HOUSE SPLITS EVEN; SPEAKER DECIDES

Effort to Change Private Bills' Days Fails by Chair's Vote.

OTTAWA, March 31-For the first time in its history—so far as available records indicate—the House of Commons today divided evenly and the Speaker was called upon to give his casting vote.

Exports to the United Kingdom Alone Equal to \$1,910,675.

The extent of the rubber industy of Canada is set forth in a report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for the year 1923. The figures are the latest available on the subject, but these have been few changes since, and it is regarded as covering the present situation. The report shows that three plants were engaged in manufacturing tires and footwear together, while seven combined to manufacture tires, tubes and other gbods. The total of forty plants included nine manufacturing tires and fubes, eight making footwear and thir-

the goods. The total of forty plants included nine manufacturing tires and tubes, eight making footwear and thirem manufacturing other goods.

The statistics show that forty establishments have a combined capital of \$56,061,625, and paid \$2,938,743 in salaries to 1,749 persons and \$9,390,374 wages to 9,897 employes. The cost of materials used was \$26,635,306, the gross value of production \$56,512,947, and the net value \$30,177,641. The plants produced 2,150,768 pneumatic tires, 2,256,604 inner tubes, 14,081,049 pair of footwear, valued at \$18,465,136,4991,417 feet of rubber belting worth \$2,660,362, and 8,282,664 feet of rubber hose, \$1,887,738. The total value of the production of all other rubber goods amounted to \$9,483,373.

In the manufacture of these goods the tire factories used 26,029,378 pounds of crude rubber valued at \$7,446,709, while

the footwear plants used 5,167,692 pounds worth \$1,597,150. Reclaimed rubber used in tires amounted to 4,235,844 pounds, valued at \$377,631, and for rubber footwear there were used 2,629,031 pounds, valued at \$274,201. The tire factories consumed \$1,493,700 of chemicals and mineral compounds, and the footwear plants used \$602,538 worth.







Statistics For 1923, Latest Available, Show Heart Disease Leading Cause of Death—Gloucester Has Highest Birth Rate

FREDERICTON, March 31.- Diphtheria mortality in New Brunswick continues to show a wonderful decrease, according to the statistics contained in the seventh annual report of the Depart- LABOR BUREAU ment of Public Health, as tabled in the House by Hon. Dr. W. F.

Roberts, Minister of Health, today.

Tuberculosis, on the other hand, continues to increase, and the death rate per 100,000 in 1923 was 109.8, as compared with Advanced Platform Includa death rate of 106.6 in 1922; 108.6 in 1921, and 108.0 in 1920. The diphtheria death rate per 100,000 was 8.3 in 1923; 11.2 in Prices Firm With Brompton 1922; 14.7 in 1921 and 17.1 in 1920.

According to the report the six principal causes of death in New Brunswick during 1928 were: Disease of the heart, 474; pneumonia, 453; tuberculosis, 489; old age, 349; congenital debility, 320; cancer, 299; all other causes, 2,679. The legitimate births totalled in 1928 10,446 and illegitimate 258. March led the other months in the total number of births, 1,085 children being born in that month.

SCHOOL INSPECTION.

Reference is made in his report to the Minister by Dr. G. G. Melvin; chief medical officer, of medical inspection in the schools of the province. In 1923-24 11,216 pupils were vaccinated free of cost, while there were 1,427 private vaccinations, making a total of free and private vaccinations of 12,648. 


