

been of any amount. It is, however, very evident that though the money in the market has been reduced that relief has been merely a temporary character.

The British funds the operations of day have not worn anything of an important character; they have scarcely supported the buoyancy which distinguished the features of the market yesterday.

The Lyons journals gave a lamentable representation of the state of the town and the working class in particular. According to these prints, the dividends applied for relief to the charitable institutions, and in ordinary times, are estimated at 4,000 and 5,000, are now rated at 27,000 extra euros, and those in the Faubourg of Vaise, La Guillotiere, and Drogue Rousses, amount to between 8,000 and 10,000.

A despatch, dated the 17th of March, 1837, has been received by the Right Hon. Viscount Palmerston, G. C. B., his Majesty's principal Secretary of State for foreign affairs, from Henry Caning, Esq. His Majesty's Consul General and Charge d'Affaires at Hamburg, transmitting a letter made at Bremen for the prohibition of the Slave Trade.

His Majesty's Government has determined upon relieving the 11th Light Dragoon Regiment, and regiments of Foot Guards, from being sent to the Crimea, 1819. The 3d Light Dragoon Regiment has been selected for this service, and will immediately be brought from Ireland to this country, and be assembled at Campobello, where they will be equipped for embarkation, (diamonded) to save the enormous expense of transporting the horses of Cork to Bristol; those fit for service will be transferred to the several regiments of Cavalry in Ireland, and the remainder will be sold at auction for the benefit of the public.

The shipping topic in the French papers, as well as in the correspondence from France, is the "ministerial crisis. According to the best information several days of negotiation had not yet taken place in reconvening the pretensions of M. Molé, Guizot, and last, not least, Louis Philippe; and the only thing which admitted of little doubt was, to use the words of the Doctrinaire Journal de Paris, that the administration must undergo some change in order to encounter the approaching important debates in the Chamber of Deputies.

The Government of Cayenne, recent by the resignation of the Right Hon. Sir Robert Wilson Horton, has been offered to Mr. Stewart Mackenzie, the member for Ross and Cromarty, and accepted by him, in the terms of Sir Robert Wilson Horton's government will expire in October next; six weeks will then have elapsed from his first arrival in Cayenne. We feel certain that his departure from the scene of his labours will be lamented by all who are interested in the welfare of the colony. Mr. Mackenzie is no stranger to the affairs of India, having held the office of a commissioner of the East India Company from 1823 to 1834. The salary of the Governor of Cayenne is reduced from £8,000 to £7,000 per annum; no private secretary is allowed him; his official list of staff is reduced to a salary of £250 a year.
