

larey, Liebenberg, Kemp and Wolmarans, were within the area of Lord Kitchener's latest move, but altho surprised by the rapidity displayed by the British troops gaps in the latter's lines enabled most of the burghers to escape. The Boer prisoners totalled 179 men, including Commandant H. Kruger and ex-Landrost Neethling of Klerksdorp.

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From the first prisoners captured, it was learned that Gen. Delarey himself was outside the actual cordon, having slept some distance westward, but Liebenberg, Kempt and other Boer commanders were inside the column of troops.

The first body, consisting of about 500 Boars, sighted at 10 o'clock in the morning, March 24, retreated at full speed, making for a gap between the British columns. A race for the opening ensued.

British mounted infantry, which had already ridden upwards of 50 miles, pressed their tired horses until they gave out, when the men jumped off and raced forward on foot. Some of the mounted men, how-ever, were able to gallop right into the gap just ahead of the burghers,

These troops also succeeded in driving back another body of 300 Boers, who were forced to desert the guns they had captured from the Von Donop convoy in February. The Boers tried to get thru several openings, but on each occasion were forced to double back, until they ultimately found a gap and passed out of the British lines within sight of Klerksdorp. Five Canadians, who fell out of their column and tried to work their way back, were surrounded by a Boer force, and made a splendid defence. But finally, seeing their case was hopeless, four of the Canadians surren-dered. The fifth, however, indignantly refused to throw down his arms and continued a single-handed fight until he was killed. This was re-garded as one of the most interesting incidents of the day. An instance of the resourcefulness of the Boers was given by Lieben-berg and several hundred men. Taking advantage of the confusion of the drive, he and his followers assumed a formation similar to that of a British column, and, moving close to one of the numerous gaps in the Bri-tish lines, succeeded in reaching this opening before their ruse was de-tected, and got safely away. tected, and got safely away.

St. Thomas, March 28.-A fatal accident took place on the loop line of the Grand Trunk Railway at Jarvis about 7 o'clock this morning, resulting in the death of two engine-drivers and one conductor and great loss to the company. Both trains were Wabash, and the cause of the accident is attributed to the engineer of the train going east not following his orders to stop at Jarvis.

The names of the dead are; John Charleton and James McGill, drivers, and Frederick McDonald, conductor, all of St. Thomas.

The westbound train, in charge of Engineer McGill and Conductor McDonald, went thru Jarvis, and was backing down a switch when the second freight, in charge of Engineer Charleton, crashed into it. There was a heavy fog at the time, and it is thought that Charleton did not see the other train about to go on the siding.

The remains of Charleton and McGill were brought here to-night, and conveyed to P. R. Williams' undertaking rooms, where an inquest will be



The Street Railway management treat every attempt on the part of the Mayor and Council to secure a better ser-vice, with good-natured indifference, and it does not seem to make a particle of difference who is in the Mayor's chair. The same state of

particle of difference who is in the Mayor's chair. The same state of affairs continues. The public have a just grievance against the Street Railway Company. Complaints are heard on every side, yet, notwithstanding, the company simply laugh at the "puny" efforts of our representatives to bring them to time. And what is worse, there is not a single newspaper in the city, free enough from Street Railway in-fluence to take up the cause of the people and force it to an issue. If the Toronto press would make a concert-ed effort in this direction the company would soon come down. There is not a particle of use in expecting the Mayor or Council to compel the com-pany to live up, to fits agreement. They are bound hand and foot and dare not raise a finger. Our only hope lies in the influence of the press, and if the Toronto newspapers will take up this subject and conduct a cam-paign against the company, it is only a matter of a short time before they will realize that the people will not stand for this sort of treatment eny longer.
