The Political Significance of The Reciprocity Question

The following letter from a prominent Canadian, now in Chicago, with an unanswerable statement of the evils of reciprocity for Canada:

Editor World: Kindly allow me to say through your journal to what I, as a Canadian long resident in the United States, think about reciprocity. It is a satisfaction occasionally to be able to say what one really thinks.

No man who possesses an adequate intelligence, and does not deliberately stifle it, can fail to see that reciprocity between Canada and the United States is a very large and real sense an imperial question.

As for Canadian wheat, you will soon produce this commanding export practically to a few tracts in Maine. Hence Americans must turn to Canada for timber and pulpwood, and must have them at any price and at any concession.

Let me say in conclusion that I believe, and many here share my belief, that should reciprocity be agreed to by Canada, Washington will have Ottawa completely under its thumb in a degree.

Two other ministers are going after doubtful seats, which are firmly anchored to their first loves.

Forget a Winner. The only other candidate to run in two constituencies is Rodolphe Forget, Conservative.

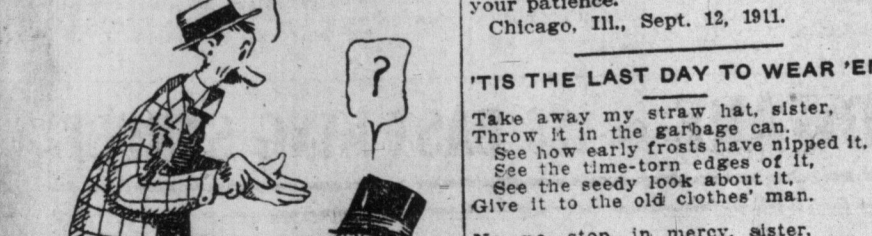
There were few incidents in connection with the formal nominations. Hon. George P. Graham met with a cool reception in his home town, the meeting being decidedly hostile.

KEMP ANSWERED CHARGES

Police Called Upon to Maintain Order, But Couldn't Quell Uproar

Uproarious and almost riotous was the nomination meeting in the I. O. O. F. Hall at which the candidates in East Toronto spoke yesterday afternoon. Each candidate was supported by a number of ardent adherents and at times the din became a great roar. During the meeting three men were kept out by the police. The electors were deeply interested and cheered and booed as they thought fit. They were good natured for the most part.

Joseph Russell reviewed his stewardship, spoke of his efforts in getting an increase in wages for the letter carriers, and of how he had received the help of rural home men in passing bills in the interests of the farmer. He had a certain way of doing his work at Ottawa. If that was satisfied the electors he wanted them to say so on election day.

"As to reciprocity, I will say a few words," he said.

UNIVERSITY WELL HEATED.

The new central plant for heating and lighting all the colleges of the University of Toronto is completed, and when the session commences the buildings will be heated by the largest plant of its kind in Canada. Every one of the University buildings from College-street to Bloor, west of the Parliament Buildings will be lighted and heated from this central plant, as will also Victoria University and the new School of Domestic Science. Formerly many of the colleges were heated by separate furnaces, but now they are all connected by underground conduits which have been under construction for over a year.

The plant comprises four huge furnaces of 400 horse-power each, and six generators about 750 kilowatts of electricity. On the coldest day during the winter it is anticipated that the furnaces will require 20 tons daily of fuel. The ordinary steam will now consist of six men instead of a score of engineers, firemen and helpers. The saving in wages alone is estimated at upwards of \$9000 a year. Next week the new furnace will be in full working order.

Reduced Assessments.

George Clark got a reduction on his assessment at 112 Belfair-avenue yesterday from \$170 to \$120. The assessment on Arthur Mitchell's property at 168 Rhodes-avenue was lowered from \$180 to \$80. The owner showed that he had only paid \$75 for it.
