### WITH POWER MONOPOLY Whitney Government Asked to Give up What it Has Rescued From Negro Who Placed Him Aboard Says

GLOBE URGES NEW DEAL

Electrical Development Co. - Power Company Out for Concessions That Would Make it Master at Niagara Falls.

This is the position of the Electrical Development Co., the syndicate which has just been refused the privilege of developing 125,000 horse power in addition to the 125,000 horse power which it was empowered to develop under its original franchise. The statement is based on the probable cost of production as estimated by Frank C. Perkins, engineer of the Municipal League of Buffalo. His figures apply to the Ontario Power Co., but this company does not produce at a less price than the Electrical Development Company. He estimates that the cost of production at Niagara Falls is only \$3.55 per horse power. But assuming the cost will be \$4 per horse power and that the company will sell at \$15 per horse power, the net profit per horse power will be \$11, or \$1.375,000 on the company's total output. The company's stock issue is \$6,000,000, and it is bonded for \$5,000,000,upon which capitalization a ten per cent. dividend would be \$1,110,000, leaving a balance for depreciation of plant, reserve, etc., of \$265,000.

Watered Stock It must be remembered also that the cash investment on the Electrical Development Company does not approach \$11,000,000. Those who bought the company's bonds were given large blocks of the stock free Probably five of the six millions of stock is water. If the company paid interest at the rate of ten per cent. on the actual cash investment, dividend obligations would amount to only \$600,000, leaving a surplus of \$775,000. In other words, the company could pay a dividend of 20 per cent on its actual cash investment and still carry forward a balance of

There is still another way of putting it. The company is developing 125,000 horse power on a capital (including watered stock) of \$11,000.000, or \$88 per horse power. The Globe is the chief organ of the Niagara Falls power interests. It has played their game consistently from the inception of their deals. It has beguiled the public into believing that its interests were protected in the terms of the franchises granted to Niagara Falls power companies when in reality there was no protection at all Its president, Mr. Robert Jaffray, is a member of the Niagara Falls Park Commission, which recommended the granting to the Electrical Development Company the privilege of developing an additional 125,000 horse power.

What little now remains in possession of the public at Niagara Falls The Globe is urging Premier Whitney to deliver over to monopoly. It says prompt action is required. Prompt action is the very thing that is not required from the standpoint of the public interest. The only prompt action that was called for was the cancellation of the order-incouncil which clinched monopoly's hold at Niagara Falls. This has been gone and now the interests of the public can be best conserved by waiting and watching developments.

Two Commissions to Report.

A commission appointed by the municipal union will shortly report regarding Niagara Falls power. Hon Adam Beck has announced that a government commission will be appointed to enquire into the same question. Pending these reports would it not be a criminal proceeding to do what The Globe is urging on the Whitney government-dispose of 125,000 horse power which represents the public's last asset in Niagara Falls power? The public wants no more bargaining with monopoly. It wants a full enquiry into conditions at Niagara Falls along the lines of revealing the cost of production and the possibility of further development of power either by independent companies, by the provincial government or by the union of municipalities. According to the nature of the companies' dealings with the public will largely depend the government's future attitude

The World has too much confidence in Mr. Whitney to believe that he will be stampeded into negotiation with the Electrical Development Company at the clarion cry of The Globe. There is no teal that the 125,000 horse power in question will be lost if it is not utilized forthwith. M. Pellatt removed all doubt on this point when he stated that if his company did not utilize the power it would be utilized by Yankee concerns. If Yankee companies can utilize it, there is no cause for alarm. The power is there to be converted into electric energy when the interests of the public demand it.

There was never a more barefaced attempt to rush the government into a foolish bargain than that which is now being made by company and its aiders and abettors The Globe. The World's advice to Mr. Whitney is not to ACT, but to WAIT.

## SON OF RICHARD CROKER

He Took Him by Request to "Hop Joint."

Kansas City, Mo., May 12.-Herbert V. Croker, a son of Richard Croker, was found dead on a south-bound Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe-Railroad train between Kansas City and Newton, Kansas, to-day. He had died during the night, evidently from the effects of some drug administered at Kansas City, where he boarded the train tast night for Bliss, Oklahoma. The first news of his death was re-The first news of his death was received in Kansas City to-day, when the local police were requested to hunt for a negro, who is said to have placed Croker on the train at Kansas City.

According to a telephone message from Newton, Croker was found dead in a car seat just befores the train reached Newton to-day.

According to stories of passengers and the conductors on the train upon which Croker died, the young New Yorker was placed on the train at Kansas City by a negro short-

Yorker was placed on the train at Kansas City by a negro shortly after 10 o'clock last night, Croker appeared to be under the influence of some drug. The negro was seen to hand him a sum of money and a railroad ticket just before the train started, when he jumped off and disappeared. At 5 o'clock this morning, when the conductor made another attempt to collect the fare, he found that the young man was dead. As far as can be learned, Croker arrived in Kansas City early on Thursday and spent the afternoon at the Elm Ridge race track. He is known to have been in the company of several patrons of the race track before he boarded the train for the south. The negro who put young Croker on The negro who put young Croker on the train last night was Charles Wood-son, a porter at the Coates Hotel. Woodson says that Croker had been drinking when he arrived at the hotel about 8 o'clock last night. After checking a small valise at the hotel, Croker, the negro says, asked him where there was a "hop joint." After repeated requests. Woodson says he agreed to accompany Croker to such a resort. Then they went together to a Chipmen are they went together to a Chinese re-sort between Wyandotte and Delaware-streets, where they remained an hour-Woodson says he then took Croker directly to the train at the Union Station. Croker's valise is still at the hotel. Woodson tells a straight-forward story, and the police do not think he was guilty of robbing Croker or otherwise abusing his confidence.

Trobably there are few with sufficiently well-balanced minds to think that praise of themselves can be other than interesting and important. But we were rather inclined to think of the Canadians as perhaps more than usually intelligent, as a people who might prefer to be told a few truths, even if they came home, to mere "buttering." We all know that south of the Canadian frontier nothing goes down like butter, but is it precisely the same north of that line? Surely the time has come to introduce something of a business element into talk about our imperial relations. Can we live-for ever on "Rule Britannia" and the colonial heroics of the South African war? Ought not the deeds now doing in the far east rather to hush out peans over South Africa? 

Certain irregularities ere disclosed, but they were comparavely petty in character and reflected ttle save a touch of carelessn he part of Mr. Jones and his staff. Vhile the board did not declare in so nany words that the enquiry would e dropped, a tacit agreement appeared o be reached to that effect, and its ractically assured that Judge Wincheser will not be called upon to probe maters any further. The views of the poard might be said to have been sum-ned up in the words of Controller

Absolutely No Evidence. There is absolutely no evidence of dishonest dealing," he declared, adding that certain irregularities had been incovered and that certain loose practices should be righted. To this the street commissioner assented, and the inquiry ended with feelings of apparent cordiality on both sides.

The mayor had prepared a statement harging that lumber had been sold without the city's consent, that it had been loaned to outside firms also without permission, that culls had been paid for at unduly high rates and that he system of measuring by tape instead of by the scale or board method neant an added cost to the city of from to 10 per cent. on lumber.

The proceedings brought out the fact that only about 500 feet of lumber had been sold in the way alleged, 40 feet having gone to a city official's number home on the Island and an almost similar quantity to the Aikenhead Hardware Company. In each case, bayment had been prompt. It was also ilicited that on Feb. 1, 1904, the Reid Company had borrowed 2363 feet of redar lumber, which had been returned in Aug. 24, and that Bryce & Co. had been accommodated with 4670 feet from hug. 22 to Sept. 11 of last year. The orce of this particular charge was a good deal lessened by the statement of teh city engineer that it was a comnon practice for the city to lend lumber to firms to expedite the carrying on of contract work. ract work. Culls WereReplaced.

The purchase of culls was gone nto with minute attention to letail, but in this matter at least he vindication of the management was lull and complete. The mayor, who was equipped with data furnished by William McCartney, chief accountant n Mr. Rust's office, gave several instances to indicate the proportion of ulled lumber included in the receipts. In one consignment from Reid & Co., of 16,517 feet, 880 feet had been culls, and in another of 19,070 feet the proportion was 256. John Jones, jr., was able to prove by reference to the accounts. that the matter of the culls and been adjusted with the supplying irms.

irms.

Most Serious Charge.

"We now come to the most serious charge," commented the mayor upon he reference to the system of measurement. The city engineer explained that measurement by tape had always been the procedure followed. It was brought out that the official measurer, Mr. Shome, did work by both systems, but that the price to be paid was letermined by the tape showing, which meant an outlay of from 5 to 10 per cent. over and above that with the scale measure as a basis. Mr. Jones' defence was that he was merely following the procedure inaugurated during Mr. Jennings' term as city engineer. To a question of Controller Ward's, as to the added cost to the city during the course of a year, the mayor referred to the 155,000 feet of 2 inch plank bought last year, and computed that the city was overcharged for 750 feet at \$18.75 per 1000.

Another allegation that lumber was being purchased in unnecessarily large amounts at tmes revealed the fact that in August last, when Mr. Jones was away, 58,000 feet of 4 inch planking had been delivered at the yards without any order having seemingly been given, both Mr. Rust and Assistant Street Commissioner Evans denying responsibility. The mayor fired his last shot, with the remark that he had heard that lumber of inferior quality had been consigned for repair work on the island bridge, and that it had been rejected by the foreman in charge. This was corroborated by the foreman before the board, but he further stated that the 10 mere complained of had been replaced by the contracting firm.

The conclusions drawn by Controller Spence were agreed to by the mayor, who declared that he had never at any time suggested any dishonesty in lumber deals. Most Serious Charge





Then Mr. Murphy took up the larger topic of municipal ownership, "of which," he said, "we shall hear a great deal in the coming election." Speaking in his individual capacity, and not as a representative of the Citizens Union, he said: "Nothing in municipal ownership per se justifies us in expecting the greatest things of it. In Europe, where municipalities have gone into almost every imaginable business nto almost every imaginable business and philanthropic enterprise, private concerns have been absorbed very, and philanthropic enterprise, private concerns have been absorbed very, very gradually, each being treated on its merits as the situation arose."

He then gave a highly instructive sketch of the municipalizing of concerns abroad. Liverpool, for instance, has gone into the milk business, Grenoble runs a restaurant for schoolchildren. Tunbridge has taken up sheep and vegetable raising, West Ham sells paving stones, Sheffield, as a by-product of its ownership of the water supply, has opened a plumbing shop, while Manchester, as a result of its system of public lighting, sells stoves and gas fittings. London, as an off-shoot of its park system, gives away plants to whoever wants them. Doncaster and Brighton maintain race-courses; Brighton, and Lisle, in France, have municipal theatres. A very large number of cities have gone into housing, libraries, sewers, cemeteries and tramways, while some operate their own telephones, pawnshops, cemetaries, bathhouses and golf links.






