

Mr, Rawn proved both wary and greedy, for he sold back the shares at \$5 each, which netted him \$13,500 spot cash. Then he levied graft tribute for every cars between to the Osterman Company of course, added the graft to the amount of the repairs. Mr. Rawn was not the only one who had a private graft.
