REPORT AN ABSURDITY.

Danish Islands Corruption Story
Denied by Christmas Lawyer.

New York, March 28.—Cal Fischer-Hansen of this city, who was attorney for Walter Christmas, the representative of the Danish government, in the overture for the purchase of the Danish West Indian Islands in 1900, was indignant at the conduct of his client, shown in his secret report to the Danish Ministry lately published.

"Ordinarily legal etiquette," said he, "would prevent my speaking. But this report is so defamatory and outrageous that I feel justified in washing my hands of the whole affair."

Mr. Fischer-Hansen described the course of the Danish representative as it appeared to him.

Christmas undertook, according to Mr. Fischer-Hansen, to start the sale of the islands for the Danish Ministry. As far back as 1890 the sale had been almost consummated, but at the last moment this government had drawn back. Thus Denmark could not make overtures or do more than suggest that overtures would be acceptable. This Christmas did not conduct Secretary White of the American Embassy at London to Copenhagen.

"At that point," said Mr. Fischer-Hansen, "the services ended. The negotiations from there on were carried forward by the American Minister in Denmark and the Danish Minister at Washington."

The Danish Ministry, going out of existence in a few months, was succeeded by the Secretary of the Ministry, which Christmas made his secret report setting forth the alleged obligations he was under to various Americans.

"This report was evidently made," said the lawyer, "with the belief that it could never see the light. But its publication has shown its absurdity. I am quite sure Christmas never saw the men he mentioned, and I believe the report was made for the purpose of personal gain."

A NEW THEME FOR AN AT-HOME.

We have just met—four of us—Mrs. Koenig, we discussed the weather, and we were all agreed that the north wind was cold, that rain was wet, that ice was not hot, that snow was white, and someone concluded with the profound remark that there was weather everywhere.

I read that there was established in Toronto a factory where the food for the employees was cooked by electricity. I really went to see this novelty—food being cooked without a fire—but that was quite thrown in the shade by the factory itself, and I became so interested I remained over an hour.

"Ah, do tell us all about it," we asked.
"Well, I really could not give the subject justice; it wants to be seen to be appreciated, but I will do the best I can."
"I arrived at the factory about 11 in the morning and asked to see the manager. I was shown into his office immediately, and announced my errand—would he be so kind as to allow me to see the 'electric cooking'?"

With the greatest pleasure. And I was conducted upstairs to the kitchen—imagine my astonishment to see a marble table, six feet long, with ovens, kettles and other cooking utensils, each reaching, boiling or simmering at the end of a wire! And everything so neat and clean—not a vestige like the ordinary turmoil of a factory. One might expect in a kitchen to find a mess of dishes and few minutes sufficed to see all, including the pleasant dining-rooms on the same floor.

On expressing the pleasure I experienced, and the interest I took in cooking, my guide mentioned that they had some larger kettles or "pans" across in the works, and he would have pleasure in showing me these. I gladly assented, and in a few minutes we were standing in a long glass-roofed room, I came out to see one novelty, but here was something that put that in the shade entirely. The kettles, or "pans" as my guide called them, were monsters to be sure! How many gallons go in each of these?

"Well," said he, "we reckon by tons. Each will hold 60 tons." "Sixty tons!" I looked over the edge of one. A beautiful yellow mass of liquid was boiling and sending out little puffs of steam, and a pleasant odor pervaded the room. "And are these boiled by electricity?" I asked.
"Oh, no," said he, "at the bottom of each pan, which is 14 feet deep, there is a pipe filled, and perforations in the pipe admit live steam, and the steam goes out into the mass. At the present moment there is as much steam going into that one kettle as would generate 150 horse power. And it would take one-quarter of a ton of coal per hour to produce that quantity of steam for the one pan alone."
