Fail To Win Back **Ground That They Lost**

Efforts of Germans Useless Against French-Only Artillery Work on The **British Front**

Paris, Oct. 11.—The French statement follows:

"In Belgium last night we broke up a German attack delivered east of Draeibank, against our positions between Victore Farm and Petegoet Farm. "On the Aisne front an enemy patrol, which was seeking to approach our lines in the region of Cerny, was dispersed by our fire.

"On the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun front), in the region of Hill 344, the Germans made an attack which enabled them to gain a footing momentarily in a portion of one of our advanced trenches. After a spirited engagement we repulsed the adversary and remained masters of our positions. "Sub.Lieut. Beyau yesterday brought down his tenth enemy airplane."

London, Oct. 11.—The official statement issued today by the war office regarding military operations on the battle field in France and Belgium says:

"There was a heavy rain again last night. The enemy's artillery showed considerable activity during the night west of Passchendaele. Otherwise there was nothing of special importance to report."

London, Oct. 11-(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)-Telegraphing last evening, the Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters says:-

"Although the achievements of Tuesamount to a great victory and the actical result is of major importance. The home divisions and Australians again covered themselves with glory while the gallant Newfoundlanders' achievements were superb. A Lancashire territorial division received its baptism of fire. Its task was to advance over the most exposed and sodden ground on the whole front. Without any tangible guide to their objectives, after passing through Reutel with slight opposition they encountered the enemy in force in a cemetery flanking the right hand of Zwaanloek road. The enemy was hiding in camouflaged trenches covered with muddied brushwork, and which concealed rifle and machine platforms. They offered a stubborn fight."

Bordeaux, Oct. 10—The socialist congress ended today with a complete triumph for the majority section. Their resolutions were passed by a vote of 1,500 to 52. They favor the Stockholm of the socialist party to obtain the necessary passports for delegates to attend it. The resolutions also approve of socialist representation in the cabinet, a more vigorous national defence policy and a revision of the war objects of the allies.

Cook for 15 or 20 minutes, or until the potatoes are well done and the sauce is thick and greamy. It is necessary to stir and creamy.
