effect of their presence is spoken of in the highest terms.

To the ninth question the following places have been sug-
gested,-Advocate IIarbor in Cumberland, IIorton Point and Black Rock in Kings, and St. Ann's, Victoria County.

The answers to the tenth question are similar to those of former Returns, and manifest comparatively small interest in Temperance Literature.
In answer to the eleventh question, seventeen of the Returns ask for a Temperance Lecturer or Agents, three suggest Prohibitiou. The Return from Nictaux thinks a rum shop would be the most ready means of enlivening them. All the Returns from Digby County ask for a Session of the Grand Division, and "Star" Division suggests a weekly edition of the Organ.
To the twelfth question the answer proves that Intemperance and the Liquor business continues to abound in the towns and larger villages, while the rural districts are comparatively free from the evil. There are however some pleasing exceptions to the first, and we are sorry to note some painful exceptions to the other.

In answer to the thirteenth question, 36 Returns report the clergy as giving good assistance, in four or five instances the answer is directly in the negative, while the others represent them as professing friendship but passing by on the other side.

The answers to the fourteenth question are as follows:13 say the medical men are friendly to the cause, - 6 that they are divided in sentiment, while 5 state that they have no medieal men among them-one says, "We banished rum, and the Doetor left." The remainder pronounce them positively hostile.
To the fifteenth question 36 Returns answer in the affirmative, 8 speak of them as partially friendly, and the others are said to be hostile. In two cases the schoolmaster is said to be abroad.
The answers to the sixteenth question are regulated by those of the 7 th, and in amount is a cipher.
To the seventeenth question the answers generally represent the Sons as the only organization, and to the eighteenth no satisfactory answer cau be obtained.

In concluding this Report your Committee would suggest the propriety of the Deputies stating in figures the number of Clergymen, Physicians, and Teachers, in their several districts and the number of each that are identified with the Temperance movement, and if Magistrates were added it would do no harm.

Bro. S. Selden presentec'. the following report from the Publication Committec :
The Publication Committee in presenting their annual report to the Grand Division, cannot but lament that so much indifference prevails in the Order generally on the subject of the Abstainer. The hopes which they have year after year expressed that the circulation of that paper would rise to a respectable number, have been so regularly disappointed that they feel that it would be out of place to enlarge on the worn out topic of the happy results which could not but arise from the manifestation of any fair amount of energy and liberality on the part of the Divisions generally. Were. these characteristics displayed by all the Divisions and members of our Order, as they are exhibited by a part, the circulation of the Abstainer would speedily treble its present amount.
The Abstainer has now a paying circulation of between 1000 and 1100. Atter the new fiscal year has commenced there will probably be a good list of about 1050, and when the clubs are properly arranged it may reach a higher number.
Several divisions have diminished their subseriptions on account of the lowness of their funds, and club lists have beeu reduced by the failure of individuals to pay. The excuses made by persons who discontinue their subscriptions are sometimes worthy of note: some temperance men have given up the paper because they do not get it regularly though the carriers assert that they have left them regularly. Others, also temperance men, have found themselves obliged to give it up-because they take so many other papers.
The committee regret this state of matters the more
because the Abstainer is conducted with so much care, prudence, ability and zeal, that there is no just cause for this indifference. Many approving letters have been received, and no expression of disapprobation has arisen from any quarter during the past year. The exertions of our worthy Grand Scribe to sustain its efficiency amidst such reasons for his diseouragement certainly entitle him to the thanks of the Grand Division.

If fifty or a hundred copies were paid for from the funds of the Grand Division, and circulated gratuitously in places where the Abstainer is little known, the committee believe that it would tend to increase the circulation. In fine, they would urge the propricty of endeavoring to secure more prompt payment, as muel inconvenience is caused by dilatoriness on this point.
