The Meaford deputation that left here Mr. Hays of the Grand Trunk in regard by and Toronto returned to this city yesterday morning. The deputation consisted of Mayor J. D. Hamill, ex-Mayor Cameron and J. D. Sing, C.E. They presented the claims of Meaford in councction with the proposed new route, but Mr. Hays gave them to understand that the Grand Trunk was not interested in any project to divert the Northwest traffic from existing routes. The deputation bearned that the Grand Trunk has centred its energies on Midland, which it finds to be the most convenient transfer point for conveying the products of the Northwest to Montreal. Elevators are already established in Meaford, and the Grand Trunk has a short route to Montreal by way of Belleville. The policy of the Grand Trunk will be confined to the development of the traffic along this route. Mr. Hays thought that one great objection to the concentration of the business in Georgian Bay was the existence of so many ports on that bay. In regard to Meaford, Mr. Hays stated that it would be impossible to ship grain via that harbor until the railway had been extended to the water's edge. This would involve the construction of 2½ miles of new track. Mr. Hays promised if the town gave his company the right of way for this track, and also graded it, the Grand Trunk would provide the rails and finish the road. If the town of Meaford wished to go to this expense and also build an elevator the Grand Trunk would be pleased to take charge of wnatewer business offered at that point. It was arranged that Mr. Tiffin, district superintendent at Barrie, and possibly Mr. McGuigan, should visit Meaford at an early date with a view of the company and the low undertaking joint action in the improvement of the trailway and steamboat facilities, The deputation left for home yesterday. Mayor Hamill stated that Meaford would send one or more delegates to the meeting that is soon to be held in Toronto to discuss the new grain route.

Liverpool Corn Trade News, Jan.

France—The weather for the past week has been more seasonable, and quite favorable for the crops.

Eussia—Somewhat less favorable news received; some hard frosts without snow having been experienced at Odessa. Such conditions are liable to cause serious damage to the crops, but other correspondents mention that reports from the interior advise good falls of anow.

Austria-Hungary—Recent weather has been seasonable and no further complaints made respecting the crops.

Roumania—The weather has been much more favorable; good rains have fallen, followed by snow.

Germany—The temperature has continued.

sonable weather.
Spain—Recent favorable news is repeated.
India—We hear that the crops are progressing satisfactorily.
Australia—The weather had been favorable, the grain had filled well, and first samples had received favorable mention.
Chil—It is too early to say anything definite as to crop, but harvest will be late.

Present Position of Market.

With respect to position of the wheat market, the Liverpool Corn Trade News says: As to the future there seems a general consensus of opinion, both in Liverpool and on the London market, that prices in the spring will be lower than they are today, but for the present the general view is that sellers will succeed in holding their own or even improving their position further. America holds the field, and can set any pace she likes within reason. Russia, it is true, is a dark horse this season, and one cannot tell what it may do if America fall into error of judgment; but there is nothing to lead one to expect this, for so far America has behaved most correctly. The United States has had since the season opened, the call of two-thirds of the world's trade in breadstuffs, and an equal share in the maize trade, and yet has managed to market this enormous quantity of stuff without disturbing the course of the trade in the slightest degree. If, however, the American grain handlers should be carried away by the excitement now agitating the stock exchange, and attempt to put prices unduly high, then Russia would have her chance to dispose of the 2,000,000 quarters which are stored at Odessa and Nicolaieff, and an excellent opportunity would be afforded to the Argentines for the marketing of their next crop. Present Position of Market.

Referring to the incomplete returns of stocks in Liverpool, The Corn Trade News says: In the grain storage and dock board warehouses there are 203,000 quarters; on the quays and at the railways there are certainly not less than 100,000 quarters; and in private stores and millers' warehouses there are probably another 100,000 quarters. Here, we have a total of not less than 400,000 quarters wheat in this port, compared with 141,000 quarters returned by merchants. Millers inform us they are holding relatively moderate quantities; to whom than does the balance belong? It is not a case of bad faith on merchants' part, but it is the system followed which gives such an erroneous impression. Liverpool Wheat Stocks.
