ON VERGE OF COLLAPSE.

The condition of John Mitchell Executive Grave Appreciation.

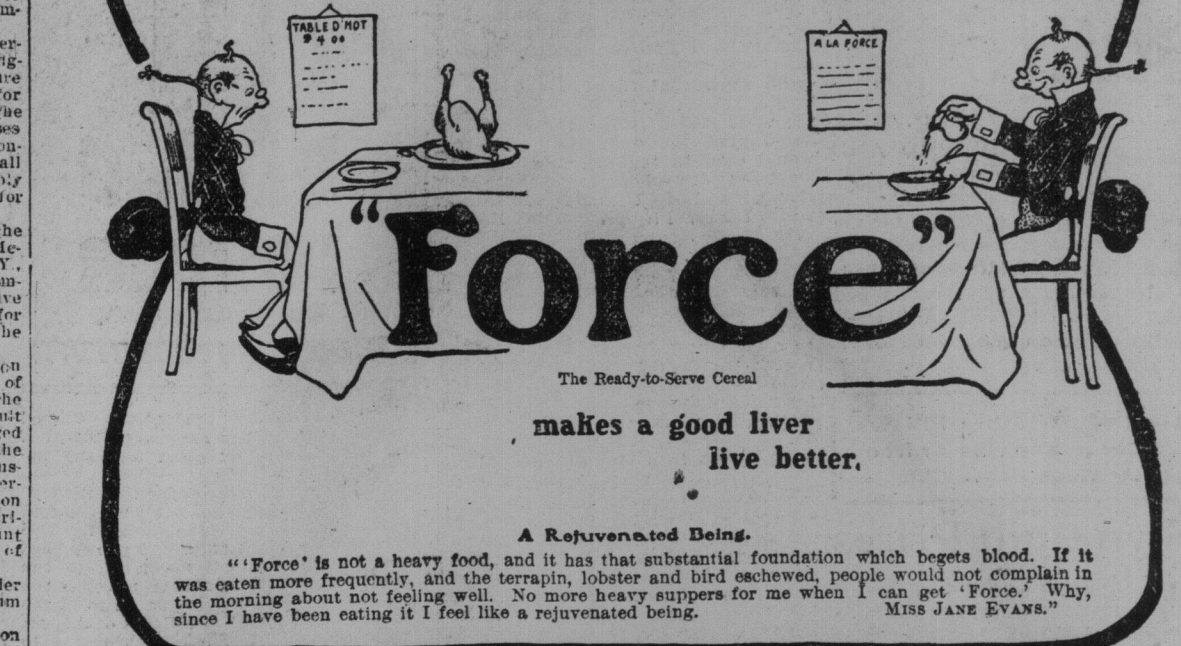
