Death of Hon. M. Adams

The death of Senator Adams which took place Sunday evening at about 7 o'clock has thrown a gloom on the whole community.

Mr. Adams was ill for some time of hemorrhage and for the past week was very low and his death was not unexpected.

He was born at Douglasville in 1845, was educated there, was called to the bar in 1868, and was made a Q. C. in 1881.

In 1870 he was elected to the Local Legislature, and in 1875 became a member of the Executive Council and Surveyor General.

He was in the Local House in opposition to the Blair government until 1887, when he resigned and ran for the House of Commons but was defeated by Hon. Peter Mitchell.

In 1891 he was in the Commons until 1898, when he was called to the Senate. He was a man of strong impulses, very hearty, outspoken to the last degree, and popular with everybody.

His wife, the former Catherine L. Patterson, and his second Miss Neill, daughter of the late Mr. Simon Neill, of Fredericton, who survives him, as do five children.

The funeral will take place from his late residence, Newcastle, on Wednesday at 10.45 a. m.

Domestic Postage Reduced

TWO CENTS WILL CARRY A LETTER TO ANY POINT IN CANADA OR THE STATES.

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—The Christmas box of inter-Imperial penny postage has been followed by the New Year's gift of a two-cent letter rate throughout all Canada.

The victims of correspondence of any portion of the Empire with the remainder of the Empire being comparatively small, the London Postal Conference concluded that the reduction to the penny rate, involving no serious financial consequences, should go into effect on the most appropriate day, and, therefore, selected Christmas as the day upon which the inter-Imperial penny postage should take effect.

PARIS, Dec. 30.—The Minister of the Colonies denies the report that Dreyfus has been held in Cayenne on his return to France, adding that the Court of Cassation alone can decide the question of the return of the prisoner.

SCARE IN ENGLAND.

BORONIC PLAGUE MAKES ITS APPEARANCE.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Londons are barely recovering from the Christmas festivities, which have been made to last as long as possible, many business houses closing from Friday, December 23, until Wednesday last. The discordant note of the festive season was struck by the announcement that the Boronic plague had arrived in England through a passenger landed at Plymouth from the mail steamer Golconda, the case having developed on her homeward voyage from India, and by the arrival in the Thames of another suspicious case, landed at Gravesend. This startling news caused a stir, but the Lancet now announces that the man landed at Plymouth was only suffering from a mild type of the disease, while the suspicious case at Gravesend proves to have been sickness due to some other cause than the plague. Both patients, however, have been isolated and the Golconda has been infected. The rate on board the steamer which are accused of spreading the plague in India, have been utterly exterminated by burning.

A FAST TRAIN.

RAIL, NINETY-FIVE MILES IN ONE HUNDRED AND FOUR MINUTES.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 2.—The new fast mail train between New York and San Francisco, which is said to be the fastest long distance regular train in the world and which left New York at 9 o'clock last evening, arrived here over the Lake Shore road shortly before noon, 15 minutes behind schedule time, and left for the west at 12 minutes later. It pulled out of Buffalo one hour and nine minutes late, of which 55 minutes were made up between that city and Cleveland. Buffalo to Erie, a distance of 80 miles, was made in 98 minutes, including two stops. Erie to Cleveland, a distance of 95 miles, was covered in 104 minutes, including stops.

WITH ROAR AND FLASH.

AND ILLUMINATION OF THE COUNTRY FOR MILES AROUND.

PORTLAND, Ind., Dec. 31.—With a roar which was heard 15 miles away, followed by a flash of fire a hundred feet high, which lighted the country for miles, a twelve inch line leading from the Ohio and Indiana Pipe Line company's immense gas station and main south of Red Key, burst today. A few seconds later the entire structure was in flames, and before long the building was destroyed. The pumping station compressed the gas, which went

through the line to Lima, Dayton, and a number of other Ohio towns as well as a number in Indiana, and was created at heavy expense. There will be great suffering among families dependent upon gas for light and heat.

News of the Week

QUEBEC, Dec. 29.—Philippe Vincent, grand chief of the Huron Indians, died last night, aged 61. His death leaves only one Indian with any pretensions to pure original blood, Malanac Goulet. Although most of the Hurons, as customary, have changed their political creed with each change of government, Chief Vincent remained to the last a Conservative of the most pronounced type. He will be hurried to the Indian cemetery with the usual Indian ceremonies.

Advice from England show that the sale of Ontario fatted poultry sent from St. John to Liverpool about a month ago was most successful.

The birds met a ready sale in Liverpool at 18 cents a pound, wholesale. The chickens were well plucked, but not drawn, and weighed an average of 1.2 pounds each. The wholesale price was equal to \$1.76 per pair, a profit of 70 cents per pair.

BOSTON, Dec. 28.—Manager Frank V. Dunan, a theatrical manager, was fined \$500 by Judge Sheldon in the Superior court this afternoon for libel, and in addition was obliged to make a complete retraction of the reference he made concerning the character and reputation of Lawyer Thomas J. Barry, which reference appeared on the program distributed to the patrons of the theatre.

BUDA PEST, Dec. 28.—A third duel was fought between M. Kubec, a son-in-law of M. Horanaky, and M. Kenedi, a journalist. Swords were the weapons, and both men were wounded.

QUEBEC, Dec. 28.—The British steamer Arrow, Capt. Pithie, which sailed for London from here last evening, has been wrecked on a rock. Part of her crew has been saved and landed here.

The captain, the chief officer and the second and fourth engineers are missing. The British steamer Glenavon hailed from Glasgow and was of 1912 tons register.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 2.—Mrs. Loretta Keat, a widow met her death in a manner horrible in the extreme. Her fate was revealed when a friend entering the house found her dead body. One hand was pinioned instinctively under heavy folding bed. The body was badly decomposed, showing that death had occurred several days ago.

When found, the woman's broken head was still clasped in bed as in a blacksmith's vice. The woman lived alone in the house.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 2.—John Wellmer, of Lafayette, Nicolette county, was shot in the head and hit by two bullets, which had given a mortal wound. They bound Mrs. Wellmer to a clothesline and escaped with Wellmer's team. After the men had gone Mrs. Wellmer began gnawing at the rope with her teeth and after several hours of hard struggle succeeded in biting the cord in two and liberating herself. Going immediately into the yard she found her husband dead and his body frozen.

A large posse of farmers armed with ropes with which Mrs. Wellmer had been tied had gone in pursuit of the desperadoes.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 2.—Advice brought by the steamship Victoria, says that the steamer merchant vessel to Shanghai, destined at all sailings offgo into that province cease.

The yellow fever floods have destroyed the crops and famine has resulted. Thousands of natives are starving.

Thousands of other hungry and ragged refugees are moving down the river in boats only to find the walls of the cities lower down closed against them. The government appropriated 300,000 taels for their relief but less than one fifth has been distributed.

It is claimed that dishonest officials have pocketed the balance. A relief fund has been started at Shanghai.

A panic prevails throughout Szechuan province, China, caused by the rehoisting of the black flag of rebellion by the notorious outlaw Yuanzai.

St. Louis, Mo., January 2.—A special to the Post Dispatch from Carlinville says: The Tipton and Top works of the Carlinville coal shaft are on fire. Ninety men are imprisoned under ground. The fire department seems unable to stop the flames.

Reading, Calif., Jan. 2.—The Mountain region is experiencing all the woes of isolation, as the result of the heaviest snow storm ever known at this point. Snow is from two to three feet deep on the level for ten miles about here in all directions. The wires are all down and trains were unable to move for some hours. A number of small houses collapsed from the weight of snow.

MADRID, Jan. 2.—Official circles here are warmly discussing the attitude of Great Britain, owing to her pressing demands that Spain sell her coaling stations in the Balaetic Islands and other strategic points, so as to render Gibraltar unassailable. The negotiations on the subject have been in abeyance owing to Premier Sagasta's illness, but it is believed that Spain, influenced by France and Russia, will resist the demands of Great Britain.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The Daily News says this morning: "In a roundabout manner we hear that the British authorities, at the request of the French government, have issued a warrant for the arrest of Emil Zola, now known to be in England."
