

CHAPLEAU IS BACK.

Will Mr. Casgrain be the New Premier of Quebec?  
GRAND TRUNK TO REMAIN NEUTRAL  
In the Struggle Between the Political Parties.

Montreal, May 6.—(Special)—Hon. J. A. Chapleau arrived in town to-day from Atlantic City, and left for Quebec this evening, where the work of bringing into existence a new Cabinet will be begun. Up to the time of writing, absolutely nothing is known as to the new Ministry, but it is still presumed that Hon. Thomas Chase Casgrain will be the man.

The Grand Trunk is Neutral.  
His Honor brings word that Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, whom he met in New York, expressed great surprise to learn that Sir A. P. Caron did not form part of the new Cabinet. The president of the Grand Trunk, in speaking of the coming elections, said his road was a purely non-political institution and would remain strictly neutral during the Federal campaign.

Angers Will Stay in the Senate.  
It looks now as if Hon. Mr. Angers would fight through the campaign as a member of the Senate. Your correspondent asked the President of the Council to-day if he intended to seek a constituency, but he replied that the Government needed a leader in the Senate, and it was likely he would remain there for a while at least.

Importers are Kicking.  
The importers here and elsewhere are kicking over the fact that the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk have increased their through rates for ocean goods, when less than a car load is sent forward, the full car load remaining as before. Some of the importers have complained that they sold goods based on the railway rate of last year, and were consequently down to loss money. 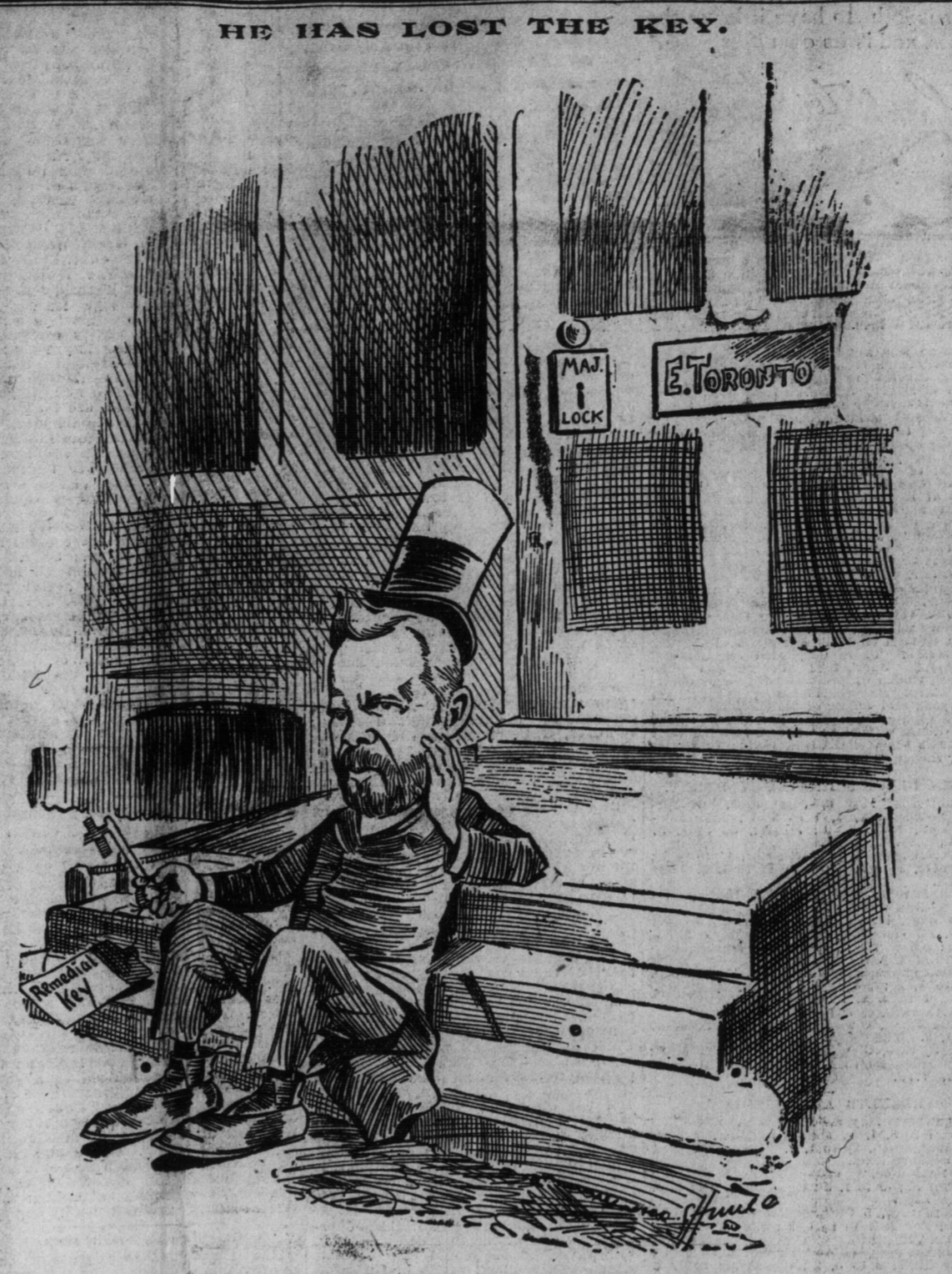
WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

TO FIGURE UP MANITOBA.

Assistant Statistician St. Denis Goes to Winnipeg.  
He Will Ascertain if Mr. Greenway's Estimate is Correct—How the Canadian Government Built Up the Dairying Industry—Prof. Robertson's Wedding—Young Brewer's Mistaken Marriage—Ottawa Notes.  
Ottawa, May 6.—(Special)—E. St. Denis, assistant to the Dominion Statistician, leaves for Manitoba in a few days to make arrangements for taking the quinquennial census of the province. Commissioners will be appointed for each of the seven districts and they, as well as the enumerators, will receive their instructions from Mr. St. Denis, who will make his headquarters in Winnipeg. The time for making the enumeration will be fixed on Mr. St. Denis' arrival in Manitoba. The census will be simply one of population, information relating to origin, religious belief, etc. being left over until the decennial census of 1901. The Manitoba Government claim that the present population is 250,000, an increase of 100,000 since 1891. This year's census will demonstrate how correct Mr. Greenway's estimate is.

The President of the Board of Trade Will Run IF THE CONVENTION WANTS HIM  
But He is Opposed to Remedial Legislation.

With Mr. E. F. Clarke as His Running Partner the Conservative will Sweep the Field—Both Strong National Policy Men—What the Liberal Game is in the West Toronto—General News in the World of Active Politics.

West Bureau Liberals.  
Brucefield, Ont., May 6.—The annual meeting of the Reform Association of South Huron was held here to-day for the purpose of organizing for the coming year. There was a good representation from the different municipalities. The following officers were elected: President, George Walker, Brucefield; Vice-president, John Kallbrenner, Brucefield; Secretary, Thomas Fraser, Brucefield; Treasurer, George Walker, Brucefield. It was decided to call a convention May 20th at this place for the purpose of selecting a candidate to contest the coming election.

A Patron in Lennox.  
Napawan, May 6.—The Patrons of Industry for Lennox held a meeting here to-day, which was not very large. The meeting was presided over by Ernestown being nominated to contest the riding at the coming Dominion election.

"Sir" Peter Runs Again.  
Chatham, N.B., May 6.—At a very enthusiastic Liberal convention held in Masonic Hall, Chatham, at which delegates were present from every parish in the county, the unanimous nomination was tendered the Hon. P. Mitchell to contest the County of Northumberland in the Liberal interest, at the coming general elections.

George Taylor in South Leeds.  
Brookville, May 6.—The Conservative Reform Association for South Leeds held to-day at Delta, and was largely attended. Those nominated as candidates were George Taylor, Dr. Preston and E. A. Donovan. After the candidates had spoken Dr. Preston went to ballot, with the result that Taylor carried the convention by a vote of 277 to 101.

Reformers' Rally.  
President G. L. Wilson of No. 4 Ward Reform Association has called a meeting for to-night of all Reformers in the Ward, and of those from other parts of the city, to be held in Ward's Hall, No. 450 Spadina-avenue. Prominent politicians will be present and addresses will be made. Election of officers and delegates to the convention will also take place.

Liberals of Centre Toronto.  
At the Liberal Club last evening a meeting was held to appoint delegates to the Liberal convention from that part of Centre Toronto lying between College and Bloor-streets.

Taylor Used a Gun.  
A Shooting Affray at Hamilton Last Night in Which James and Thomas McKelvey Were Intended Victims.  
Hamilton, May 6.—(Special)—James and Thomas McKelvey, two well-known sportsmen, were shot about 9 o'clock to-night at the corner of Bold and Caroline-streets, by Patrick Taylor, nephew of Mrs. Taylor, who keeps a grocery and liquor store at the corner of Bold and Caroline-streets, but the shooting was not serious. Being the probabilities are that both men will recover. The bullet entered Jim's leg, and the McKelveys live across from Taylor and are well-known characters. Shortly before the shooting took place they entered the liquor store and proceeded to kick up a disturbance on board behind the counter, and then attacked Taylor. The latter says he had heard they were going to assault him, and prepared himself with a .22 calibre revolver. The McKelveys picked up bottles and fired them at Taylor, and he returned the fire, and then he says to protect himself he fired, not intending to kill, but to scare his assailants away. Drs. Rennie and Griffith were summoned and attended to the injured man, but did not remove the bullet from Tom McKelvey's leg to-night. Taylor was arrested.

Kingston Bishops in Conclave.

SEVENTEENTH YEAR  
OSLER IN THE WEST  
THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRADE WILL RUN IF THE CONVENTION WANTS HIM  
BUT HE IS OPPOSED TO REMEDIAL LEGISLATION.  
WITH MR. E. F. CLARKE AS HIS RUNNING PARTNER THE CONSERVATIVE WILL SWEEP THE FIELD—BOTH STRONG NATIONAL POLICY MEN—WHAT THE LIBERAL GAME IS IN THE WEST TORONTO—GENERAL NEWS IN THE WORLD OF ACTIVE POLITICS.  
MR. E. F. OSLER, SENIOR MEMBER OF THE FIRM OF OSLER & HAMMOND, BROKERS, AND PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRADE, consented yesterday to stand in the Conservative interests in West Toronto, if he were the choice of the convention. Mr. Osler is a National Policy man, and an anti-Remedialist, and is a strong candidate for the riding. Downtown business men are saying that Toronto has not had any representative of her big commercial interests at Ottawa, and that Mr. Osler, if elected, will prove to the Queen City in Parliament what Sir Donald Smith has been to Montreal.  
Some are saying that unless E. F. Clarke is offered and accepts the nomination in East Toronto, he will not be Mr. Osler's running partner in the west.  
It has been decided not to attempt to secure in the Conservative convention the nomination of any pro-Remedialist for the west.  
The plans of the McCarthyites for the west are a little indefinite yet, and in view of the fact that both the Conservative candidates are likely to be anti-Remedialists, there may be no third party man put up in that constituency.  
It is stated on pretty good authority that the Liberals will put up two men, who will take no definite stand as regards Manitoba, but instead ask the people to rely on Sir Oliver Mowat's assertion that the question can be amicably settled.  
At the Albany Club last evening the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Toronto met for organization. The meeting was largely attended, and was in feeling, and its conclusion the opinion was freely expressed that there was no possible doubt of the election in the west of whatever candidate the Conservative party should put up. The feeling seemed to be in favor of the twin of anti-Remedialists, E. F. Clarke and E. B. Osler.  
A McCARREYITE IN WINNIPEG.  
Ald. Sproule Will Probably Run—Hugh John Macdonald's Popularity.  
Winnipeg, May 6.—(Special)—Before the west is set at rest as to the result of the political situation in Winnipeg being complicated by the entry of a McCarthyite candidate, Ald. Sproule, following the lead of his brother, has broken with the Conservative party and taken the Conservative side in the McCarthyite contest. Ald. Sproule declares he has been promised support in unexpected quarters, and discovers the names of several prominent members of the Conservative party who have broken with the party and taken the McCarthyite side.  
A Political Headline.  
Meantime the Winnipeg political situation is in quite a muddle. A number of erstwhile Conservatives of prominent name have taken themselves for Mr. Martin on the school question grounds, but on the other hand, Mr. H. J. Macdonald has secured the support of several prominent members of the Conservative party, and his conversion being largely on personal grounds. The Hon. J. Macdonald's personal popularity is aiding his candidature greatly. He has a natural faculty of making friends, which fighting his big advantage. Mr. Martin has a certain stage in being right on the school question, but there are indications to the effect that the McCarthyite party will be victorious in the McCarthyite contest.  
IN MR. HAGGART'S CONSTITUENCY.  
Mr. McCarthy Addresses a Monster Meeting at Carleton Place.  
Carleton Place, May 6.—(Special)—Mr. McCarthy made his first appearance in Carleton Place this evening before an immense audience in the Carleton Place Hotel. He was met by a large number of his constituents, and did not get in till 9 o'clock. Mr. McCarthy spoke for two hours, and discussed at length the issues for the election. He explained his position to the Conservative party from his break seven years ago, went on rapidly to review the past, and then present, and entered fully into the Manitoba school question, dealt with the Bowell element and the anti-Remedialist representatives, referred to the manner in which members had been induced to support the coercion act by promises of office, and named 11 members who had since defected from the ward. He paid especial attention to the Minister of Railways, Mr. Haggart, in this (the hon. gentleman's) constituency, and pointed out in sarcastic terms how economy had been practiced, especially in the Curran bridge, the Shick's Island dam and the Boulanger Canal. He closed his eloquent address with an appeal to the electors to return only honest and independent representatives at the approaching election, who would hold the balance of power and thus be enabled to secure good government. At the close cheers were given, the usual vote of thanks passed, which was then announced that a convention to choose McCarthyite would be held in Perth on the 13th.

ON COURSES EVERYWHERE

THOROUGHBRED RACE AND PREFERENCE FOR THE GAME. Fast Trials at the Woodbine-Stonemason Course a Mile in 1:45 1/2 - Hillbrook and Moorland Real of the Queen's Plate Distance in 3:30 - All the Horses Out and Watched by Many Earl Riders.

It was a perfect morning for training operations at Woodbine Park yesterday, and the excellent conditions of the track may be judged from the performances of the various candidates that will sport silk at the coming meeting. A large crowd of spectators gathered at the scene, and the appearance of the horses, as presented showed that race day was close at hand.

STONEMASON'S FINE MILE. The feature of the morning's work was Stonemason's trial, the little selling Plater, in company with Musselman and Haining, covering a mile in 1:58. He was ridden by Harry Lewis, the stable jockey, and had in the neighborhood of 120 pounds up Saragosa and Connors, the two Brooklyn Handicap candidates, were sent a mile in 1:55. Euston led Joe Miller a mile gallop, which was covered in 1:53, while Look-out and Golden Hedge did slow work.

THE HENDRIE HORSES OUT. The Hendrie fillet, Leobauer, was sent a mile and an eighth in 2:07, the first mile being run in 1:54. Trainer McGarry also gave Cardinal and Melchior strong work, the latter negotiating a mile in 1:52. 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SIR JOHN EVANS PRESIDES

At the Meeting of the British Association to be Held in Toronto Next Year.

London, May 6.—Sir John Evans, K.C.B., has accepted the presidency of the British Association meeting at Toronto for the year 1897.

His well-known archaeological, and equally noted for his devotion to geology, numismatics, and kindred branches of investigation. He was born in 1826, being a son of the late Rev. Dr. Evans of Market Bosworth, Leicestershire.

He was a general manufacturer for some years and is president of the British Paper Makers' Association. His published works include "The Coins of the Ancient Britons," which received the prize of the French Academy.

He is a deputy lieutenant of the Ancient Bronze Implements, Weapons and Ornaments of Great Britain and Ireland, and many contributions to the Archaeologist and the Numismatic Chronicle. He is an honorary member of the principal foreign learned societies.

He is treasurer of the Royal Society, was president of the Geological Society in 1876, president of the Anthropological Institute in 1878, and has for years been president of the Society of Antiquaries and the Numismatic Society.

His antiquarian and numismatic collections are among the best in England. He is a deputy lieutenant of the Hertfordshire, and vice-chairman of the Hertfordshire County Council.

He is a member of the British Association, and sits upon the council and general committee of the association. He is the author of several books on numismatics and archaeology.

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OUR HAMILTON NEIGHBORS

MAYOR TUCKETT GETS AFTER THE WARD BEHELDERS.

Special to Establish an Historical Museum in the Ambitious City—Mayor Tackett Gets After the Ward Behelders.

Hamilton, May 6.—(Special)—There was a long array of sitters at the Police Court this morning. Tom Connors got six months, and William Cusick got a year in Central Prison for entering Mrs. Hopkins' ickle factory.

He has discovered that the busy aldermen have been bringing pressure to bear on the engineer to have the work put on where he was wretchedly this morning, and threatened to give Street Commissioner McLaughlin the job of putting on the same terms.

Will Have a Museum. The Ladies' Committee of the Wentworth Historical Society met at the home of Mrs. Calder yesterday, and it was decided to use the funds, about \$800, for the securing of a building near the centre of the city for an historical museum, and Mrs. Calder, Mrs. J. S. Hendrie and Mrs. Papps were appointed a committee to secure the building.

After the Alimony. A writ has been issued against T. H. Lawry, who is residing in Oklahoma Territory, for the alimony of Mrs. T. H. Lawry for \$500 for alimony. The amount was fixed a year ago, but has not been paid, and divorce proceedings are now pending between the two parties.

News for the Shooters. Hon. J. M. Gibson, president of the Dominion Rifle Association, has been advised that 500,000 rounds of Martini-Enfield ammunition have been shipped to the use of the provincial and Dominion rifle associations during the present season. This will be welcome news to riflemen throughout the country.

Death of John Davis. John Davis, the fish dealer, who has been doing business in this city for over 30 years and was one of the best known men in the city, died tonight rather suddenly of apoplexy at his home, 100 St. George-st. He was married three times, had two unmarried daughters and two sons—Frank, who resides in British Columbia, and Walter of this city.

Last Night's Blast. At 7 o'clock to-night fire broke out in the kiln house of the Toronto and Hamilton Sewer Pipe Company, and about \$1500 damage was done, but the main buildings were preserved by the good work of the fire brigade.

The Crew of the Peering Were Taken Off Her Early in the Morning.

Highland Light, Mass., May 6.—The steamer reported ashore on Peaked Hill bar in the Peering, Capt. J. J. Holmes. She worked off the bar and proceeded towards Boston at 5.40 a.m.

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The vessel which went ashore at Cahoon's Hollow at midnight is the Daniel B. Peering, Capt. Clifford and crew of eight men were taken off in the lifeboat by Capt. Cole and crew of Cahoon's Hollow life saving station at 2 o'clock this morning, after a hard struggle with wind and sea.

The vessel was carrying a cargo of coal. She is owned by C. B. Reynolds of Newport.

Drowned Whilst Temporarily Insane.

Coroner Atkins yesterday conducted an inquest regarding the death of Ralph Hilton, whose body was found in a creek 40 feet under a bridge on Spadina-road by Constable Francis on Tuesday. The jury returned the following verdict: That deceased came to his death by jumping over the Austin bridge on Spadina-road when suffering from temporary insanity, and was drowned.

Dr. Thomas Armstrong and Dr. Fred Penton, who conducted the post-mortem examination, testified to the effect that death was due to drowning. It is a strange circumstance that there was not a mark on the body at all.

Jury Will Decide To-Day.
