



17.—What new rules are now made?

1. To Encourage Missions to Broome Circuits as Soon as Possible.

(a) That Rule 201, shall have added to it the following, viz.: That where the Conference deems it needed it may give to a mission station the full amount of its missionary money from one to three years previous to commencing the scale, in said Rule 201.

(b) That such stations shall be under the direction of the missionary committee, and shall send a quarterly report as missions do, whilst they

continue to retain any portion of their missionary money.

(c) That rule 256, be repealed because it is inconvenient and the above privileges are much greater than it gives.

2. THE JUBILEE AND THE CHURCH EXTENSION FUND.

That as next year is the jubilee year of our work, in this country, such a movement be inaugurated as shall enforce increased vigour into our Church Extension Fund enterprise, and that the following plan be adopted:

CHURCH PROPERTY.

(a) That in view of the low price of property at the present time, all our stations which have not parsonages, be encouraged to purchase, or build, and whilst they are being paid for, mission stations be allowed the following proportion of rent from the Quarter Board, viz.; The year the house is built or purchased, the full amount of rent, and one fourth less than the full amount for four succeeding years.

(b) That Rule 189, (b) be thus amended: subscriptions shall be taken up throughout our work, and that a subscription of one dollar shall constitute a member for one year. Ten dollars shall constitute a member for life. Any person who subscribes \$30, to this fund, or any minister who shall collect that sum, shall be a member of the Committee for life, having a seat and a voice in each meeting. But any person who-shall contribute \$50, or any minister who shall collect that amount shall be a life member of the committee, with voice and vote in its meetings for business.


That \$400, shall be substituted for \$1,000, in section (c), rule 180. (c) That Rule 37 shall have added to it the following, viz.; To the extent

of not less than two thirds of its real value.

(a) That the following question be printed on the property schedule:

Is the property, church, or parsonage insured?

(e) That sections a. b. c. d., of rule 187, be used in applying to the District Committee for permission to purchase or build churches and parsonages.



(a) That the rule made at last Conference in reference to superannuated Ministers having a seat and voice in Conference, be repealed, but that any superannuated Ministers affected by the last year's rule while in force shall not be deprived of the privilege which it gave them.

(b) That in future superannuated Ministers shall answer the question on Historical Report, "Is he embarassed in his circumstances?"

5. CHILDRENS' FUND.

That the apportionments to the stations for the Childrens' Fund be made in future on the following principle, viz. Fifteen cents per member, and six per cent on the ordinary income, but that the Finance Committee and Conference shall have power to make exceptions in what they consider special cases.

6. Connexional Hymn Books.

That all our churches and sabbath schools be affectionately urged to use the Connexional Hymn Books, both in our sabbath schools and ordinary services.

7. SICK MINISTERS SUPPLY.

That Mission Stations be reminded that if a Missionary, through sickness becomes unable to perform the duties of his station, application must be made to the Missionary, or Executive Committee, who will as soon as possible, provide a supply, and the station, in behalf of the Missionary Committee must, in the usual way, apply for the allowance from the Relief Fund.

8. Consolidation of Minutes.

That a committee of five members of Conference be appointed to consolidate the new legislation passed since the Conference of 1872, also to consider what other new regulations or modifications of existing rules, might be made with advantage, and to report through the general committee to the next Conference, and the following shall be the committee, viz:—Revs. R. Boyle, J. C. Antliff, B. D., H. Harris, R. Cade and W. Bee.

18.—What changes are now made in relation to Church propertu?

1. That permission is hereby given to the Quarterly Meeting of Walpole Station, and the Trustees of Lot fifteen. Main-street, in the Village of Walpole, to sell said lot, the proceeds to be devoted to Church extension on the Walpole Station.

2. That the Bradford Station Quarterly Meeting have permission to

sell Hope Church on that Station.

19.—What Votes of Thanks are now passed by the Conference?

1. That the thanks of the Conference be conveyed to Mr. R. I. Walker and Mrs. C. Tackaberry for the receipt of \$400 to our Mission Fund, being amount of legacy left thereto by the late lamented Mrs. Robert Walker.

2. That the thanks of this Conference be conveyed to the Companies of the Great Western, the Grand Trunk, and Hamilton and North-Western Railways, for conveying the delegates of this Conference at re-

duced fare.

3. That the thanks of this Conference be given to Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A., B.D., for his very able Conference sermon; to Rev. H. Harris, for his suitable ordination charge, and that they be requested to send them for insertion in the Christian Journal; and also, that the Revs. R. Cade and Thomas Griffith be requested to send their Sabbath sermons for insertion in the paper.

4. That the thanks of the Conference be given to Bro. Goodman, the

Globe reporter, and Bro. C. S. Willis, the Journal secretary.



1. REPORT OF THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE TO THE CONFERENCE.

We have examined the journal of Thomas B. Coupland in which we find satisfactory evidence of painstaking in his labours and thorough devotion to his work. We could not examine the journals of the other brethren as the District Boards by an oversight had not forwarded them to this Committee but from the examinations as reported by the Districts there is sufficient reason to believe they have been faithful to their sacred calling.

2. REPORT OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee believing in the divine origin and moral obligation of the Sabbath desires to express its thanks to Almighty God for the marked improvement which has taken place in its observance during the last few years, but regrets its continued desecration by large numbers of the people of our land and make the following recommendations:

1. That all our ministers, officials and members be requested to abstain from all worldly conversation, social visiting and unnecessary

travelling on the Lord's Day.

2nd. "That we request our People to discourege in every possible way Sabbath interments, inasmuch as they frequently violate the sacredness of the day," and that our ministers preach at least once a year on Sabbath Observance.

3rd. That as a Church we deprecate all unnecessary travelling on our canals, rivers, lakes and railways and all Post Office labour on the Sabbath and devoutly desire its discontinuance.

3. REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE 1879.

Your Committee, having carefully examined the Reports from the Stations, find:

1. That out of 1009 officials reported, 933 are total abstainers from strong drink as a beverage, being 82 per cent. of the whole. Twelve stations report that all their officials are abstainers.

2. That most of our ministers and stations shew commendable zeal in the cause of Temperance, in the holding of public meetings and in preaching temperance sermons; but some few we regret to say, appear to have done but little. On the whole we have cause for rejoining that the practice of total abstinence from intoxicating liquors has taken such firm hold on our neemle.

3. Your Committee would recommend (1) that rule 50, page 10, of the Discipline, which requires that candidades for our local ministry, be total abstainers, which includes those for the itinerency, should be kept in view and acted upon. (2). That rules 179 to 183 relating to the use of intoxicating liquors and tobacco should be kept in view by all our ministers, officials, and members, and be acted upon generally and conscientiously. (3). In general, locking at the continued terrible evils of intemperance, and especially the powerful obstacle it presents the spread of the Gospel, and the best interests of man for time and eternity, we urge that all our ministers and people seek by the employment of all prudent means, and especially by earnest prayers to God in private and public, to advance the cause of temperance in our Dominion.

4. SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

Your Committee has investigated, as far as possible, the state, position and working of the Sabbath Schools of our Church, and begs to report as follows:

There has been an increase of six schools and 163 scholars, and a decrease of two teachers. On some Districts there has been an increase while others have reported decrease. We give the Districts.

TORONTO DISTRICT, an increase of 2 schools and 17 Teachers with a decrease of 98 scholars. BRAMPTON District, a decrease of 2 schools, 16 Teacher, 52 scholars. HAMILTON District, an increase of 2 11 72 GUELPH District, a decrease of 20 LONDON District, an increase of 8 61 KINGSTON 153 a decrease of 4 BARRIE an increase of 22 136

Your Committee would direct the attention of Conference.

1. To the fact that meanly half of our preaching places have no connexional School, (142).

2. That many of the Schools are closed in the winter season, which your committee thinks should be kept open; and would recommend the Conference to call the attention of the stations to the matter.

3. We would further recommend that District Unions be formed; that in each District there-be a Convention held during the winter, and if possible all the Ministers, reperintendents, and Teachers attend, so that a greater interest may be created in Sabbath School Work. The

6. Lastly that these recommendations be read from all our pulpits. All of which we humbly submit.

Pastoral Address.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PRIMITIVE METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA.

DEARLY BELOVED.

"Grace and peace be multiplied unto you." After another year of toil, conflict and success; we, your representatives in Conference assembled, beg to assure you of our interest in your welfare, both for time and eternity.

The Conference has been one of great peace and harmony, the spirit of love, sympathy and unity pervaded the minds and hearts of all the Brethren. Much deference and respect were paid to the views and feelings of all. One aim appeared to be before every eye—the Glory of God, through the extension and consolidation of our beloved connexion.

The net increase in the membership was found to be 133, after filling a large number of vacancies occasioned by removals and deaths.

These arrangements involve a large amount of outlay, and we trust that on both Circuits and Missions a corresponding amount of liberality will be evinced. Brethren suffer the word of exhortation, while we sympathize with you in your financial difficulties, we ask you to prove the Divine promise in this matter of giving unto the Lord's work. "Bring ye all the tithes unto the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." Remember that God is true to His word.

Again, in this age of sentimentalism and cold formality; let us seek a nearness to God, and thereby warm our souls at His altar. There is nothing of such profound importance as a personal consecration of ourselves and our all to God; and the consequent baptism of our souls with




