Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

These pages are calculated for Toronto and Quebec, and for ordinary purposes will serve with sufficient accuracy for every city in Canada.

MOON'S PHASES.—This Table gives the times for the two meridians when the moon passes the geocentric longitudes of 0°, 90°, 180° and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

TWILIGHT.—In this Table are given the times at which twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening, i.e., the times when the sun's centre is 18° below the horizon.

GREATEST ELONGATION OF THE POLE STAR.—This column gives the greatest azimuth of the Pole Star east or west from the meridian as observed at a place in latitude 45°. When the greatest elongation corresponding to any other latitude is required, the number given in the column should be corrected by means of the following table.

The 1st correction for the degrees of latitude is to be subtracted from the greatest elongation given in the calendar, or added to it, according as the degrees of latitude are less or greater than 45°.

The 2nd correction, which is always additive, is found by multiplying the number given in the third line of the table by the number of minutes in the latitude.

Thus for latitude 43° 20'. 1st correction = - 4° 5" 2nd correction + 2.0 × 20 = + 40"

THE PLANETS.—The times of rising and setting of the five chief planets are calculated for Toronto, and are corrected for refraction. The times of culmination, although computed for the meridian of Toronto, will serve approximately for the whole of Canada. The meridian zenith distances, being designed merely to aid in finding the planets, have been given only to the nearest tenth of a degree, as seen from the latitude of Toronto.

When the planetary day is shorter than the mean solar day, and commences soon after the midnight of the preceding day, the planet will sometimes arrive a second time on the meridian before the expiration of the actual civil day. From analogous causes a planet will sometimes rise twice or set twice in the same civil day. When two culminations occur in the same day, or two risings or settings, the times of both are registered.

The times of the SUN'S RISING AND SETTING are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction both for Toronto and Quebec.

The Moon's RISING is given from full to change, and her setting from change to full.

The Moon's MERIDIAN ZENITH DISTANCES are given to the nearest tenth of a degree for Toronto. They are not corrected for parallax or refraction.

The column SUN ON MERIDIAN gives the time that a watch should shew when the shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark.

DECLINATION OF THE SUN AT APPARENT NOON.—This column gives the sun's declination at the instant he passes the meridian of Toronto.

Moon's AGE.—This column shews to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's age at Toronto Noon.

The column, MOON ON THE MERIDIAN, gives the mean time at which the moon's centre passes the meridian of Toronto.

The column, UPPER TRANSIT OF POLE STAR shews for every day the mean time at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of Toronto. It passes in the morning from April 9th to October 8th, and in the evening for the rest of the year.

The five last columns, although computed for Toronto, will serve with sufficient accuracy for the whole of Canada.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11 h. 58 m. 2 s. to the time of its preceding upper transit.

From the time of the upper transit of the pole star may be found the time of its greatest western or eastern elongation, by adding or subtracting the constants given in the annexed Table.

From the times of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be derived, with the aid of the following table, the times of culmination, and of the rising and setting of the principal fixed stars that appear above the horizon of Toronto.

Star Table.

To ascertain where any star found in the following table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the preceding meridian transit of the pole star given in the calendar. To find the time of rising of a star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from the time of its meridian passage. For the setting of a star, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. Those stars marked (....) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or set at Toronto, or at places to the north of Toronto.

Eclipses.

In the year 1861 there will be three Eclipses of the Sun and one of the Moon.

- I.—An annular Eclipse of the Sun, January 10, invisible in Canada.
II.—An annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 7, invisible in Canada.
III.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, December 16, visible in Canada.
IV.—A total Eclipse of the Sun, December 30, 31, visible as a partial one in Canada.

I.—ANNUAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, January 10.

The central line of this Eclipse commences about 5° east of Madagascar, and passing through South Australia in a N. E. direction terminates at a point in about latitude 4° N. and longitude 170° W. The Eclipse is visible as a partial one throughout Australasia and from a considerable portion of the Indian Ocean and the Indian Archipelago.

II.—ANNUAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, July 7.

This Eclipse is seen as a central one from parts of the Indian Archipelago, and as a partial one from the greater part of India, China, New Zealand and the northern parts of Australia.

III.—A PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE MOON, December 16.

The first contact with the shadow occurs at 15° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the east, and the last contact 150° towards the west. Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) 0.185.

IV.—TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, Dec. 30, 31.

The Eclipse is first seen at 23h 14m of Dec. 30, Greenwich mean time, from a point in the North Pacific, in latitude 9° 1' N. and longitude 74° 1' W.; and it is seen last at 4h 22m of Dec. 31, Greenwich mean time, from a point in Eastern Africa in latitude 27° 13' N., and longitude 12° 33' E.

The line of central eclipse commences from a point south of Cuba, and, extending along the northern coast of South America and through a part of North Africa, terminates near Cape Matapan in Greece.

From a point in or near Quebec in latitude 46° 29' N., and longitude 4h 44m 48s W., a partial eclipse is visible.

At Quebec the Sun rises partially eclipsed (obscuration increasing).

Magnitude of the Eclipse at sunrise (Sun's diameter =1) .224.

Angle from the North Pole 112° towards the West (for direct image).

Greatest obscuration Dec. 31 ... 5h 15m A. M.

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Sun's diameter =1) .306.

Angle from the North Pole of last contact 141° towards the East (for direct image).

From a point in or near Montreal, in latitude 45° 30' N., and longitude 4h 54m 24s W., a partial eclipse is visible.

At Montreal the Sun rises partially eclipsed (obscuration increasing).

Magnitude of the Eclipse at sunrise (Sun's diameter =1) .299.

Angle from the North Pole 115° towards the West (for direct image).

Greatest obscuration Dec. 31 ... 5h 1m A. M.

Last contact " 8 560 " } Mean civil time at Montreal.

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Sun's diameter =1) .337.

Angle from the North Pole of last contact 145° towards the East (for direct image).

From a point in or near Toronto, in latitude 43° 39' N., and longitude 5h 17m 33s W., a partial eclipse is visible.

At Toronto the Sun rises partially eclipsed (obscuration decreasing).

Magnitude of the Eclipse at sunrise (Sun's diameter =1) .402.

Angle from the North Pole 102° towards the East (for direct image).

Last contact occurs, Dec. 31, 8h 27m, Mean civil time at Toronto.

Angle from the North Pole of last contact 147° towards the East (for direct image).

The mean temperature of the year 1859 was $44^{\circ}19$, which differs only $0^{\circ}06$ in excess from the average of 20 years.

The mean temperatures of the several months were in six instances above and six below their respective averages. As shown by the table, the warmest month absolutely, though relatively a cold one, was July, and the month that was absolutely coldest, though it was relatively warm, was February. The warmest month relatively was March, being 62.27 above the average, and the relatively coldest month December, which was lower than the average by 80.08 . December was the coldest December on record, being $3^{\circ}2$ colder than the coldest December previously recorded.

The warmest day was July 12th, with a mean temperature $79^{\circ}88$, and the coldest January 10th, with a mean temperature -80.66 .

The highest temperature of the year was $88^{\circ}0$, being 25° below the average. It occurred on July 12th, already mentioned as the warmest day. The lowest temperature of the year, occurring on January 10th, (also the coldest day in the year,) was -26.6 being $14^{\circ}7$ below the average, and the lowest ever recorded at the Observatory. The absolute annual range thus amounted to $114^{\circ}5$.

Humidity.—The mean humidity of the year was $.74$, being nearly identical with that of 1858. The annual march, as exhibited in the monthly means, corresponded in its alternate increase and diminution very accurately with that of the preceding year, and in most cases showed nearly exactly the same numbers.

Clouds.—The extent of sky clouded, on the average of the year, was nearly 3-5ths of the hemisphere, and for nine months the sky was on the average at least half overcast. This accords with the experience of previous years, but in the distribution of cloudiness among the different months a want of parallelism is apparent.

Wind.—The resultant direction of the wind was N 61° W. The mean velocity of the year was 8.17 miles per hour, which was 1.60 miles above the average, and shows an increase on the two preceding years. The most windy month was April, with a mean velocity 10.79 miles, and the least windy month May, with a mean velocity 5.70 miles. The most windy day was March 19th, when the mean velocity was 31.16 miles, the greatest recorded; and the calmest day September 23rd.

The most windy hour, on the average of the year, was from 1 P.M. to 2 P.M., with a mean velocity 11.00 miles; and the calmest hour, from midnight to 1 A.M., when the mean velocity was 6.64 miles. These statements agree very nearly with those made in the preceding year, when the most windy hour was from 2 to 3 P.M., and the calmest hour from midnight to 1 A.M.

Rain and Snow.—The depth of rain 33.274 inches, shows an increase of more than 5 inches on that of the

year 1858, and was 2.415 above the average. The depth of snow shows also an increase of 9 inches on that of the preceding year. This however was principally due to the heavy falls in December, as the amount that fell in other months was below the average in every case but in January, when it exceeded it only by about 3 inches. The total depth of rain and melted snow exceeded the average by 2.72 inches.

November was the most rainy month with respect to the amount of rain, and June with respect to its frequency. The smallest amount of rain fell in February, and the fewest rainy days occurred in December.

The heaviest rain occurred on August 23rd, when it fell to the depth of 1.655 inches, and the heaviest fall of snow on December 18th, when the dep. was estimated at 1.6 inches.

The fall of rain was distributed over 127 days, and the fall of snow over 87 days, including 23 days which occurred in December alone; and there were 169 days only, or less than half the year, without either rain or snow.

The rain occupied about 514 hours and the snow about 380 hours in its fall, making thus a total of about 894 hours, or $37\frac{1}{4}$ days, during which either rain or snow was falling; a result it is to be remarked differing only by about one day from that of last year.

The hour at which rain or snow was most frequent, between 2 P.M. and 3 P.M., and the hour most free from rain and snow, on the average of the year, was between 1 A.M. and 2 A.M.

Thunderstorms.—There were 30 thunderstorms, reckoning as such those cases in which thunder or lightning occurred accompanied by rain or hail; besides 18 instances in which the thunder or lightning occurred singly or together, but without rain or hail.

Auroras.—The auroras in 1859 were not quite so numerous as in 1858, but there was an increase in the number of days in which those of the first class were observed. The aurora of August 28th, and the following days, was probably one of the most remarkable ever recorded, when considered with respect to its brilliancy, its duration, and the extent of the earth's surface at which it was visible. It was accompanied by an extraordinary magnetic disturbance. The magnets were deflected from their normal position to the extent of about $20^{\circ} 7'$ in the declination and $2^{\circ} 20'$ in the dip; and in the horizontal and vertical components of the force there was a departure from the normals of about .08 and .006 of their respective normal absolute values. The magnitude of these deviations will be better appreciated when it is remembered that a disturbance is reckoned large when the declination differs by the dip $1'$, the horizontal force .0012, and the vertical force .00026, from their respective normals.

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REMARKABLE OCCURRENCES IN 1859.

January, 1859,

1. Canadian Steamer *North American* struck a rock off Cape Race, and her fore compartment filled with water; she reached Halifax in safety on 4th instant.

3. Fatal accident at the Polytechnic Institution in London, occasioned by the falling of the stairs.

4. Steamship *Vanderbilt*, wrecked on Ilace Point, Fisher's Island, Ct., no lives lost.—The Roman Catholic Church of St. James', Montreal, burned, loss \$100,000.—Tycoon, new Civil Emperor of Japan crowned at Jeddo.

5. A Decree published at Calcutta constituting the Punjab Lieutenant Governorship.

9. A large fire at St. Catherine's.

10. Coldest weather ever recorded in Toronto, thermometer marking -28.6°.—The Prince of Wales presented the 100th Prince of Wales' Royal Canadian Regiment, with a set colors, at Shorncliffe Camp.

11. An attempt made to blow up the house of Mr. Linley, in Shelford, which failed in causing injury to any of its inhabitants.

15. Ship *Portuguese Queen* burnt in Boston Harbor.

23. Fourteen lives lost by the foundering of the Screw Steamer *Czar*, off the Lizard.

24. The entire pacification of Oude was reported.

25. Burns' centennial festival celebrated throughout Canada, and the United States, and in England at the Crystal Palace, Sydenham, as well as other places.

27. Princess Frederick William of Prussia, (Princess Royal of England), gave birth to a son.

28. William H. Prescott, the eminent historian, died suddenly at his residence in Boston, aged 62.

29. The Provincial Parliament of Canada met at Toronto for despatch of business.—Inauguration of the Wellington College, Sandhurst, by Her Majesty, for the training of orphan children of military men.

30. Extensive fire in St. Catherine's, loss about \$80,000.

—Prince Napoleon, son of Jerome Bonaparte, married at Turin, to the Princess Clotilde, daughter to the King of Sardinia.

February, 1859.

1. A new weight, equal to 100 lbs. avoirdupois, and called the Cental, adopted at Liverpool, Hull and other Corn Markets in England.

3. The Prince of Wales arrived at Rome on a visit for the purpose of inspecting the works of Art in that capital.

5. Mr. Gladstone communicated to the Indian Assembly Her Majesty's refusal of their petition to be united to Greece.

7. The Prince of Wales paid a visit to the Pope.

10. Shower of fish, from one to three inches long, fell in Glamorganshire.

11. Extensive damage at Hoyle Mill, near Barnsley, by the bursting of the canal banks, it was estimated that 50,000,000 gallons of water was discharged over the adjacent fields and woods.

12. Mr. Cobden left Liverpool on a visit to Canada and the United States.

26. Armstrong's Gun, a weapon of vast range and great power, introduced into the artillery service of Great Britain, after numerous testing experiments at Woolwich.

March, 1859.

4. The British Gun Boat, *Jasper*, lost on a sunken rock, near Jamaica; about 40 lives lost.

7. Arrival of Baron Perier and 68 other Neapolitan political refugees at Queenston, Ireland. They had been sent on a vessel for New York, but compelled the captain to land them on British territory.

19. Frightful accident on the Great Western Railway in consequence of the embankment having given way, owing to heavy rains which fell for some days previously: seven lives lost and several persons seriously injured.

22. The city of Quito, in Ecuador, destroyed by an earthquake, about 3,000 lives lost.

23. It has been estimated that the Indian Mutiny will cause an addition of £34,000,000 stg. to the East Indian public debt.

24. At Malta, the custom hitherto observed of sentries presenting arms at the passage of the Host in procession, was discontinued in consequence of instructions received from the British Government.

26. The new Canadian Tariff increasing the average rate of duties paid about twenty-five per cent, came into force.

28. Remains of John Hunter, the eminent surgeon and

founder of the Hunterian Museum at the College of Surgeons, removed, by the direction of the Royal College of Surgeons, from St. Martin's Church, and re-interred in Westminster Abbey.

29. Serious riots in Galway on account of Gavanagh visiting that town and delivering a lecture against Popery.

30. Seven persons killed by an explosion of gunpowder, at Hounslow Powder Mills.

April, 1859.

1. The French Government decide to send an army of 60,000 men to the frontier of Sardinia.

2. Two new bishoprics erected for Australia,—the bishopric of Brisbane, (Moreton Bay), and the bishopric of Goulburn, (New South Wales).

7. Tantia Topee, captured by the English, with great loss to the rebels under his command.

9. The celebrated mandarin, Yoh, died at Calcutta.

14. Mail-carrier, Adams, shot near Brantford and mail robbed,—murderers unknown.

15. Tantia Topee tried by court-martial at Scopree, and sentenced to death.—The boiler of Messrs. Edwards' Spinning Works at Scouringburn, near Dundee, exploded, killing 19, and severely injuring 17 persons.

17. A riot took place between natives and blacks at Panama during a Roman Catholic procession.

18. Hon. Francis Hincks, late Premier of Canada, arrived in Toronto.—Tantia Topee, the Indian leader of the rebels hanged at Scopree.

19. The *Bowmanville* entered Toronto harbour by the new channel cut by the action of the waves through the peninsula, the first steamer that attempted the passage.

20. The Austrian ultimatum, dated April 19th, requiring the Sardinians to disarm and disband all Italian volunteers, addressed to the King of Sardinia, and promulgated to Europe by telegram on 21st.

21. The first public drinking fountain erected in London England, opened by Mrs. Willson, daughter of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

23. The Austrian ultimatum received at Turin.—Important remains of the Roman town of Ulloconium discovered in excavations made on the site near Wroxeter.

24. Great Western Railway buildings, Windsor, burned.—Boiler of steamer *St. Nicholas*, on the Mississippi exploded upwards of 30 lives lost.

26. Hon. Daniel Sickles acquitted of the murder of Philip B. Key, at Washington.—French troops first cross Mount Cenis.

27. The United States ship, *Pomona*, from Liverpool to New York, wrecked on the coast of Wexford, about 400 lives lost.—Revolution in Tuscany.

28. Sardinians defeated at the Bridge of Buffalora, the first action between these Powers.

29. The bark, *Emigrant*, the first vessel of the season, arrived at Quebec, from Europe.—Battle of Perpij, fought between Government troops under Gen. Vicente, and revolutionists, under Gallo, the latter defeated, loss, 200 killed.—Declaration of war by Austria.—The Austrian army crossed the Ticino.

30. At one o'clock this morning, the ministry were defeated in the Legislative Council of Canada by a majority of three, and the supply bill thrown out.—The Austrians occupy Novara—Manifestations made by the populace of Parma before the Royal Palace.

May, 1859.

1. The Austrians occupy Mortara.

2. The Canadian steamer, *North Briton*, arrived at Quebec, the first steamship arrival of the year.

3. Smith O'Brien arrived in Toronto and was received enthusiastically by his countrymen.—The Legislative Council reversed their vote of 30th April, on the supply bill, by a majority of four.—The Emperor of France, in an address to the Corps Legislatif, declares war against Austria.—The Austrians pass the Po at Cambio.

4. The second session of the sixth Parliament of United Canada, closed by the Governor General in person.—The Austrians advance to Sal.

6. Baron Von Humboldt, died at Berlin, aged 91.

7. The Austrians repass the Po at Gerola.

8. Captain McClintock discovered in the Arctic regions, certain evidence of the fate of the Franklin Expedition, which left England in May, 1845. Sir John Franklin died, 11 June, 1847. The *Erebus* and *Terror* were abandoned, 22nd April, 1848, by the survivors, 105 in number, who afterwards perished on the main land.

6. Milan rises upon the Austrians.—Victor Emanuel declared King.
7. The Austrians evacuated Pavia.
8. The Emperor of the French and King of Sardinia entered Milan.—A submarine telegraph cable laid down in the Red Sea, by which means news from India to England will be accelerated about seven days.
9. Battle of Magenta, lasted nine hours, the allies victorious. Austrians lost, 1,600 killed, and 1,200 prisoners.
10. British ministry defeated in the House of Commons by a majority of 13.—Garibaldi enters Bergamo.—The Austrians evacuate Pavia and Placentia.
11. The Austrians evacuate Lodi, Bologna and Ancona.—The Derby ministry resigned.—Prince Metternich died, aged 86.
12. Lord Palmerston called to form a Government.—Bologna abandoned by the Austrians.
13. The Austrians abandon Plaziglottone.
14. A revolt takes place in Venice.
15. A Negro insurrection at Puerto Cabello in Venezuela, which was suppressed after a sanguinary struggle.
16. Schooner *Oneida* of Kingston carried away one of the Gates on the Welland Canal, causing the embankment to give way, and flooding a great extent of country.
18. The Austrian Emperor assumes supreme command of his army.
20. The Austrians abandon Montichiari, Castiglione and Sonato.
22. The King of Belgium arrived in England on a visit to the Queen.
28. A young woman, aged 17, named Catherine Spillan,

a milliner, residing on Ontario Street, committed suicide by cutting her throat with a razor.

24. The battle of Solferino fought: Austrian army numbered 170,000 men, that of the allies 160,000, great losses on both sides, the Austrians defeated.—Napoleon telegraphed that the army took 6,000 prisoners, 3 flags and 30 cannon. French loss, killed and wounded, 12,000 rank and file, and 720 officers.

25. The English and French forces, accompanying the English and French Ambassadors to the Emperor of China were obstructed in their passage up the Peiho river, attempted to force their way and were totally defeated by the Chinese, 464 killed and wounded.

27. Frightful accident near South Bend, Ind., on the Michigan Southern R.R., 33 killed, 50 to 60 more wounded. The train was precipitated into the river.

28. About sundown a most tremendous tornado swept through the township of Melanchton from the N.W., scooping out a lane through the bush, and carrying barns, houses and fences away with it like chaff.

29. Mr. Cobden arrived at Liverpool on his return from Canada and the United States.

30. Mons. Blondin walked on a tight rope over the Niagara river, for the first time, from the American to the Canadian side and back, 10,000 present.

July, 1859.

1. The Isle of St. Juan, Vancouver Territory, taken possession of by General Harvey, in the name of the U.S. Government, an assumption protested against by Governor Douglas of British Columbia, on behalf of Great Britain.

2. The balloon "Atlantic" landed on the farm of Mr. Whitney, town of Henderson, near Sackett's Harbour, at 20 min. past 2 P.M., being just 19 hours from St. Louis, a distance of over 1,100 miles, more than doubtless the longest balloon voyage ever made. Names of passengers—Wise, La Mountain, Gager and Hyde.

3. The steamer *Ploughboy*, with several members of the ministry and other Provincial celebrities on board, nearly wrecked on Lake Huron, on her way to Sault Ste. Marie; she drifted all night at the mercy of the waves and dragged her anchor until within 20 feet of land.

4. Flight frost reported to the north of Toronto.

5. The steamship *Agena*, of the Galway line, wrecked this morning at 5 o'clock, having gone ashore in a fog, 8 miles east of Trepary Bay, passengers and crew saved, vessel and cargo total loss.

6. The steamship *Hungarian* from Liverpool, Wednesday 29th, passed Father Point at 11.30 A.M. to-day, making a very rapid passage, 8 days 12 hours.—An armistice signed by the belligerent powers at war in Europe, at Villa Franca, to extend to the 15th of July.

11. A commercial treaty with England ratified by the Japanese Government.—The Emperors of France and Austria met at Villafranca and agreed upon the terms of peace.

15. The Emp. of France & King of Sardinia enter Turin.

16. Death of the young Queen of Portugal, of diphtheria, after an illness of five days; she had been only a few months married.

17. Capt. Vansittart died from his wounds received at the Peiho, China, June 25th.

18. Dreadful storm passed over a great part of England, a number of persons killed by lightning, and much property destroyed in and near London.

23. Seizure of the Island of San Juan by an American force under General Harvey.

25. The Vauxhall Gardens, London, closed as a place of amusement, the grounds being about to be converted into building lots.

26. A cyclone passed over Calcutta, 40 vessels lost in the river Hoogly.

August, 1859.

6. A strike in the Building trades of London, in consequence of the workmen demanding that the hours of labour shall be reduced from ten to nine per day, without any reduction in the rate of wages: this strike continued until November.

9. Strike of operative builders in London assumed formidable dimensions, 20,000 refused to work.

12. The Queen paid a visit to the Channel Islands.

14. Grand entry of the army of Italy into Paris.

16. The foundation stone of the Rev. C. H. Spurgeon's new Tabernacle in London, Eng., laid by Sir S. M. Petro.

5. The Great Eastern left the Nor for her trial trip at sea.—Major-General Sir Wm. Eyre, Commander of the Forces in Canada, died, aged 53.

6. The feed pipe of the Great Eastern burst, causing six deaths, and great consternation on Board.—Great Fire in Halifax, N. S., loss about \$1,000,000.

7. The Governor General left Toronto for Quebec.

8. I. K. Brunel, the celebrated engineer, died of paralysis, aged 63.—The British Association for the advancement of Science, met at Aberdeen, his Royal Highness, Prince Albert, in the chair, as President.

9. Shock of an earthquake felt at New Quay, Cornwall, which lasted over a minute.—Captain McLintock arrived in England in the Iris yacht, bringing intelligence of the death of Sir John Franklin, and the subsequent loss of his expedition.

10. Messrs. Le Mountain and Hardwick ascended in a balloon from Watertown, N. Y., and descended 150 miles north of Ottawa, after four hours journey; they were not heard from until October 3.—The Bay of Fundy died.—A new Planet discovered by M. Robert Luther, at Bilk, and named Mnemosyne.

11. Hill Sodok installed as Bey of Tunis.

12. Mr. John Head, only son of the Governor General, drowned while bathing at Grande Mere, river St. Maurice.

7. Robert Stephenson, the eminent engineer, died in London, England, aged 55 years.

8. The monument to Major-General Sir Isaac Brock on the Queenston Heights, formally inaugurated.—The Cricket match played at Philadelphia, between the All England eleven and American twenty-two terminated in favor of the former, with eight wickets to spare.

9. The Glasgow new waterworks at Loch Katrine, inaugurated by the Queen.—The Flora Temple, Merchant ship, lost in the China Sea, with nearly 1000 human beings.

10. The Virginian negro in insurrection at Harper's Ferry.—The Grand Trunk Railway opened to Riviere du Loup.—The Prince of Wales commenced residence as a student at Oxford.

11. The cricket match played at Hamilton, between the All England eleven and twenty-two of Canada West, resulted in favor of the former with ten wickets to spare.

12. An extensive fire in Toronto, about 60 families rendered homeless.—Hostilities commenced between Spain and Morocco.

13. Sir John Dean Paul and Mr. Strachan, the convict

16. The screw steamer Royal Charter, totally wrecked in Muffa Red Bay, Wales, over 400 lives, and \$2,600,000 in gold lost.

17. The International Bank of Canada suspended at 10, a.m., which brought down the Colonial Bank at noon, in consequence of the run made upon the latter.

18. Lord Brongham elected Chancellor of the University of Edinburgh.

November, 1859.

1. A terrible accident occurred upon the Chicago and North Western Railway, nine persons killed, and a great number injured.—The Great Eastern left Holyhead for Southampton, for exhibition.

2. This day observed throughout Canada as a day of public thanksgiving for the abundant harvest.

3. The propeller, Ohio, blew up and sank in ten minutes off Long Point, Lake Erie, only 2 lives lost.

4. The New York Central Grain elevator at Buffalo, totally destroyed by fire, loss 200,000 bushels of grain.

5. The Reform Convention met at Toronto.

6. The centenary of the birthday of Schiller celebrated in various parts of Germany, England, U. S. & Canada.

7. A decree of the Sultan imposed a limit upon the luxury of the Turkish women of high position, and ordered certain changes in their costume.

8. Dr. Smethurst being pardoned of the murder of Miss Isabella Banks, is committed for trial for bigamy.

9. About this time numerous volunteer rifle corps were formed in various parts of England.

10. The tribunal of the Inquisition abolished by the Provisional Government of Tuscany.

11. The Rev. Dr. Lynch installed as coadjutor Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Toronto.

12. The Grand Trunk Railway opened to Detroit.—The Canadian steamer Indian, totally wrecked, at 6 a.m. of Mary Joseph, Guysborough, Nova Scotia, 27 lives lost.

13. Dr. Geo. Wilson, Prof. of Technology, University of Edinburgh, died.

14. An engine and car with about 50 ladies and gentlemen crossed the Victoria Bridge at half past three, p.m.

15. Sir J. B. Macaulay, late Chief Justice, C.P., died suddenly, at Toronto, aged 66.

16. Washington Irving, the American author, died suddenly at his residence, New York, aged 77.—A severe earthquake felt at Circular head, Tasmania.

December, 1859.

1. John Brown, instigator of the Virginian slave insurrection, hanged at Charlestown, and by a refinement of cruelty the rope was manufactured from Cotton.

2. The first session of the thirty-ninth Congress of the United States, opened at Washington.

3. A disastrous fire in London, O. W., destroying United Presbyterian Church, Great Western Railway repairing shop and Codham's Sash Factory.

4. Thomas de Quincey, the English Opium Eater, died at Laeswade, near Edinburgh, aged 73 years.—Severe earthquake felt in the State of San Salvador.

5. Tonon's Harbor frozen over during past night.

6. Freight trains commenced crossing the Victoria Bridge regularly.

7. An extensive incendiary fire took place in Toronto.

8. Shields Green and Copeland, three of the Virginian rioters, executed at Charlestown, Va.—Jean Baptiste Beauregard, executed at Montreal for the murder of A. Charron.

9. The Royal Palace of Fredericksburg, Denmark, destroyed by fire.

10. The Victoria Bridges opened for general traffic.

11. The Spanish war steamer, Genoa, exploded in Málaga harbour, with great loss of life and property.

12. Lord Macaulay, died, in London, of disease of the heart, aged 50.

13. Great fire in Beckman street, New York, loss, half a million of dollars.—The Sir Henry Pellegrin, totally wrecked in Carmarthen Bay.

14. A great portion of the Union Railway Station at Troy, N. Y., fell, owing to the contraction caused by the intense cold of the iron girders, supporting the roof.

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OUR MUNICIPAL SYSTEM.

The welfare of a people is in a great measure dependent on the goodness of its government. So the nature of the government must to some extent depend on the education, manners and habits of the people. It would be as ruinous to Canada to impose into it the despotism of Russia, as it would be to Russia to impose into it the free government of Canada.

It is astonishing to find, on a retrospect of history, how much the nations that shone brightest on the world's horizon were indebted for their lustre to their Municipal institutions or a good system of self government. As with nations, so with the different parts of the same nation: the remark is applicable more particularly to cities and towns—those hives in which the industrious of mankind are in the habit of congregating. Originally, municipal government was restricted to cities and towns: it is only in modern times that the extension has been made to country places.

The growth of municipal government is a most interesting study. It had its origin with the Romans, and sur-

vived in many places the destruction of the Empire that gave it birth. The seed was widely sown, and though in some places choked by the thorns and briars of feudalism, in other places, where it fell on good soil, it grew, and increased as it grew, till its expansion, as witnessed by its originators, would be a subject of profound wonder.

The origin of the word "Municipal" itself, proves the parentage of the system about which we write. It is of Latin origin. It is derived from the word *Municipis*, the latin for a person entitled to the rights of a free citizen. Municipal government is emphatically a free government—one that can only flourish among free men—but like other human institutions, is liable to abuse.

The great features of the Municipal system are, that the people of different localities are incorporated; that they govern themselves by electing their governors; that the persons elected, usually called Councillors, hold office only for a limited period; and that through these local bodies the government is dispensed as required without the delay or expense of State legislation. The system is one of

decentralization. There must be local bodies governing separate and independent localities, and yet all subject to one supreme governing power. These local bodies may be termed guilds, burghs, towns, townships, cities or counties; it matters not by what names they are called. The people who cluster together elect their council, and that council is endowed with restricted powers of legislation, which powers are to be exercised more for the good of the governed than of the governors. The head of the council may be a provost, mayor, warden or reeve; it matters not by what name he is called. His duty is to preside over the particular council or body of men over whom he is placed.

The origin of Municipal government in England is involved in much obscurity. Traces of it, however, may be found at as early a period as the Conquest. During the time of the Norman kings, certain inhabitants of each burgh were entitled to choose officers for the administration of its affairs. The electors were generally the free male inhabitants of the constituency. Each freeman was required to render faithful account of his "lot" and "scot." By the word "scot" is signified a tax. By the word "lot" is meant the obligation to perform such public service as may fall to the lot of the particular freeman by rotation. Thus we see an unmistakable trace, though partaking somewhat of the rudeness of the times, of the system which is now the badge of British freedom and the pride of this colony. Further traces may be discovered by a reference to the history of the Norman period. The freemen or burgesses transacted their business in common council. In the course of time, when the burghs were incorporated, the name "common council" became attached to those few selected to manage the affairs of the burgh, when the great body of burgesses was too numerous for that purpose. The term common council is to this day familiar to us in municipal nomenclature.

The incorporation of burghs was the work of ages. The kings, for the purpose of raising revenue, or of more easily collecting it, frequently granted charters to towns of note. Thus, charter after charter issued under the great seal. Some charters conferred immunities on the burgesses affected. Each town, according to its influence, enjoyed more or less of these immunities. Hence, the system, so far from being uniform, was quite the contrary. Each burgh knew as little of its neighbor as it cared about its welfare. In those days towns were not knit together by ties of commerce or by the modern incidents of commerce—bands of iron. The facilities for travelling were few, and the desire little. Then, a journey of ten miles was looked upon as afeat quite as great as that of five hundred miles in these days of steam by land and by water.

The early charters, however, were not acts of incorporation; incorporation was the idea of more modern times. The first reference to anything of the kind, of which we have any record, occurred in 1412. In that year the citizens of Plymouth petitioned the Crown for a charter of incorporation. Many things combined to spread the incorporation of towns by royal charter. The political party in the ascendant for the time being never failed to make use of this means of strengthening themselves throughout the kingdom. In the time of William III, the influence of the Crown was greatly used for the incorporation of towns, with a view to serve political objects. So in process of time every place of mark became incorporated, enjoyed its privileges, and put forward its corporate importance. As a corporation lives for ever, some of these corporations were found on the statute book when the people represented by them, owing to fluctuations of population, could scarce be found. In this way we have the origin of rotten boroughs, and other constitutions akin to them, about which so much has lately been said and done in England.

The right of the people to choose their municipal governors is, so far as we can learn, of as great antiquity as the system of incorporating burghs. In Scotland, as well as in England, there are manifest proofs of the exercise of franchise at an early date.

The word "alderman" often occurs in Scottish codes. It is a word well known even in modern times, as applied to cities. It is a word of clear Saxon origin. The words "ald," "said," and "alder" in Saxon, signify older; and thus the word alderman originally signified "older man," or a man who, compared with his neighbours, was of greater age, and so entitled to greater respect. In time the word was applied to prince, dukes and earls. Thus, Ethelstan, Duke of the East Anglia, was called Alderman of all England. Afterwards the word became of still more general signification, and was applied to magistrates and others in authority. At present, by "alderman," we understand an officer of a

town corporate, next in rank to the mayor or chief officer. The word "mayor" is of French origin. It is the same as "maire" in French, the chief officer of a town corporate. By some it is supposed that "maire" is derived from "maître," the master or head man of the town.

Perhaps we had better here explain the origin and meaning of the few remaining terms applied to municipal officers. As head of a town or city council is called the mayor, so the head of a county or rural constituency (to be hereafter described) is called the warden or keeper, for such is the well understood meaning of the word. The head of a township constituency is called the reeve. This word, until restored in modern municipal nomenclature, was obsolete, except in compounds. We find it in sheriff (shire-reeve) and other compound words of that kind. It signifies, like warden, simply a keeper. The sheriff is the keeper of the shire, and so the head of a township council is, *par excellence*, the reeve or keeper of the council.

Having made this digression to explain the terms which, during the remainder of this paper, we intend to use without explanation, we shall now proceed.

The great variety of charters extant in England, and the confusion arising out of them, induced the English Legislature, in 1835, to attempt consolidation, so as to produce uniformity. This was effected by the Imperial statute 5 & 6 Wm. IV. cap. 76. Before that act, all was chaos. There was scarce a power or privilege in common to the cities, towns and boroughs of England. One town had exclusive privileges of trade; another had exclusive privileges of fishing. One class of persons was entitled to vote in one borough, and in another borough the same class was expressly disqualifed. Nothing was in common; everything was in confusion. The materials were at hand, but in such a mass of confusion that the system (or rather want of system) then prevailing was anything but natural.

Order was effected by the act to which we have referred, (5 & 6 Wm. IV. cap. 76.) It laid down a general form of municipal government, which was made applicable to all municipal constituencies, and then repealed so much of all laws, statutes and usages, and so much of all royal and other charters, grants and letters patent, as were inconsistent with or contrary to that form. It declared that from the time of the passing of the act, no person should be elected, made or admitted a burgess or freeman of any borough by gift or purchase, and made provision for those who were then so. It created a new qualification for freemen or voters, which qualification was made of general application, and dependent rather on property than on personal influence. It also declared a new qualification for the elected, which was in like manner made of general application. It provided that the days of election and the periods of office should be the same throughout the kingdom. It abolished all exclusive rights of trading, and in this respect placed all municipalities on the same footing. It likewise abolished certain privileges created by particular charters, such as exemption from service as jurors. The remedy was sweeping and effective, and has proved to be lasting. It was the progenitor of the Canadian municipal system, and therefore deserves more than a passing notice from us.

The persons affected by the act were of two classes, the electors and the elected—the governed and the governors. The qualifications as well as the rights of each were fixed and determined. A mode of registering voters was adopted; and whenever a voter tendered himself, the only question that could be raised was the one of identity. The persons elected were termed councillors, and, as regards each locality for which elected, were created a corporation, under the name of "the mayor, aldermen and burgesses" of the borough, as the case might be. The corporation, which was undying, was made to act through its council or body of councillors, which changed each year. Provision was made that one-third of each council should go out of office yearly, and by this procedure the council was yearly changed, though the corporation was always the same. In the event of a vacancy within the year, and before the day of general election, it was provided that the electors should, on a day to be fixed by the mayor of the borough, meet and elect, from among the number of persons qualified to be chosen, a person to supply the vacancy.

The members of the council yearly elected, from among themselves, a mayor or head officer; and no mayor or other member of the council was entitled to act as such, until he took a certain declaration of office, prescribed by the act. Acceptance of office was obligatory. A fine was imposed for failure of acceptance, and every necessary provision made to secure the service in office of duly qualified persons. This was nothing more than the old law of "lot," to which

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we have already made allusion. It was, however, also provided, that if any person holding the office of mayor, alderman or councillor, should be declared bankrupt, or should apply to take the benefit of any act for the relief of insolvent debtors, or should compound by deed with his creditors, or should absent himself for given periods from the meetings of the council, he should thereby become disqualified, and cease to hold office. The mayor of each council was declared to be a justice of the peace for his borough, and to continue to be a justice during the next succeeding year after he should cease to be mayor, unless disqualified. No minister of religion, and no person having, directly or indirectly, any share or interest in any contract or employment with, by or on behalf of the council, was qualified to be a member of the council. The disqualification, however, was not to extend to any alderman or councillor by reason of his being a proprietor or shareholder of any company having a contract with the council for lighting or supplying with water, or assuring against fire, any part of the borough. By subsequent legislation it was declared that the disqualification was not to extend to any person having a share or interest in any lease, sale or purchase of any lands, or any agreement for any such sale, lease or purchase, or for the loan of money, or in any security for the payment of money only. Still later, the Legislature declared that no person should be deemed to have an interest in a contract or employment with, by or on behalf of the council, by reason of his having a share or interest in any newspaper, in which advertisements relating to the affairs of the borough might be inserted. We are thus specific, in order to explain fully how much the English Legislature desired and endeavored to maintain the purity of the public trust created. Whenever councillors forgot that they are trustees for the public—that they are elected for the good of the public, and not for their own personal profit or advantage—then an axe is laid at the root of municipal government, which, if not in good time removed, must work utter destruction.

The powers of the council were, though extensive, of course subordinate to those of the supreme government. These powers were, to make such by-laws as to the council should seem meet, for the good rule and government of the borough, and for the prevention and suppression of nuisances, and to appoint fines (limited in amount) for the prevention and suppression of nuisances. Express authority was given for the maintenance, management and control of roads and bridges. County roads and bridges, however, in England, were, and still are, under the control of the justices in quarter sessions of the particular county. To the justices are entrusted general powers as to the assessment and collection of county rates. The municipal system proper has not to this day been extended to the counties of England. To each council of a borough was of course left the appointment of all the subordinate officers of the corporation. It was by the same act provided that all acts to be done by the council of the borough might be done by the majority of the members of the council present at the meeting; the whole number present at the meeting not being less than one third part of the number of the whole council. It was not lawful for any member of the council to vote or take part in the discussion of any matter before the council, in which such member was directly or indirectly peculiarly interested.

Such was the municipal system of England in 1835; such it is to this day. The Canadian system though the offspring of that of the mother country, is an improvement upon it, and superior to anything of the kind known in the civilized world. The principles of our system are the same as those of the English system, but the application of them is much more extensive in this colony than in the parent state. While municipal government was in older times restricted to a few opulent and powerful towns, it is in modern times extended to every city, town and borough in England; and while in England it is as yet restricted to cities, towns and boroughs, it is in Canada extended not only to cities and towns, but to villages, townships and counties, and in fact to every inch of land in the colony.

The municipal system of Canada, like other human institutions, was the growth of time. When the colony was in the hands of the French, municipal laws were administered by the intendant or colonial governor and council. For many years after the English acquired possession of the colony, the same regime prevailed. Then, the people were few in number and far asunder; there was no such thing as organization. When population increased, the necessity for decentralization forced itself on the attention of the Legislature, and resulted in a very imperfect system of municipal government. Cities and towns, as in England,

were from time to time incorporated by special charters; charters here being the acts of the Legislature, in England the acts of the monarch. The charters or acts of incorporation were without uniformity, and so very often opposed to each other. No special provision was made for rural municipalities, such as counties, townships and villages. They were, as in England, under the control of justices of the peace in quarter sessions.

Such was the state of things in Canada until 1841, when the Canadian Legislature passed an act (4 & 5 Vic. cap. 10) to extend the municipal system to districts (now counties) and other rural municipalities. This was a step in advance of the mother country—a step which has not yet been taken by the mother country. Cities, towns and villages were left as before, dependent on their several charters, which were as diverse as local interests and local influences could make them.

By the act of 1841, the inhabitants of each district of Upper Canada were constituted into bodies corporate, and made capable of suing and being sued, and of purchasing and holding lands situate within the limits of the district, for the use of the inhabitants, and of making and entering into such contracts or agreements as might be necessary for the exercise of their corporate functions. The council of each district was made to consist of councillors chosen by the inhabitants of the several townships within the district,—each township having more than three hundred inhabitants, freeholders and householders, being entitled to choose two councillors. The warden or head of the council was appointed by the Governor of the Province. Both electors and the elected had fixed qualifications imposed, the qualification being a property one. No person in holy orders, no minister or teacher of any religious sect or denomination, no judge of any court of civil jurisdiction, no military, naval or marine officer in her Majesty's service, no person accountable for district revenues, and no person receiving any pecuniary allowance from the district for his services, no contractor with the district, was eligible to be elected a councillor. Persons duly qualified and elected to serve, were liable to be fined if they refused to do so. One third part of the entire number of councillors went out of office each year. All meetings of the council were open to the public. Questions in council were determined by the majority of councillors present, the warden having the casting vote. Each council had power to pass by-laws for making, maintaining and improving roads, bridges and public buildings. Powers were also given for the establishment and support of schools. General powers were also given for defraying the expenses of the administration of justice, the salaries of district officers, and other minor expenses necessary to municipal organization. The Governor of the Province was invested with authority, by the advice of his council, to dissolve all or any of the district councils of Upper Canada. The act did not in any manner affect any exclusive rights or privileges of the municipal authorities of any city or town incorporated by act of Parliament. It applied only to district or rural municipalities, leaving cities and towns to be governed under the provisions of their several acts of incorporation.

Though much good was effected by this act, much remained to be done. The division of the Province into districts, owing to their great size, was inconvenient. Townships and villages within districts were for all purposes parts of such districts instead of having distinct municipal organizations. Districts had nothing in common with cities and towns, and the cities and towns had nothing in common among themselves. No provision was made for the advancement of municipalities in the scale of municipal government. The materials, as in England before 1835, were at hand, and required only some master measure to reduce them to order—to create a system.

So things remained until 1849. In this year, much was done that the experience of former years proved to be necessary. The division of the Province into districts was abolished. Counties or lesser divisions were substituted. Townships and villages were incorporated. One general law was made for cities, towns and incorporated villages, and all special acts of incorporation were repealed. These provisions were from year to year amended, until 1858, when all the amendments were consolidated, and one general and comprehensive measure enacted.

We now propose to explain the present municipal system. Its growth we have seen. Its provisions are numerous, but well arranged. The great feature of the system is the incorporation of municipal bodies. Each county, city, town, township and village is incorporated, and each has its council, which changes year by year. The powers of each are well defined, and the proper exercise of them is subject

to the review of the superior courts of common law. Provision is made for the advancement of villages into towns, and of towns into cities, according to population. So soon as a village contains three thousand inhabitants, it may be erected into a town; and so, when a town contains 10,000 inhabitants it may be erected into a city. Towns, townships and cities may, for the convenience of elections, be divided into wards, each ward electing one or more councillors or representatives in the governing body. Cities are for most purposes deemed counties, that is, of co-ordinate jurisdiction. Towns and villages are, in general, like townships, for some purposes, subject to the jurisdiction of counties, and entitled to representatives in the council of the county. It is in the power of the council of any town entirely to withdraw itself from the jurisdiction of the county, and to become as independent of the county as any city.

In case a town-ship is laid out by the Crown in territory forming no part of an incorporated county, the Governor may, by proclamation, erect the township, or two or more of such townships lying adjacent to one another, into an incorporated township or union of townships, and annex the same to any incorporated county. The proclamation is to appoint the returning officer who is to hold, and the place for holding the first election in the township or union of townships. When a junior township of an incorporated union of townships has one hundred freeholders and householders, it may become separated from the union of townships. Provision is made for the separate incorporation of townships having a less number of inhabitants than one hundred, where one township is so situated with reference to streams or other natural obstructions, that its inhabitants cannot conveniently be united with the inhabitants of an adjoining township for municipal purposes. The Governor-General may also annex gore of land not forming part of an incorporated township, to any township or townships to which they are adjacent.

So the Governor-General may, by proclamation, form into a new county any new townships not within the limits of an incorporated county, and may annex the new county to any adjacent incorporated county, or, under certain circumstances, erect the new county into an independent incorporated county. In every union of counties, the county in which the county court-house and gaol are situate, is the senior county, and the other counties of the union are the junior counties. During the union of counties, in general, all laws applicable to counties apply to the union, as if they formed but one county. When the census returns show that a junior county of a union contains not less than fifteen thousand inhabitants, after certain preliminaries, the Governor, if he deems the circumstances of the junior county such as to call for a separate establishment of courts and other county institutions, may, by proclamation setting forth those facts, constitute the representatives in the county council of the villages and townships within the county into a provisional council, and in the proclamation appoint a time and place for the first meeting, and name one of its members to preside at the meeting, and also therein determine the place for and the name of the county town. The member thus appointed presiding officer is to preside until a provisional warden has been elected by the council from among its members. The provisional council may not only appoint a provisional warden, but a provisional treasurer and other provisional officers. It may also acquire the necessary property at the county town of the junior county, on which to erect court-house and gaol, and erect the same. After the provisional council has procured the necessary property, and erected thereon the proper buildings for a court-house and gaol, the council may enter into an agreement with the senior or remaining county or counties for payment of its just proportion of the debts of the union. In case the councils do not agree as to the amount or periods of payment, the matter is to be settled by arbitration. When these things are done, it is for the Governor-General to appoint for the junior county a judge, a surrogate, a sheriff, one or more coroners, a clerk of the peace, a registrar of titles, and at least twelve justices of the peace. After the appointments are made, the Governor-General may, by proclamation, separate the junior county from the senior or remaining counties. The separation is to take effect on a day to be named in the proclamation. On that day the courts and officers of the union cease to have any jurisdiction in the junior county, and the property of the corporation of the union situate in the junior county becomes the property of the corporation of the junior county. When the junior county is legally and formally separated, the head and members of the provisional council become absolutely head and members of the junior county. So all by-laws, contracts, property,

assets and liabilities of the provisional corporation, become the by-laws, &c., of the new corporation.

The powers of municipal incorporated bodies may be exercised by by-law or resolution. A by-law requires certain formalities, which a resolution does not. One is in many respects less formal than the other, and in some cases one must be used when the other cannot be used. When a junior county or township is separated from a senior county or township, the by-laws of the union continue in force in the several counties or townships which composed the union, until altered or repealed by the new councils. The same consequences, as to property, follow the dissolution of a union of townships, as already explained with regard to a dissolution of union of townships. Each county or township remains subject to the debts and liabilities of the union, notwithstanding the separation.

The head of every county and provisional corporation is designated the warden; so the head of every city and town, the mayor; so the head of every township and village, the reeve. If the township or village has five hundred resident freeholders and householders, then one other councillor is designated the deputy reeve. The council of every city consists of the mayor, who is the head thereof, and of two aldermen and two councillors for every ward. The council of every town consists of the mayor, who is the head thereof, and of three councillors for every ward; and if the town is not withdrawn from the jurisdiction of the council of the county in which it lies, one of the councillors is elected by the council to be reeve of the town, or its representative in the county council. The council of every incorporated village consists of five councillors, one of whom is chosen as reeve or the representative of the village in the county council; and if the village has five hundred resident freeholders and householders, then one other of the councillors is chosen deputy reeve or second representative of the village in the county council. The council of every township consists of five councillors, one of which is chosen reeve or representative in the county council. When the population of a town is five hundred resident freeholders and householders, the township is entitled to a deputy reeve or second county representative, in the same manner as incorporated villages. The council of every county consists of the reeves and deputy reeves of the townships, towns and villages within the county. One of the reeves or deputy reeves is annually chosen by the council to be its warden or head. His appointment is no longer, as formerly, in the gift of the Government. No reeve or deputy reeve is entitled to take his seat in the county council until he files with the clerk of the county council a certificate, under the hand and seal of the local municipal clerk, that such reeve or deputy reeve was duly elected, and made and subscribed the necessary declarations of office and of qualification. In the case of a deputy reeve, a further certificate is required, to the effect that the local municipality has the requisite population to entitle it to a deputy reeve or second representative in the county council. Some villages are not incorporated, and these are not entitled to any representative in the county council. They are usually called police villages, and are governed by three trustees, chosen by the people, one of whom is chosen inspecting trustee or head of the council. The reeves and deputy reeves of the different local municipalities within a junior county, are *ex officio* members of the provisional council.

The persons qualified to be elected mayors, members of a council, or police trustees, are such residents of the county within which the municipality or police village is situate, as are not disqualified by the act, and have, at the time of the election, in their own right or in right of their wives, as proprietors or tenants, freehold or leasehold property, rated in their own names on the last revised roll of the municipality or police village, to at least the value following:

In townships—Freehold to \$400, or leasehold to \$80.

In police villages—Freehold or leasehold to \$400.

In incorporated villages—Freehold to \$40 per annum, or leasehold to \$80 per annum.

In towns—Freehold to \$80 per annum, or leasehold to \$160 per annum.

In cities—for aldermen—Freehold to \$160 per annum, or leasehold to \$320 per annum; and for councillors, one-half of the qualification required for aldermen.

And so, in the same proportions, in all municipalities and police villages, in case the property is partly freehold and partly leasehold.

No judge of any court of civil jurisdiction, no gaoler or keeper of a house of correction, no officer of any municipality, no bailiff of a division court, no sheriff's officer, no innkeeper or saloonkeeper, no person receiving any allowance from the corporation (except as mayor, warden, reeve,

deputy reeve or township councillor), and no person having by himself or his partner any interest in any contract with or on behalf of the corporation, is qualified to be a member of the council of the corporation.

All persons over sixty years of age, all members and officers of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, all persons in the civil service of the Crown, all judges not above disqualified, all sheriffs and coroners, all persons in priest's orders, clergymen and ministers of the gospel of every denomination, all members of the Law Society of Upper Canada, whether barristers or students, all attorneys and solicitors in actual practice, all officers of courts of justice, all members of the medical profession, whether physicians or surgeons, all professors, masters, teachers and other members of any university, college or school in Upper Canada, and all officers and servants thereof, all millers, and all firemen belonging to any authorized fire company, are exempt from being elected or appointed councillors, or to any other corporate office.

The electors of every municipality for which there is an assessment roll, and the electors of every police village, are the male freeholders, and such householders as have been residents for one month next before the election; who are natural-born or naturalized subjects of her Majesty, and who were severally rated on the last revised assessment roll for real property, held in their own right or that of their wives, as proprietors or tenants, for certain fixed sums. In cities, the real property, whether freehold or leasehold, or partly such, must be rated at the annual value of thirty dollars; in towns at twenty dollars, and in incorporated villages at twelve dollars. When a municipality is divided into wards or electoral divisions, no elector is to vote in more than one ward or electoral division. If entitled to vote in the ward in which he resides, he is not entitled to vote in any other ward or electoral division. When real property is owned or occupied jointly by two or more persons, and is rated at an amount sufficient, if equally divided between them, to give a qualification to each, then each is deemed rated within the act, otherwise none of them is deemed rated.

The elections are held annually, and generally in the beginning of the year. The term of office is in all cases one year. Mayors of cities and towns are chosen by the electors generally. Instead of, as formerly, by their respective councils. Strict regulations are made for the conduct of all elections; and if contravened, a remedy is given by application to the courts for a new election. We cannot, in this paper, enter into the details of holding an election. In case, at any annual or other election, the electors neglect or decline to elect the members of a council for a municipality on the day appointed, or to elect the requisite number of members, the other members of the council, or, if there are none, then the members of the preceding year, or the majority of them, appoint as many qualified persons as necessary to constitute or complete the number requisite.

In case the right of any municipality to a reeve or deputy reeve, or in case the validity of the election or appointment of a mayor, warden, reeve, deputy reeve, alderman, councillor, councillor or police trustee, is contested, the same may be tried by a judge of either of the superior courts of common law, or the senior or officiating judge of the county court of the county in which the election or appointment took place. When the right of a municipality to a reeve or deputy reeve is the matter contested, any municipal elector in the county may be the relator; and when the contest is respecting the validity of any election or appointment, any candidate at the election, or any elector who gave or tendered his vote at the election, may be relator for the purpose. The application must be made within a limited time, and in the form prescribed by the statute. The decision of the judge is final.

Every qualified person duly elected or appointed to be a mayor, alderman, councillor, reeve, or deputy reeve, councillor, police trustee, assessor or collector of a municipality, who refuses the office within twenty days after his knowing of his election or appointment, is, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, liable to forfeit not more than eighty dollars, nor less than eight dollars, at the discretion of the justices. The money forfeited is to be for the use of the municipality.

The jurisdiction of every council is confined to the municipality the council represents, except where a more extensive authority is expressly given. The powers of every council are as already mentioned, exercised by by-law, when not otherwise ordered or provided for. Every council may make regulations not specifically provided for by the act, and not contrary to law, for governing the proceedings of the council, the conduct of its members, and

the appointing or calling of special meetings of the council, and in general such other regulations as the good of the inhabitants of the municipality requires. Every by-law is required to be under the seal and signed by the head of the corporation, or by the person presiding at the meeting at which the by-law was passed, and by the clerk of the corporation. Certain other formalities are requisite to the passing of every by-law; and in order to secure the validity of by-laws to raise money, the assent of the electors is requisite.

In case a resident of a municipality, or any other person interested in a by-law, order or resolution of a council, applies to either of the superior courts of common law, and produces to the court a copy of the by-law, order or resolution, certified under the hand of the clerk, and under the corporate seal, and show by affidavit that it was received from the clerk, and that the applicant is resident or interested as above, the court, after at least eight days' service on the corporation of a rule to show cause, may quash the by-law, order or resolution, in whole or in part, for illegality. Particular by-laws require to be promulgated for a particular time; and if so promulgated, no application to quash them will be entertained after the lapse of six calendar months from promulgation. In case of a by law, order or resolution is illegal, in whole or in part, and in case anything has been done under it which, by reason of the illegality, gives any person a right of action, no such action can be brought until one calendar month has elapsed after the by-law, order or resolution has been quashed or repealed, nor until one calendar month's notice in writing of the intention to bring the action has been given to the corporation; and every such action must be brought against the corporation alone, and not against any one acting under the by-law, order or resolution. The corporation is authorized to tender amends to plead the tender to the action. A summary remedy is given for the punishment of offences against by-laws.

No council is to act as bankers, or issue any bond, bill, note, debenture or other undertaking of any kind, or any form in the nature of a bank bill or note, or intended to form a circulating medium, or to supply the place of specie or pass as money; nor, unless specially authorized, can any council make or give any bond, bill, note, debenture or other undertaking, for the payment of less amount than one hundred dollars. But express authority is given to issue debentures, in sums of not less than one hundred dollars each, for the purpose of raising money under a valid by-law passed for the purpose. All debentures must be sealed with the seal of the corporation, and signed by the head thereof, or by some other person authorized by by-law to sign the same. These debentures, payable to bearer, or to any person named therein as bearer, may be transferred by delivery. The transfer has the effect of vesting the property of the debenture in the holder, and enables him to maintain an action thereon in his own name. So debentures may be made payable to order, and if endorsed become in like manner negotiable. They are placed much on the same footing as bills, notes and other similar negotiable securities for money.

No council has power to give any person an exclusive right of exercising within the municipality any trade or calling, or to impose a special tax on any person exercising the same, or to require a license to be taken for exercising the same, unless authorized or required by statute so to do; but the council may direct a fee not exceeding one dollar to be paid to the proper officer for a certificate of compliance with any regulations in regard to the trade or calling. An exception is created in respect to ferries the exclusive privileges in which may be granted by the corporation.

Subject to certain exceptions, every municipal council has jurisdiction over the original allowances for roads, highways and bridges within the municipality.

Here ends our sketch of the Municipal System of Upper Canada. Compared with the older systems out of which it grew, the improvements are marked. It is more extensive, more efficacious, and in all respects more beneficial than any municipal system in the world. It contains the seeds of self-government, and the fruit is the general prosperity of the country. The system is admirably adapted to the wants of a new country. It expands as population increases, and is found equal to any emergency that may arise in the course of onward improvement. It follows closely upon the footsteps of the pioneer; and as forests disappear before his axe, it enables him to make good roads, good drainage, and other good and necessary public improvements. The system has been of late extended to Lower Canada, and, so far as we can judge, is likely to work beneficially in that section of the Province.

LETTER RATES.

Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., but if posted unpaid such letters are charged 7 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

On Letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., with optional prepayment.

The rate on Letters to the United Kingdom is,

By Canadian Packet 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling on arrival in England.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond Sea, and Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid. The rate on letters for the U. States,

(except California and Oregon) 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

For the Registration of a Letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents

MISCELLANEOUS CHARGES.

The charge on Parcels by Parcel Post to any place in Canada is 25 cents per lb. (with 3 cents. add'l if Registered.)

One cent per oz., payable in advance by Postage stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars, Price Current, Hand Bills and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charge on Books, &c., by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 12 cents on $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. packets, and 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents additional for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. These charges must be prepaid.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by Post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering post office:

For a paper published 6 times a week, 40 cents per quarter.
" 3 " 20 "
" 2 " 13 "
" 1 " 6 "

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS.

Transient Newspapers—that is to say, Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded—except only *British Newspapers* dis-

tributed to regular subscribers by Canadian Booksellers or News Agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mails.

NEWSPAPERS BY MAIL FROM ENGLAND OR UNITED STATES.

Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States Newspapers brought by mail into Canada, are charged one cent each on delivery.

PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

The rate on Periodical Publications is, if not exceeding 3 ounces in weight, 1 cent; over 3 ounces, 4 cents.

If prepaid by postage stamps from the office of publication, Periodicals published in Canada, weighing over 3 oz., may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals, printed in this Province, other than Newspapers, when specially devoted to the Education of Youth (both religious and general), to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication, to be transmitted to any post office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

Transient Periodicals—including Canadian Periodicals not prepaid the commuted rates from the office of publication—not exempted by the preceding clause, and all other Periodical publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by Stamp, the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in Mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the 1st clause of this sec.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage Stamps are provided for sale of the respective values of 1 cent for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet.

Letter Envelopes are provided, impressed with medallion stamps, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage to the amount of 5 cents and 10 cents respectively.

The 5 cent envelopes will be sold to the public at the rate of \$5.50 per hundred, or 60 cents per dozen. The price of a single envelope is 6 cents.

The 10 cent envelopes will be sold at the rate of \$10.50 per hundred, or \$1.25 per dozen. The price of a single envelope is 11 cents.

PENAL CLAUSES.

The Act contains the following penal clause:—

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted, for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers,) shall be a misdemeanor.

JUDICIARY.

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COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.—The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Upper Canada, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same; and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men (except in cases otherwise provided) try all issues of fact, and give judgment and award execution thereon, and also in matters which relate to the Queen's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by Her Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England. Chief Justice—Hon. Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart.; *Puisne Judges*—Hons. Archibald McLean, and Robert Eaton Burns. Clerk of the Crown and Pleas—Chas. Coxwell Small, Reporter—Chris. Robinson. Clerk in Chambers—W. B. Heward. Clerk of the Process—Robt. Stanton. Crier and Usher—And. Fleming.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—This Court has the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators, co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and to prevent multiplicity of suits, staying proceedings at law prosecuted against equity and good conscience, and may decree the issue, repeal or avoidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers as the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law. Chancellor—Hon. Wm. Hume Blake. Vice-Chancellors—Hons. Jas. Christie Palmer Eaton, and John Godfrey Sprague. Master—And'w Norton Buell. Tizing Officer—Geo. Hemings. Registrar & Reporter—Alexander Grant. Special Examiner—John Hector. Messenger—Alexander Ross.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.—This Court has the same powers and jurisdiction as the Court of Record, as the Court of Queen's Bench. Writs of summons and capias issue alternately from either court. Chief Justice—Hon. Wm. Henry Draper, C.B. *Puisne Judges*—Hons. William Buell Richards, and John Hawkins Hagarty. Clerk of the Crown and Pleas—Lawrence Heydon. Reporter—Edward C. Jones. Clerk—Geo. C. Goldsmith. Clerk of the Process—R. Stanton. Crier and Usher—Daniel Connell.

PRACTICE COURT AND CHAMBERS.—One of the Common Law Judges holds a Court during each Term, called the "Practice Court," for hearing matters relating to the adding or justifying bail, discharging insolvent debtors, administering oaths, hearing and determining matters on motion, and making rules and orders in causes and business depending in either of said law courts. Chambers are held each day in Law and Chancery by one of the judges of the said courts, for such business relating to suits therein as may be transacted by a single judge out of court. Clerk, Wm. B. Heward.

HER AND DEVISER COURT.—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their

duties are to determine claims to lands in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favour of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assigns. Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year. *Clerk of Commissioners.* W. B. Ilward.

COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damage claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100; and cases of torts to personal chattels, to £30; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of £50 under 16 Vic. c. 119, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

SURROGATE COURTS.—These Courts are now regulated by 22 Vic. c. 93, and grant administration subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. *Clerk.* C. Fitzgibbon, Toronto.

COURTS OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—Chairman, the County Judge in each county, who with one or more Justices of the Peace, holds Court of Quarter Sessions in his county four times a year for trials by jury in cases of larceny, misdemeanour and other offences. Sittings first the Day in January, April and July, and third Tuesday in November, with power of adjournment.

RECORDERS' COURTS.—In the Cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Kingston, and Ottawa, the Recorders' Court takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices for Counties having no jurisdiction in the Cities—the care of which is confided to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen and Police Magistrates of each. Sessions held 2nd Monday in January, 1st Monday in April and July, and 3rd Monday in Nov. *Recorders.*—George Duggan, Toronto; Archd. J. McDonald, Kingston; John E. Start, Hamilton; William Hirtz, London; J. B. Lewis, Ottawa.

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURTS.—The County Judge in each county presides.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25; but not to actions for gaulation: debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor; ejectment, title to land &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions.

CLERKS OF ASSIZE.—W. A. Campbell, Toronto; the Deputy Clerks of the Crown are ex-officio Clerks of Assize and Marshals in their respective counties.

The College year commences with the Autumn Term. The Autumn Term begins September 8; Winter do., Nov. 20; Spring do., Feb. 15; Summer do., May 1. Reports of the progress and conduct of the pupils are sent to parents at the end of each Term. Deducting the Vacations, the Terms are ten weeks each. The Tuition Fee is \$10 for one Pupil, \$9 each for two (Brothers), \$8 each for three (Brothers), \$7 each for four (Brothers); and the Fee for Boarders, inclusive of Tuition, is \$45 per Term. The many improvements made in the arrangement of the College Boarding House have been found to add very materially to the comfort of the boarders. A large paved Ball Court and a Gymnasium, fitted up with the most approved modern appliances, and a spacious play-ground and cricket ground afford ample facilities for outdoor exercise and amusement within the College bounds. The Boarding House is conducted strictly as an integral part of the Institution, its disbursements paid out of, and its returns paid into, the general funds. Prizes of books and certificates of honor are given every year to those who distinguish themselves in any of the subjects taught in the College. His Excellency the Governor General offers annually a valuable Prize of Books for the best examination in the higher departments of Classics and Mathematics. At the Annual Public Examination in July Exhibitions are competed for, varying in value from \$100 to \$20 per annum. Competition for them all is open to the Grammar Schools of the whole Province. More than two thousand of the youth of the Province have received their education, in whole or in part, in Upper Canada College. It numbers now about 300 pupils. The Principal, the First, Second, and Third Classical Masters, and the Mathematical Master, were all of them pupils of the Institution; as were likewise the greater portion of the Medal-men, Scholars, and Honor men of our Universities.
