PERSIA

Under pressure from Russia the Persian government at last yielded to Russia's ultimatum and disengaged by American troops, W. St. Shuster, on the 22nd ult. But an outbreak against Russian troops at Tabriz, one of the chief cities of Persia, occurred on the 20th, and led to the siege and capture of the city after a nine day's struggle. All the northwestern portion of Persia is now occupied by Russian troops who appear likely to remain permanently. To maintain the balance of power, the British are occupying Shiraz on the south coast, where one of their consuls was recently attacked. Were Persia a strong nation all these little difficulties with her neighbors would have been submitted to arbitration, but arbitration is not for the weak in the present condition of the world's politics.

LAND HAS TWO VALUES

Don't get mixed on this subject. Land has two values—one value is created by labor—improving the property, etc., which value should be exempt—the other value is that created solely by population. The idea is to tax the value which the public creates in the interest of the public. This is fair and equitable. To tax a man for improving his property is not fair, we ought to encourage improvements and not fine a man who puts money into a splendid house and estate land. If you believe in this improved system of taxation, say so, and demand a change. The sooner the better.—Chatham, Connecticut.

CHINA

The conference between the representatives of monarchy and republicanism in China, which opened in Shanghai on the 17th ultimo, finally decided upon extending the truce and referring the whole matter to the vote of a national assembly. However, the republican representatives of all of the eighteen provinces of China proper elected on the 29th ultimo, the great revolutionist leader, Dr. Sun Yat Sen, said to be a Christian, to the presidency. On the same day Mongolia, as large in territory as China itself, but containing less than 3,000,000 people, declared its independence under Kutuktu, one of the Buddhist priesthood, as Grand Khan. Eastern Turkestan has also declared its independence, and China proper is divided about equally by the Yangtze river between the Monarchists of the north and the republicans of the south. Fighting again broke out on the 31st, but great efforts are being made by both sides to preserve peace pending an appeal to a newly elected national assembly. The Chinese are creating local governments in the provinces, and this is well understood by the Monarchist leaders, whose almost universal policy is to divide and conquer. The Monarchist and any further progress of international relations.

More Labor Leaders Arrested.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 30.—Olaf A. Tevitt, secretary-treasurer of the State Building Trades Council; J. E. Munsey, leader of the Salt Lake Union of Structural Ironworkers, and Anton J. Hansen, organizer of the State Building Trades Council, were indicted today by the federal grand jury in connection with the alleged nationwide dynamite conspiracy. Their arrest followed.

Indictment was also returned by the grand jury against E. A. Clancy, the McNamara brothers, Ortie E. McManigal and Schmitt and Caplan.

And the grand jury has not finished its investigation by any means, said United States District Attorney McCormick. The three labor leaders, who have been here for some time as witnesses in the government dynamite inquiry, were arrested in the witness room in the federal building a few minutes after the indictments were filed in Judge Wellborn's court.

Nova Scotia Apple Trade

The shipments of apples from Nova Scotia in 1911 aggregated 921,702 barrels, 1,861 half barrels and 9,907 boxes. This is estimated to be only half the crop. Of this quantity 700,128 barrels have been forwarded through the port of Halifax, 21,574 via the Bay of Fundy and 100,000 barrels by rail to western Canada.

REV. W. R. ROBINSON TAXED WITH COSTS

Last July Rev. W. R. Robinson laid a private information against the Royal Hotel, St. John, contending that they were violating the amended section of the Liquor License Act, the purport of which is that no bar is to have any obstruction which will shut out the full view. Daniel Mullin, K. C., acting for the hotel, contended that so long as the inside of the bar was visible from the office it was sufficient. Mr. Wilson, K. C., argued that the bar must be seen from the street. Magistrate Ritchie up-held the plaintiff and gave his decision against the hotel. The case was appealed and argued before Judge Forbes, who a few days ago decided for the appellants and taxed Rev. Mr. Robinson with the costs.

Hon. C. W. Robinson, M. P., Elected to Lead the Liberal Opposition at Fredericton-Convention Will Soon Be Called.

St. John, Dec. 27.—At a meeting of Liberal M. P.s., M. P. P.s., defeated candidates and other representative party men, held here tonight, the first business taken up was the resignation of Hon. C. A. B. Copp, M. P. P., of Sackville, was then selected as his successor. Hon. Mr. Pugsley, Hon. H. R. Emmerson and Mr. Carvell delivered addresses, referring in flattering terms to Mr. Copp's qualifications for the leadership of the opposition, and confidently predicting early victories in both provincial and federal circles. Mr. Copp accepted the leadership making a vigorous fighting speech in which he attacked the provincial government for broken promises, extravagance, etc. It was agreed that a provincial convention should be held on call of the new leader.

SINGLE TAX ADOPTED BY MEDICINE HAT
Western City to Try Experiment With Land Tax Only.

Medicine Hat, Dec. 22.—By the enactment of an amendment to the Medicine Hat charter which will be brought before the legislature the city will introduce the single tax system. The amendment provides for the total abolition of business taxes. Licenses are to be retained, solely for regulation purposes, but the principle upon which the city's revenue is to be derived is to be that of a tax on land alone. The Medicine Hat council decided to abolish all taxes, dock, stock and barrel, with the exception of the tax on land. We have thus given a lead to cities of the province in the direction of a reform which is being seriously considered by all progressive cities everywhere. Medicine Hat will be the only city in North America which is at once a single tax municipality owning all its public utilities.

The estimated revenue for the year ending March 31 next is \$85,000,000, a gain of thirteen millions. The Inland Revenue receipts for the eight months will amount to \$14,347,323, as against \$12,383,118 in the corresponding period.

Mercury Found at Porcupine
Ottawa, Dec. 28.—Cinnabar, the ore of mercury, is reported found at Porcupine, Ontario. As mercury is used to separate silver from its compounds a market for the new ore can be found, right at the mines. Cinnabar has not previously been found in Canada.
