MAKE MILLS CLOSING DOWN IN ORDER TO CURTAIL OUTPUT

In This Way They Plan to Brace Up the Spruce Market—Production Will Be Decreased One Half During Month of July—Statement of St. John Millowners Confirmed.

(Bangor News.)

As parties to an agreement reached at the meeting of spruce manufacturers in Boston last week, most of the large mills in Maine will curtail production to some extent. N. M. Jones, of Bangor, representing the Katahdin Pulp & Paper Co. (which has a large saw mill in Lincoln); Samuel Stern of the Stern Lumber Company, and Edward E. Walker, of James Walker Company, were in Bangor, representing the Maine Spruce Company and the Maine Spruce Company and other big spruce concerns also had men there.
