DEATH BUT NO SURRENDER CANADIAN'S HEROIC CHOICE

At the Klerksdorp Affair Five of Our Men Were Surrounded by a Boer Force—Four Surrendered, But One Fought Single-Handed Till He Was Killed.

Pretoria, Transvaal Colony, March 28.—About 1500 Boers, under Delarey, Liebenberg, Kemp and Wolmarans, were within the area of Lord Kitchener's latest move, but also surprised by the rapidity displayed by the British troops...

Five Canadians, who fell out of their column and tried to work their way back, were surrounded by a Boer force, and made a splendid defence. But finally, seeing their case was hopeless, four of the men surrendered.

The guns captured from Von Donop's convoy were brilliantly recaptured by the Scottish Horse, who charged up to the muzzle of the artillery, and rode the Boer gunners off their feet before the latter had a chance to fire.

ST. THOMAS, MARCH 28.—A fatal accident took place on the loop line of the Grand Trunk Railway at Jarvis about 7 o'clock this morning, resulting in the death of two engine-drivers and one conductor, and a great loss to the company.

The names of the dead are: John Charleton and James McGill, drivers, and Frederick McDonald, conductor, all of St. Thomas.

The westbound train, in charge of Engineer McGill and Conductor McDonald, went thru Jarvis, and was backing down a switch when the second freight, in charge of Engineer Charleton, crashed into it. There was a heavy fog at the time, and it is thought that Charleton did not see the other train about to go on the siding.

The remains of Charleton and McGill were brought here to-night, and conveyed to P. R. Williams' undertaking rooms, where an inquest will be held to-morrow.

Engineer John Charleton lived at 122 Inverness-street, Engineer James McGill on Scott-street and Conductor Frederick McDonald at 25 Catherine-street. McGill and McDonald are each survived by a widow and two children. Charleton leaves a widow and three children. All three men had been employed by the Wabash Company for upwards of ten years, and were well-known here.

DIED FROM GAS. Owen Sound, March 28.—John Linley, a farmer from near Maxwell, was found dead in bed at the Sefton House this morning. A strong odor of gas was in the room. An inquest will be held.

Dr. Webb's financial representative refused to purchase. Ottawa, March 28.—Mr. Arthur L. Meyer, financial representative of the New York Syndicate which is about to take over the Canada Atlantic Railway, arrived here to-day, and is going over the line to-morrow with his wife and daughter in a private car. He says a considerable amount of the purchase price has been paid, but the transfer of the road will not take place till June. The company will erect several tourist hotels in the Algonquin Park district, and, in time, will erect the new Central Station in Ottawa, towards which the city paid a bonus three years ago of \$50,000. The repair shops will remain in Ottawa, and be enlarged. Regarding the rumor that the name syndicate is after the Great Northern Line, Dr. Meyer was very guarded, and would neither deny nor affirm that the next Sunday trip would be the preliminary step to acquire an option on this line. The Great Northern at present is managed principally with American capital.






