ANNUAL MEETING.

The Eleventh Annual Meeting of this Society was held on the 12th and 13th April, in Old St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, in circumstances of much comfort and enjoyment. The weather, for the season of the year, was good. The central position of the city, and the facilities for travelling afforded by the different railways, contributed towards making the attendance unusually large.

The proceedings began at half-past ten on Tuesday morning, Mrs. Ewart, President of the Society, in the chair. The schoolroom was seated for six hundred, and was decorated with a profusion of bright flowers, maps, and national flags, a prominent feature on the walls being the motto of the Society, "The World for Christ," painted on blue silk, but long before noon it was filled to its utmost capacity, many being unable to obtain seats. For this reason it was thought better to meet afterwards in the church.

After the usual opening devotional exercises and the reading of minutes, Mrs. Parsons welcomed the visitors to the hearts and homes of the Toronto friends. To this address Mrs. McCrae, of Guelph, made a most fitting reply. The President then gave her annual address, which, along with the welcome, will be printed in the Annual Report. Letters of greeting, all of which were couched in kindly and interested terms, were read from Chater, Manitoba; St. Andrew's, Quebec; Indore Society, Quebec; St. Johns, Newfoundland; Eastern Division; the Union Missionary Society, New York, and the Presbyterian Boards of New York, Philadelphia, and the North-West, United States, and a telegram from Ottawa (Phil. i. 27, last clause).

1st. That the sum of \$12,090, required, by estimate, for the work of the Society, be handed to the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Committee, and \$500 retained for current expenses.

2nd. That the sum of \$2,000 of the surplus funds be handed to the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Committee, with the request that it be appropriated towards the completion of Rev. Hugh MacKay's boarding-school for Indian children, at Broadview, in addition to the sum of \$1,000 included in the estimates of the Foreign Mission Committee for the same purpose.

3rd. That the sum of \$3,500 of the surplus funds of the Society be reserved in the hands of the Treasurer, for the establishment of Miss Rodger's boarding school at Indore, and that the same be paid over to the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Committee whenever required for that purpose. Mrs. D. Cowan, Toronto, presented an address of sympathy and encouragement from The Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

Invitations were presented to hold the next annual meeting at Guelph and Peterborough, by Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Walker, Miss Roger and Mrs. McEwan. On motion of Mrs. Ball, seconded by Mrs. Drainie, it was unanimously decided to accept the invitation from Guelph. On motion of Mrs. Watson, seconded by Mrs. Cooper, it was agreed to reappoint the Nominating Committee, with the addition of Mrs. Thorburn, Ottawa, and Mrs. D. Ross, Kingston. A specimen map of Formosa was then shown, prepared by the method explained in the March leaflet, with the following notes: Formosa, an island ninety miles east of China (separated from it by Formosa Straits), 237 miles long, seventy wide, between twenty-one and twenty-five degrees north latitude. The capital, Tai-wan-foo, about the latitude of Havana in Cuba, fertile, all kinds of tropical products, large commerce, divided from north to south by a chain of mountains, some of which are extinct volcanoes, many of them covered with perpetual snow, first heard of in Europe in 1582, when a Spanish ship was wrecked on the coast; taken by the Chinese, 1683; opened to foreign commerce, 1858. The English and Germans are now exploring the island with the hope of forming settlements. The southern half of the island of Formosa is occupied by the English Presbyterian Church, who carry on a very successful mission there; the northern half by the Presbyterian Church in Canada, under the care of Dr. Mackay. The Chinese live on the Eastern side of the island, the Aborigines on the west.

The Indian Reserves of the North-West, under the care of the Church, were also pointed out on the Government map-six in Manitoba, four in Assiniboia, one in Saskatchewan, and one in

Alberta.

An address to Queen Victoria on the occasion of her Jubilee was read by Mrs. Harvie, at the close of which the whole audience rose and sang the National Anthem. Miss Gunther then favored the Society by singing "O Rest in the Lord."

So let us go to Him with large petitions. Let us in our prayers ask for the things we want as well as need. "May Prayer be the key of the morning as well as the bolt of the Evening." "Prayer is knowing work, believing work, thinking work, searching work, humbling work, and nothing worth, if heart and hand do not join in it."

Never shall we all meet again. So let us "Consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works." Let us celebrate the Jubilee of our Beloved and Honored Queen in this "Upper Room" by continuing with one accord in prayer and supplication.

This is the Church's need now, her hope, her privilege, her duty. This is within our power—united, continued prevailing prayer.

"The pierced hand is upon the flood gates of Heaven." "All power is given in Heaven and Earth to Him." May this meeting together at the Throne of Grace bring down a blessing greater than that of Pentecost. And may this Baptism of the Spirit make us all, at the close of this annual meeting, as different from our present state, as the Apostles were changed under the first Baptism of Power from what they were before the Ascension of Christ.

Again dear friends, let me assure you of a most *cordial* welcome to these anniversary services, to our homes and to our hearts.

It is with a feeling of very deep thankfulness to our Heavenly Father that I rise to address you, for our God has very greatly prospered the work of this W. F. M. Society during these last twelve months. As report after report, of the most cheering character, has come in from our Presbyterial societies and our auxiliaries, now numbering 251 with 74 mission bands, each and all, with scarcely an exception, breathing a tone of so much deeper interest and far more unselfish devotion to the service of the Master, and sending us the large sum of \$18,581, I am led to ask myself: How was it that we Canadian women and professed disciples of that loving Master, who gave his life for us, had so long neglected His last command—to disciple all nations—and so missed this rich blessing now so evidently felt by so many of our members. We certainly had no new command from Him on the matter, and we as certainly had no new promises given us to stimulate us to be up and doing. Then, how was it? I cannot tell. We can but throw ourselves on our Lord's mercy and forbearance, and, confessing our unfaithfulness, strive to redeem the time now given to us by more active and prayerful work in the future. The history of these eleven years since, at the solicitation of the F. M. Committee of our Church, a few of us undertook to work as a W. F. M. Society, has been one of steady advance, not only in membership and contributions, but in a most blessed consecration of time and means and influence to assist in sending the

knowledge of a Saviour's love to the uttermost parts of the earth. And the results are such that we are surprised at our prosperity, so unexpected, when we know how comparatively few of the women of our Church are engaged in it, and how very little of individual effort or self-denial is exercised by even these few. Looking at these facts we can but exclaim: What are we, O God, that Thou art thus so gracious to us and, notwithstanding our neglect, hast made these feeble efforts of ours to bring forth so much? Surely, dear friends, it well becomes us to-day to render humble but hearty thanks to our God and Saviour for all his tender mercies and loving kindnesses bestowed on us, and to pledge ourselves that henceforth, by His grace strengthening us, we shall walk more undeviatingly in the path He would have us to go. I am sure this desire is in the hearts of all who hear me: That having tasted of the rich blessing that comes on all those who are praying-not in a half-hearted way-but earnestly, "Thy kingdom come" and who are trying to do something to hasten on the coming of that kingdom. Having also realized something of what it means to be co-workers with Christ our Lord, and the high honor and privilege conferred upon us when He says, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto me." We can no longer be found among those who are cold or indifferent about the heathen, or who make as an excuse for their indifference that we have the heathen all around us, and should attend to those at home first. No, dear friends, we know "these things we ought to do, and not leave the other undone." And we also know, that while much has been and is being done for those at home, there has been a fearful and soul-imperilling neglect of those abroad, and the result has been a great increase of heathenism. Do we at all realize that in heathen lands at this moment there are 200,000,000 more than there were at the beginning of this century, that Mahomedanism and Heathenism is increasing seventy times faster than Christianity? How utterly inadequate the work of all the missionary societies put together seems, when these numbers are taken into account. These societies claim only 2,800,000 converts to Christianity, including their families and dependants, and these are scattered over all parts of the globe. And is it any wonder the number is so small when you think of the very few men and women and the comparatively paltry sums devoted to Foreign Missions? Great Britain, whose annual income is said to be \$5,000,000,000, gave last year \$7,500,000 for Foreign Missions. One-fifth of the wealth of this continent is said to be in the hands of Christians, and they gave \$5,500,000 which was equal to 1-16 of a cent on the dollar. Had they given one cent on the dollar it would have amounted to \$87,000,000, and in the same year in both countries hundreds of millions were spent on amusements and stimulants alone. These statistics are appalling, and such as it is impossible to realize, but they are true. Notwithstanding, dear friends, let us not lose heart, "The kingdoms of this world shall yet be the kingdom of our Lord and His Christ." Let us then take courage and devoutly thank God for the present vital interest in Foreign Mission work that is

spreading with such intensity among the students in the universities and colleges in Great Britain and the United States, and, thank God, in our own loved Canada also. No, dear friends, we can no longer take this work in a half-hearted manner, as we have hitherto done. These young men and women must not be hindered from going to the ends of the earth with the glorious Gospel in their hands for lack of means. Woe be to us Presbyterians of Canada, to whom God has given so much, if we be found among the number of those who "hinder the work." The failure to provide for these can only arise from lack of faith on the part of Christ's followers. His promises are rich and abundant. The silver and the gold are His, and He will give "good measure, pressed down and running over," to those who give for His service, and also "make all grace to abound towards us, that we, having sufficiency in all things, may abound in every good work." Why are we so backward in taking God at His word? It is not that we can for one moment doubt His ability and power to make it come to pass. You who have trusted Him in any difficulty know how sweet and sustaining is that trust. Then let the motto of our society, "The world for Christ," be more constantly before our eyes and deep down in our hearts, and let all our energies be enlisted to help on to that blessed consummation, and, while pressing on our part of the work for the "women and children," let us not forget to stir up our fathers and brothers, our husbands and sons, to pour into the Lord's treasury, so that there may be enough.

The Secretaries' reports will, I know, rejoice your hearts and fill them with thanksgiving. The Treasurer's statement, too, will add to your rejoicing. But let us rejoice with trembling, for to whom God has given much from them will He justly require much, and we as yet come very far short of what we might do and be. Let us remember too that if love to Christ be not the motive actuating us in all we do instead of a blessing may come wasting and mildew. I am exceeding glad to see so many delegates present from our branches. Mrs. Parsons has already given you a cordial welcome, in our names, and it is now my pleasing duty to welcome those friends who are with us from sister societies. We shall hope to be stirred up to a more vigorous prosecution of our work by their kindly Christian greetings, and trust that they, too, while imparting good cheer to us, may themselves be cheered and invigorated to press on with their own work. If increasing zeal and consecration to the service of the Master be the result of our meeting together, then may we join in saying, Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things, and blessed be His glorious name forever, and let the whole earth be filled with His glory.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

During the few weeks which have just passed, unusual activity has prevailed among the branches of our Society throughout the Western Division of the Church, because it has been a time of anxiety alike for officers and members. Doubtless, watchful oversight has been maintained all the year, otherwise the result would have been very different, but just at this time most careful scrutiny has been exercised, as here and there, from many different points, the returns have come in to the various centres. And now, to-day, while the grand total is being made up, we have gathered ourselves together to lay it before the Lord, and like the disciples of old, "tell Him what we have done and what we have taught," for we too, in our lives and by our work, have been teaching. Ere we speak of the work, let us pause for a moment to dwell with loving remembrance on the memory of friends who were wont to rejoice with us upon occasions like this. We recall how frequently they joined in noting with earnest attention each return as it came in to swell the year's gathering. In thinking of their patient loyalty, and the true pleasure it afforded them, we can rejoice that now they have been called to higher service and far deeper joy, and that the pure sweet influence of such lives remains among us.

We are startled, on looking back at the eleven years of our history, to find that so large a number (especially during the past two or three years) have been called home, and are thus led again to reflect how soon this work must pass into other hands. Each one of you can recall to-day some interested friend, some member of an Auxiliary or Band, some officer, who has been called away during the past year. In this connection several names might be mentioned. will all supply them. We name one-Mrs. King-our late esteemed Treasurer, of whose endearing personal qualities and cheerful devotion to duty you had some knowledge, and whose stimulating example you will not soon forget. There are others we would do well to remember to-day-that large number, who, for various reasons, seldom or never can attend even the ordinary meetings of the Society, through its bands and branches. Their way may be hedged about by the restraints of God's Providence, bodily weakness, pressing home duties, straitened means, or other difficulties known to themselves and of sufficient importance to justify them in remaining away. Shall we not think of them for our profit and learn from them that patience which purifies? It may be that those who thus "stand and wait" are doing the work, that their deep interest

is helping it forward in many ways, that through their prayerful remembrance of us, we have been made strong and able to do what has been required, and thus it has become true in our case also, "That the whole round world is bound with golden chains about the feet of God." You have heard from every Presbytery, and from the Board of Management, through its officers, a careful account of what has been done during the twelve months which have passed since we met at London, you have been told how the work has opened up and extended at home, and how, from the various mission stations at near and more distant places, cheering news has been echoed again and again. Apart from these eloquent facts, and the still more eloquent statement of the Treasurer, there remains very little to tell.

You can readily understand that there have been many long and interesting meetings held by the Board, that our correspondence has been full, often very full and varied in character, that the deliberations of the Executive Committee have been even more frequent than those of the General Board, with knotty points to discuss and questions of expediency to settle, and that to-day, when we meet so many able advisors, see your enthusiasm and look on your interested faces, it would appear that we have come to a haven of quiet rest, where we can lay aside responsibility and enjoy ourselves.

In attempting to present the prominent features of the work as concisely as possible, we may observe that in the foreign field the outlook is wider, a greater variety of work in progress, new and highly qualified teachers sent forth, fresh districts occupied, several useful schools established nearer home, and the prospect of others of a more practical and technical character being opened.

And how about the Home Work, the mainspring of our life as a Society. From your personal knowledge you can all readily endorse the statement that the women of the Church have very generally grasped the idea of the Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee in the matter of order and arrangement. They aim at forming in every congregation a Mission Band or Auxiliary, or both, that shall reach out to the Presbyterial Centre, which sustains and supports the General Board and endeavors to extend the work in its immediate

It is with feelings of no ordinary pleasure and gratification we are able to state that, in carrying out these plans in detail, the ladies have shown unity of sentiment, harmony of action, and unswerving

If further testimony to the efficiency of this organization were necessary, it may be found in the statements which have been made respecting the readiness and zeal with which you rallied this year again to the help of the North-West Indians-you were of one mind in this matter, from Lake Huron to the Ottawa, in distant Manitoba and even far down to the Gulf and by the Sea.

To those who remember the time, not so far distant, when, in order to complete the sum required by the Foreign Mission Committee for the year, it was necessary to take up a collection among ourselves at the annual meeting—to those and to all—this result is eminently satisfactory, and calls forth anew songs of praise to the Great Disposer who has their watchful care of the small sums in this department also.

Our offering this Jubilee year is as usual not made up of large givings, but, with a few exceptions, of the careful savings of the comparatively poor, of systematic giving by people of moderate means but "willing mind." It is the direct fruit of "stability in our opinions as in our work."

As we now pass to another period of our history, to new hopes, new purposes and new memories, let us consider, not what has been accomplished, which, although fitted to encourage, is but a drop in the ocean, but rather the great work that remains to be done, being its distance in the work of the Lord. If the gain of well-doing is in "the developed character of the well-doer," if the Master pronounces that servant blessed "whom his Lord, when He cometh, shall find so doing," surely we who are so highly privileged ought to be able to think better, to act better, and to the success of individual effort in any department of work, surely it is also worth while for us in this important undertaking to cultivate these virtues.

Our Master confers great honor upon us in permitting us to engage in this special service, let us beware of doing anything that might hinder all the wholesome influence which work of this kind is fitted to exert upon us. Such service, done with pure and faithful hearts, will bring a foretaste of the "new heaven and the new earth." It will cause God's light to shine upon us more clearly, and where "His light shines, there is wisdom and safety."

FOREIGN SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Ten years ago, on the 17th of April, we gathered as a Society, in Knox church, Toronto, to celebrate our first anniver-Truly, that was the day of small things, but some of us will remember how interesting were the proceedings, how encouraging the reports, and that a deep under-current of missionary zeal and enthusiasm pervaded the hearts of all present. Eighteen Auxiliaries and three Mission Bands were reported, with the sum of \$1,107.99 in the treasury. This amount we appropriated, with thankful hearts, to the support of Miss Rodger and Miss Fairweather, then laboring at Futtehgurh, India.

To-day we neet to commemorate our eleventh anniversary. The little one has not yet become a thousand, but the growth has been steady, and within a recent period even rapid. For this we praise God. His rich blessing has rested upon us and upon our work, therefore have we been prospered. "Then answered I them, and said unto them, the God of heaven, He will prosper us, therefore we, His

servants, will arise and build."

The review of work at our decennial annual meeting was particuarly encouraging, and we descended the Mount of Privilege, at London, prepared, in the name and strength of the God of missions, for a more enlarged and exalted service. Jehovah-nissi has been the watchword on many lips and in many hearts, during this the first year of our second decade, and so we have enlarged our borders, and increased our contributions, until, from the partial support of two missionaries, with which, as a Society, we commenced work, we can now, (see resumé of foreign work as presented in report of Recording Secretary,) with a good balance in the treasury, meet all the claims upon us this year, for woman's work in the various foreign mission fields of our Church.

Dr. Mackay has been absent from Tamsui many weeks at a time during the year, superintending the building of the new chapels, and in his absence Mrs. Mackay has remained at home, meeting with, counselling and advising the converts, assisting the students, attending the sick and sorrowful, and in every possible way watching over and furthering the interests of the mission. But, Mrs. Mackay shall speak for herself. "Let me tell you," she says, "something about my work from day to day. Between our house and kitchen the Dr. has built a place for Chinese in fine weather, to sit; it is simply four posts with a pointed grass roof and no walls. Now, I go between the house and kitchen so many times a day I can't count. Converts come, old and young, men and women, rich and poor, keep pouring in, coming and going. Some will stay a whole day, others a little while. Preachers call, their wives follow, students sit and talk, and why all this? I could not tell you in a month. One is in trouble, one has a letter for the Dr. about the mission, one has been persecuted, one wants medicine from the store-room beside the Dr.'s study, one is sick, one is sorrowful, one wants a tooth taken out, one wants a hymn-book, and one and all would like to see the Dr. I have to speak to all, but can't attend to all. Our place is never, never a day, without from one to twenty coming * * I never knew one to get angry at what I might say, so you see I am busy, busy, * I never knew busy, and happy, happy, happy, every day. You see, therefore, that I meet with so many without going into the country. Still I do go. Not long ago I visited every chapel on the west side. Being a native, the women gather all around me. All those who come wonder much at little Georgie. He sings without stopping. He helps, for many hear him and go home ashamed. We could not get the girls' school opened yet, when we do Mrs. Jameson will be with us. If any one in dear-Canada, dear Canada, asks for me, say she is well, busy, and will

From Mrs. Jameson we learn that Mrs. Mackay is cheerful, patient and sympathetic, that she reads character with quickness and correctness, is courageous, devoted to the Church, and a real help to Dr. Mackay and the entire mission staff.

In writing of the girls' school and the training of the students in Oxford College, Mrs. Jameson says:—"In the hot summer days I used some times to go over and see Mrs. Mackay teaching. would tell me that some of the girls learned quickly, but some needed so much patience. The students used to gather around her like bees, nothing new or of interest to be seen or heard, but Mrs. Mackay must be there. Of the native preachers and their work, Mrs. Jameson speaks in the highest terms. They are polite, prepossessing in appearance and manner, close students, possessing a vast amount of knowledge on general subjects, as well as of Bible truth, are practised debaters

and good preachers.

We are glad to gather from Mrs. Mackay's letter that the girls' school will be re-opened ere long, and that then Mrs. Jameson will have become sufficiently proficient in the language to utilize her knowledge and past experience in teaching, in giving instruction to the children in this institution, under the direction of Dr. Mackay.

II.—Our Mission to the Indians of the North-West.

The interest which has been awakened in the minds of the members of our Society in this field, since the rebellion, has deepened rather than lessened during the year. This, we believe, is mainly due to the earnest words of Rev. Hugh Mackay. His description of the terrible condition of the poor Indian, ignorant, degraded, often cold and hungry, and, worse than all, dying miserably without God and therefore without hope, thrilled our hearts to their very depths. And as we heard of their frantic appeals to their medicine men, their sun dances, their worship of the wind, the lightning, the thunder, and their longing after the true God, we were strongly moved and felt that we ought not to rest until we had done what we could to bring these souls to Jesus.

Our Church has now under its care 17 Indian reserves, including the 4 reserves under Rev. Hugh Mackay, and the 2 under Chief Mus-cow-pe-tung and Chief Pasquah, belonging to Piapot's group (on which work has not yet been commenced), and the Sioux Band at Portage la Prairie. These reserves contain a population of about 3,200 souls, about 200 being communicants of our Church. The entire Indian population of Manitoba and the North-West Territories is about 32,000 so that, as a church, we have only reached one-tenth of the Indian population of this part of our Dominion. This ought not to be, and it can only be changed by each individual member of the Church of Christ doing his or her duty in this respect.

We are thankful to state that the work is progressing, each year new reserves are taken up and new schools opened, and the older reserves are beginning to give evidence of both the temporal and spiritual good resulting to the Indian from the faithful labors of our missionaries in past years. In proof of this we mention, with considerable satisfaction, that many of the Indian men and women taking prizes at the agricultural exhibitions last season belonged to the reserves where our missionaries labor; and when our boxes of

1. Mis-ta-wa-sis's Reserve.

This reserve is situated on the North Saskatchewan river, about twenty miles from Fort Carlton, and forty from Prince Albert. Mission work was commenced on this reserve about eight years ago, by Rev. John Mackay, the present missionary, who was associated with Rev. Jas. Nesbit in the early days. The number of Indians in the band is about 207, 47 men, 67 women, 48 girls under fourteen years of age, and 45 boys under fourteen. Chief Mis-ta-wa-sis is greatly interested in the spiritual as well as the material prosperity of the band. They have no church, but the Chief is now busily engaged in getting materials on the ground for one. Mr. Mackay writes :- "I am getting the men to do work for the clothing given them. They are helping to get on the ground the wood for building a new church, and are willing to accept some of the clothing in payment, which is a benefit to the mission. The Sunday school is in charge of Mrs. Mackay and her two daughters. There are 42 communicants on the roll.

Miss Christie B. Mackay has charge of one day school on this reserve. The government inspector has expressed himself as highly pleased with the progress the children are making. The little girls are taught to knit and make patchwork, and they are teaching the older ones at home. Miss Mackay mentions a pretty little incident which occurred some time ago in school. A bright little lad named Joseph came to her in tears over his lessons. Miss Mackay said to him, "don't cry, Joseph; don't you know you may be a minister when you grow to be a man." He laughed, dried his tears, and ran back to his seat, and in a few hours came up and repeated the lesson, which was a child's evening prayer, every word. At night he went home and told his mother, who is a Christian Indian woman, and dying of consumption, that he was going to be a minister. She said she hoped God would spare her son to preach

The clothing, 1385 pounds weight, arrived safely, and is just what was required. When Mr. Mackay wrote, Mrs. Mackay had just finished fixing up the children and was then giving out the garments to the old women. One old woman, nearly seventy years of age, was so pleased, that she commenced to dance with joy, and said she would go to school three days and learn to read. The books and Sunday school papers are invaluable in the school.

2. Riding Mountain Reserve. (Okanase.)

Okanase is in Manitoba, near Riding Mountain. The nearest station is Strathclair on the Manitoba and North Western Railway. The band in this reserve numbers 235; men 74, women 82, children under seven years 25, over seven and under fifteen 54, and has been under the care of our missionary, Rev. Geo. Flett, about eleven When Mr. Flett was appointed these Indians were pagans and uncivilized, now they are a Christian community, and comparatively prosperous and comfortable. We have here a very successful school, at present under the care of Mr. J. Lauder. The attendance is encouraging, the average being nineteen. Mrs. Flett has greatly assisted Mr. Flett in all his labors among this people, working for their spiritual benefit with untiring energy and devotion.

3. Rolling River Reserve.

4. Rossburn (the Gamblers') Reserve.

In the autumn of 1885 Mr. Flett was placed in charge of the above new reserve. Rolling River is about 18 miles south-east of Okanase, and Rossburn 30 miles west. The band at Rolling River numbers 121, at Rossburn 177. These Indians are all pagan, and mission work among them is both difficult and discouraging. Schools have not been opened yet, and but little more than a beginning has been made. Mr. Flett, however, is very hopeful and has distributed some of the clothing sent this season, as well as last, among them.

The clothing and books, about 800 pounds, were received in good condition. The books came at a very opportune time, just when they were opening the Sunday school. "The clothing," Mr. Flett says, "could not have been better assorted, and has given my poor Indian children much joy and comfort. I know you must have a great deal of work about it, but it is a good work, and I trust will

show some fruit in the near future."

Mr. Flett, in a very able and comprehensive letter on the subject of the training of Indian children, strongly recommends the establishment of Industrial or Boarding schools on all the reserves. He states that in all Indian mission school work, much of the benefit which should be derived is lost, by the frequent and protracted absence of entire families with their children from the reserve. In his opinion the children should not be taken out on these long hunting expeditions, but should remain in the boarding school under training. Again, in some districts the families are scattered, and the excuse is that the children cannot walk to the school on account of the distance. It would pay, he says, to put up on every reserve a good-sized log house or two and give to all children willing to come to school food and clothing as well as instruction. Mr. Flett's long experience—nearly seventy years now—with Indian life, habits and customs, adds weight to his suggestions.

5.-Bird-Tail Reserve.

This reserve is situated at the junction of the Assiniboine River, and the Bird-Tail Creek, a few miles south of Fort Ellice, and is about 45 miles from Okanase. The band consists of Sioux refugees from Dakota, under Chief Enoch, and numbers about 140, men 36, women 42, boys under fifteen 21, girls under fifteen 24, babies 17. Rev. Solomon Tunkansuiciye, the missionary, has been laboring on this reserve now nearly nine years. The Christian Indians are comparatively comfortable, and a few of them contribute to the schemes of the Church, but many of those who have not yet embraced Christianity, are very degraded and often in great distress, especially in the winter season.

Our school is under the charge of Mr. J. Burgess, a most efficient teacher. Last year this school was reported as the third best in the agency, and Mr. Burgess received a prize of \$60 from the Indian Department. The clothing, 1,100 pounds, and books were gladly received and greatly appreciated. Mr. Burgess says:—"The wool was very soon made up into socks and mitts," and that, "needles, thimbles, thread and blankets are most acceptable." Many of the houses have only one room and in these rooms sometimes three or four families reside, each member having his or her particular spot where they sit or lie down at night. Their only covering is a blanket, and very often the old people, with threadbare blankets, lying on the cold frozen ground, suffer severely.

A most interesting letter containing thanks for the clothing has been sent to the Society by Peter Caske (Chaska) Hunter, a young Indian. He says:—"We all glad to get cloth, ech one of them, and we thank ever so much obliged to you. I think you are very kind to poor people. I hope you get good time all the time in your life. I shake your hand of my heart." Peter Hunter is a young man of twenty-two, he teaches a Bible class of young men and is a "straightforward, honest, humble fellow." He wishes to be a minister, and so anxious was he to go to a training school that he sold an ox to defray his expenses. Since his return from school, where he had learned to be carpenter and blacksmith, he has lined and ceiled the new church and made a bell tower for it. He writes very well and sensibly, and affords a good example of the importance and value of a boarding or industrial school training.

6. Round and Crooked Lakes. (4 Reserves.)

Between the Qu'Appelle River and the Canada Pacific Railway, bout 20 miles from Broadview, and 104 west from Okanase are our reserves lying together. They contain a population of about Mindians. Rev. Hugh Mackay is located here and has built a comfortable mission house on the banks of the Qu'Appelle River of Round Lake.

is a kind of boarding school, in which the children receive food and clothes, as well as instruction. This year the average attendance has been 33, and some of the number, Mr. Mackay says, have given their hearts to the Lord Jesus. During the visit, of Mr. Mackay to Ontario last season, the members of our Board had the pleasure of meeting with him. In reply to questions asked as to the needs of the work, he stated that the greatest want was "a house into which he could gather more children." He also spoke of the terrible condition of these poor people, especially in times of sickness, without nurse, physician, or medicine and often without the commonest necessities. In view of these statements, and understanding that the Foreign Mission Committee had authorized the erecting of a school building at Crooked Lakes, and also the appointment of assistant teachers and helpers, it was decided to request the Foreign Mission Committee to appropriate from the funds of the Society the sum of \$1,000 for school building, and the salaries of Mr. and Mrs. Jones, assistant teachers, also the salaries of two native helpers. With reference to this appropriation, Mr. Mackay says :- "In reply to your letter of the 28th Nov. I do not know what to say. I might have gathered from your other letter that the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society were to help us in our building next summer, but when I read that you had appropriated \$1,000 for this purpose, both Mr. Jones and myself felt as Mrs. Jones, who immediately went to her room, (perhaps she shall not know when I tell it) and had a good cry." In speaking of these helpers Mr. Mackay says :- "Mr. Jones has taken charge of the school and the Sabbath services in my absence. Mrs. Jones has been as a Christian mother to the large family placed under her care. I wish to thank the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, for the great assistance they have given the school at Round Lake, in the appointment of Mr. and Mrs. Jones."

We have forwarded this year to Mr. Mackay, through several of our Presbyterial Societies and Auxiliaries, about 2,350 pounds of clothing, and 3,500 pounds, or about \$1,200 worth, of bedding and household soft furnishings, all new, for the school building, now in process of erection. This noble gift arrived safely and, - but we will let Mr. Mackay give thanks in his own words: "Your letter of the 13th Nov. I have received, also the goods of which it speaks. I can't tell you how much the hearts of the missionaries at Round Lake have been cheered. I feel proud of belonging to a Church of which the ladies of your Society form a part. Col. McDonald, our Indian agent, who has visited us, said, "You astonish me when you tell me that a few ladies of your Church have accomplished such a work." Here are a few who have been awake this past autumn and look at the result. The hours spent in labor, the meetings held, the willing hearts and hands employed, the prayers offered and the care and anxiety of those leading the work, all of which comes up as a sweet sacrifice to God. Tell it where you will, for wherever it is told it shall bring honor to our Church and glory to our Master."

7. Cote's Reserve.

This reserve is situated on the Assiniboine River, near Fort Pelly, about 116 miles north-west of Okanase. There are about 267 Indians on this reserve. There is no ordained missionary, but Mr. C. G. Mackay, who was in charge of our school, acted as catechist, holding most successful services in the houses of the Indians. For more than a year the health of Mr. Mackay has been failing, and last autumn he was obliged to leave his work and remove to Kildonan, where his friends resided. He continued to fail during the winter and on the 28th Feb., suddenly at last, he fell asleep in Jesus and was laid to rest in Kildonan cemetery. This Servant of God sleeps, but we "Sorrow not, even as others which have no hope. For, if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him." Mr. Mackay was only thirty-three years of age and leaves a widow and little son. He was greatly beloved by the Indians, who had, previous to his illness, shown their appreciation of his work by asking to have him ordained

We sympathize deeply with Mrs. Mackay and pray, that as the waves and billows of affliction pass over her, she may be comforted and sustained by the presence of the "Man of sorrows" our blessed

About 1,900 pounds of clothing were sent, and, as we have not heard to the contrary, presume that they were received safely. Information will doubtless reach us shortly from Chief Joseph Coté, to whom we have written on the subject.)

8.—Assiniboine Reserve.

This reserve is in Assiniboia, about ten miles south of Indian Head. The Indians are of the Assiniboine tribe, about 270 in all, under Chief Jack. This reserve was visited by the Convener of the Foreign Mission Committee and Rev. Geo. Flett, and selected as a suitable field for missionary operations. In Dec., 1885, a school was pened, Mr. James Scott acting as teacher and missionary. These Indians are all pagans, and are not anxious as yet to have their chiliren attend school, consequently there is not a large attendance, bough there are about 40 on the roll. Mr. Scott describes the condition of the women of this reserve as very low indeed. "They re, truly speaking," he says, "but the property of the Indian, who may have as many as he can buy from father or brother." 9. Piapot's Reserve.

This important reserve is situated in the Qu'Appelle valley, about 30 miles north-east of Regina. It forms one of a group of three, the other two being under Chiefs Mus-cow-pe-tung and Chief Pasquah. Chief Piapot's is the largest, and contains about 400 souls.

When visited by the Convener and Mr. Flett in 1885, the Chief gave his consent to the opening of a school on the reserve in connection with our Church. Miss Rose, of Woodstock, was appointed teacher, and the Government agreed to assist in the erection of a building. There were some unavoidable delays, but in July last the school was successfully opened, our Society assuming its support. Miss Rose speaks very gratefully of the kindness of Rev. A. Urquhart and other friends in Regina, and Rev. Jas. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions, in assisting her, not only with advice and counsel, but in a practical way. Immediately after her settlement, Miss Rose writes, "My people are full of suspicions and prejudices about the school. They have much confidence in Mr. Flett and tell me to ask him here and see if he thinks books are good for children." Again she says, "The work is truly appalling, but I feel strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. He set me here and I feel sure that he will not forsake me in this unbroken heathen field."

2,500 pounds of clothing and a barrel of books, besides a large quantity of furniture, bedding and other soft furnishings were sent to Miss Rose for this field. "My poor people," she says, "go very bare of clothes and are very brown and dirty; the old women are very thankful for the garments, and sending them is a good good work." Also, "the books," she writes, "were a good investment." The pictures were put up in the school-room and many an old Indian man and woman spend hours in looking at them with wonder and admiration.

In speaking of the magnitude of the work and her varied and numerous duties, Miss Rose says, "I would need a private secretary. I have at this moment lying beside me unanswered thirty letters, all wishing for missionary news, and I love to write but can only do so much. So, my dear ladies, you will pardon me if I fail in detail." It is doubtless very delightful and inspiring for individual Societies to receive letters directly from the missionaries in the field, but it is almost needless for us to say, that our sisters will, in reality, be advancing the work they have so much at heart by denying them selves in this respect and patiently waiting to hear through the Board.

11. Pasquah's Reserve.

These reserves are contiguous to Piapot's. Rev. A. Urquhart, of Regina, was recently appointed by the Foreign Mission Committee as missionary to these reserves. About 500 Indians are settled here. Mr. Urquhart is deeply interested in the Indian Mission work in the North-West, but after prayerfully considering the appointment was led to decline it, on account of the difficulties in the way of severing his connection with his congregation at Regina, who were most desirous of retaining him as their pastor. Having given much thought to the material as well as the spiritual progress of the Indian, and especially to the education of the children, Mr. Urquhart advocates with Mr. Mackay, Mr. Flett and others, the establishment of boarding schools. There should be, he says, on every reserve a building capable of holding from fifty to one hun-The boys should be taught the rudiments of an English education, also farm work, and the girls domestic duties,

A good contribution of clothing from a congregation in Province of Quebec, was sent to Mr. Urquhart for the new field. Some of the socks and mitts having been knitted by a lady ninety seven years of age. This, in the meantime, has been sent to Miss Rose.

The Industrial School, which is to be established at

Long Lake

by government, under the direction of our Church, will probably be in operation not later than next autumn. It is expected that about \$30,000 will be expended in buildings and equipments, and \$1,400 anmally for maintenance. Mr. Urguhart suggests that these boarding schools might be feeders to this institution, where the older boys build be taught agriculture, and trades of various kinds.

12. Stony Plains Reserve.

This reserve is situated in the north-west corner of the Terriory of Alberta, near Edmonton, The band numbers 171, under hief Enoch le Potac. In December, 1885, our school was opened, nd has been most successful, under the care of Mr. M. Anderson, Irs. Anderson assisting in the instruction of the little girls. About M pounds of clothing were sent to Rev. A. B. Baird, Edmonton, with the use of the Indians on this reserve.

13. File Hills Reserve.

This reserve is situated about thirty miles north-east of Fort Total number on the reserve 393—160 men, 170 omen, and 63 children under 14 years of age.

The Indians are They were strongly opposed to a pagans, and very degraded. school, but by kindness Mr. Toms induced a few to come, and in the end succeeded in rallying around him quite a number of children Mr. Toms labors under great disadvantages. His wife and family were unable, on account of sickness, to go to him during the winter. He lives in an attic over the schoolroom, and with his own hands does the work of the household, often cooking and giving the children their meals.

640 pounds of good and useful clothing were sent to Mr. Toms, and his heart was much cheered and encouraged by the kindness of

the members of this Society.

14. Sioux Indians (Portage la Prairie).

Some time ago the ladies of Knox church, Portage la Prairie, formed themselves into a "Woman's Sioux Missionary Society." They felt that God had a work for them to do among the Sioux Indians in their own vicinity, and in pursuance of this thought proceeded to open a school for the children of the band. During the year this Society has been incorporated with ours, and as a suitable building was available, the school has been equipped as a boarding school, under the care of Miss Wight, of Kirkwall, Hamilton Presbytery, who entered upon her duties in January last.

Miss Wight writes that only six children have as yet attended the school regularly, but that old grey-haired men and women come and want to be taught. Miss Wight fully realizes the discourage ments of the work, and that, viewed from a human standpoint, the prospects are dark; "but viewed," she says, "from the standpoint that God has sent her there to do a work for Him, they are brighte than the sun." The ladies of Portage la Prairie take a deep interes in this school, some of them calling daily to give advice and assist

ance if needed.

720 pounds of clothing and 250 pounds of bedding were sen some time ago. Miss Wight writes that it is cheering to look at it She is much encouraged by the fact that a little Indian girl give some evidence of having given her heart to the Lord Jesus. It will be seen that our Society is supporting seven of the ten Indian school connected with our Church in Manitoba and the North-West.

III.—Central India.

Since the establishment of the Canadian Presbyterian Mission the Province of Indore, Central India, much interest has been man fested by our Society in its development and progress. tions appropriated to the establishment of this branch of mission work in the district occupied by the Church. This interest increases from year to year, keeping pace with our knowledge of the terrible condition of the woman. In these later days God has given to woman a new revelation. It has been revealed to her that more than half the houses in India and eastern lands are closed to man, but joyfully opened to the women who bring glad tidings of salvation. Dr. Joseph Cook tells us that 80,000,000 of heathen women are living behind the closed doors of zenanas and harems. And what do we see behind these closed doors? a picture of degradation, ignorance, superstition, vice, misery and despair, of unquestioning submission to cruel wrongs, which no words can describe, and which has no parallel in our experience. Knowing these things as we now know them, is it surprising that almost two-thirds of our contributions have, from year to year, been appropriated to the work among the women and children in Central India, and that we have increased our staff of lady workers as rapidly as possible?

The Medical Mission work grows in importance and volume. The success of properly educated medical ladies in affording relief, spiritual as well as physical, to India's neglected daughters, is so apparent that a loud call for the increase of these workers comes to sonaries already in the Indian women themselves, but from our mismedical lady, in the person of Dr. Marion Oliver. Miss Oliver maduated with honors from the Woman's Medical College, Kingston, a April last; was solemnly set apart to the Medical Mission work at a company with Miss Wilson, of Nova Scotia, now Mrs. Murray,

The travellers reached Indore in safety on the 18th December, nd for the present Dr. Oliver has settled at Indore. In writing from ndore, December 29th, she says: "I am not going to write you a tter of any length till I have been here a little longer, and am able write intelligently on Indore and our Mission work. To-night I st send a few lines to say that I've got here, got my own and the ission boxes and organs in good order. Got Miss Wilson converted to Mrs. Murray; got a snug corner in Miss Beatty's rooms for yself; aye, and in her heart too; got myself, and belongings pretty ell in order, so that I shall be able to begin the study of Hindu on onday next." In speaking of the Mission she says: "Am more an agreeably surprised with the Mission, with India and with surundings. Miss Beatty's hands are more than full, but as yet my ugue is tied. * * * I am trying to pick up fresh words every day. ave been in several houses with Miss Beatty, and seen many sick men and children * * * . . Mrs. Wilson, in describing the work Neemuch, says: "The building in which our school and dispeny have accommodation would make a fine hospital, and we someles look forward far enough to see its rooms filled with patients, presided over by a lady from our own Canada. I think each of

our stations has a covetous eye on Miss Oliver, and is wondering who will be fortunate enough to secure her after her year at Indore is ended. * * * There is certainly plenty of room for a lady doctor at Neemuch. Miss Beatty spent a week with us lately, and in that time was sought out by and gave medicine to many women.

Upon the return of Rev. J. F. Campbell to India, and the arrival of Rev. R. C. Murray, in January, 1886, the Mission Council proceeded to take up new stations and distribute the members of the Council to these various points. In making these arrangements it was decided that all our lady missionaries, with the exception of the Misses Stockbridge, should remain in Indore, consequently our staff there numbers, since the arrival of Dr. Marion Oliver, five. Miss Rodger and Miss McGregor, our oldest missionaries (one having been thirteen and the other nine years in India), have during the year-Miss Rodger in September and Miss McGregor in July-placed their resignations in the hands of the Foreign Mission Committee. This matter is now under consideration by the Committee, and we earn estly pray that the Holy Spirit may so influence the minds of all interested, both at home and in the mission field, that, for the glory of God and the good of the Church, the valuable services of these ladies may be retained.

Miss Rodger reports her school as prosperous. About twenty girls are studying English, and a larger number are studying the vernacular, the latter, however, are not as regular in their attendance, nor as eager to learn as the first. The girls studying English are for the most part Bengalese, Parsees, with a sprinkling of the Mohammedan and Marathi element, and lately some Eurasian girls have attended. "The Bengalese children," Miss Rodger says, "are very clean and tidy, and do not require to be told to attend to these things, as is frequently the case even with the Parsee girls," The children all meet together to study the Scripture lesson and geography. "They have studied this year," Miss Rodger writes "Barth's Scripture History, and have taken up the time when the children of Israel entered Canaan, also the chief events of the life of Christ. * * * They have a good idea of general geography, and can answer a few questions in astronomical geography."

Miss Rodger has not been able to give us much time as usua this year to zenana work, on account of the difficulty of securing the assistance of a competent Bible woman. There are a few Hindu girls attending school between the ages of five and eight years, they are not far advanced, however, as, on account of the early marriages of Hindu girls, they remain at school such a short period.

The establishment of the boarding school for native girls are widows, in which Miss Rodger is so deeply interested, has been delayed, owing to necessary changes in the plan of proposed building. training of native teachers and Bible women for future work, besides affording shelter and education to many poor suffering little widows, who might otherwise in their wretchedness and despair, fly to a life of vice. Our Societies are all alive to the importance of this work, and, without doubt, when the details of the scheme are arranged and approved by the Foreign Mission Committee, will provide the means for the erection of the building.

Recent intelligence informs us that Miss McGregor has been ill since the month of January (the date of her letter is Feb. 24th), but is now able to leave her room. During the year her time has been much occupied with the Central Girls' School, 285 in all have attended this school, the majority of them for more than six months, 63 new names have been added, while 124 have left, many on account of their marriage, others because of removal from Indore. In January 106 names were on the roll, with an average attendance of 73. Religious instruction is given, and the school always closed

An important department in the school is the training class for teachers, which numbers eight.

Miss McGregor calls attention in her report of work to the advance of public opinion with regard to the education of women, as evidenced by the fact that four pupils over the age of fourteen have been permitted to attend school this year, and formerly, she says, "only the lowest and often disreputable characters would offer to bring the children to school. Now situations of this kind are eagerly

The Ranepoora, or mixed school, was open during the first half of the year, with an average attendance of 25, and the Bible class of native Christian women, numbering from six to eight, has been continued, the women attending pretty regularly. semployed, and zenanas visited in the usual neighborhoods. 306 visits have been made during the year, and 2,577 persons have, through these visits, heard the Gospel read.

Miss Ross opened a new school in the Sarafa, or money lenders' street, in August last. While seeking for a house in this locality the heard many disparaging remarks about the education of girls and women, the men said it would not do to educate women, as hey would become as sharp as themselves, and would not then mind what they (the men) said to them. Miss Ross, however, perevered and secured the room, but for three days no one came. "On the fourth day one little girl came in, and for three days had companion. * * * During the month ten presented themselves, and spicions, one said that Miss Ross would "drown the girls," nother that she would "carry them off," and a third that she ould "give them something to drink and break their caste." But he school has prospered, and there are now "eighty names on the II, with an average attendance of twenty-five or thirty." Through the school admission is gained to the houses.

Ross says that she has received invitations to which she has not been able yet to respond. She visits now twenty houses and six Mohullas. None of the women visited have yet asked for baptism, though the faces of some "always brighten" when she speaks of Jesus, and they have "lost faith in their own idol worship."

From recent letters we learn that Miss Beatty was laid aside about the middle of January with a sharp attack of fever, and is now in Neemuch for change of air. The past year has been a busyone with Dr. Beatty, the work grew so rapidly that she was unable to attend to it alone, she has, however, secured an able assistant in the person of Miss Brierly, who has had considerable training in connection with a Zenana Medical Mission. Dr. Oliver has also given good assistance. Since Dr Beatty's illness, through an interpreter in the dispensary, Miss Beatty has treated during the year more than 3,500 patients, and visited about 500 in their homes. "The Bible woman," writes Miss Beatty, "always goes with me, and when I cannot make the women understand she explains. Each house represents a congregation of from four to a dozen or more women, who hear a Gospel hymn and the story of the Saviour's love."

Miss Beatty looks hopefully forward to the opening of a hospital for women. She has already had one case which was successfully treated. She says: "I believe the time is ripe for the opening of the hospital and training school. Four intelligent women are urging me to teach them obstetrics and diseases of women, and I hope soon to ask you, through the Council, for money for a building." Our ladies are delightfully comfortable in the new bungalow.

Miss Annie Stockbridge, Mhow, in describing her school work says :-- "The great hindrance is the early marriage system, constantly bright girls in whom we begin to take an interest suddenly leave school to be married, which ends their life of freedom. The daily attendance at school is between thirty and forty I have children of all creeds and castes, except Mohammedans, who will not, as a rule, send their little girls to school." Miss Stockbridge visits twenty-seven houses, and in teaching fancy work and reading, speaks to them of a Saviour's love. They listen very attentively to the truth. One Bengali Baboo's wife says that she "partly believes the Bible," though she cannot become a Christian, on account of her family. The majority of the families visited are Hindu, with a few Parsee and Mohammedan houses. Miss Minnie Stockbridge has charge of a school at Pensionpora, visits several zenanas, dispenses simple medicines among the people. Mrs. Builder has carried on her industrial class of women at Mhow with good success during the

Mrs. Wilkie has given us a very pleasing description of the distribution of the contents of the boxes sent with Dr. Oliver. She says, "to each woman we gave a cretonne bag, into which we put needles, pins, thimble, and 4½ yards of bright calico to make a jacket also a book containing Hindu texts and cards. Our estimates of work this year provided for the expenses of the medical training of two young ladies, viz., Miss McKellar, of Ingersoll, and Miss M. Fraser, of St. Elmo, Glengarry Presbytery.

Miss McKellar, having completed a preparatory course of study tion examination, began, in October, her medical studies at Kingston Woman's Medical College. At the same time Miss Fraser and Miss Ebarts, of Lindsay, entered the Kingston College and also commenced been accepted by the Foreign Mission Committee for the field in the Committee upon the completion of Miss Ebarts to make application to passed most creditable examinations in the High School, Galt, where for future service in the foreign field, to which she had given herself application to the study of the science which was to fit her for Mission work among the women of India.

Very suddenly, however, and without any premonitory symptoms, she was stricken with paralysis on the evening of 1st January. This affliction seemed almost unbearable at first, but now, with a spirit of quiet resignation, Miss Ebarts is able to say, "He hath done all things well." And, though our sister may never go to India as a aries, accepted as such by the God of missions, who sees the heart and who ever takes the will for the deed (when only one can be given),

Miss Bell is somewhat stronger than at this time last year, but food has also, for His own wise purposes, set this missionary (in spirit) aside, and there is little probability, at least in the near future, in India. Miss Bell is now in Scotland with friends, and has written us from there several times during the year.

IV.-Trinidad.

Our Society has this year contributed the sum of \$300 for the stablishment of a school in connection with the work of Rev. J. Knox Wright, Couva; Miss Minnie Archibald, of Truro, N.S., was appointed to this important work and left in November last. Miss

Archibald is an experienced teacher, and is likely to prove a valuable addition to the staff of workers in this field. Mr. and Mrs. Wright have recently been called upon to part for a short while from one of their little ones. God has taken him to Himself. They will be comforted, doubtless, by the thought that though "he shall not

return" to them, they "shall go to him."

Mrs. Morton has favored us with many interesting and helpful letters from month to month and copies of circular letters, sent to the Societies in the Maritime Provinces. These have been specially suitable and instructive to our Mission Bands. Mrs. Morton sends us the following report of the schools established by means of the contribution of \$300 sent to her from our Society previous year:-"Don't expect a glowing report. A good work is going on by means of the Red Hill school. We have secured a much better room than we had at first and it is used as a place of meeting on Sabbath and fortnightly when the catechist visits us. It is full on these occasions. The children are making good progress, but the teacher is only second-rate. There is one good and encouraging feature about this school, the children are unusually regular in their attendance. I have fostered this by giving a small reward to all who miss not more than two attendances. Pray for the teacher, he is not baptized yet, though at heart we believe him to be a Christian. The Macoya school has not accomplished so much, but we will not give it up. Agnes goes once a week to the Macoya school to gather in the girls for a lesson in sewing."

The New Hebrides.

Our Society has this year contributed \$300 for schools in these islands, also \$200 for expenses of "Dayspring" and 800 pounds of clothing, much of it new, sent with our dear friends Mr. and Mrs. Annand to assist them in beginning work in the island of Santo. This devoted missionary and his wife sailed from San Francisco in March for this island of savages in the New Hebrides. Recent intelligence from this field informs us that our missionaries and families are all well, and the work of the Lord prospering in their hands. It has been announced that 25 French families are about to be sent to the New Hebrides to found a colony, and the attitude of the French government is a cause of grave anxiety to many, but God can and will overrule all these events for His own glory and the advancement of His kingdom. In exchange for our Santo box we received from the missionary women of Halifax a noble contribution of clothing for our North-West Indians. The work is one, and pleasing interchanges of this kind are links in the golden chain of Christian affection, which binds us together as sister societies.

We take pleasure in thanking our missionary friends in various fields for valuable letters received from time to time. Mrs. Wright, Miss Lizzie Copeland, Miss Temple and Rev. K. J. Grant have been most kind in this respect. With much gratitude, we also

The Foreign Mission Committee is a tower of strength to our Society and, under its sheltering care which may meet us, in the progress of our work.

It will be remembered that at last annual meeting a memorial from the Peterboro' Presbyterial Society called the attention of the Board to work among the Jews and asked that something might be done to give to God's ancient people the Gospel of Christ. After some conversation, it was decided to empower Mrs. Byers, of Ganto forward them to Dr. Freshman, New York, for his mission among the Jews. The sum of \$15 has been contributed and applied in this way.

This eleventh annual record of the foreign work of our Society is now about concluded. To the general reader it may appear dry and uninteresting, but to those whose hearts are aflame with missionary zeal and love, it will be none too long. Such as it is we lay it before you, grateful to God for all that has been accomplished. But we pause for a moment to note a phase of this work which we had purposely refrained from alluding to until now, we mean the wondrous grace and blessing which have come to our own souls through it.

Has not the love of Missions illumined for us Bible truth; has it not taught our trembling lips to pray and speak; has it not scattered to the winds many and strong prejudices; has it not opened our eyes to the gifts and graces of others; has it not made us more content with our place and lot in life; has it not enlarged our hearts and filled them with love to the whole world; has it not taught us to be unselfish and given us a truer conception of the meaning of the word "Giving"? Expressed in a sentence, our Society has been and is a spiritual training school for its members. Are not our young people beginning to pray aloud to the edification of others, and are they not learning to deny themselves that the Gospel may be preached? Not more than a month ago a young domestic servant, living in Toronto, handed to the President of one of the Mission Bands a cheque on the Post Office savings bank for the sum of \$44 for our Mission work in India and China. In handing it in she said, "I cannot have money in the bank at interest when millions are starving for the Bread of Life."

Ye dwellers in darkness, with sin-blinded eyes, Go, wash at His bidding and light will arise, Come to the light, 'tis shining for thee, The Light of the world is Jesus.

The "dwellers in darkness," are many, 850,000,000 of them, and they must be brought to the Light. Then let us "go forward" in

HOME SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The year now closing has been the most successful yet enjoyed by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (Western Division) in newly formed auxiliaries, average attendance at meetings, the number who are awakened to take a leading part in the exercises, accession of members, manifest interest and large gatherings at the annual meetings of Presbyterial societies, and the visible outcome of it all-

A band of fifty hopeful women began this work for the women and children of heathen lands eleven years ago, at the desire of the Foreign Mission Committee, believing that by self-denial and special attention to systematic giving they, and their sisters who would join them, could be a further aid to the Foreign Missions of our Church without infringing on the varied claims of the needy and the heathen in our midst, the schemes of our Church, or the home. At the close of our tenth year the General Assembly gratefully recognized our help and desired "to endorse and emphasize the appreciative estimate of the committee " for it.

Two New Presbyterial Societies, 65 Auxiliaries, and 26 Mission Bands,

an average of nearly eight per month, in all, reward the diligence of busy organizers since last general meeting. Within the first month of our gathering in London six auxiliaries were formed. The Presbyteries surrounding that city displayed activity throughout the whole year and many expressed their indebtedness to its influence, as did those in the vicinity of Ottawa in the previous year—an influence which, the membership and contributions from that quarter just read by secretaries, show, is not an impulse of the moment, but a steady perseverance. Three of our branches have failed to report this year, but we have good reason to believe that some of them have vitality enough left to be yet revived, and it is cheering to note that four of our former number which, under adverse circumstances, disbanded, have once more heartily united with us. The live members of such weak societies can yet pray for the work being done at home to send the Gospel abroad, and for our Missionaries who are constantly asking Christians thus to remember them. Rev. A. N. Somerville, D.D. says that solitary individuals, simply by their prayers, may be the means of introducing the Gospel into vast and populous dominions, but it must be associated with action.

Our older branches display an improvement generally in motives for and methods of giving, with a desire to keep in view the obligations under which we yearly come to our Church and the need for liberality; for example: "When we read the estimates for the year at our monthly meeting, there was a general expression of thankfulness for the evident spread of interest in missions, and, also, we are glad

that so much more is expected of our Society."

Here we would affectionately remind and urge upon our members that by giving in the ordinary way, and with unity of aim, into the general treasury, the work will go on and extend on a sounder and surer basis than can be relied on by making special donations to individuals or Missions. We, as a society, are auxiliary to the General Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee, our funds all go through the hands of that Committee to assist in forwarding every Mission the Church can take up. Our strength at the present moment is

Eighteen Presbyterial Societies, 251 Auxiliaries, and 76 Mission Bands.

We have therefore commenced our second decade with a more assured faith that this branch of Church effort will prosper, and just here is the stage at which we must "double our prayers," as well as our action and vigilance, if we expect to continue the forward movement and personally to obey our Lord's command—"Go ye."

"Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give

glory."

The new Presbyterial societies deserve a passing word, that of Orangeville, although organized only in September, has brought \$288.37 into the treasury, and Brandon with its five auxiliaries, \$97.40. If we add Winnipeg auxiliary with its \$100 to the North-West contribution may we not firmly believe that a reflex blessing will be the result to the donors, and to their large Home and Foreign

Mission. "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth."

Our Society now extends from Ormstown, Que., to Brandon, a distances of 1,555 miles, but on looking over the names of about 600 congregations between—and our auxiliaries and bands together being only 325, and the majority of the latter in connection with the congregational auxiliaries—what a number of gaps appear! We are yet obliged to confess it is the day of small things with us, but could not this very year—the jubilee year of our Queen—see a branch formed in every one of them? It is a work for busy women, for the rich, the poor, for her who may give less than the "two mites which make a farthing" although it may not be all her living. The power of littles is shown by our united donation to Missions to day. Individual responsibility may not be lightly dismissed. "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest."

Testimonies to the reviving effects of the meetings are numerous, such as, "We spend a profitable hour together in studying a portion of Scripture; our President takes the lead; the lesson is well prepared; these unions are very pleasant to all who take part in them.'

"Our membership is well nigh doubled, and interest at each meeting greatly increased. The Lord be praised for stirring us up in this good work." "The work is being blessed to ourselves." "May the outcome of it all be His glory."

"The heathen are so dependent, by God's own plan, on us who believe the glad tidings."

One feature of this year's advancement has been the hiving off among some of our larger societies; Hamilton Auxiliary has become three bands. The Toronto "Murray-Mitchell" and "Burns" have dispersed into several; almost every church in the latter city has now its congregational auxiliary and the majority Mission Bands besides. The advantage of this appears when we state that seventy members were enrolled on one evening in one church.

The Mission Bands

as usual have taken a good share in enriching the treasury, in helping the needy Indians to garments for the body and food for the mind. They have been our Aarons and Hurs. At a meeting of one Band seventeen young girls followed one another in sentence prayers, each taking up one subject, petition, or field. And some members have gone further—they have offered themselves for Mission work.

The Outlook

for the formation of societies is encouraging. enquiry prevails, practical questions are put. Our reports and letter leaflets of past years are sought, and we are told by some they are

Some ladies ask for a mere talk from Presbyterial officers and end the meeting by organizing, others give us a surprise by announcing that they, with the authority of their minister, are now an

A number of our auxiliaries have been formed this year through requests from ministers for a representative from the Board to go and explain our methods to the women of the congregation. And there are now official communications from two presbyteries on the

The students in our colleges have added their quota of effort and some auxiliaries have arisen through their instrumentality. They tell us of the ladies in new and scattered congregations wishing to know of our work. "The students who preach on 'Missions,' says one, "are beginning to recognize the great importance of urging the formation of auxiliaries." Another says, "My prayer is that God may bless you as individuals and as a Society and enable you to do great things for the advancement of His kingdom."

Our members going to new and distant parts of our country carry on the work. A young girl sent back to her old auxiliary \$7. Another member became president and sent in a life membership fee. Thus intelligence regarding Foreign Missions is diffused and

the work at home for the fields abroad is extending.

Many of our members have passed this year from our sight, we believe into the presence of the Master whom they served here. May we, like them, "reap, and gather fruit unto life eternal."

The good done by visits of Missionaries is learned through reports from different societies. Earnest prayers continue to be offered for Rev. J. A. and Mrs. Annand. Of the latter an auxiliary says, "Her straightforward story of the wrongs to which women are subjected impressed us greatly." Rev. Hugh Mackay's description of life among our own North-West Indians, particularly the children, touched the hearts of all who heard him. Twenty-two enrolled themselves as members of one auxiliary after hearing him, and their enthusiasm has borne good fruit already.

Literature.

The Tenth Annual Report has told its tale to thousands and has borne good fruit. The issue of the Monthly Letter Leaflets is now 1,500. Each Society is entitled to two free, and each life member to one. The rest are for sale by the Home Secretary, and this year have brought in a revenue of \$50.29. Many who buy and read them at home testify to their value in helping to interest others, and to a better understanding of where our Missionaries are and what doing, also to a better appreciation of how our own work is carried on. Our members now look for the statement of expenditure and estimates for the year, sent out in September generally, and have come to examine it_critically to find out if their money is wisely applied.

All our other literature is sent out by Mrs. Telfer, 72 St. Alban Street, Toronto, whose report for the past year is as follows: Mite boxes sold 4,942, given free 100, total 5,042; leaflets sold 12,276, free 10,131, total 22,407; envelopes, 3,745; prayer cards, 1,862. The free distribution has in several instances borne fruit. A President sent a small supply to a young friend in a newly-settled district, the result was a donation to her auxiliary of \$22.00, collected by the friend. The members of two or more societies send mite boxes to the women in the congregation who cannot attend their meetings and a good return is thus made, in one instance \$10 being added to the funds.

The Garments for Indian Women and Children

in our Canadian North-West, and the presents suitable for our Mission schools in Central India and the New Hebrides must be but briefly referred to here, a description of all having appeared in the Letter Leaflet. In the donation to Central India, sent by Dr. M. Oliver, six societies (four of them in Barrie presbytery), assisted by a few friends, united. Almost all the auxiliaries in London Presbyterial Society joined in forwarding about 800 pounds weight to the New Hebrides by Rev. J. A. and Mrs. Annand. One hundred and sixty auxiliaries and Mission Bands, assisted by sister societies and other friends of the "Red Man," sent over 21,000 pounds weight of excellent clothing "with much heart and good will" to the addresses of eleven Missionaries and Missionary Teachers who are in charge of schools on the different reserves in our North-West. "The women that were wise-hearted did spin with their hands and brought that

To the friends who have helped us, and among them Sabbath Schools and Mission classes, our thanks, as a Society, are due for this and for donations in money year after year.

To show that giving to Mission blesses, one among many says, "I think this box did good to our women themselves," the pastor, in the absence of officers unavoidably detained, gave a Missionary address and left, thinking the meeting was over, "but they prolonged it, reading Missionary intelligence, some engaging audibly in prayer who had never done so before."

Dr. Pierson says: "Practically the Missionary work is to-day carried on by a small fraction of the membership of the Church of Christ." Our opportunity will soon be past; can we not consecrate ourselves anew to the work this day, and look for an awakening to their privileges of all the women of our Church, and through

It is with much pleasure and thankfulness that we present the Fifth Annual Report of this Society. that has crowned our efforts we give to Him, in whose service we have been privileged to engage, our grateful praise.

As a Presbyterial organization we have been abundantly blessed during the past year, blessed in the advance which some of the older Auxiliaries have been enabled to make in membership and in their contributions, blessed in the extension of our work by the addition of five new Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands, blessed in the increased zeal and liberality of all the Societies, and blessed in the development and useful application of latent talent in our midst.

We have now fourteen Auxiliaries and three Mission Bands all actively engaged in seeking to push forward the great work, and largely animated by true missionary spirit. These comprise an aggregate of 415 members, 92 being members of the General Society, and one, Miss Constance Henderson, of Cobourg, being enrolled a life member. The contributions from the Auxiliaries amount to \$800.57, from the Mission Bands, \$128. Total, \$928.57.

The above figures show an increase for the year, in membership, of 162, in contributions, \$245,11.

The response to the appeal for clothing for destitute women and children in the North-West has been hearty and liberal, nearly all the Auxiliaries contributing, the aggregate value being about \$300.

Woman's Foreign Missionary Society

OF THE

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

(WESTERN DIVISION).

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—This society shall be called "THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA" (Western Division), and its central point of operation shall be the City of Toronto.

ARTICLE 2.—Its object shall be to aid the Foreign Mission Committee and Board of Missions, by promoting its work among the women and children of heathen lands, and for this purpose it shall receive and disburse all money which shall be contributed to the Society, subject to the action of that Committee or Board, in the appointment of missionaries supported by the Society, and fixing their salaries and locations. For the furtherance of this end it shall endeavor to organize similar Associations throughout the Church, and these Associations shall bear the name of "Auxiliary Societies to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada," and shall report their work to this Society at such times as the By-laws may direct.

ARTICLE 3.—Each person paying one dollar annually, through an Auxiliary or direct to the Treasury, shall become a member of this Society. The payment of twenty-five dollars by one person, at one time, shall constitute a life membership.

ARTICLE 4.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of thirty-six Managers, including the President, four Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, two Corresponding Secretaries, and a Treasurer. They shall be elected from the members of the Society annually, by the members who are present at the Annual Meeting They shall have power to elect non-resident Vice-Presidents, and to appoint corresponding members when the objects of the Society shall be promoted thereby; they shall also have authority to fill vacancies occurring in their body during the year.

ARTICLE 5.—There shall be an Executive Committee, composed the officers and four other Managers, to be elected annually. The Committee shall have power to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board Five members shall constitute a quorum.
