THE CLIFTON HOUSE IN ASHES

Famous Hostelry at Niagara Falls, Ont., Destroyed by Fire Sunday Morning—Loss \$150,000.

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 26.—The world-famed Clifton House tonight lies in ruins, being totally destroyed, together with its contents, by fire this morning.

The fire was not noticed, though in the rear of the big hotel, in the room over the kitchen, and although the alarm was promptly given and the entire fire department promptly on the scene.

The hotel proper was first built by Mr. James C. Clifton, during 1836, who named it the Clifton House.

General Shafter Reports a Victory and General Blanco Says the Enemy Was Repulsed—General Attack Said to Have Been Postponed.

Washington, June 26.—(Special to The Toronto World.)—A Washington special says that the general attack on Santiago has been postponed.

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Gen. Blanco Says the Enemy Was Repulsed With Numerous Losses—Eight Spaniards Killed.

London, June 27.—The Madrid correspondent of The Times has cabled to Lieut-General Corcoran, Minister of War, as follows:

"Continuing my account of what happened Thursday and Friday at Santiago; General Rubia's column, after concluding its operations, was again attacked at midday and in the afternoon by the enemy's forces in large numbers, supported by artillery."

The enemy again advanced to the attack Friday morning, but were repulsed with numerous and visible losses.

They were seen to be retiring in concert with insurgent bands, and shouts of 'Viva Cuba Independiente.' In both days fighting we lost eight men killed and three officers and 24 men wounded.

The colonel of the Puerto Rico Battalion, Commandant Alcazar, and Colonel of Cavalry Domingo Berry, especially distinguished themselves.

The fact of our not being able to take the offensive before receiving reinforcements from Manzanilla and also of the outer line of defences at Santiago being weakened, induced General Linares to retire and to retreat his men. This was effected without molestation from the enemy.

Opposite Santiago 22 vessels and the fleet of transports remained in sight.

"Regarding the country between Sevilla and Santiago, all the topographical information we possess is that it is difficult of access. Admiral Sampson's amiable honorifice, and the anxiety as to events in Cuba, led to the production of the disgraceful calumny which imputed barbaric conduct to the Spanish troops at the events in Cuba. 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THE GOLD OUTPUT OF THE KLONDIKE

Miners Calculate on Twenty Million Dollars This Season—How Fleecers Were Fleeced in Charley Anderson's Case.

Dawson City, April 24, via Seattle, Wash., June 25.—The Klondike district and Indian River output of gold is estimated as anywhere from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000.

There is every reason to believe now that the latter figure will be very near the true mark. If private estimates of mine-owners should produce the amounts of gold and silver produced, the following creeks and tributaries should produce the amounts of gold and silver produced.

Only a few claims are being worked this season, and every one has proven to be almost fabulously rich. This is particularly true of properties situated above and between the two discoveries at No. 8.

Securing a grub stake, Anderson went to his claim and settled down to hard work. The first gravel showed good pay, and when bedrock was reached Anderson saw the fleecers had been fleeced.

When Anderson told of his good fortune the former owners of the claim devised sundry ways and means to get back the property. But the prospective rich man would have nothing to do with them.

This statement is based on actual observation. Sulphur, while yielding good pay, has not as yet shown up nearly so well as Domestica. The pups and guides coming into these streams are being prosecuted diligently now. It is believed before summer is over many valuable and important strikes will be made.

Two months ago Anderson was offered \$400,000 for the claim, not including the present season's work, or \$550,000 for dump and claim. His price is \$750,000, and he will not consider any offer under this.

Lippy of Seattle is another favored son of fortune. He staked a claim on Bonanza, but a few days later traded it for his present property at El Dorado Hole, after a shaft had been sunk on the Bonanza claim, but not a dollar found.

A piece of quartz, the exterior of which gave no evidence of gold, was shown by an assayer to contain \$167 to the ton.

While in a madlin condition he fell into the clutches of some would-be sharpers, who easily persuaded him to invest \$800, and to let them handle the property.

When Anderson came to the Yukon valley he found himself possessed of the property named, but without a dollar in his pocket. The young Swede begged, implored and threatened his tormentors, but to no purpose.

By far the most important discovery of the year has just been made by Sam Pond, Latham and Fairbanks, all well-known San Franciscans. These men have discovered a quartz ledge near the mouth of the White River, which will probably make them millionaires.

TORONTO FRUIT MARKET.

Mr. Watson C. Orr of Winona grows a bit 'Worthy Because of The World's Progress' Editor World: In your issue of to-day you have an editorial on fruit market. In the news columns there is another item on the same question. It seems to me that the two are somewhat at variance, and that neither is quite right. Fruit growers do not regard Toronto as their natural market. On the contrary, they regard the consumer as their natural market, and many of the largest growers of fruit have for years been doing all in their power to establish markets everywhere and anywhere in Canada, outside of Toronto. So far have they succeeded in this attempt that probably not one-tenth of the fruit grown in Ontario goes to Toronto. One reason for fruit growers not trying to avoid Toronto has been the outrageous market fees charged by the G. E. B., which, according to your statement, they took \$5000 out of the pockets of the growers who sent their fruit to Toronto that year. The commission firms of Toronto have fought for the growers' interests and have won, and are entitled to the growers' thanks and support, and they have done so. The commission firms of Toronto have just tried us by building a new fruit market and doing the fruit grower out of \$5000 or more annually, and they are not to be faulted for that. The commission firms of Toronto have just been bought out by a company which has been bought out. Verily, Toronto is well named 'Hogtown' which has not earned so ill-flavored a name, and which provide free markets for fruit, and to which we can send our produce. The profits on fruit growing have been reduced to nil. Many growers in this section have taken out large portions of their plantations, and other things, largely because they have been mercilessly hounded by transportation companies. Don't let The World be a party to encouraging hoghousness.

ROCKLAND STRIKE.
