ASSISTANT STATISTICIAN ST. DENIS GOES TO WINNIPEG.

He Will Ascertain if Mr. Greenway's Covernment Built Up the Dairying Interests-Prof. Robertson's Wedding-Young Brewer's Mistaken Marriage-

Ottawa, May 6.—(Special)—E. St. Denis, assistant to the Dominion Sta-tistician, leaves for Manitoba in a few days to make arrangements for tak-ing the quinquennial census of the province. Commissioners will be ap-pointed for each of the seven districts and they, as well as the enumerators, will receive their instructions from Mr. St. Denis, who will make his headquarters in Winnipeg. The time for making the enumeration will be fixed on Mr. St. Denis' arrival in Manitoba. The census will be simply one of population, information relating to origin, religious belief, etc., being left over until the decennial census of 1901. The Manitoba Government claim that the present population is 250,000, an increase of 100,000 since 1891. This year's census will demonstrate how correct Mr. Greenway's estimate is.



cal North Was Certainly a Peculiar Individual—He Extertained Everybedy and Knew Not Politics.

New York, May 6.—Mr. Julian Ralph in his London special says: Colonel North's death removes one of the most extraordinary men of London. He was luxurious, lavish, the popular bluff hero of the people and the curlo of society. He kept up a magnificent seat at Ekham, near London, in Kent, where every foot of the interior walls was covered with the products of almost prodigal outlay, good, bad and indifferent, as the case might be, but always expensive. The house was maintained like a grand hotel in season. The family dined apart, but the Colonet held his court at a great table, where he presided over nightly companies of 40 or 50 men, representing an uncommon blending of classes and sorts. Very often these men came in a private car, stayed over night, and were driven to the station in the morning in separate vehicles.

Colonel North liked to entertain on a grand scale, and gave holiday feasts to great bodies of local militia, railway guards and whoever he chose to invite. It is said that his dogs were housed in mahogany kennels, and were fed food to make the mouths of poor people water.

Colonel North was a man of humble origin, and never denied it. As a city man and a racing man, he held two

He went where he pleased among the best people. He was always bluff, natural and intensely original. When Colonel North ran for a seat in Parliament from Leeds against Herbert Gladstone, his extraordinary ranvass lost him the seat. His custom was to appear on the platform, make a few jesting remarks, announce that he did not understand politics himself, but followed Sallsbury, who did. He had the private fire engines parade, painted his dogs in his election colors and in many ways made an extraordinary and original campaign, at the end of which The Standard, the Tory organ, declared his defeat was not to be regretted. He proved to be sufficient of a politician to prevent the development of radical ideas. Where he lived radical meetings were seldom held, but when they were he used to appear and move an amendment, defeating the object of the meetings.
