MINING IN THE REGINA MINE

A. W. Ross Buys a Newspaper for Columbia, Otherwise Known as Upper Grand Forks.

Encouraging Reports Concerning Minnehaha of Camp McKinney—Mining Exchange Sales.

Since so little is generally heard of the workings of British companies operating in Canada, the following concerning the Regina Mine, near Bat Portage, should prove of interest.

THE TAGGART MURDER CASE

Links in the Chain of Evidence Woven by the Crown in the Court of Assize.

BROTHER OF THE PRISONER INSANE.

Father of the Accused Was a Man of Eccentric Habits and Uncontrollable Temper.

All day yesterday great crowds thronged the corridors of the Court House and tried to gain admittance to the Criminal Assize Court, where the Taggart murder trial is in progress.

Mrs. Law Was Overcome. Just after Mrs. Law, mother of the dead woman, had commenced to relate her story of the prisoner's visit to her home after the murder, she was overcome and collapsed. Her evidence went to show that when the prisoner worked his money went for drink. He went away twice and came back penniless, and twice his wife took him in and cared for him.

Mrs. Hogebals of 101 York-street testified that the prisoner wanted to buy a revolver at her store on Thanksgiving Day, but he did not have enough money. He had a set of harness with him and wanted to exchange it for a pistol. This the witness would not do, and Taggart later sold the harness at Jacobs' train-street, 125 Queen-street west, for \$1.25.

Mrs. Singer Bought the Hammer. Mrs. Singer of 123 York-street said that Taggart had bought a new hammer from her on Thanksgiving night for 40c. As Mrs. Brown of George-street, R. J. Cosburn, the prisoner's brother-in-law, and Arthur Webb, Police Court Clerk, gave important testimony to the facts leading up to the issuing of the order of protection.

The Order of Protection. In the afternoon Dr. Greig was put on the stand and gave evidence as to the condition of the woman when he examined her in the yard at 45 Station-street, for whom the Gauger of Duchesne-street, for the prisoner, worked at various times, related conversations about the order of protection, and that he had taken place between himself and Taggart.

Evidence for Defence. The first witness called for the defence was Mrs. Taggart, mother of the prisoner. She testified at length about the family and the fact that she has three daughters and four sons. One of the latter is at the present rate of the asylum, another is in the United States of America, and a third is in business on King-street west, in Vancouver, B. C. The father of the prisoner was a man of unsteady habits of going away from home at intervals. The last time he went away he never returned. He died in Vancouver of the McKinney Reef mine, and was buried in the cemetery of that city. His wife followed, and corroborated her mother's story. The case will likely finish to-day.



WHEAT FUTURES LOWER.

Decline of a Cent a Bushel at Chicago Yesterday.

Liverpool and Paris Also Declined—Conditions of Growing Crop in Many Countries—Condition of the World's Markets—Notes and Gossip.

Tuesday Evening, Jan. 17. Liverpool wheat futures to-day declined 1/4 cent per cental for all deliveries.

Paris wheat to-day declined 5/16 to 10 centimes lower at the close.

Chicago wheat futures to-day receded one cent a bushel, and although there was no selling for both foreigners and commission houses.

Liverpool maize futures declined 1/4 to 1/2 cent to-day.

Chicago corn declined 1/2 cent per bushel to-day. American stocks are fast accumulating owing to big receipts.

Exports at New York to-day: Flour, 11,383 barrels and 24,695 sacks; wheat, 151,388 bushels.

Receipts of wheat at Liverpool the past three days 416,000 centals, including 298,000 centals American, same time, 117,000 centals.

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 463 cars, as against 360 cars the corresponding day of last year.

Growing Wheat Crop. The Liverpool Corn Trade News, Jan. 8, reports conditions of the growing crop.

France—The weather for the past week has been more seasonable, and quite favorable for the crops.

Germany—The temperature has continued very mild, and although there are no special complaints of crop damage, it is probable that the crop will be a good one.

Spain—Recent favorable news is reported. India—We hear that the crops are proceeding satisfactorily.

Australia—The weather had been favorable, the grain had filled well, and first samples had received favorable mention.

Chili—It is too early to say anything definite as to crop, but harvest will be late.

Present Position of Market. With respect to position of the wheat market, the Liverpool Corn Trade News says: As to the future there seems a general consensus of opinion, both in Liverpool and on the London market, that the spring will be lower than they are to-day, but for the present the general view is that sellers will succeed in holding their own or even improving their position.

Duluth, Russian wheat is held in 6d to 2c over par to high; 2 1/2c asked for a very early delivery of Liverpool.

Wheat parcels to Liverpool are very sparingly offered; 2 1/2c 10/4d paid for No. 1 Northern Duluth; 2 1/2c 3/4d quoted for January No. 2 Northern Duluth; 2 1/2c asked for April-May No. 2 Chicago spring; No. 2 hard winter arrived, sold at 2 1/2c. Among the week's sales four cargoes of Australian wheat are reported, in all 42,000 quarters, at 2 1/2c 6d to 2 1/2c for Dec. and Jan. shipments.

For the first time this season the news comes Canadian red winter, ex-ports, 6s 2 1/2d to 6s 3/4d per cental, being on a par with same day's quotations for No. 1 Northern Duluth.

Holding Back Their Wheat. The Corn Trade News makes the farmers' deliveries of wheat in the United States for the 22 weeks ending Dec. 24, 2,906,000 quarters, as compared with 3,268,000 quarters for same period from the much smaller crop of 1897. The farmers in the United States have been very reluctant sellers of their big wheat crop of 1898. Last season more than 50 per cent of their crops was disposed of during the first five months of the crop year.

This season it is doubtful if much more than 40 per cent of the crop has been delivered during these five months.

We have here the singular fact, that although the European countries in Europe had a larger wheat crop in 1898 than in 1897, there has been actually a larger consumption of wheat this season than last. Reserves at harvest of 1898 were reduced to a minimum; farmers everywhere have sold a good proportion of their crop than usual.

Last season Europe imported about 150,000,000 bushels during the seven months of the crop year; this season it is likely that 200,000,000 bushels will be imported. The requirements of foreign wheat for the seven months, January 1 to July 31, 1899.
