





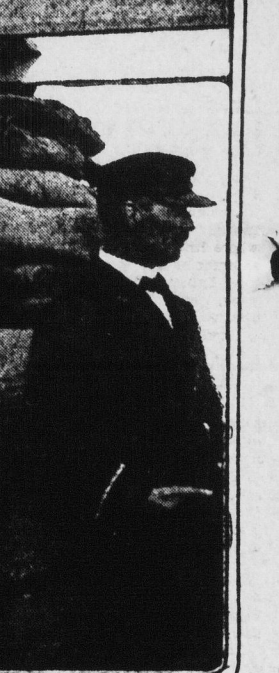

FRENCH ATTACK ENEMY IN THE VOSGES

ENEMY'S POSITIONS BETWEEN LA FONTENELLE HEIGHTS AND TAUNAIS STORMED BY FRENCH

Powerful Defensive Works Attacked Saturday Night—Southern Part of Taunais Taken by French Who Captured 700 Prisoners — Berlin Reports Germans Have Crossed the Narew River — Total Number of Russians Captured by Teutonic Armies Since War Began Estimated at a Million and a Half by German Military Officials.

Paris, July 25.—French troops last night stormed several powerful German defensive works between LaFontenelle heights and the village of Taunais, in the Ban-De-Sapt region of the Vosges mountains, according to an official communication issued this afternoon by the French war department. The southern part of Taunais, the statement adds, was occupied by the French and 700 unarmoured Germans were taken prisoners. On the remainder of the front only artillery duels took place.

Berlin Figures.—The total number of Russian prisoners of war in the hands of Germany and Austria-Hungary since the beginning of the war, including the figures reported by the general staff yesterday, surpasses 1,500,000 officers and men.

Germans Cross the Narew.—Berlin, via London, July 25.—The Germans have crossed the Narew river on a front from a point south of Ostroleka. Southeast of the Pul-tusk fortress the Teutonic forces are approaching the Bug river.

These two advances of the German troops in Russian Poland are announced in today's official statement issued by the German army headquarters' staff. The movement indicates that the Germans are making for the Warsaw-Petrograd railway which runs parallel with the Bug river, 12 miles to the southeast.

More Fighting in Southern Arabia.—London, July 24.—There has been further fighting in Southern Arabia, where British and Turkish forces have been skirmishing for some time, according to a British official statement issued today, claiming a success. The statement follows:

"Sheikh Othman, which in the withdrawal of our troops to Aden had been temporarily abandoned, was re-occupied on Wednesday. The Turks were easily expelled and were pursued for a distance of five miles. Sheikh Othman is now securely held and the civil population is fast returning. The Turks are still near Lahaj, but are said to be suffering from sickness. Our total casualties in the affair of Wednesday amounted to about 25 of all ranks."

French Report.—Paris, July 25, (10:25 p. m.)—The following official communication was issued by the war office tonight:

"In Artois and between the Oise and the Aisne there have been continual artillery actions. On the north bank of the Aisne in the region of Troyon, as well as in Champagne, on the Perthes-Beauejour front, the mining operations have continued to our advantage."

"In Southern Woevre the cannonading has been intermittent. In the Vosges our troops, notwithstanding the bombardment, have organized the positions conquered yesterday at Ban-De-Sapt."

"The number of German prisoners has increased to eleven officers and 825 men, of whom only seventy were wounded. A number of bodies were found in the trenches. On our side only two battalions of one regiment of the regular infantry were engaged. Six machine guns have already been recovered from the conquered trenches."

THE GOEBEN ESCAPES AGAIN

Former German Cruiser arrives at Constantinople with hole in her side caused by torpedo.

London, July 25.—Advice received in Athens from Constantinople state that the Turkish cruiser Miduh, formerly the German cruiser Goeben, was returned with a hole six yards long and three yards wide under the waterline, according to the Athens correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company. The correspondent adds that the German submarine U-51 is reported to be stranded off Tekelmedj.

Men may sneer at God, and the spiritual forces in operation in God's world as they may—I want to give expression to my own positive conviction this evening, which is this, that more men are going to believe in God and the superintending providence of God because of this war, and as they see the calculations of German brutality and insolence and material force overthrown and discounted by the operations of a Divine Providence ruling in the history of nations and individuals.

"This little book has a message for us all—a real permanent message—and the message is just this, that God watches over His people. The many failures of German diplomacy and military science mean nothing less than that a Father's eyes are watching us, and a Father's hand is guiding us, and a Father's love encircles us, and if God be for who can be against us?"

"That is the message. It is the message that this world is under moral government, and its destinies are under the superintendence and control of an all-wise and almighty God. Slowly but surely this war is waking up the whole world to realize what Emerson said—'There is a God.'"

New York, July 24.—A jury, after being out for 53 hours, last night found Edward M. Grout, Brooklyn's first borough president and former controller of New York city, guilty of perjury in that he made a false official statement of the funds of the defunct Union Bank of Brooklyn, while he was its president. He will be sentenced Tuesday.

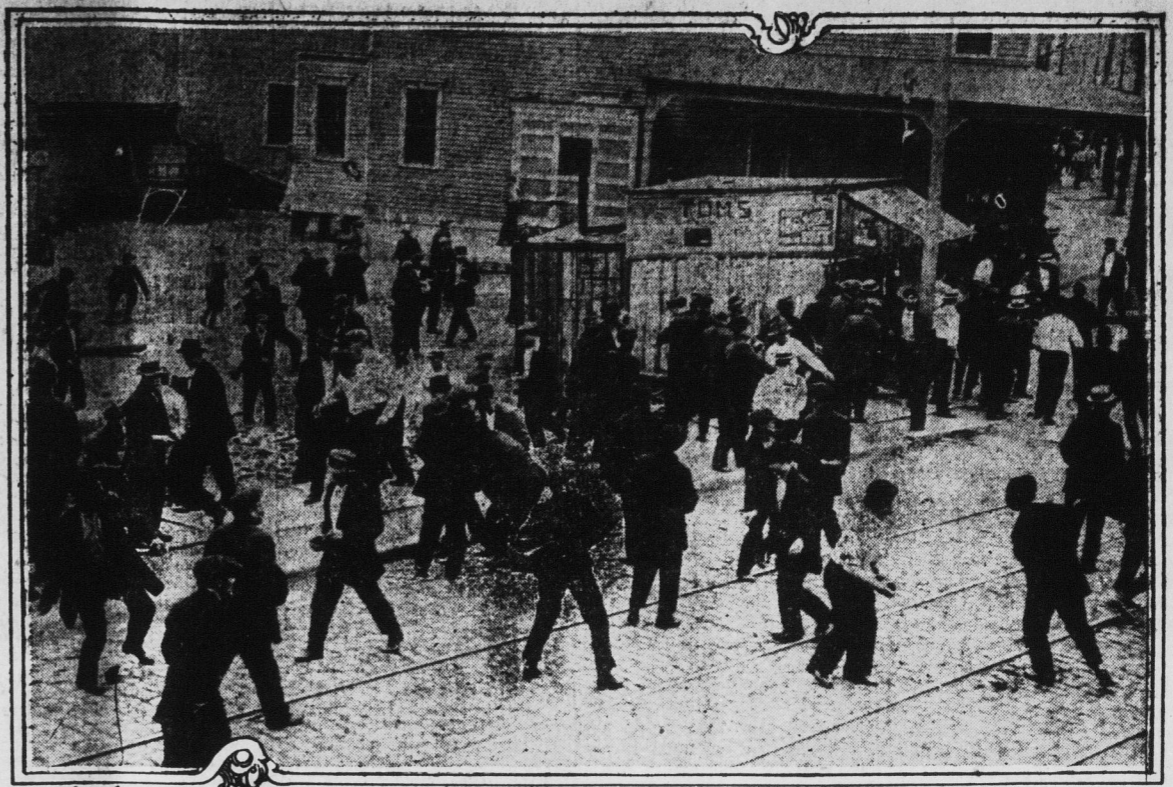

COUNSEL IN BECKER CASE ARE BUSY

Jack Rose Visits District Attorney—Gov. Whitman Doubts Story of Frame-up Against Becker.

Albany, N. Y., July 24.—After a two hours conference with convict Joseph Murphy of Sing Sing, Governor Whitman announced today that the story Murphy told of overhearing Rose, Webber and Vallon planning to frame up former Police Lieut. Chas. Becker, was to his mind untrue. Murphy admitted, the governor said, that he had talked with Becker in the death house at Sing Sing prison on the evening of June 20 and that on the following day Murphy had written to Bourke Cockran information of the alleged "frame up." The guards who had permitted Murphy to enter the death cell would be dismissed Monday, the governor said, after verifying the fact that Murphy had talked with Becker by communicating with Warden Osborne of Sing Sing. Murphy gained admittance to the death cell, by telling the guards he was a member of the Mutual Welfare League and offering to sing for condemned men, the governor said.

Strikers vote not to return to work today—Six thousand more out of work.

New York, July 25.—Efforts to settle the strike of 1,500 Bayonne oil workers, which has been in progress for a week and has been marked by serious riots and the killing of three strikers, failed last night when the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey notified the men that it would not accede to their modified demands. The strikers then voted not to return to work on Monday. Nearly six thousand more men from the Tide Water Company's plant, thrown out of work by the strike, will also remain idle.

FIRE ON BRITISH STEAMER STARTS FROM EXPLOSION

Valuable sugar cargo destroyed shortly before steamer Cragside was due to sail from New York.

New York, July 25.—An explosion of unknown origin occurred in the forward hold of the British freight steamer Cragside at her dock in the Hudson river here yesterday and was followed by a fire which, however, was speedily checked. The Cragside which was to leave here last night for an English port with a cargo of 100,000 bags of sugar will be delayed a few days. Authorities are investigating to determine the cause of the explosion. The fire and water damage to the steamer was estimated at \$10,000 while the cargo of sugar, valued at \$144,000 is believed to be a total loss.

DENY TURKEY WILL SUE FOR PEACE

Peace rumors continue in Geneva, however—Turkish officials and Khedive of Egypt have arrived.

Geneva, via Paris, July 25.—Nedjemken Effendi, the Turkish minister of justice, and Fassun Effendi, arrived Friday at Lausanne from Berlin. The former is ill and has entered a hospital. The Turkish consul here today stated that the story published here and also in London to the effect that Nedjemken Effendi and Fassun Effendi came to Switzerland as representatives of their government, with the object of opening parliaments for a separate peace with the Triple Entente, is untrue. "Even if she wished to Turkey cannot make a separate peace," declared the consul. However, the peace rumors continue. By a curious coincidence Abbas Hilmi, former Khedive of Egypt, also has arrived at Lausanne from Vienna. He is travelling incognito. In the hands of Mary Ann Rumley was improving. 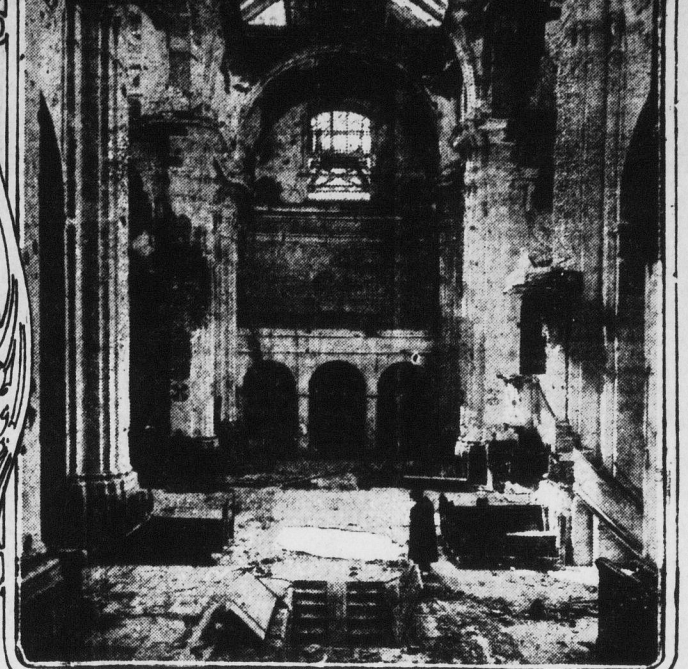

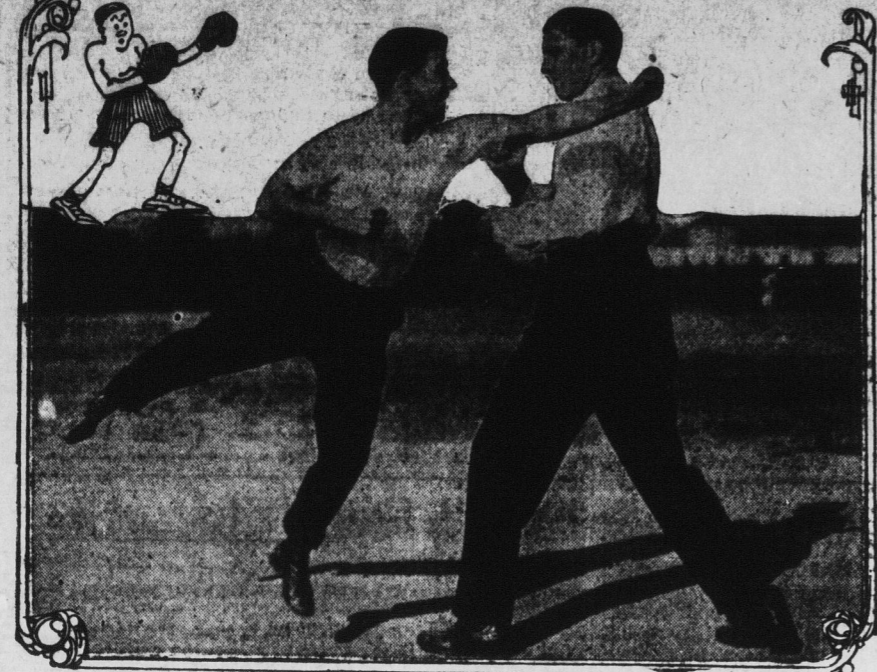
